Facts, Figures On Housing Given

Editor's Note: We are indebted to Mr. Loyd F. Green, representative of Olin Boese and Associates of Fort Worth, architects for the expansion project, Housing Authority of The City of Ranger, for the following information.

Old project consists of 50 low rent dwelling units, built in 1951-52, consisting of 25 two-unit buildings.

The new project was authorized by Local Housing Board in March, 1964. Plans were completed in January, 1966.

The job will consist of: A. Three new duplex buildings, 1 bedroom, brick veneer, with vinyl-asbestos tile floors on concrete slab; baths — ceramic tile floor and wainscot with showers; walls plaster-board (sheetrock) with appropriate finish.

B. Five of the existing buildings will have all interior finish and partitions removed and rebuilt to house four one-bedroom units similar to new construction.

C. The Management Building (Housing Office) will be revamped on the interior, a new toilet room, and a 12x14 foot storage room added.

D. A new 2-x30 open air shelter will be built centrally located in the new development.

All dwelling units (this job) are designed for, and will be rented to the aged, only (62 or over).

General contractor for the job is The Herman Bennett Construction Company of Brownwood. Elbert Coburn is the job superintendent at the building site. Various subcontractors for specialized work will be announced later.

Olin Boese and Associates of Fort Worth are the architects. Loyd F. Green is the architect representative on the project.

Moving-in and set-up work started April 13. Actual construction will begin within 10 days or two weeks.

The contractor has 300 calendar days in which to complete the job.

The six new units (three duplexes) are to be constructed first. Re-modeling will be last.

The Local Housing Authority, with V. V. Cooper as Contracting Officer, will have overall charge of all construction.

Cisco Wins North Zone Meet; Ranger Is Third

Cisco Junior College tracksters earned the championship of the Texas Junior College Athletic Conference's north zone track meet in Ranger Tuesday.

The Wranglers scored a total of 102 points. Runner-up was Temple JC with 75 points. Ranger was third with 36 points, followed by Navarro who scored 22. Cooke County JC was fifth placer with 11 points. Hill County JC and Weatherford JC failed to register a point.

Cisco's Isaac Barnes was high point individual performer. He won the 100 yard dash in 9.8 seconds and the 220 in 21.8. Barnes was part of the first-place 440-yard relay team and for which he ran a 47.5 anchor lap.

Cisco tallied five firsts, and Ranger scored three firsts. Temple took laurels in the high jump, broad jump and the mile and two-mile runs. CJC's Mike Lawew was second in the high jump.

The first four place winners in each event will represent the North Zone in the conference meet April 30 at Binn Junior College in Brenham.

Ranger Junior College officials are happy to announce the receipt of a letter from Dr. David T. Kelly of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools recommending that the college be established as a "correspondent school."

This status is given to new colleges or to colleges which have made rapid strides toward full accreditation with this regional agency and who intend to seek accreditation in the near future.

Although Ranger Junior College is fully accredited by state agencies and by the Association for Texas Colleges and Universities, thereby making the credits valid for transfer to senior colleges, the regional accreditation is the ultimate step in academic programming. President Ted Nickack said.

When full accreditation is given, it will be retroactive to the time of the establishment of the correspondent status he said.

Dr. Kelly visited the Ranger campus a few weeks ago and examined the facilities and program. Following this visit he recommended the correspondent status.

Ranger Junior College has made application for special grant under Title III of the Higher Education Act of 1965 for "developing institutions."

The application for this grant must be accompanied by a letter from the regional accreditation agency indicating progress toward accreditation is being made.

In a copy of the letter sent to Washington Dr. Kelly states the following: "It is my opinion that Ranger Junior College is proceeding on a sound basis, generally in accordance with the standards of the Southern Association. If present policies are continued, if necessary additional financial support becomes available, and if present competencies are used, the institution has the potential to meet accreditation requirements at or near the normal schedule for an institution of good quality."

Dr. James Reynolds, Professor in Junior College Education at the University of Texas has been used as a consultant at Ranger Junior College for the past two years for the purpose of upgrading the total program. Additional consultants are to be used in the coming academic year in preparation for another visit from a representative of the Southern Association.

Ranger Junior College faculty, staff administration, and students expressed gratitude for the support of the area and community in assisting the college to attain this correspondent status.

**PEANUT PRODUCTION RECORDS  
ARE SET BY 24-BUSHEL AVERAGE**

Seasoning rains now might be more comforting, but figures on the 1965 peanut crop in Eastland County are enough to bring smiles from raisers and area merchants. There were 31,682.6 acres harvested in 1965 with a record-breaking yield of 737 pounds average. In all, there were 23,986,259 pounds produced, according to Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Committee Manager Gilbert Meredith.

564.6 acres were harvested; 14,083,428 pounds produced; for a total average yield of 497 pounds to the acre. At 30 pounds to the bushel, the yield was up in 1965 to about 24 bushels to the acre, as compared to 19 1/2 the year before. And at about 11 to 12 cents a pound, or some \$3.50 per bushel, this high yield means a lot of cash is still circulating in the area.

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# Eastland County Pecan School Is Good Success With 125 Visitors

One hundred and twenty-five people interested in pecan orchards registered for the 11th annual Eastland County Pecan Budding and Grafting School at Cisco Junior College Monday. The day's program included school sessions at the college and an afternoon demonstration at the B. T. Graham orchard.

Pecan Field Station at Brownwood led a discussion of pecan grafting cutting and storing, when and how to graft, types of grafting, moving wrappings and coverings from grafts, and the care of trees being grafted. He used picture slides made on actual grafting operations at the pecan station to illustrate his talk.

Larry Womack of De Leon and C. E. Smith of Rising Star assisted with the lecture program, telling the visitors of their own experiences and methods of tree improvements.

George Blackburn, Stephens County agent, paid tribute to County Agent J. M. Cooper of Eastland County for organizing the school 11 years ago and the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association prior to that. He noted that the pecan orchard expansion program throughout this region was due largely to the work of Mr. Cooper.

In ill health for several months, Mr. Cooper was present for the meeting but was unable to help with the school as he has done in the past. A limited amount of graft wood from the Brownwood station was passed out to visitors seeking improved varieties for their trees.

During the afternoon, some 75 pecan men gathered at the Graham orchard a mile west of Cisco for the practice session. Lee Lieske and Mr. Graham assisted with the demonstrations.

Oscar Schaefer, vice president of the county pecan association, presided due to the illness of President A. D. Ellington. Jim Smothers of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce welcomed the visitors, and Robert Donovan of the CJC Agriculture Department extended the group an invitation to return next year. Some 35 CJC ag students were among those attending the lectures and demonstrations.

The school was a joint project of the county association,

the Cisco CofC, and Cisco Junior College.

Miss Marilyn Nash of Ranger, the 1966 Eastland County Pecan Queen, assisted in registering the visitors and attended the morning session, which was held at CJC cafeteria. The visitors ate lunch at the cafeteria before going to the Graham orchard.

Mr. Schaefer described the school as a good success from all standpoints. Visitors were present from 15 counties and from New Mexico.

Last year a total of 175 patients from Eastland County required treatment in a State Mental Hospital. The speaker, Dr. Shervert Frazier of Austin, is the Commissioner of the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation. He is former director of the Houston State Psychiatric Institute and chairman of the Department of Psychiatry at Baylor University. Dr. Frazier is a native of Shreveport, La., received his pre-medical education at Baylor, served as a medical officer in the Navy during World War II, and entered private practice in general medicine in Harrisburg, Ill., following the war.

He received training in internal medicine and psychiatry at the May Foundation in Rochester, Minn., at the New York State Psychiatric Institute and the Presbyterian Hospital in New York City. He was on the faculty of the

Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons prior to coming to Houston in 1962.
