Tunnell Seeks First Elected Term of Office

Railroad Commissioner Byron Tunnell, seeking his first elected term on the Commission, will step up his campaign during the final two weeks before the May 7 Democratic primary election. The 46-year-old Commissioner, who has campaigned vigorously across the state, will campaign this week from the Valley to the Panhandle and from the Gulf Coast to West Texas. He will spend the final week of the campaign in other sections of Texas, returning to Austin on May 7 to receive election returns.

Tunnell had been assured re-election as Speaker of the House when Gov. Joth Connally appointed him to the Railroad Commission on the eve of the opening of the 59th Legislature. "He has the background of a lawyer, a legislator and as Speaker of the House," said Connally. "He has demonstrated he has unlimited capacity, determination and courage needed to a marked degree on the Railroad Commission."

A native of Tyler, Tunnell is a veteran of World War II. He received his law degree from Baylor University. He is married and the father of two daughters.

After serving three years as assistant district attorney for Smith County, Tunnell entered private law practice in Tyler where he compiled an impressive list of church and civic accomplishments.

He was elected of the Texas Legislature in 1966, representing Smith and Gregg counties. He was elected Speaker of the House by the 58th Legislature.

Area's Farm And Ranch Outlook Improved By Good General Rain

The farm and ranch outlook appeared considerably brighter this week after rainfall measuring 3.5 to 5.8 inches fell during the past few days throughout Eastland County and this region. The heaviest measurable rain was reported in Cisco where a 2-inch deluge late Monday brought the period's total to 5.8 inches. Measurements were reported elsewhere as follows: Eastland 3.30 inches, Ranger 3.85 inches, Rising Star 3.7 inches, Carbon 3.9 inches, Gorman 3.85 inches, Scranton 5.5 inches, Moran 5 inches, and Morton Valley 4.5 inches. Although the rain came too late to materially benefit the small grain crops of the area, it left fields and pastures soaked. Bill McCutchen, assistant county agent, reported that the grain harvest would be spotted in this region. Many of the fields have been opened to livestock for grazing. Some peanut seed were in the ground, particularly in the irrigated areas, McCutchen reported. Planting was expected to begin as soon as the fields are dry enough and to continue through June. The county has approximately 38,000 acres under USDA allotments for 1966. Lakes gained substantially during the rain. Lake Cisco reported more than a foot of new water, and Lake Leon's run-off will continue for several days. Leon had gained some two feet of new water Tuesday. Stock tanks were full throughout this region. Most county roads came through the rainy weekend without much damage. A hard rain south of Cisco sent water over the roads in several places late Monday. The interstate highway route just south of Cisco had some damage due to the hard rain. Clearing weather has been forecast for the balance of the week.

## Pecan Tree Precaution Urged At This Season

The time of year when the pecan growers begin to ap-  
sively watch orchards for  
signs of the pecan nut case-  
bearer is almost here.

The larvae of the pecan nut  
casebearer is the most de-  
structive of the pecan insects.  
However, it did very little  
damage last year due to the  
cold weather.

There are three generations  
of the insect. The first two  
generations do damage to the  
nuts by boring into the nut  
and eating out its contents.  
However, according to East-  
land County Agent J. M.  
Cooper, by the time of the  
third generation the nut is too  
hard for the insect to pene-  
trate.

A. D. Ellington of Cisco  
president of the Eastland  
County Pecan Growers Asso-

ciation assisted by Tom Den-  
nan researcher at Texas  
A&M University's West Cross  
Timbers Experiment Station  
recently banded a large num-  
ber of trees in the Dale Car-  
lile orchard southwest of Cis-  
co in the Nimrod Community.

The Carlile orchard was set  
out and owned for many years  
by Lee Lieske noted pecan  
man who now lives in Cisco.

Other destructive pecan in-  
sects include the hickory  
shuck worm. This insect also  
does its damage in the larvae  
stage. Damage from this  
worm is increasing in the  
county, Cooper said.

The pecan weevil appears  
only in certain years when  
the weather conditions are  
right. It has a two year life  
cycle. Adequate moisture at  
the proper time is essential in  
the life cycle of the weevil.

Di-Syston, a new systemic  
insecticide for the control of  
the yellow aphid, honey dew  
creating insect, has been suc-  
cessfully controlled in the  
county, Cooper stated.

The material is taken up  
into the sap stream of the  
trees and kills the insects. It  
is expected to be approved by  
the Food and Drug Adminis-  
tration in the very near fu-  
ture. Early June is the prop-  
er time to apply Di-Syston.

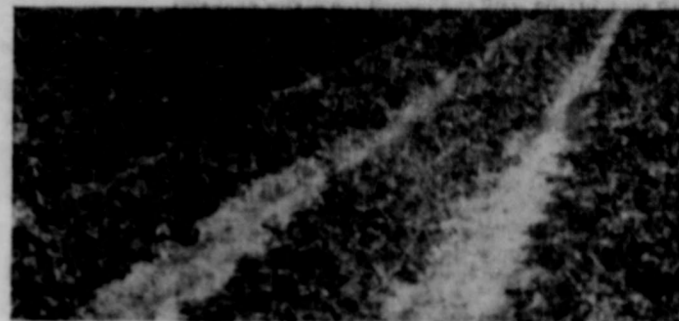

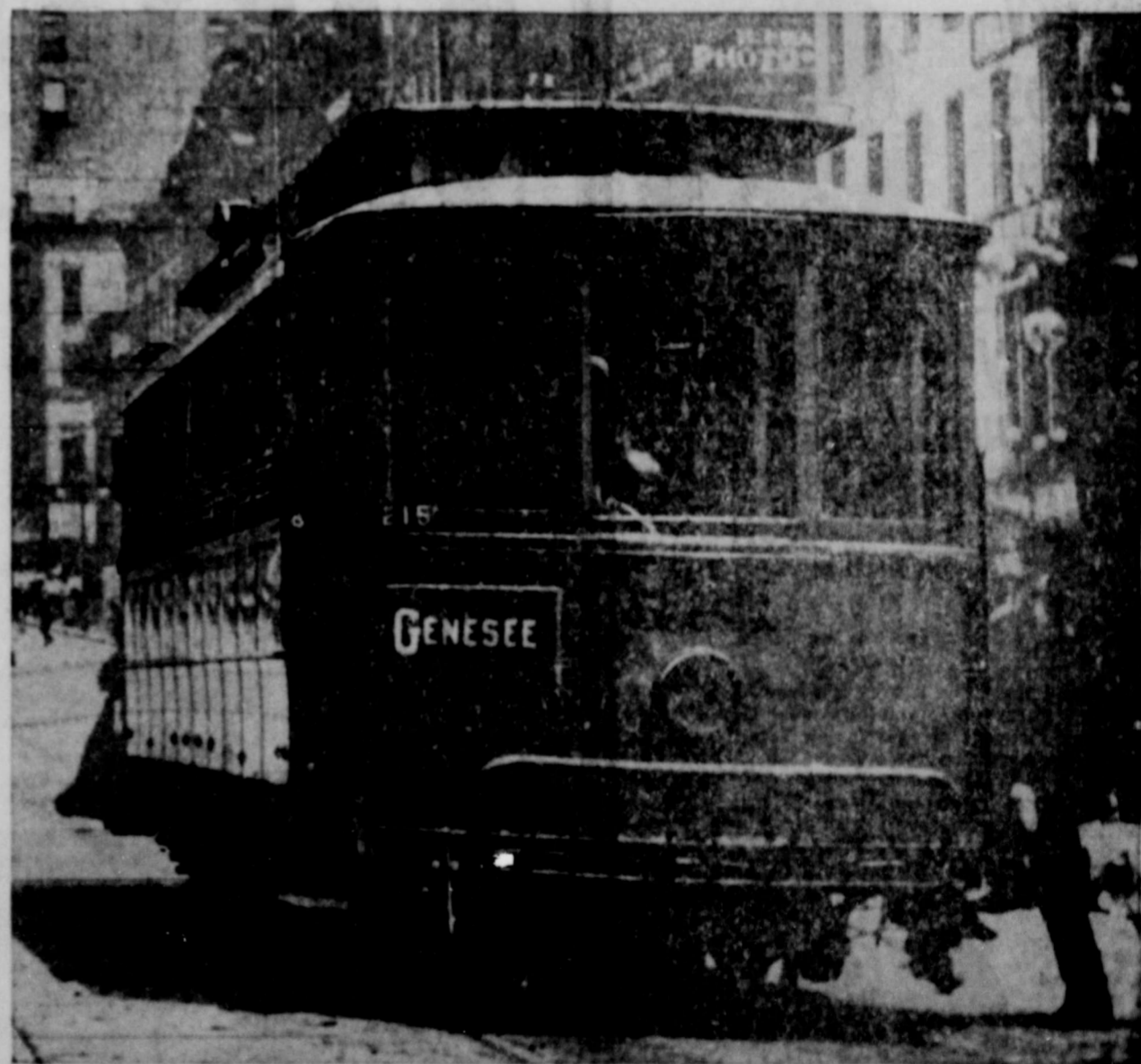

**Postal Savings  
To Be Withdrawn  
Postmaster Says**

Depositors with postal savings certificates are being urged by the local postmaster to withdraw their accounts from Post Offices as soon as possible or as soon as the anniversary dates on their cer-

ificates are reached. The Postal Savings System was abolished March 27, 1966, with the signing of Public Law 89-377 by President Lyndon Johnson.

"As of April 28, no deposits can be accepted and no new accounts can be opened," the postmaster said. "Interest will end on the anniversary date of each certificate."

For convenience all certificates held by a depositor may be cashed at the same time and interest will be paid for each full month; they have been outstanding beyond three months from the interest date, the postmaster said.

The Postal Savings System was established Jan. 1, 1911, to get money out of hiding and to attract savings of a

large number of immigrants who were accustomed to saving at Post Offices in their own country; also, it served as a safe depository for people who had lost confidence in private banks.

Unpaid deposits remaining in the Post Office beyond June 30, 1967, will be transferred to the Treasury Department in a trust fund and will be available for payment without time limitation whenever proper claims are received, the postmaster said.
