ON THIS DAY (May 1) 1946, the Sinclair Oil and Refining Corporation was established.

Independence, Kansas, was the birthplace of its founder, Harry Sinclair, and the spiritual birthplace of the billion-dollar complex of companies known by his name today.

It is not surprising that the oil men of Texas play a prominent role in the history of Sinclair development. The words "in a brief span of years, petroleum has altered man's way of life throughout the world" are inscribed on the monument marking the site of the well that brought in the great Spindletop field in Texas.

In commemoration of a half century of expansion, a colorful 104 page book has been published. We are indebted to Mrs. Saul Perstein for the loan of a copy of this fascinating story of phenomenal growth. The book contains pictures and stories of Sinclair's first Texas well on the Gulf coast in 1916, operations in Ranger in 1917, the Mexia field, the pipeline from Burkburnett to Houston, a link in the chain of lines from the Gulf to Great Lakes, and the giant refinery in Houston, one of the largest Sinclair holdings in the nation.

Dedicated to the company's 112,000 stockholders, 50,000 employees, and 4,000,000 customers, the volume gives a credit where credit is due from the dinosaur to the gas tank.

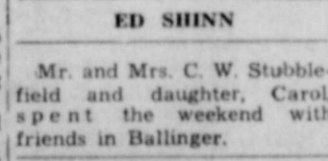
Shinn Installed Area President At Houston Meet

Rain Total In County Tops 6 Inches

Ranger reported 2.5 inches for Friday and 1.1 for Thursday.

Eastland County residents are generally grateful that their "half-foot" of rain came over a long period of some eight days, and not all at once as has been the case with many area points which have experienced serious flooding as the late April showers turned loose.

The total for this county, through Friday afternoon, and including the heavy downpour at 2 p.m., is right at 6.1 inches — representing seven days on which rain has fallen.

The "spell" began Friday, April 22, and with the exception of last Wednesday, has dumped rain everyday — with up to two and three heavy showers on some of the days.

Lakes and tanks in the county, which had been low during the early months of the year, were reported filled as the rains continued. Grass was getting a head start in yards and fields as mowers and hoes were being protected from rust.

Average rainfall for April is 2.87 and this much rain has not fallen in the county in April since 1957 when 6.33 was recorded.

Wind and hail accompanied most of the showers, and members of an Eastland High School speech class reported seeing what they believed to have been a tunnel in the northwesterly cloud that swept across Eastland County Friday afternoon. There were no reports of any having touched the ground however. Ironically, the City of Eastland reduced water rates this month to encourage the use of water for yards and shrubs.

The Eastland rain schedule generally looked like this: Friday (April 22), .74 of an inch; Saturday, .75; Sunday, 1.55; Monday, .14; Tuesday, .38; Wednesday, 0; Thursday, .90; and Friday, 1.00.

Cisco's rainfall figures were reported for April as follows: April 10, .8 with hail; April 16, .9; April 19, .3; April 22, 1.6; April 23, .5; April 24, 1.5; April 25, 1.6; April 28, 1.0; and April 29, 2.0. Total: 10.5.

ASC Office Issues Notices

The following announcements have been made by Jesse G. Meredith, Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office manager:

Producers who have overplanted their wheat permitted acreage are reminded that the excess wheat must be disposed of and notify this office no later than Sunday, May 1. Failure to comply may cause complete loss of wheat certificates or a drastic reduction in payment.

Producers who have wheat, feed grain or cotton diverted acreage are reminded that this area may not be grazed from May 1 until Nov. 1, 1966. No crop may be harvested from this area in 1966.

Farms signing intentions to participate in the 1966 wheat or feed grain program are reminded that they must comply with the base or allotment on all non-participating farms to be eligible for price support and diversion payments.

Farmers with Cropland Adjustment program agreements must comply with all allotments and bases on the participating farm as well as any other farm in which they have an interest for the duration of the agreement. Conserving base requirements must be met on all participating farms.

Funds are still available and applications for CAP contracts will be accepted through May 13. This program is designed to take land that is currently producing surplus crops out of production for five to ten years.

Funds are also available for counties, cities or towns for the conversion of cropland to community use. Anyone interested in this program is urged to contact this office.

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"I believe that too much control of our government's affairs has passed out of the hands of Congress, and into the hands of the regulatory and administrative agencies. This authority, which has been lost by default, must be re-claimed by the Congress. The trend of surrendering authority to agencies and commissions—who are supposed to administer the laws instead of making them—should be halted. I think it is time that Congress recognize this usurpation of its power and authority for what it is: government by bureaucracy. When Congress loses its authority, then the people lose theirs, for Congress is the voice of the people."

GOVERNMENT SPENDING

"There is no justification for deficit spending except during times of national emergency. I think all new proposals for spending should be carefully screened and that a determined stand be made against unnecessary spending. These are prosperous times, and it is now that we should be paying the national debt, rather than creating more of it. If we don't pay off our national debt during good times, when do we pay it?"

VIET NAM

"I will always support an unyielding stand against communism, and I feel that there is no other tenable position for us to take in Viet Nam than that which the President has so firmly taken. We cannot be soft toward an ideology that has set out to destroy our own way of life. At all times, of course, I believe we should keep the doors open for possible negotiations that would bring about a peaceful solution to open conflicts such as we have in Viet Nam. Our goal in Viet Nam is to stop aggression on the part of the communists toward a peaceful people who have every right to seek their own destiny."

OIL AND GAS

"I will support legislation aimed toward bringing about a healthier oil and gas industry. This is a prime business—an indispensable business—to our District, and contributes substantially to the welfare of us all. As to the 27% oil depletion allowance, I am in full accord with it and would resist any measure that would seek to change it to the disadvantage of the industry and the District."

EDUCATION

"Education is the single most important function of an enlightened society. We must make it as accessible as possible, for as many as possible, without either reducing our scholastic standards or jeopardizing our traditional academic freedom. I will favor legislation that broadens our educational base, insofar as it does so without giving the Federal Government control over our curricula. The selection of textbooks and the teaching of subjects should be left exclusively in the hands of the local schools, without infringement of any kind on the part of the government."

"I am also interested in seeing our schools extend their efforts in the direction of more technical and vocational training, and would support legislation that would encourage this. I feel that this would lessen the high drop-out rate, as well as provide useful training to those who do not have an opportunity to go to college. This would also enhance the national employment picture, as the overall demand for trained technicians and specialized workers is nearly all fields is greater than the supply."

"As your Congressman, I would support legislation that would give a tax relief to parents of students enrolled in colleges. Such a bill should allow tax deductions for the amount put out for academic expenses such as tuition, fees, and books, or perhaps give the parents an additional standard tax exemption similar to the present 8000 exemptions allowed for dependents. Such educational exemptions, of course, would continue only for the established four year period."

"It is my firm conviction that we cannot legislate poverty out of existence, but we can go a long way toward eliminating it through education."

JUDICIAL SYSTEM

"As a former District Judge and District Attorney, I am extremely proud of the lead the legal profession has traditionally taken in the affairs of our government. Especially do I hold our courts in high esteem."

"To keep our court system above the criticism and reproach it has occasionally undergone in the past, I would introduce and urge passage of legislation that would prescribe basic qualifications for Judges appointed to the federal judiciary. In addition I think it would be desirable to establish a mandatory retirement age, and a procedure for removing judges when they become unfit for service because of health or other reasons."

NATIONAL DEFENSE

"I will always be a strong advocate of a national defense force large enough and modern enough to maintain our peace and security anywhere it might be threatened. Such a force should be second to none in the quality of its personnel, its leadership, and its weaponry. I believe such a force can be achieved and maintained without a wasteful expenditure of the taxpayer's money."

WATER CONSERVATION

"There is no greater problem facing our District than the need for adequate water, now and in the future. I will support any feasible legislation that promises to create greater water resources for our area. Obviously, such legislation is a must, because we don't have enough water as it is, and to neglect it further would be to compound a tragedy. The problem is of such magnitude that it is going to require great study, imagination and vision to solve it. I, for one, am ready to begin."

AGRICULTURE

"I believe the present Omnibus Farm Bill places too much authority in the hands of the Agricultural Department and its Secretary. As a case in point, there is the arbitrary policy ruling by the Agricultural Department, that adversely affects the farmer by altering skin-row planting practices. I would favor farm legislation that would take into consideration the different and varying characteristics from one farming region to another. Especially would I work diligently to amend the programs to again permit the kind of skip-row planting that the farmer of this district wants and needs."

LABOR LEGISLATION

"I have always favored the right of labor to organize for the purpose of achieving desirable objectives for its working members."

I also support the principle of collective bargaining, as it is the only way to reach a livable balance between labor and management.

I do not believe that either labor or management should be allowed to walk rough-shod over the other. It takes both to produce the goods and manufacture the wealth in which we all share, and both have legitimate viewpoints which must be evaluated and adjudicated equitably in any controversy between them."

I do not favor any act or measure that would directly or indirectly compel anyone to become a member of any labor, trade, or business organization on a mandatory basis. This, to me, is a dangerous encroachment on the freedom of the individual."

VETERAN'S AFFAIRS

"As an overseas veteran of World War II myself, I am a supporter of the broad objectives of the Veterans' Program, and I particularly endorse the educational provisions of the G. I. Bill and the extensions of it to include veterans of recent conflicts. As to future legislation for veterans, I will give due consideration to any measure that will tangibly improve the lot of the veteran without putting an unfair penalty on other segments of the population."

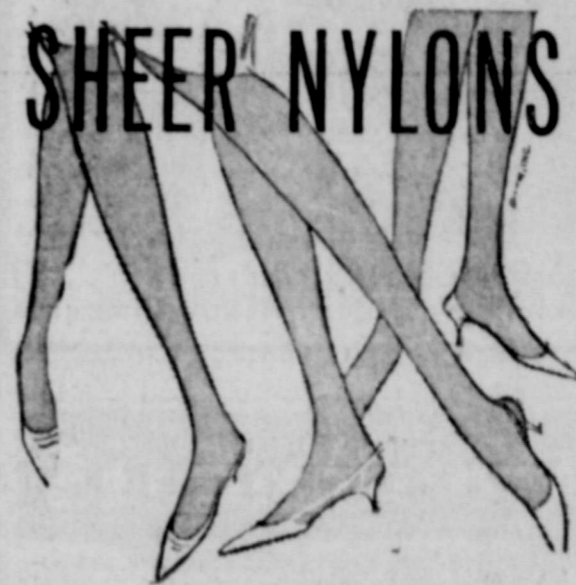

Rain Total In County Tops 6 Inches

Ranger reported 2.5 inches for Friday and 4.1 for Thursday.

Eastland County residents are generally grateful that their "half-foot" of rain came over a long period of some eight days, and not all at once as has been the case with many area points which have experienced serious flooding.

The total for this county through Friday afternoon, including the heavy downpour at 2 p. m., is right at six inches — representing seven days on which rain has fallen.

The "spell" began Friday, April 22, and with the exception of last Wednesday, has dumped rain everyday — with up to two and three heavy showers on some of the days.

Lakes and tanks in the county, which had been low during the early months of the year, were reported filled as the rains continued.

Average rainfall for April is 2.87 and this much rain has not fallen in the county in April since 1957 when 6.33 was recorded.

Wind and hail accompanied most of the showers, and members of an Eastland High School speech class reported seeing what they believed to have been a funnel in the northwesterly cloud that swept across Eastland County Friday afternoon.

Ironically, the City of Eastland reduced water rates this month to encourage the use of water for yards and shrubs.

The Eastland rain schedule generally looked like this: Friday (April 22), .74 of an inch; Saturday, .75; Sunday, 1.55; Monday, .14; Tuesday, .38; Wednesday, 0; Thursday, .90; and Friday, 1.90.

Cisco's rainfall figures were reported for April as follows: April 10, 8 with hail; April 16, .9; April 19, .3; April 22, 1.6; April 23, .5; April 24, 1.3; April 25, 1.6; April 28, 1.0; and April 29, 2.0. Total: 10.5.

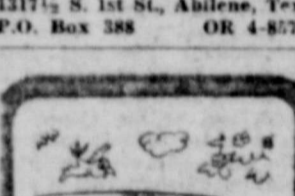

The following announcements have been made by Jesse G. Meredith, Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office manager:

Producers who have overplanted their wheat permitted acreage are reminded that the excess wheat must be disposed of and notify this office no later than Sunday, May 1. Failure to comply may cause complete loss of wheat certificates or a drastic reduction in payment.

Producers who have wheat, feed grain or cotton diverted acreage are reminded that this area may not be grazed from May 1 until Nov. 1, 1966. No crop may be harvested from this area in 1966.

Farms signing intentions to participate in the 1966 wheat or feed grain program are reminded that they must comply with the base or allotment on all non-participating farms to be eligible for price support and diversion payments.

Farmers with Cropland Adjustment program agreements must comply with all allotments and bases on the participating farm as well as any other farm in which they have an interest for the duration of the agreement. Conserving base requirements must be met on all participating farms.

Funds are still available and applications for CAP contracts will be accepted through May 13. This program is designed to take land that is currently producing surplus crops out of production for five to ten years.

Funds are also available for counties, cities or towns for the conversion of cropland to community use. Anyone interested in this program is urged to contact this office.

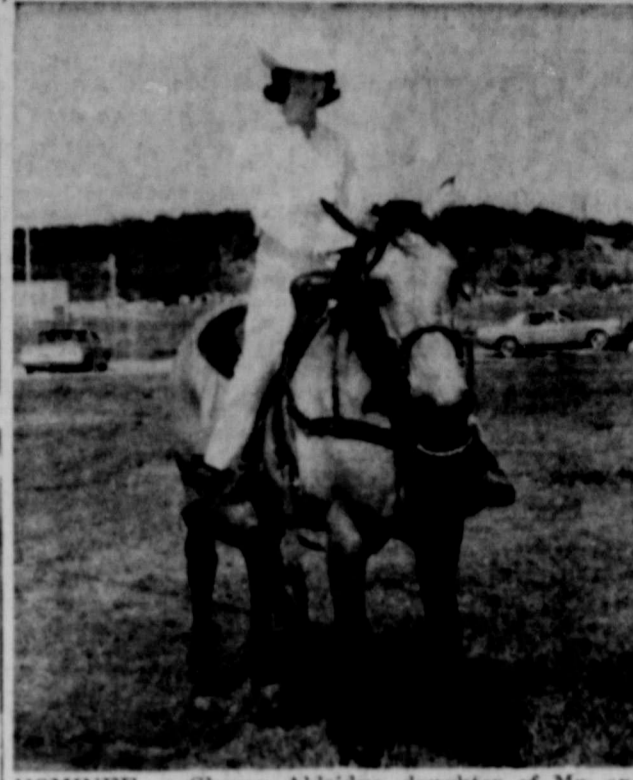

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Where I Stand On....

FREE ENTERPRISE
 "I am not one of those who apologizes for or takes a defensive attitude toward the free enterprise system. It doesn't need defending. It's the best system ever devised for satisfying the material needs and aspirations of the people. There is room for improvement, of course, but this can be done without altering the basic principles which make it function."

FEDERAL BUREAUCRACY
 "I believe that too much control of our government's affairs has passed out of the hands of Congress, and into the hands of the regulatory and administrative agencies. This authority, which has been lost by default, must be reclaimed by the Congress. The trend of surrendering authority to agencies and commissions—who are supposed to administer the laws instead of making them—should be halted. I think it is time that Congress recognize this usurpation of its power and authority for what it is: government by bureaucracy. When Congress loses its authority, then the people lose theirs, for Congress is the voice of the people."

GOVERNMENT SPENDING
 "There is no justification for deficit spending except during times of national emergency. I think all new proposals for spending should be carefully screened and that a determined stand be made against unnecessary spending. There are prosperous times, and it is now that we should be paying the national debt, rather than creating more of it. If we don't pay off our national debt during good times, when do we pay it?"

VIET NAM
 "I will always support an unyielding stand against communism, and I feel that there is no other tenable position for us to take in Viet Nam than that which the President has so firmly taken. We cannot be soft toward an ideology that has set out to destroy our own way of life. At all times, of course, I believe we should keep the doors open for possible negotiations that would bring about a peaceful solution to open conflicts such as we have in Viet Nam. Our goal in Viet Nam is to stop aggression on the part of the communists toward a peaceful people who have every right to seek their own destiny."

OIL AND GAS
 "I will support legislation aimed toward bringing about a healthier oil and gas industry. This is a prime business—an indispensable business—to our District, and contributes substantially to the welfare of us all. As to the 27½% oil depletion allowance, I am in full accord with it and would resist any measure that would seek to change it to the disadvantage of the industry and the District."

EDUCATION
 "Education is the single most important function of an enlightened society. We must make it as accessible as possible, for as many as possible, without either reducing our scholastic standards or jeopardizing our traditional academic freedom. I will favor legislation that broadens our educational base, insofar as it does so without giving the Federal Government control over our curricula. The selection of textbooks and the teaching of subjects should be left exclusively in the hands of the local schools, without infringement of any kind on the part of the government."

WATER CONSERVATION
 "There is no greater problem facing our District than the need for adequate water, now and in the future. I will support any feasible legislation that promises to create greater water resources for our area. Obviously, such legislation is a must, because we don't have enough water as it is, and to neglect it further would be to compound a tragedy. The problem is of such magnitude that it is going to require great study, imagination and vision to solve it. I, for one, am ready to begin."

AGRICULTURE
 "I believe the present Omnibus Farm Bill places too much authority in the hands of the Agricultural Department and its Secretary. As a case in point, there is the arbitrary policy ruling by the Agricultural Department, that adversely affects the farmer by altering skip-row planting practices. I would favor farm legislation that would take into consideration the different and varying characteristics from one farming region to another. Especially would I work diligently to amend the program to again permit the kind of skip-row planting that the farmer of this district wants and needs."

LABOR LEGISLATION
 "I have always favored the right of labor to organize for the purpose of achieving desirable objectives for its working members. I also support the principle of collective bargaining, as it is the only way to reach a livable balance between labor and management. I do not believe that either labor or management should be allowed to walk rough-shod over the other. It takes both to produce the goods and manufacture the wealth in which we all share, and both have legitimate viewpoints which must be evaluated and adjudicated equitably in any controversy between them. I do not favor any act or measure that would directly or indirectly compel anyone to become a member of any labor, trade, or business organization on a mandatory basis. This, to me, is a dangerous encroachment on the freedom of the individual."

VETERAN'S AFFAIRS
 "As an overseas veteran of World War II myself, I am a supporter of the broad objectives of the Veterans' Program, and I particularly endorse the educational provisions of the G. I. Bill and the extensions of it to include veterans of recent conflicts. As to future legislation for veterans, I will give due consideration to any measure that will tangibly improve the lot of the veteran without putting an unfair penalty on other segments of the population."

JUDICIAL SYSTEM
 "As a former District Judge and District Attorney, I am extremely proud of the lead the legal profession has traditionally taken in the affairs of our government. Especially do I hold our courts in high esteem. "To keep our court system above the criticism and reproach it has occasionally undergone in the past, I would introduce and urge passage of legislation that would prescribe basic qualifications for Judges appointed to the federal judiciary. In addition I think it would be desirable to establish a mandatory retirement age, and a procedure for removing Judges when they become unfit for service because of health or other reasons."

NATIONAL DEFENSE
 "I will always be a strong advocate of a national defense force large enough and modern enough to maintain our peace and security anywhere it might be threatened. Such a force should be second to none in the quality of its personnel, its leadership, and its weaponry. I believe such a force can be achieved and maintained without a wasteful expenditure of the taxpayer's money."
