### Gus Asks for 'New Trial'

Gus Orman, who pleaded guilty April 25 to possession of marijuana in 91st District Court, appeared in that court Wednesday for formal sentencing, and surprisingly filed a motion asking a new trial and gave notice of appeal.

He was sentenced to "not less than two years, nor more than five, by Judge J. Frank Sparks, and had been given ten days to "get his affairs in order."

His motion, which suggests "insufficient evidence", apparently will permit Orman, a convicted Cisco bootlegger, to remain free until the appeal is perfected, and passed on by the judge.

Indications were at the time of his trial that he preferred to plead guilty, and leave sentencing to the judge rather than face a jury's judgment and punishment suggestions.

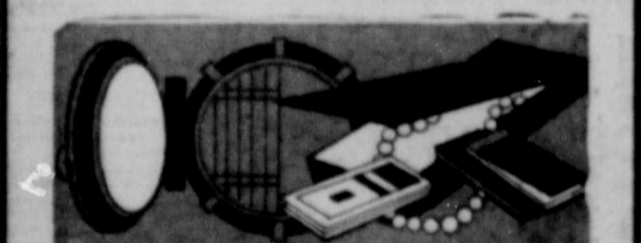
