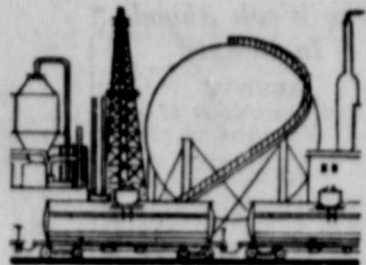

## RANGER GENERAL HOSPITAL HAS LONG SERVICE RECORD

The observance of National Hospital Week, May 8-15, reminds area residents to take inventory of local hospital facilities. For more than four decades, Ranger General Hospital has been a symbol of healing to multiplied thousands of people who have availed themselves of its ministry.

In operation since 1923, the institution maintains both City and County affiliations. Currently serving on the Board of Directors are J. A. Bates, president, Mrs. Roscoe Hopper, vice president, Beauford Anderson and Mrs. D. E. Pulley, all of Ranger; Don Parker, Eastland; R. A. Hammett, Cisco; and James Rutherford, Rising Star. Drs. W. P. Watkins and L. R. Gohlke are staff physicians.

Serving the hospital as administrator is W. J. Herrington, with Mrs. Dortha Harris, assistant administrator and business manager. Betty Morris and Mary Frances Cope are insurance clerks.

In recent years, the three-story brick structure has undergone extensive remodeling and repair. Lowered ceilings and a spacious sun porch has added beauty to the interior while central heat and air-conditioning contributes to its year-round comfort. These, plus modern furniture and kitchen facilities have added much to the convenience of both patients and staff.

In 1962 the hospital initiated a future nurses program, the first of its kind between Fort Worth and Big Spring during these years. The Candy Strippers have served while learning the basic fundamentals of the profession.

A member of the Texas Hospital Association, Ranger General has a pay roll of thirty, some who have a record of more than fifteen years in their present location.

This thirty-six bed hospital would be a credit to a town twice the size of Ranger. It is, and will continue to be, a vital part of community life.

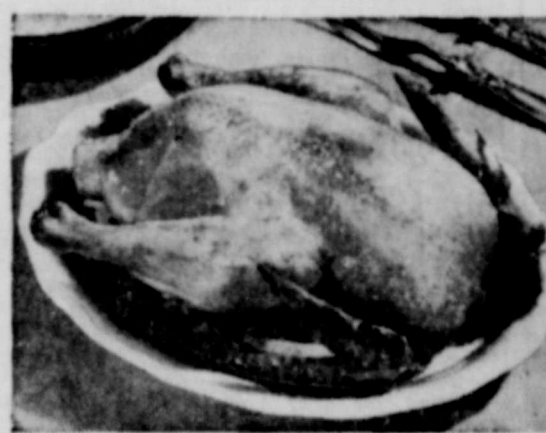

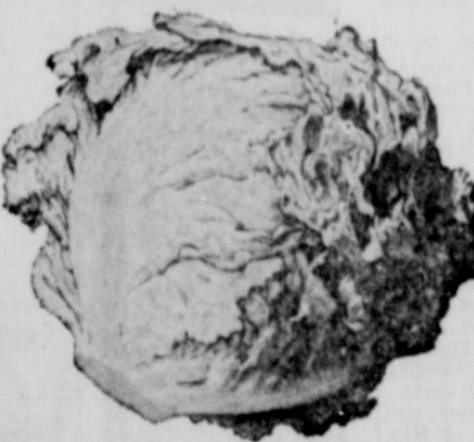

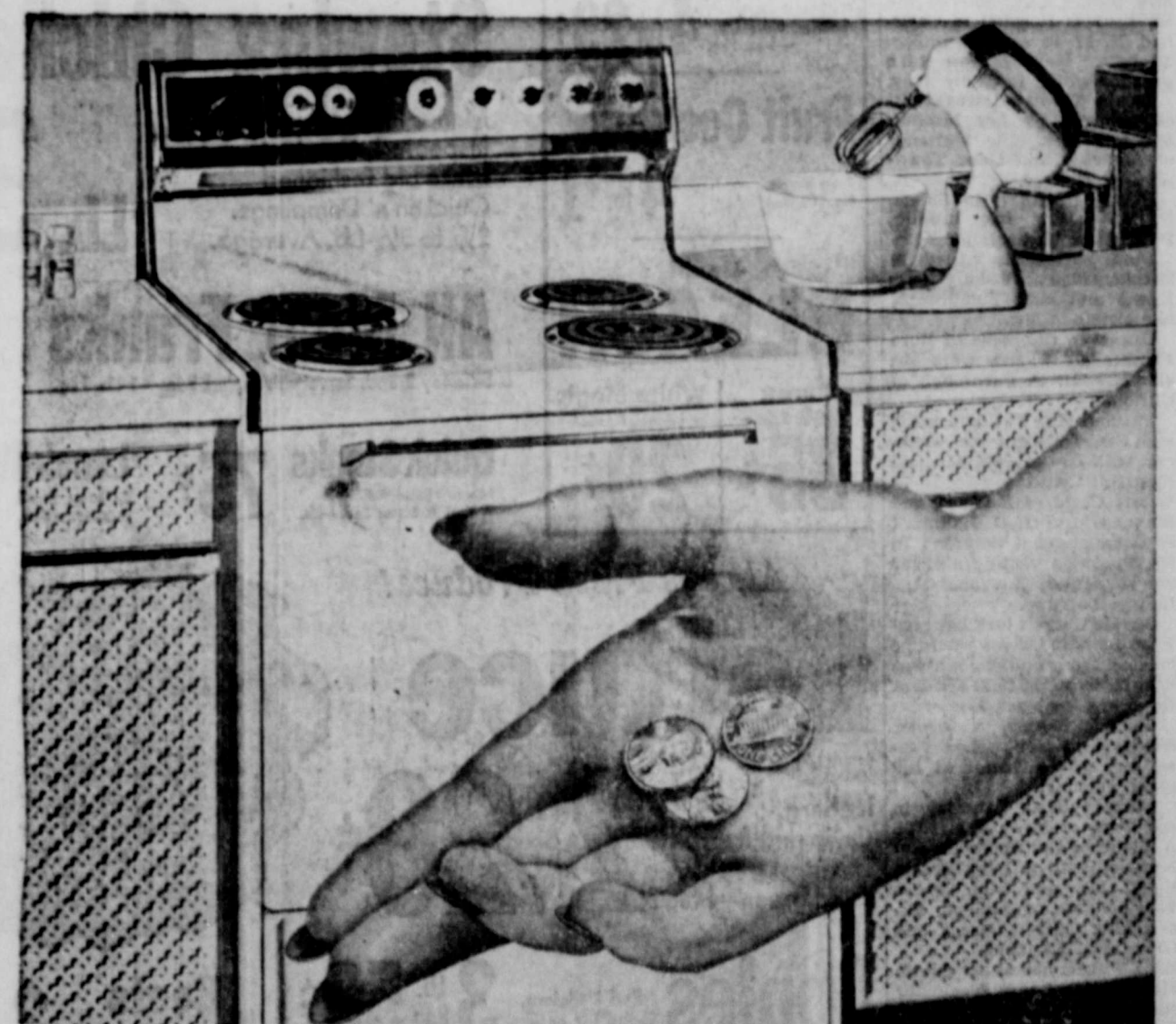

As Texas celebrates its 100th anniversary as an oil-producing state, Eastland County shares in the development that made the Lone Star State the No. 1 energy source for a booming American civilization.

Eastland County ranks 142nd among the Texas counties producing oil and gas.

## Pecan Field Day Is Set Monday In Gorman

The annual spring pecan field day will be held next Monday, May 16, at Gorman, according to J. M. Cooper, county agriculture agent.

The morning session will be held in the banquet room of the Brown Jug Cafe, beginning at 9 a.m.

After lunch in the same room the group will go to the nearby pecan orchard of Charley Underwood for a field trip and to check on the progress or stage of the pecan nut case bearer.

Fred Brisson, retired professor of the horticultural department of Texas A&M; B. G. Hancock, horticulturist of the Texas A&M agricultural extension service, and Tom Denman, horticulturist of the agricultural experiment station, Stephenville, will be on the program.

Cooperative marketing, fertilization, pollination, banding for the pecan nut case bearer and control of insects and diseases will be discussed on the all-day program.

Arthur D. Ellington, president of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association, will give a report on the results of the pecan grafting session held April 18, at the T. T. Graham Orchard in Cisco.

sands a year are paid in lease rentals and bonuses on acreage which operators hope will some day yield oil or gas.

In addition to sharing the tax load for local schools and levels of government, oil and gas producers and royalty owners send some \$127,000 a year to the State Treasury in severance taxes. Oil taxes accounted for \$75,000; gas \$52,000.

Triggered by the first discovery in 1917, the search for oil in Eastland County is still under way. The Oil and Gas Journal reported 16 wells were drilled in the county last year. Five of these were "wildcats" seeking new fields or production from new strata. Results: 5 oil wells; 4 gas wells; 7 dry holes. Oil men and other investors risked an estimated \$441,000 in Eastland County to drill 56,000 feet of holes. Some \$120,000 disappeared forever in dry holes.

The Texas Employment Commission reports an industry payroll of about \$1.7 million a year for Eastland County. Some 10,000 persons are directly employed by oil and gas firms. This, of course, is only part of the total employment created by petroleum operations for many others work in related service and supply jobs.

One of the most significant technological developments of the last two decades has been the high recovery of liquids like butane and propane from natural gas. Four points operating in the county produce approximately 71.3 million cubic feet of gas a day, which gives added value to gas produced here.
