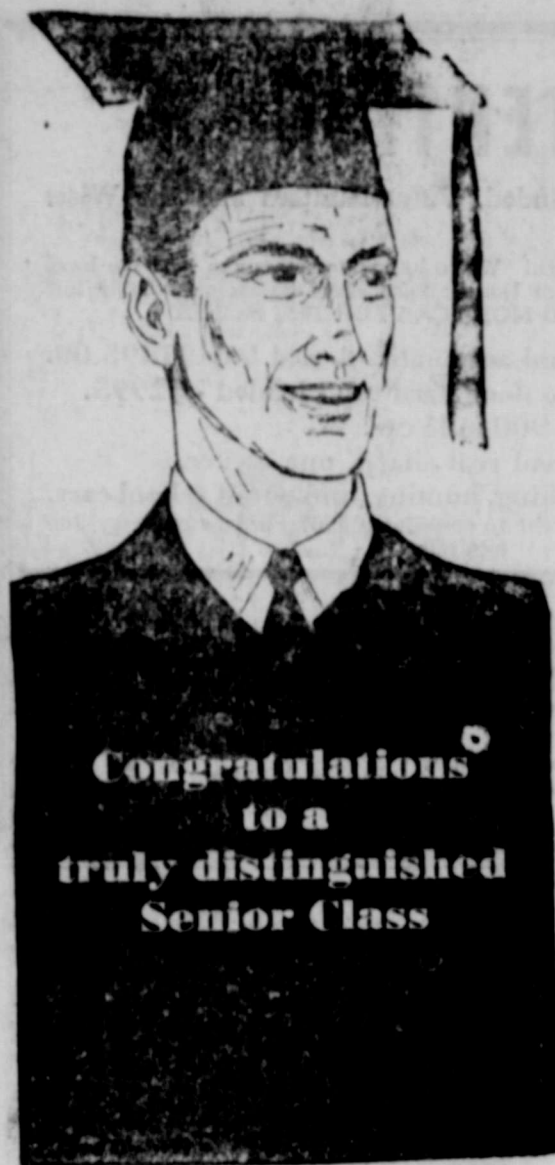

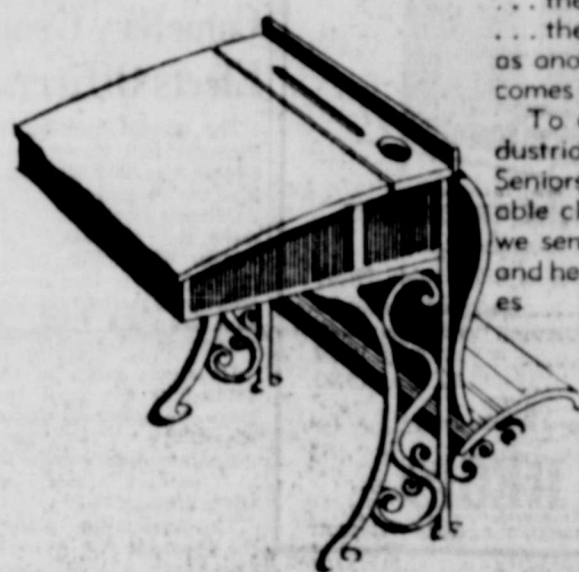

All interested persons are urged to attend and comment upon the proposed regulations.

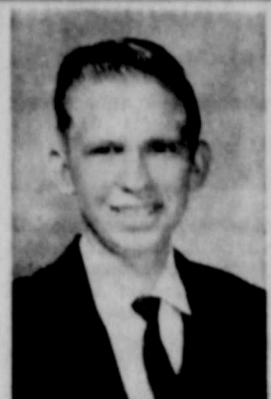
