

The Peace Corps uses the acement Test to determine lbw an applicant can be utilized overseas. The test measures general aptitude and the abilaty to learn a language not education or achievement. (If Test scores indicate a limfor example, the Peace Corps tries to place the applicant in an English-speaking country.) The Placement Test require no preparation and is noncompetitive - an applicant

The application form, not the Placement Test, is the most important factor in he sons interested in serving in the Peace Corps must fill out an application if they have not already done so, and present it to the tester before taking the Test. Applications may be obtined from local post offices or from the Peace Corps, Washington, D. C. 20525.

The Placement Test takes out an hour and a half.



### Social Security **Payments Total** \$3,400,404 Here

Some 4,499 people in East and county received a total of \$3,400,404 in social security benefits in 1965, R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene, revealed today, an increase of \$464,988 and 249 people over 1964.

A large part of the increase payments resulted from changes made by the Social Security Amendments of 1965, Tuley said. Those changes which were in addition to the new program of health insur-ance for the aged, included a per cent increase in monthly benefits retroactive to January 1965; benefits for widows as early as 60; benefits for and 22; benefits for some people over 72 who hadn't worked long enough to get social security before; and the pay-ment of disability insurance benefits to workers who are unable to work because of a disability that lasts 12 months or more

"In addition," Tuley continued, "a good many older peo ple, upon applying for medifouund they were eligible for regular social all, the 1965 figures for Eastland County include 2,448 retired workers, 311 disabled workers and their families, and 1,173 wives and children of retired or deceased workers.
