During the last meeting of the Eastland, Stephens, Throckmorton, Callahan, and Shackelford County Medical Association, this group voted to go on record as adopting a resolution passed by Texas Medical Association endorsing and approving the ethics and principle of Individual Responsibility.

In keeping with traditions of free choice in this country, I.R.P. (Individual Responsibility Program) is voluntary and is being adopted by various medical societies. The I.R.P. standard form is a means of placing responsibility where it belongs, the physicians report. The physician is responsible to his patient, and the patient is responsible to the insurance company. Dr. W. P. Watkins, president of the five-county association said: "This may be somewhat confusing at first, but all physicians will help their patients collect their due amounts."

Purpose of the resolution is to establish responsibility for collecting federal funds when the Medicare program goes into effect on July 1, as is reported. The individual doctors have the option of observing the resolution or not, it is said. As stated, the resolution would put the responsibility for collecting the federal money with the patient, who in turn would pay his physician for his services.


