If You Earned \$600, Report It

DALLAS—Everyone under 65 years old, whether single or married, who is a citizen or resident of the United States and had gross income of \$600 or more during the year must file a return, Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of the Internal Revenue Service for Northern Texas advised taxpayers today.

If you are 65 or older on the last day of your tax year, no return is required unless gross income was \$1,200 or more. If your income is under the above figures, you should file a return to obtain any refund due you of income tax withheld from salaries or wages.

Businessmen, farmers, and other self-employed persons must file a return if net earnings from self-employment were \$400 or more.
Document No. 5107, which furnishes more detailed information on this subject, may be obtained by dropping a post card to the District Director, Internal Revenue Service, 1600 Patterson Street, Dallas, Texas 75201.

County Reaches 78 Per Cent Of Savings Bond Sales Goal
During the month of November, United States savings bond sales in Eastland County amounted to \$19,959, according to a report received from Guy Peyton Parker, Chairman of the Eastland Co. savings bonds committee. To date this county has purchased \$233,591 in savings bonds and this is 78 per cent of the 1966 goal of \$300,000.
During the first eleven months of 1966, savings bond sales in Texas amounted to \$139,381,146 which is 94 per cent

of the state's goal of \$147.5 million. This is an increase of 5.2 per cent over the same period last year.
"Nationally, the sale of series E and H savings bonds during November amounted to \$368 million. These sales were the highest for any November in 11 years; 9 per cent higher than a year ago. The January-November sales were \$4,485 million, 7 per cent over sales for the first 11 months a year ago and a 10-year record for any January-November sales since 1956," Chairman Parker stated.




Senator Says

Money Is Expected To Be Big State Problem

Money to finance the growing costs of state government will be the biggest problem that the Texas Legislature will face when the biennial session opens Tuesday, Jan. 10, at Austin.

That was the opinion expressed by Senator Tom Creighton of the 32nd District, which includes Eastland County, in a talk last Wednesday evening at the weekly meeting of the Cisco Lions Club. He was introduced by Jack Anderson, the program chairman.

The Legislature will first have to determine what the cost of the state government will be for the next two years before passing a tax bill, Creighton said. Under the constitution, the Legislature must appropriate money without providing a tax that will yield it.

A raise of up to 20 per cent on state employees' salaries might be passed, Mr.

affected by changes in the judicial setup to equalize the work load of the district courts, Mr. Creighton noted. He said there has been prepared for release soon some recommendations for the state's court reorganization. This could move the 91st Court from Eastland County or add one or more counties to it.

Annual sessions for the legislature, four-year terms for top state officials, and the casualty insurance laws are other topics that will get attention and possible law changes, Mr. Creighton said.

Two controversial matters due to come up are changing the laws to permit sale of liquor by the drink in wet areas and enacting laws to permit betting on horse races, the senator said. There is more steam behind the liquor matter this year than usual, he noted, and the horse racing proposal will be given more backing than ever before.

The shortage of nurses, branch banking and a state utilities commission are three other subjects due for consideration, he predicted.

Sen. Creighton said the legislature will have to pass a resolution to keep Texas clocks on Central Standard Time or the state will come under a federal law placing the entire country on daylight saving time. He has found sentiment mostly in favor of "keeping things like they are."

The voter registration system will get attention, Mr. Creighton believes. He has been a member of a legislative committee that has been studying the matter. He said they hope to upgrade the voter registration certificate to the status of a driver's license whereby the citizen will be mailed his renewal application each year or each two years.

The need of cities for additional income will be another matter that the Legislature will study, he said.

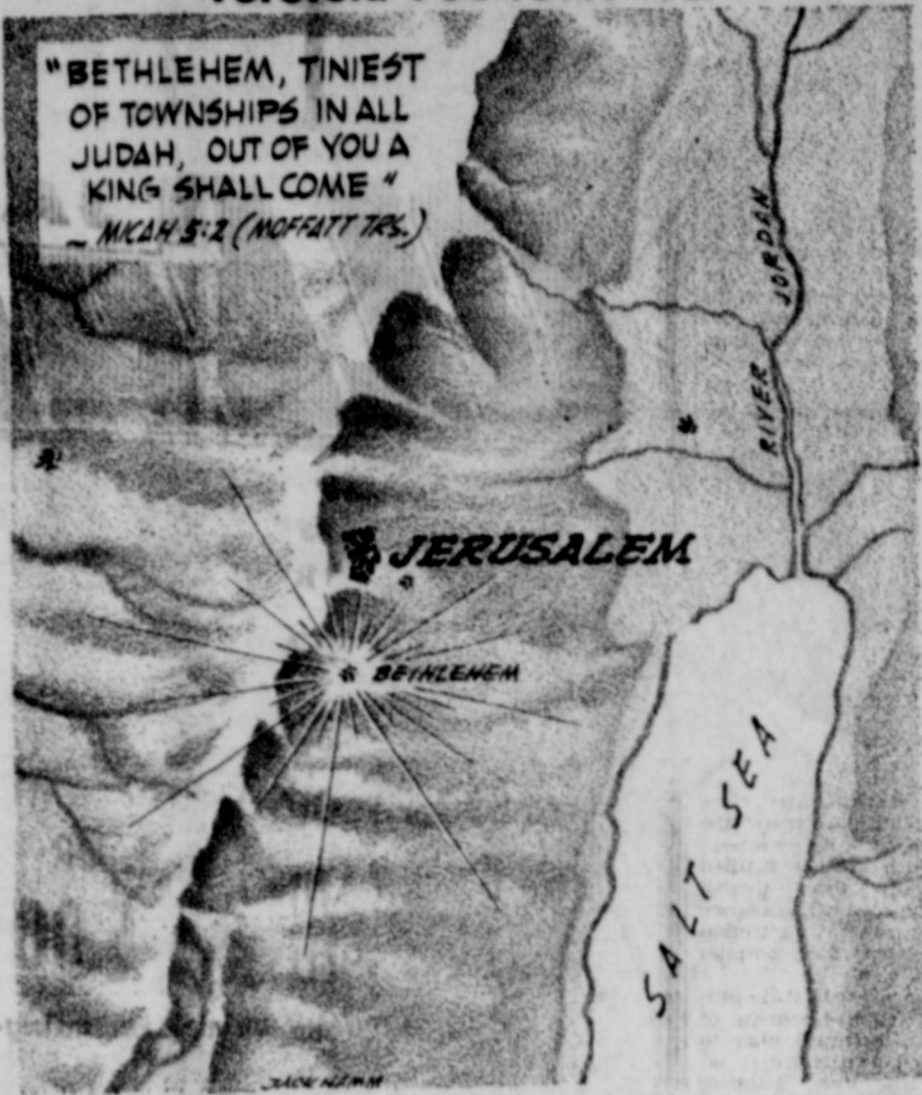

Is Nelson Brown, In Fact, Buried In Eastland Plot?

An Eastland woman has entered the Nelson Brown estate case with claims that "Uncle Nelson" is buried in her family plot in Eastland Cemetery. She has reportedly shown interested persons the unmarked grave which she claims is Brown's.

Cemetery records do not date back to 1900, the year Brown died in Flatwood Community. City manager Lewis Tiner stated that "sketchy" records were compiled in the 1940's, using existing tombstones as a basis. Unmarked graves are not listed in this report.

The Eastland woman refused to talk with Telegram personnel, but her son stated that he had always been under the impression that Brown was actually "a distant uncle" of his mother's. The son did not know whether his mother's claims indicated that she intended to seek a share in the \$84 million reportedly being held in trust by a New York City bank.

Mrs. Cecil McGriff of Alice, one of Nelson Brown's 22 great-grandchildren, has said that she hired a Memphis, Tennessee, tracing service to settle the estate.

A grave located near Brown's was considered the final key in unraveling the estate.

What effects the latest claims will have on settlement of the estate are not known at this time.

Some six Eastland County residents are reportedly heirs of the estate, including Elmer B. Hall of Banger, his aunt and his daughter, both of Cisco.

When a person applies will determine the date his medical insurance protection goes into effect. If he applies in one of the three months before the month of his 65th birthday, his protection begins as soon as he reaches 65. If he waits until the month of his birthday or the 3 remaining months in his enrollment period, his coverage will be delayed from one to three months.

If the person misses his initial enrollment period altogether, he won't have another opportunity until the last three months of the next odd-numbered year. Then, he will have to pay a higher premium for the same protection. Also, his coverage will not begin until six to nine months after he enrolls.

Hospital insurance, which is the other part of the medicare program, is effective as soon as a person reaches 65. There is no specific enrollment period for this part. For anyone receiving social security benefits, prior to age 65, hospital insurance protection will be automatic the month age 65 is reached. These people will be notified automatically about signing up for the medical insurance if they want that protection to supplement their hospital insurance.

Tuley suggested that people now within 3 months of their 65th birthday plan to pay a visit to the social security office soon, bringing with them some proof of age, preferably a birth certificate or an early baptismal record. Other documents are usually acceptable. Generally speaking, the older the document, the better. For those who are at work, or for some other reason cannot come into their district offices, it is possible to start the application just by getting in touch with the district office by telephone or letter.

Now's Time To File Medicare, Benefits Forms

With the advent of medicare, it is now more important than ever that a person approaching retirement age know the proper time to sign up for his health insurance protection and for any monthly benefits he may have coming.

R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager of social security in Abilene, explained that even if a person plans to work beyond age 65, he should make application to establish his eligibility for medicare benefits in the three months before the month he is 65. A delay means a loss of protection under medicare. Also, by not filing at the right time, the worker may also lose some monthly benefits.

Tuley pointed out that there is an initial seven-month enrollment period in which to elect medical insurance under medicare. This is the part of medicare which pays for doctor bills and involves a monthly premium of \$3 a month from the beneficiary, matched by \$3 from general Federal revenues.

The initial enrollment period begins with the third month before the month the person turns 65 and extends through the third month after that month.

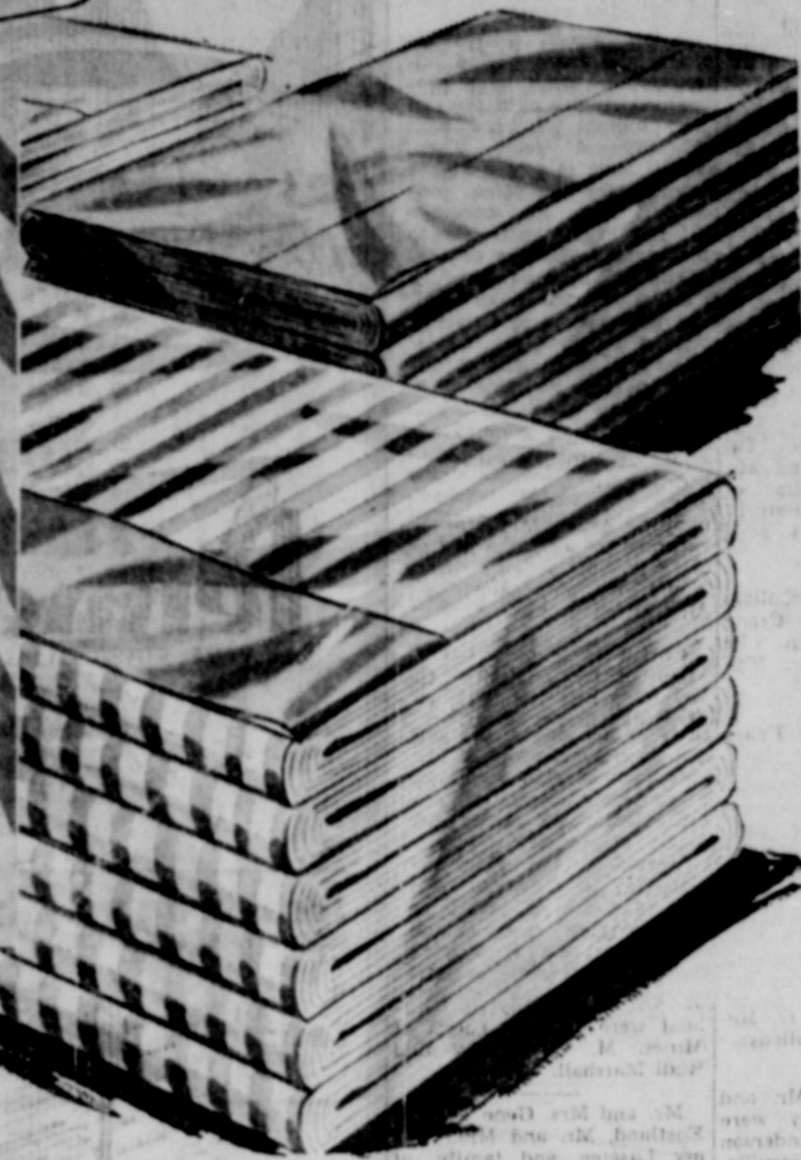
