

If you are 65 or older on the last day of your tax year no return is required unless gross income was \$1,200 or more. If your income is under the labove figures, you should file a return to obtain any refund due you of income tax withheld from salaries or wages.

Businessmen, farmers, and other self-employed persons must file a return if net earnings from self-employment were \$400 or more.






