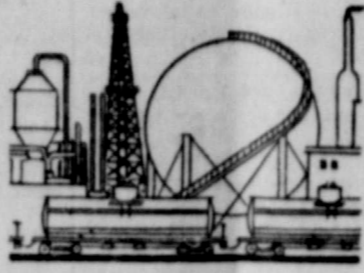

New Zealander Tells Rep. Musgrove About His Home Land Takes Oath In Palo Pinto

New Zealand is located 1800 miles southeast of Australia, has two and one half million people, fifty-one million sheep three million dairy cattle and six million beef cattle, according to a native son, Gary Snowsill, who spoke to Ranger Lions Thursday, Jan. 12, at the Paramount.

Snowsill appeared here through the sponsorship of the Lions Clubs of New Zealand, Lions International and the Cisco Lions Club.

Basically, there is not much difference between New Zealand and the United States, he said. New Zealand is a game similar to football, cities and electricity, said Snowsill.

However, he did note a few differences — if a man in New Zealand should have an accident that causes injury, he would receive free ambulance, doctor and hospital services. School children are given free dental treatment throughout their school years. In New Zealand deer are considered a menace and paid hunters, called "cullers," work 24 hours a day trying to rid the countryside of the deer.

In a few weeks, Snowsill expects to report to Fort Bliss where he will be an officer in the New Zealand army. An active 2nd Lt. in the New Zealand army, he plans to observe U. S. training techniques while at Bliss as he expects to be recalled to active duty and assigned to Viet Nam before the war is over.

'JAYCEE WEEK' BEGINS MONDAY ACROSS USA

Price of Lunches Raised; Clark's Contract Renewed

Ranger Public School trustees Tuesday night extended the contract of Supt. James R. Clark for another year on his present contract, voted to buy two new school buses, raised the prices of meals in the two lunchrooms, raised some salaries to meet new Minimum Wage Standards and accepted the resignation of Charles Veale as a bus driver.

Meals to students at Hodges Primary were raised one nickel to 35 cents, teachers and other school employees were raised 15 cents to 45 cents and visitors were raised from 50 cents to 75 cents. Price of extra milk purchased at milk breaks or at noon remains at four cents for either chocolate or white milk.

Student meals at Young and the Junior-Senior High School jumped 10 cents each with other meals being raised the same as at Hodges.

The prices were raised due to the fact that both lunchrooms have lost money every month this year and with new pay raises going into effect Feb. 1 as required by Federal law, the losses would mount during the spring.

Hodges lunchroom has lost a total of \$308.45 this year while Young has operated at a loss of \$702.90.

Meals have cost the school actually 44 cents each even with free surplus commodities while students paid only thirty cents for their meals.

Young lunchroom had a total income from sale of meals and Federal reimbursement of \$3,847.46 through December 31 while their expenses totaled \$4,550.36. This is loss of \$9.25 for each of 76 days that meals were served.

Hodges had an income of \$6,986.27 and expenses of \$7,244.72 for the same time. This was a loss of \$4.06 per day.

The only reason the prices were not raised in September, Clark said, was that the school had not bought any new lunchroom equipment or supplies and they did have a small bank account that is about gone now.

Hodges served 16,410 meals to paying students in 76 days last year and 1909 free meals. Young served 10,291 paying meals and served 787 free meals.

The board agreed not to turn a hungry child away from a free meal when it was needed no matter why the child was not able to buy the meal.

Cooks were raised to one dollar an hour as required by the new law effective Feb. 1 and the managers were raised to \$1.15. With another pay raise required next year and with groceries increasing in cost weekly, it will be impossible to keep the new prices long without making drastic changes in lunchroom work set up next year and even that might not help, Clark warned.

The new law will not require pay raises to other employees of the district, Clark said, but will necessitate switching from an annual contract salary to an hourly basis with any time over 44 hours a week being paid for at time and a half.

Next February 1, 1968 minimum wages will go from \$1.10 to \$1.15 and the work week must be cut to 42 hours. The following year it changes again a like amount.

Clark told the board that he had taken \$17,157 from the Interest and Sinking Fund which is used to pay for school bonds in September each year and put it on deposit at four per cent interest until Aug. 25 when it will be withdrawn and paid on bonds. The board had voted to do this earlier.

The High School Activity Fund report of 16 accounts were gone over. They showed a combined bank balance of \$1,544.54 at the close of December. Accounts in the fund includes all the classes, clubs, cheerleaders, dispen-

Before the December 31 deadline, Hodges received word from Burleson that the consolidation had been postponed until after the first of the year.

Congressman Burleson in a letter to Hodges dated January 5, 1967 indicated that there would not be a consolidation of the routes.

"This is a good example of the democratic process in action said Hodges." If we had not had a representative in Washington to intercede for us, we would have lost Ranger route 3; I feel that Congressman Burleson is to be commended for the fine job he is doing for us."

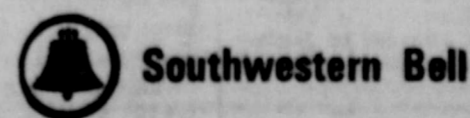

COUPLE PROVIDES UNUSUAL WINTER HOME FOR FLOWERS

"More flowers per square inch," describes one small area of the property belonging to Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Weaver, 317 Pine St.

As a Times reporter walked out of the 25 degree chill of Wednesday morning into the comfortable 60 degree atmosphere of the 10x15 ft. "home of the plants" (pictured above), the first impression was that of waking up in a new world.

"It's quite a story," said Mrs. Weaver as she stooped to remove a faded blossom from among its brighter neighbors. "Flowers have always been my hobby and I spent my spare time (and more) digging beds, planting seeds, watering plants; then when autumn came, putting the plants into pots and the pots into any available space in the house for the winter.

When I was no longer able to do this Jesse, who had always lended a hand, took charge and has developed an enthusiasm greater than mine."

Flowers have a way of multiplying and the time came when there was no more room in the house for the large variety of geraniums, cacti, amaryllis, etc.

"Lack of space was our problem," said Jesse. Looking out across the small back yard. Since necessity is the mother of invention, he began to see the wall of the

garage as one side of a green house, available scrap lumber as framework and heavy but inexpensive plastic as three walls and roof. Summer and early autumn evenings found Mr. and Mrs. Weaver working and, when wintry winds began to blow, the flowers were transferred to pots and into their very own bungalow, to grow and blossom to the delight of their owners and all who stop to admire them.

Row upon row of pots hold geraniums with luxuriant foliage and a profusion of blossoms. Other vessels hold plants what will bloom in the spring. Attracting the lion's share of attention is a Christmas cactus which seems to have lost its calendar and waited until January to burst into full bloom.

The little house boasts central heating (a small gas heater in the center of the one narrow aisle), running water, lights and almost wall to wall carpeting of plants awaiting the coming of spring when they will be transplanted to front yard beds, there to "pay for their raising" with the beauty and fragrance that only a flower can give.

If you need a "winter resort" for your plants, talk with the Weavers. They can tell you how to provide it at a minimum cost for maximum enjoyment.

(Continued from Page 1) Process, annual library, textbooks files and similar groups.

Also accepted were the tax collectors report, the financial statement of the athletic fund and a line item budget report of the main budget.

The board voted to buy two new 48 passenger school buses with V8 motors, no spin differential and two speed rear axles at a cost of about \$4,350 each. Delivery is expected in August at the earliest, Clark said, depending on the Viet Nam conflict demands on vehicles. Purchases are made through the State which takes bids from all manufacturers.

When the buses arrive the school will sell by bids a 1962 Chevrolet short bus, a 1966 Chevrolet regular bus and perhaps a 1962 Dodge regular bus.

For regular school use the school would have two 1967 models, one 1966 Chevrolet, a

1963 and 1960 Chevrolet. Probably one bus will be kept as a spare bus but not more than two.

Clark told the board that all buses have \$50 deductible insurance as well as fire, theft, combined additional coverage, property damage and medical payments. The pick ups have all but collision insurance.

Students on the buses are covered for \$10,600 bodily injury per person or \$20,900 per accident, \$5,000 property damage, \$500 medical payment. Total insurance cost for buses is \$264 for one year.

The bills were approved for payment after study and the meeting adjourned until February. Menus for two weeks were given out along with copies of the high school examination schedules and rules.
