67 LICENSE plates went on sale Wednesday and it looks like there's a lot of vehicles to be registered.

Numbers for autos in the county start with DLM 650 and go through DLZ, DLK, DLS, DLT, DLV, DLW and DLY) running from 10 thru 999. Commercial plates run IZ6025 to IZ8399 and farm truck licenses run 8K675 to 8K2124.

The county received 9,400 auto, 2,375 commercial and 1,450 farm licenses. None received for antiques.

Tuesday the Sheriff sold an oil well as directed by the courts to help settle litigation and Monday, Feb. 13th, he scheduled to sell 90 shares in

The report shows that the public schools money was divided, putting \$28,699.68 in local Maintenance Funds and \$8,166.99 in the Bond Fund.

The college money was divided with \$10,469.47 going into local operations and \$10,069.25 into the Bond Fund. \$856.78 was paid to the public school as a collection fee for assessing and collecting the taxes.

Collections to date for the public schools and college total \$115,032.90 on current taxes, \$7,772.98 on delinquent taxes for at total tax collection of \$122,812.58. Penalty and interest will add \$926.43 to the first amount making total collections this tax year total \$123,739.01.

At the close of August last fiscal year collections for the year totaled \$124,705.96.

Taxes for last year and delinquent after January 31 and penalty and interest is now being assessed.

The public school budget anticipated a total tax income of \$82,667 for local maintenance and bonds. \$79,072.39 has been collected to date including taxes, penalty, interest and collection fees from the college.

An \$821,780 Damage Suit naming Ivan J. Allen of near Ranger is scheduled to be heard in 91st District Court Monday, Feb. 13, District Judge J. Frank Sparks reports.

Brought by Mrs. Patsy Reidel of Dallas, the suit was filed by the law firm of Thompson, Coe, Cousins and Irons, and alleges that Mrs. Reidel's husband, Albert F. Reidel, was shot Nov. 7, 1964. Attorneys Bill B. Hart and Virgil T. Seaberry Jr., both of Eastland, represent Mr. Allen.

The original petition in the suit asked \$771,780.70 but an amended petition raised the amount to \$821,780.70.

Among other cases scheduled for Monday is one in which Calvin Jones of Cisco will be tried for hog theft.

Other cases include: Feb. 16: State of Texas vs. Dennis Williams, and an injunction suit involving the sale of land; Feb. 17: Judge Sparks will go to Callahan County assigned to hear a case there; Feb. 20: three non-jury cases are to be heard in the Eastland court; and March 1: another Ashford case is set.

Dozen Cases Handled In District Court

A dozen cases were disposed in 91st District Court Monday with juries rendering three verdicts.

Seven of eight civil suits scheduled to be heard were tried before trial time, and the other case continued to a later date, District Judge J. Frank Sparks reports.

Four criminal cases were heard. One for DWI, second offense, was dismissed on a motion from the state, due to insufficient evidence.

Another, naming the same man, William Ellis Todd of Ranger, for a similar offense, resulted in a not guilty verdict by the jury.

Charles Thompson and James Goforth pleaded guilty to theft over \$50, involving the theft of a pickup in Gorman, and juries recommended two-year sentences, with the stipulation that Thompson's sentence be probated. Judge Sparks also will probate the Goforth sentence, he said, under existing statutes.

Another case, originally set for Monday, State of Texas vs. Harold Dean Nichols, formerly of Cisco was continued until March 1, the judge said.





An ordinance fixing and determining the general service rate to be charged for sales of natural gas to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Ranger, Eastland County, Texas, and providing for the manner in which such rate may be changed, adjusted and amended.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF RANGER, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bill rendered on or after the 28th day of February, 1967, the general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Ranger by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

First 1,000 cu. ft. or fraction thereof \$1.67 gross; \$1.50 net. All over 1,000 cu. ft. @ \$.8433 gross per MCF; \$.759 net per MCF.

No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period.

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date.

In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations in effect.

The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

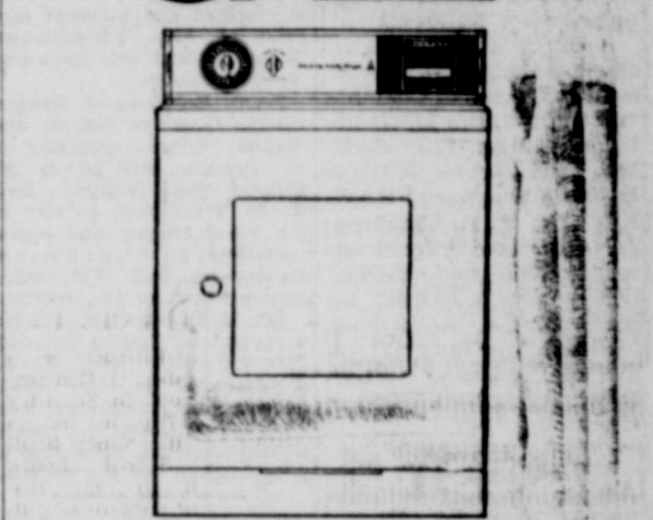
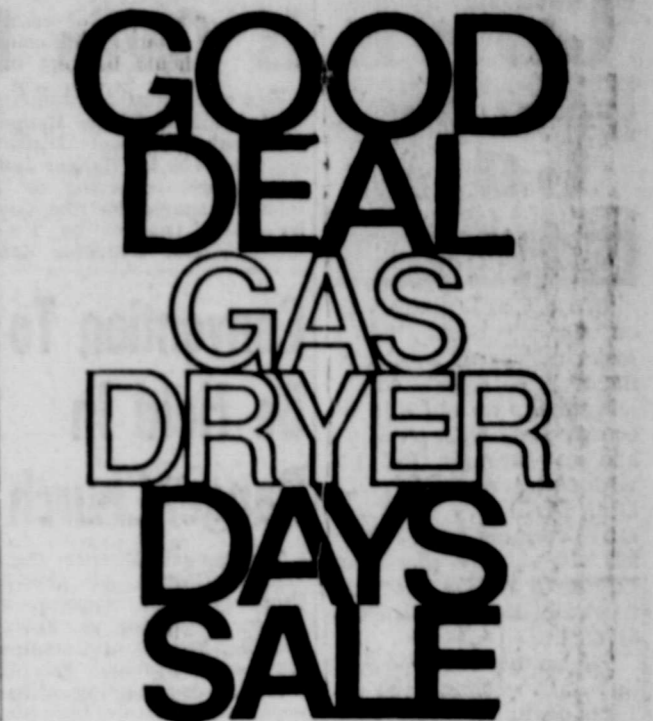

Suggestions Offered To Help Prevent Robbery Of Your Home

DALLAS — Many burglaries of homes and apartments in Texas can be prevented if simple precautions are taken states the Insurance Information Institute.

The Institute's Southwest Regional office in Dallas lists steps:

1. If you are away from home, don't advertise it. Tightly drawn shades, notes to the milkman and accumulated newspapers are a dead giveaway even to the inexperienced housebreaker.
2. Whenever you leave home - even if only for a few minutes - lock doors and windows.
3. When you are out at night, keep a few lights lit.
4. Never leave a house key under a doormat or over a door. These are the first places a burglar will look.
5. Keep your garage door closed and locked at all times, whether you are home or not.
6. Door hinges should be on the inside, to prevent a burglar from forcing them

with a crowbar.

7. Heavy screening on windows and sturdy double locks on door make forced entries more difficult.

8. Careful attention should be paid to securing basement doors.

9. Large amounts of cash, jewelry and stamp and coin collections should be kept in a safety deposit box or adequate safe.

10. Locks should be changed when moving into a new apartment or when a key has been lost.

11. Don't leave ladders lying around where they can be used by a would-be housebreaker.

12. Be cautious when strangers come to the door. Women at home alone should be particularly careful. Use a "night" door chain.

13. Before leaving on a trip, notify neighbors and police so they can keep an eye on your house. Discontinue deliveries of newspapers and milk. If you will be on a long trip, arrange to have the lawn mowed.

14. Keep a record of the serial numbers of such property as typewriters, firearms, photographic equipment, bicycles, etc. to aid police in the event you are burglarized.

15. Always report burglaries and attempted break-ins to the police and cooperate with officers investigating crimes in your neighborhood.

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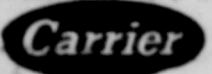

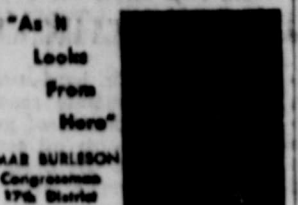

Washington



WASHINGTON, D. C. — It is approximately 1800 miles from the center of the 24-County Seventeenth Congressional District of Texas to the Federal Treasury in Washington where funds for the Great Society are stored.

To get there, however, requires quite a few detours. In some cases it is by St. Louis; Billings, Montana; Fort Worth; Dallas; Denver; Tulsa; Omaha; Chicago; Detroit; or Kansas City.

These places are the regional outposts of the Federal bureaucracy, and many of them — like Sears and Roebuck and Montgomery Ward — offer competing brands of Great Society programs, wrapped up in different packages and sold on different terms.

For local officials dealing with this governmental maze it is like running an obstacle course with no certainty of ever reaching the end of the track. If he is plagued with a water problem he may be sent to the Farmers Home Administration in Temple or to the Federal Water Pollution Control Commission in Kansas City, or to the Community Facilities Administration in Fort Worth, or to the Economic Development Administration in Detroit, or to the State Capitol or to Washington or to some other place or agency. It is a bewildering, frustrating road to travel.

All over America, governors, mayors, city managers, and state legislators are complaining bitterly of what ought to be a fairly simple task — getting the money the Congress has voted to build the Great Society and using that money to the best advantage locally without so many "guidelines". The ends of which are held in Washington.

"Creative Federalism" is a phrase now being often used by the Administration, which actually means "cooperation" between the many layered bureaucracy in Washington and its counterparts in the State and local governments.

It really is a simple concept and crucial to the social objectives and political success of the many new programs provided by Congress during the last two or three years.

It was easy enough in 1965 and 1966 to vote billions for education, health, welfare, urban renewal and poverty wars, but unless those billions buy what they are supposed to buy and unless they get down to the people they are supposed to help, what is the purpose of them?

As these programs now operate, the money must pass through a governmental apparatus so vast and so complicated it defies description. It is made up of nearly 100,000 separate units of government, ranging in size from the local sewer district in a Texas town to a vast highway running the length of Appalachia. It employs millions of people in hundreds of bureaus, agencies and departments — in offices scattered half way around the earth from Guam to the Virgin Islands.

The question is being constantly asked, "Is it possible to unite them in the kind of a single-minded national effort the Administration envisions, and is there any organizational set-up which can really function efficiently to do the job?"

It is now obvious that these questions have got to have answers, and affirmatively, if all these plans are to bear fruit and if the billions committed are to have any meaningful impact on the life of America.

There is talk of reorganization. Governors are fed up with rules, regulations, guidelines, delays and unmet promises, and some demanding that they be given the money without Federal interference. The idea of a tax rebate to the States is catching on. Because of the weaknesses in the present system, the idea may gain a lot of momentum unless corrections are made, and made soon.

New Highway Maps Show Added State Lakes, Roads, Shelters

AUSTIN — Six new public lakes, 819 miles of new highways and 18 new safety rest areas make their appearance for the first time on the Texas Highway Department's colorful 1967 Official State Highway Map.

Before the year is out, about one million copies of the map will be distributed throughout the world, inviting Texas and out-of-state visitors alike to "Discover Texas, America's Fun-Tier."

All the "new lakes" are accessible to the public via the 67-thousand-mile Texas highway system.

Largest of the new reservoirs is Lake Meredith on the Canadian River in the Panhandle. Others are Lake Arrowhead, Fin Creek Reservoir, White River, Lake Bardwell and Somerville Reservoirs.

The new map shows 115 additional miles of Interstate highways added since last year. More than 1,700 miles of these superb new highways are in service now.

The 1967 Official Highway Map also delineates approximately 794 miles of new farm to market roads. Many of these provide the visitor with access to recreational areas throughout the State, as well as serving agriculture and industry.

Eighteen additional safety rest areas are shown on the map for the first time. More than 1,100 safety rest areas scenic turnouts and roadside parks now enhance the safety and convenience of Texas highway.

A message from Governor John Connally welcomes the visitor and extends a personal invitation to explore Texas.

Further emphasizing the water resources of Texas, a scenic photograph of the San Rayburn Reservoir in East Texas graces the cover of the map.

Padre Island centers a pictorial display, along with 12 other vivid color photographs of scenes and sights from every area of the State.

For the convenience of the traveler, the face of the map contains a handy mileage table, inset maps showing principal streets in larger cities, and listings of State parks, Texas Highway Department Tourist Bureaus and highway patrol offices.

The 1967 Official State Map is but one of a variety of services provided for the convenience of the traveler by the Texas Highway Department.

Through its Travel and Information Division, the Texas Highway Department assist nearly three-quarters of a million visitors each year in eight Tourist Information Bureaus located at key highway gateways and in the rotunda of the State Capitol in Austin.

Additionally, the Department answers more than 261 thousand inquiries annually, furnishing information and descriptive literature about Texas.

In performing these services, the Department distributes more than 3.5 million pieces of travel-oriented literature about Texas annually. Of this volume more than two million pieces are produced as a part of the Highway Department's travel promotion program.

Texas motorists may order the 1967 Official State Highway Map when registering motor vehicles during February and March. County tax officers have been provided with supplies of special order cards.

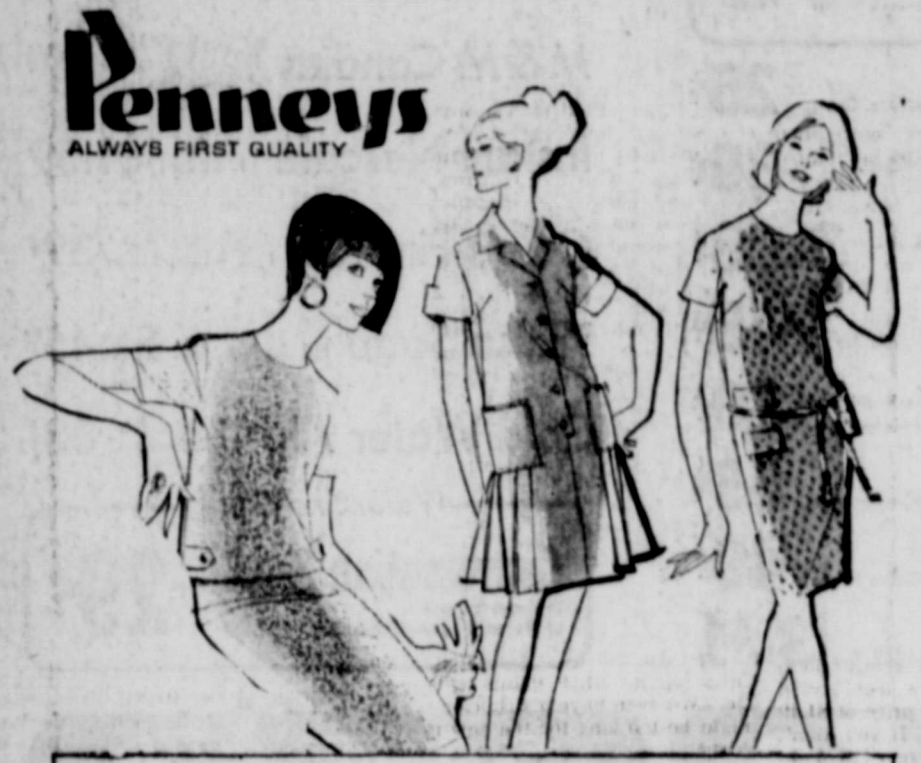

Contract Is Awarded On Another Super Highway Section In County

Another section of Interstate 20, the super highway that eventually will replace Highway 90 and by-pass Cisco, Eastland and Ranger, was ready for work to begin this week, according to announcement from the Texas Highway Department's district offices at Brownwood.

The new section, a 5.3 mile stretch from a point east of Cisco to almost due south of Eastland, has been contracted to Cecil Ruby Company, Inc., for the price of \$1,731,161.00.

The contract is for grading, structures, flexible base, and two-course surface construction.

R. P. Haun, resident engineer for Eastland County, and his staff will be in charge of engineering work on the project. A total of 325 working days will be required on the project.

The Interstate 20 project began about two years ago at the Eastland County line, west of Cisco, and for the past year a section from the Cisco city limits to a point about mid-way between Cisco and Eastland has been under construction.

Plans call for hard-surfacing of the interstate road to await the completion of grading and structures all across the county. It has been announced previously that the target date for completing Interstate 20 in Texas is 1970.

The Cecil Ruby Co., of Austin, was expected to begin moving men and equipment in this week for the beginning of work. This company had the contract on the first project — the section from the Eastland-Callahan County line east to the Cisco limits. The second section, from the Cisco city limits east midway to Eastland, was contracted to M. E. Ruby, Jr., also of Austin. This project has been finished except for seeding and planting grass beside the right of way to prevent erosion. This will be done in March and April.

Engineer Haun reported that the Highway 183 project north of Cisco to the Stephens County line be completed in about six weeks.

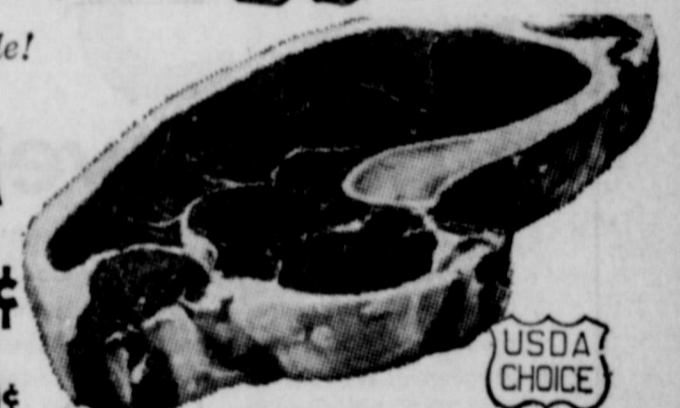
