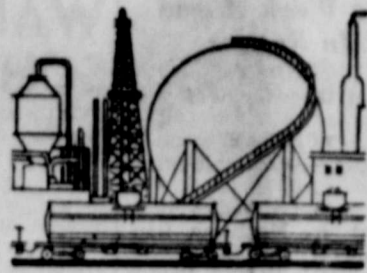

## Former Newsboy Becomes Famed Violinist

Rubinoff and his violin are synonymous with Pittsburgh. As a newsie in his hometown, he was literally kicked off the platform of a railroad station by a policeman. That day he vowed he'd make policemen escort him through great cities. His violin has done the trick. Rubinoff has had police motorcycle escorts through New York and Cities from that size on down. Frequently, he'doubled on a theater stage and had to be rushed to radio stations and back to theaters to keep split-second schedules.

Through all these years on the road of stardom, I have known Rubinoff and have marveled at his versatility. He can do any clowning trick that can be done with a violin. He can make a violin talk. In another mood, he can play the most tender ballad, written by his own pen. In still another mood, he can perform a dynamic composition, requiring the greatest emotion and deepest feeling. I have seen him turn pale and step into another world as he raised his baton to perform such a number.

I have watched Rubinoff rehearse his symphonic orchestra in sections - he was the first to do that - working for days on a single section, then at the end of the week, bringing all sections together for a smooth working dress rehearsal.

Once I suggested that he listen to the first recording of a certain popular tune. He wasn't in the mood. We retired and next morning at four o'clock, he came to my room and ordered me out of bed to hear him play a violin obligato to the record. I refused to get up so he slipped a drawer of ice cubes under my covers and got me out of bed to listen. That tune became one of his greatest overtures.

Varied music, from the artist's own pen, and from the pens of the great masters of all time are featured on Rubinoff's Concert Program.

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## Special Bus Will Carry Delegates

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State Rep. Burke Musgrove announced the "hurried up" hearing date, stating that he first learned of the setting Friday morning.

A large delegation of Eastland County and area residents is planning to be in Austin for the hearing, to show members of the Judiciary Committee the advantages of leaving the court in Eastland where adequate quarters are presently provided.

The hearing is set for Room 345, but because of the delegations expected to attend, Musgrove said, it is likely that it might be moved to the main floor of the House of Representatives.

Eastland Attorney Virgil T. Seabury, Jr., will make the formal presentation for keeping the court in Eastland County.

A special bus is being arranged and will leave Eastland at 4:30 a.m. Tuesday en route for Austin. Bill Hoffmann is handling arrangements for the bus, and Frank Sayre is contacting persons securing reservations of those who can and will go to Austin to plead the case of the 11th Court of Civil Appeals in this county.

A smaller delegation of interested persons will go to Austin Monday afternoon to confer with Musgrove about the presentations and to map plans for the formal hearing.

Walter Knapp of Amarillo is chairman of the committee which is considering the bill. The bill was drafted by and introduced by Abilene representatives Gram Jones and Frank Calhoun. The City of Abilene and Taylor County have a gigantic bond issue election in Abilene on the same day, which if passed would build a new courts building.

# Cumpton Resigns, Smith Is Named Head Grid Coach At Ranger High

The resignation of Gerald Cumpton as head coach and athletic director of Ranger High School was accepted by the board of trustees Tuesday night and Assistant Coach Charlie Smith was elevated to the top position with a new two year contract.

Cumpton resigned effective the end of this week in order to move to Pittsburg where he has been elected to a similar position. The Pittsburg school is about four times the size of Ranger.

In his letter of resignation Coach Cumpton stated that it was with mixed emotions that he submitted his resignation.

"Since I have been in Ranger I have always tried to do what was best for Ranger High School. I felt this to be my job and I hope this goal has been accomplished."

"I wish to thank each and everyone who has been a part of our program for they deserve much of the credit for any success we might have had."

"I want to give Mr. Clark a special vote of thanks for the outstanding way he has performed his duties as Superintendent. It has been an honor and privilege to work with such an outstanding man."

"My family and I wish to thank all the people in Ranger who helped to make us feel right at home in this fine community."

"Let but far from least, I want to thank the boys who played so well for Ranger High School," he told the board.

Cumpton had been coach for two seasons at Ranger coming from Olney where he was assistant.

## WARDEN TO CONDUCT SCHOLARSHIP TESTS

O. C. Warden, supervisor of Schools, will administer the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMSQT) to Ranger and Gorman High Schools on Tuesday, Feb. 28, at Ranger High School, J. W. Childress, Principa, announced today.

The NMSQT, a two and one-half hour test of educational development, is the first step in the 12th annual competition for four-year Merit Scholarships. Students who wish to be considered for the Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1968 must take the NMSQT on this date.

All students' scores will be reported to their school before May 15, together with interpretive and guidance materials for schools and students. About 14,000 semifinalists, the highest scorers in each state, will be announced publicly on Sept. 22, 1967. The names of semifinalists will be sent to colleges and organizations offering financial aid to undergraduates. In October approximately 38,000 students who score just below the level required of semifinalists

will receive letters of commendation for their high performance, although they will not be eligible to compete for Merit Scholarships.

Each semifinalist will be required to substantiate his NMSQT performance on a second examination and submit certain biographical information in order to become a Finalist in the competition. Only finalists are eligible to be considered for the Merit Scholarships financed by the NMSQ and sponsors. Every finalist will be awarded a Certificate of Merit for his outstanding performance in the 1967-68 Merit Program.

## First National Bank\*

SCENE OF DARING SANTA CLAUS BANK ROBBERY, Dec. 23, 1927

During Christmas Festivities, costumed Santa and three fellow bandits looted bank of \$12,200 cash, \$150,000 in securities. They escaped through gun battle with two little girls as hostages. A three-day manhunt followed.

The children and money were recovered; the robbers captured. Six persons were killed, eight injured. Later, a mob lynched 'Santa' when he broke out of jail.

THERE WILL BE a "wait and see" period of several months now to determine what will happen to the M-K-T Railroad that runs through Eastland County.

The railway company has had an application before the Interstate Commerce Commission for some months to abandon the line from Waco to Stamford. Recently a group of Gorman folks headed by Melvin E. Shell bought the 26-mile segment from Gorman to Dublin. Mr. Shell co-owner of Gorman Peanut Co., reported that it will be used to move peanuts to market connections.

At one time, there was a move afoot to buy the stretch from Dublin to Cisco for a T&P connection. And at one time, the T&P was interested in buying the stretch from Stamford to Cisco.

The ICC must rule on the purchase by the Gorman group, which likely will be favorable. And it will have to be determined whether the Cisco - Stamford section, which serves a big sheet rock plant is taken by the T&P, or abandoned.

(State-wide release by Texas State Historical Survey Committee.)

The historical First National Bank in Cisco has been designated a "Recorded Texas Historic Landmark," and is being marked appropriately with an interpretive plate, Charles Woodburn of Amarillo, president of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, announced today.

The interpretive plate, made of cast aluminum with Swedish steel effect, will be placed by the Official Texas Historical Medallion which was awarded this structure 5 years ago. It is sponsored by the First National Bank. The marker text states: (See attached copy of inscription)

Awarding of this plate is a part of the statewide program, "RAMPS," which includes recordation, appreciation, marking, preservation and survey of historical structures. These medallions with plates may be sponsored by private donors or organizations and by cities and counties in cooperation with the Eastland County Historical Survey Committee according to Chairman Mike Collins of Eastland. All such markers and inscription are approved by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

This type of marker is designed to recognize and interpret historical, cultural, architectural and religious significance of buildings and other structures as worthy of preservation.

The history of this structure will be placed in the State Archives and its location will be listed in the next edition of the Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers and on maps to help stimulate tourist trade in the area, provide a high point on historical tours and acquaint local citizens of Eastland County with their own unique historical heritage, Collins stated.

**Important ASCS Dates Announced**

Jesse G. Meredith, office manager of Eastland County ASCS, has announced the following important dates to remember: Feb. 28, final date to apply for new farm feed grain base; March 3, final date to release or request additional cotton acreage; and April 4, final date to release or request additional peanut acreage.

Meredith also said that incentive payment on mohair, wool, and unshorn lambs probably will be made in April.

Aerial control of mesquite has been added to the list of approved ACP practices. Cost-share is approved at \$150 per acre. The average cost for spraying mesquite by the aerial method is \$3.00

per acre and spraying should be done about 45 days after the first leaves appear in the spring. Sign-up dates will be announced by the ASCS office.

Requests for a measurement service prior to planting are now being filed. The rate of charge is \$10.00 per farm plus \$2.00 per acre based on allotment or base, whichever is applicable.

Requests for cost-share may now be filed for springing Coastal Bermuda. Recommended is 180 pounds of sprigs per acre with 130 pounds of 16-20-0 per acre. Maximum acreage for cost-share is 30 acres. Applications must be filed before work is begun.

## HOMEMAKERS' HINTS

The 1967 Texas Home Demonstration Associations district meeting is scheduled for April 13 and 14 in Stephenville. Meeting facilities are being provided by Tarleton State College. Some 200 Home Demonstration women representing 20 central Texas counties are expected.

Making plans to attend from Eastland County are Mrs. W. V. Fenter, Rising Star; Mrs. Genoa Brown, Eastland; and Mrs. B. W. Gordon, Ranger. These three women will serve as voting delegates for Eastland County. Too, Mrs. Fenter will be a member of the resolution committee during the meeting. The recreation workshop will be conducted by the Eastland delegates.

More and more home owners are installing central vacuum cleaning equipment. This system has a motor, fan, filter, and bag located in a basement or other remote home location. Outlets are placed in strategic positions throughout the house. A long, portable hose and nozzle are connected to the outlets for cleaning.

Most central vacuum systems collect dust in an outside vented section attached to the motor unit. Dirt collecting bags may be emptied twice a year.

Advantages to the built-in system include non-recirculation of dust; near silence since the motor is remote; and convenience — no unit to carry, and minimum storage requirements.

Many of the portable type cleaners will sport a variety of new features for the homemaker in 1967. Canister cleaners that will float on air are in the experimental stage. Air exhaust is directed under the canister, lifting it just slightly off the floor. However, critics of this feature say it merely blows the dust and dirt away from the vacuum.

More research is being done on battery operated vacuums to lengthen the time between rechargings. The trend toward decorative clean-

ers is being stepped up in response to consumers' desire for brighter colors and upgrading of style.

Different brands of self-polishing wax have different formulas. Even the same brand changes from time to time as improvements are made. Because of these differences, never combine partially used cans of these waxes.

Never wash eggs before storing them, advises a nutrition specialist. Washing removes the natural protective coating which keeps air and foreign odors from entering the shell.

# THE GORDON SPOT

Several people have recently requested information on the control of Scale insects. Scale insects attack a wide range of plants from ornamentals to fruit trees. There are some 2,000 species of these tiny insects, but the control practices are about the same for all scale insects.

Adult scale insects form a protective layer of wax over the body. This wax may be merely a thin layer or it may be in the form of tufts, plates or powder. The females lose their legs and never move after once inserting the beak into the plant. The females lay eggs and after a short period die. The tiny eggs soon hatch into little "crawlers" or nymphs which begin to crawl about the tree, searching for a place to eventually repeat the above process.

Dormant "winter" oils are most effective in controlling scale insects. Oils are toxic to all three stages of the scale: eggs, nymphs, or "crawlers" and adults. This type of oil can only be applied during the dormant period of the year, and even then, should not be applied to plants retaining green color.

Another type of oil commonly referred to as "summer" oils has been used during the remainder of the year with some success. The summer oils are much "lighter" than winter oils but may still cause serious foliar burning or even death to the plant if excessive amounts are applied. Extreme care should be taken in using only the recommended amounts on the label when applying either of these two oils.

Three other insecticides have been effectively used against most scale insects during the growing periods of the year. Malathion, diazinon, and Cygon have given good control if applied while the

nymphs or "crawlers" are present. These insecticides only control the "crawler" stage of the scale. The adults are protected from these chemicals by their waxy covering and the chemicals have no effect on eggs which have been laid.

Generally, three to four applications at seven to ten day intervals are necessary before control is obtained if chemicals other than dormant oils are used.

Some Eastland County livestock men may be interested in attending a beef cattle field day at the Livestock and Forage Research Center near McGregor on March 2.

Tours of the cattle pens will be held from 9:30 a. m. to 12. The afternoon program begins with "Are Small Beef Cows More Efficient?" A. A. Melton has been doing research to find out which size beef cow is most efficient. His talk will be a report on what he has found to date. Other interesting topics will also be discussed.

The Research Center also sells bulls on that day. One local rancher plans to buy a bull from the Center. The Research Center is located 3 miles south of McGregor on State Highway 317.

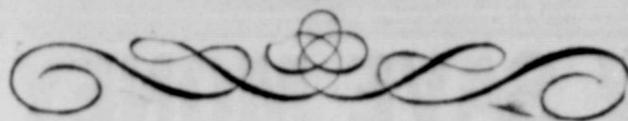
## Cisco Baptists To Host Ass'n. Meeting Monday
