DRIVER EDUCATION COURSE HAS 35 STUDENTS ENROLLED

Ranger Public School's annual summer driver training class gets underway at 8 a. m. with 35 students enrolled, according to Principal James W. Childress. Classes will be from 8 a. m. to 10 a. m. five days a week with Principal Boone Yarbrough doing the teaching at the high school. The last day of classroom work will be Monday, June 19. The classroom work must last at least 20 calendar days.

Beginning Typing and Office Machine, James McDonald. There are currently available jobs on the campus for summer work under the college Work-Study Program. The College Work-Study Program is designed so that the student may earn as much as \$75 per month while attending school. The National Defense Student Loan Plan is a low interest rate loan program to be repaid after a student graduates from college with as much as 50 per cent cancellation for those who become teachers.

In explaining the extension of the program instituted several years ago, the mayor stressed the importance of continuing purchase of bonds and its effect upon the city's credit rating.

High School Science Teacher Hired; Bus Financing Handled

The board of trustees of Ranger Independent School District met in a called meeting Thursday night and elected Robert M. Whitley, Breckenridge, as a high school teacher of science for next fall and accepted the resignation of Larry Hunt as Hodges Oak Park School principal.

In other action they approved issuing time warrants to the Commercial State Bank for \$8,430 for four years to buy two new school buses that are ready now for delivery. \$1,500 will be spent from current transportation fund making a total expenditure of \$9,930 for the two buses.

The board was told by Superintendent James R. Clark that five new majorette uniforms had been ordered as well as a new drum major uniform. The drum major will wear white with a gold glitter military type shield on it and will cost about \$128. The majorettes will wear a white A line dress with three quarter length sleeves with silver glitter trim. The dress will come to seven inches of the knee. The dresses are about \$50 each.

For variety they may still wear old outfits if agreeable. Clark gave the results of the junior high twirling contests and also a report on what it would cost to begin a metal-shop program.

He told the board that it would cost about \$50,000 for lathes and equipment and that it took a minimum of 30 boys not enrolled already in vocational agriculture to secure a teacher unit.

Offers to trade the school car were gone over but action deferred. It was agreed to let the new football scoreboard be paid for by a prospective business for advertising purposes. Clark told the board that he did not have a replacement for Hunt and no applicants at this time. He said he still needed two high school teachers and maybe three. He said he had visited four colleges and secured only one name of a prospective teacher.

He reported that the present senior class had left the school \$250 to be used toward purchasing new stage curtains for the high school auditorium.

Jury Ordered To Report Monday

Three cases have been scheduled for trial Monday at the 91st District Court in Eastland. The docket included two criminal cases and one civil suit.

Bryant W. Boles, 45, of Cisco, will go on trial on charges of kidnapping, sodomy, indecent exposure to a child, and enticing a minor for immoral purposes. The charges grew out of a case in Cisco several weeks ago.

In the other criminal case, Larry O. Clark, 21, of Dallas will be tried on charges of burglary and assault with intent to rape. This case was the result of an incident at Ranger several weeks ago.

County Attorney Perry T. Brown will be assisted by Bill Thomas, Abilene attorney and former Taylor County attorney, in the prosecution of both cases. Mr. Brown has announced.

Dewey Cox of Ranger is the court-appointed attorney to represent Bowles, and W. B. Wright of Cisco was named by the court as counsel for Clark.

The civil case is styled Vaughn R. Pirtle et al vs. Ervin Addy III. The plaintiffs are seeking \$32,160 damages as the result of an automobile accident in December, 1964, in Cisco.

Ben Sudderth of Comanche will represent the Pirtles, and Brown, Day and Crawley of Fort Worth will be the Ady law firm.

Youth Corps Summer Jobs Slated For 160

Some 160 students from 22 high schools in Eastland, Palo Pinto, Shackelford, Throckmorton, Stephens, and Young Counties will be eligible for employment through the neighborhood Youth Corps Summer program, according to an announcement by Tip Archer of Eastland, Area Coordinator.

Jobs will include clerical aides in the schools and tax offices; library aides; and custodial and maintenance aides. Clerical aides will also be employed in the Home Demonstration offices, Soil Conservation offices, and Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation offices.

To be eligible, a student need only be enrolled in one of the high schools, between the ages of 16 and 21, and meet family income requirements. Students should apply through their high schools.

Each student will be paid \$1.25 per hour for up to 27 hours a week for 12 weeks. In addition, each student will spend one hour a week in education and job counseling with selected school personnel.

All wages will be paid with the federal grant of \$74,270.00 available for this area. Archer stated that \$83,000.00 was spent on the "in-school" phase of the NYC this school year. The summer program will begin May 29.

All student employees will be supervised by the participating schools.

Three Oil Test Are Announced For County
