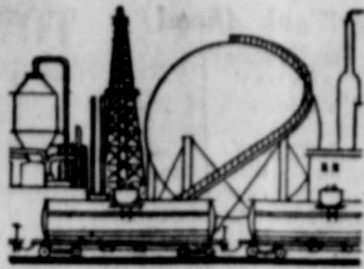

Two New Buses Ready For Next School Year

Ranger Public Schools received two new school buses Thursday for use next school year.

Both buses are Chevrolets with Superior bodies on them and are each rated 48 students in load carrying.

The cash price of each bus is \$4,965 Supt James Clark reports.

Next fall we will be operating two 1967 buses, one 1966 and one 1963 model. For spare use will be a 1962 Dodge and for football a 1960 model.

Engines on the new 1967 buses are six cylinder 195 horsepower motors. Both buses are equipped with no-spin differential and two speed rear axle.

The driver is provided with seat belts for the first time.

The public is invited to get inside the new buses and look them over and note the many improvements on the new ones compared to older buses.

Clark Gets 10 More Years; Gives Notice of Two Appeals

Larry Clark had another day in court Friday when he pleaded guilty to burglary, waived a jury and was given a one-year sentence by Presiding Judge J. Frank Sparks.

The sentence will run concurrently with the 80-year sentence handed down Tuesday by Judge Sparks after Clark was found guilty by a jury of aggravated assault with intent to rape.

Coming as a surprise was notice given by Clark through his court-appointed attorney, W.B. Wright, of his intention to appeal both cases, following the Friday proceedings.

Judge Sparks said formal sentencing will come in a few days. Procedure in the appeal will be for the attorney to continue to represent the defendant at county expense, through the appeals courts.

A civil case is set in 91st District Court for June 14, and Judge Sparks will be in Wichita Falls hearing a motion in a court there on June 9.

Green Beret Sergeant Is Buried In Service At Snyder On May 30

Sgt. Donald Thorpe Deere, a 22-year-old Snyder soldier who gave his life for his country while serving in Viet Nam with a Special Forces detachment of the famous Green Berets, received military rites at Hillside Memorial Gardens in Snyder on May 30.

The soldier was officially declared dead by the Army on May 18, 1967, after having originally been reported missing in action May 17, 1966.

The Captain of the Green Beret detachment with which Donald served described the action in which the Snyder soldier was listed as missing.

Operating with South Vietnamese forces at Lac Ninh near the Cambodian border, Sgt. Deere was hit in the thigh by enemy fire while attempting to cross a clearing to contact his unit. He was never seen again. Viet Cong forces took the position and it was later recaptured by American troops. Deere's body was never recovered.

The Rev. Jerry Speers, pastor of Green Hill Baptist Church of Snyder, officiated at the services, which were held in Bell - Seale Chapel. Assisting were the Rev. Allen Fosbit, pastor of Fluvanna Methodist Church; the Rev. Odie Archie, Sr., and the Rev. Samuel Delgado.

A special detachment of U. S. Army units from Brooks Medical Center at San Antonio and Fort Hood were in graveside rites at the cemetery.

The services were followed by the regular Memorial Day service of the local posts of the VFW and American Legion. A memorial bronze plaque was placed in Hillside's Field of Honor in Deere's honor.

Congressman George Mahon extended his sympathy to the family and expressed regret that he could not be present for the service.

Sgt. Deere was born September 6, 1944, in Roscoe and attended Snyder schools and Ranger Junior College. He joined the National Guard and entered the U. S. Army in July, 1963. He served a tour of duty in Okinawa prior to his special assignment in Viet Nam in January 20, 1966.

The Green Berets is an Army Special Forces unit comprised of soldiers trained especially for guerrilla warfare and action in unusual situations. They are all volunteers.

Sgt. Deere was the great-nephew of Mrs. Victor Cornelius of Eastland, who attended the services Tuesday; and the great-grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Pettit, longtime Eastland residents. Donald's maternal grandmother, Mrs. L. O. and E. Thorpe, Sr. of Dallas, is the former Thelma Pettit of Eastland.

Survivors are the parents, Mr. and Mrs. Herman Deere of Snyder; two brothers, Charles of Fort Hood and D. Leon of Arlington; one sister, Mrs. Roy D. Sanderford of Arlington; the paternal grandmother, Mrs. Delphia Deere of Lamesa; the maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Leonard E. Thorpe, Sr. of Dallas; four nephews and one niece.

Valid Operators License Due For Driver Training

Contrary to rumors, Ranger students now taking driver training will receive valid operators license like any adult now holds Supt. James K. Clark.

There is not any change yet in the licensing procedure Clark said. The new law does not go into effect until Aug. 29, and the Ranger High School class will be through around the last of July.

Thirty-nine students are now enrolled in the class with five of them being from Olden. Class size was originally set at 35 by State regulations but it was raised 10 per cent in a letter this week from Austin permitting Ranger to have 39.

The letter also increased the number of hours the teacher can teach actual driving of the vehicle from four hours daily to six hours.

The Texas Education Agency said these changes were being made to permit the summer classes to complete the course before the new law goes into effect.

Classes now meet from 8 to 10 a. m. daily and will end June 19, Monday, with Coach Charlie Smith doing the classroom teaching. Actual driving begins June 20 with Coach Smith both supervising the driving.

Each student pays \$25 tuition which almost covers the cost of the course Clark said. Last year it only lacked \$35 covering the cost.

Students completing the eighth grade next May will not be eligible for driving training since the age limit is being raised beginning August 29.

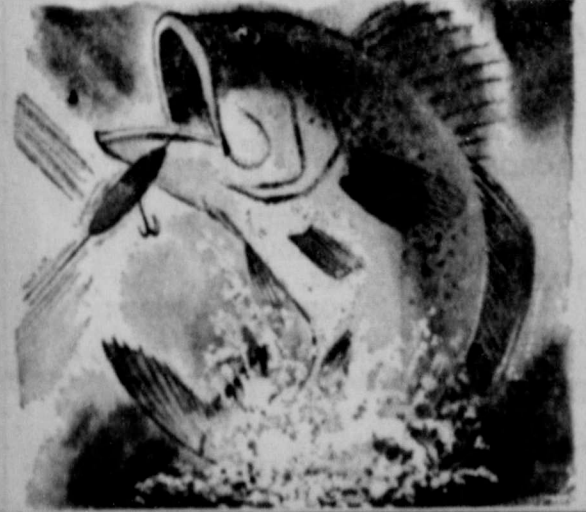

Mrs. Horton Writes From The Middle East And Holy Land

(Editor's Note: Mrs. James Horton is on a 65-day cruise to 27 ports. She sailed from New Orleans April 6 on the Stella Polaris of the Swedish Lines.)

Dear friends of home: On the morning of May 1, our little "Stella" arrived in Alexandria which is the port of entry to Egypt. We transferred immediately by motor coach to the airport, taking the plane for the flight up the Nile River to Luxor. There were 36 of us together with our last guide.

After dinner at Hotel "New Winter Palace" we rode in horse-drawn carriages to the once glorious temple of King Karnak. This is a temple twelve feet in diameter by 75 feet high, stand as monuments to this dynasty 4,000 years B. C. Statues of Kings, Queens, and animals still remain, many of them unscarred by time.

Next morning after a very early breakfast we crossed by ferry to the west side of the Nile. The night before, on this same ferry, we crossed the Nile with only the night of Egyptian stars overhead. It was a wonderful experience. Then by private car, we drove to a few miles to what is known as the "Valley of the Kings." There we descended into the tombs of Pharaohs (King Tut) and other pharaohs. There are 64 of these tombs built in the side of sandstone hills. We descended into four of them and able to learn some of the habits and ways of living so long ago.

It is impossible to describe

the greatness and colossal bigness of these Kingdoms of forty centuries before Christ. The city of Luxor is stagnant; no growth and certainly nothing clean. One wonders why this part of the background should be so backward.

Cairo is growing. There is much building of beautiful homes and luxurious boulevards.

The new airport is one of the largest and most beautiful I've seen. The museum in Cairo displays the wonders of a past world and contains all the findings — furniture, jewelry, food, etc. — that were in the tomb of King Tut.

Bible Lands: On the morning of May 4, we took a 250 mile flight from Cairo to Amman, Jordan, crossing the Suez Canal, the Sinai Peninsula, the wilderness of Moses and the Dead Sea. Amman is a large, beautiful city in the lowlands of Jordan, where planes can land. We drove by bus to Jerusalem, crossing the rolling hills of Judah. The terrain in the Jerusalem part of Jordan is very rough. It is made up of high, rocky hills. Only the deep valleys can be cultivated.

St. George Hotel, where we stayed, is the heart of the city. Shops for souvenir buyers are nearby. We were told that the tourist business affords practically the only income for the people in this city of 85,000. We visited many Biblical places and I felt I was walking on Holy Ground, among these were Mount of Olives, Garden of Gethsemane, where Christ spent his hours of before the betrayal by Judas, the Agony Rock, the Holy Sepulchre and Calvary.

In Bethlehem, just 12 miles from Jerusalem, we visited Rachel's tomb, the grotto of the Nativity where Christ was

born and laid in a manger, the milk grotto and saw the saw the sloping fields where Ruth and Naomi worked for Boaz.

Driving from Jerusalem to the Dead Sea, we descended 1,300 feet below sea level. This is the lowest place on earth.

Continuing toward Jericho we crossed a very high ridge of mountains before coming down into the city. Jericho is a place of beauty; growth, lush. They raise many fruits and vegetables, delicious oranges and bananas.

Part of the old and famous wall of Jericho still remains. — It is the oldest city in the world, as records have been found dating as far back as 700 B. C.

Then on the Damascus, Syria. The countryside crossing the plains of Jordan was luxurious with fields of grain not yet ripened. There were many flowers, poppies, great clumps of white daisies and many unknown wild flowers.

Fields of grain were even richer as we drove into the Syrian countryside.

Damascus claims to be the oldest city in the world with continuous habitation. We drove through the residential district where there are many large and beautiful homes, many of our western architecture. Most interesting was the very old "Street called Straight", where we came upon St. Paul's Window in the wall. The Apostle allegedly escaped through this window and to the Chapel of Ananias, which is the oldest church in Christendom. It is a Catholic church now.

Damascus is truly a city of contrasts. Cars are mostly makes from America. We rode in a Dodge. There are very few stop lights and drivers seem to be making up their own rules. Horns blared in the heart of the city. Population is 250,000.

Syria is an independent country and one which has not received help from the United States. Education is free through Master's Degree. It is compulsory from 6 to 16 years of age. A student must pay for his books.

Driving west from Damascus, we were many hours between ranges of mountains on which many had grown skiing that young people were skiing on them. Here again the valley was rich in fields of grain, watered by the Biblical Mount Hermon.

Spring is the best time of year to enjoy this part of the world.

We visited the ruins of the enormous Roman Temple of Jupiter and nearby the temples of Baalsham and Venus. These old historic temples are in the city of Baalbek, Lebanon. The foundation stones are reputed to be the largest ever quarried by human hands. These temples were built in the first to third centuries, A. D.

\$5,250 Damages Awarded by Jury

A 91st District Court jury deliberated for about four hours Thursday and found in favor of the plaintiff, awarding the Pirtle's of Cisco \$5,250 in damages.

A total of \$33,760 had been asked in the suit. The jury held that a 1964 accident in Cisco was not "unavoidable." W. T. Eaton was jury foreman.

The suit was styled Vaughn R. Pirtle vs. Ervin Addy III, Pirtle, 20, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Pirtle and Addy is the son of Dr. and Mrs. Ervin E. Addy II.

The damage suit resulted from an auto collision in Cisco on Dec. 5, 1964 at 11:45 p. m. in which Addy and Pirtle were drivers of two vehicles. In the Pirtle's original petition, six points of negligence were charged against the Addy youth, and sums including \$1,600 for replacement of a Volkswagen, \$27,160 past and future earnings for the youth; and \$5,000 for his parents in loss of service is asked.

The Addy's answer disclaimed points of negligence on the Addy boy's part, but counter-charged four points of negligence against the Pirtle youth, and called the incident an "unavoidable accident."

Testimony began Wednesday after selection of the four women, eight man jury in Judge J. Frank Spark's court. The Ben Sudderth law firm of Comanche is counsel for the Pirtles and the Brown, Day and Crowley firm of Fort Worth represents the Addys.

Among the witnesses testifying Thursday morning were young Pirtle, his father, Ronnie Reynolds and Reynolds's mother, Mrs. Don Reynolds, all of Cisco.

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LIONS HEAR ADDRESS ON SCHOOL EXPENSES

More money will have to be found soon to pay for operation of the Ranger Public Schools Supt. James R. Clark told the Lions Club Thursday noon.

The new teacher pay raise will cost the average school 3.5 per cent more and to Ranger—that is over \$4,000. The pay raise two years ago cost a similar amount and the abolishment of all school fees cost us about \$3,000 in revenue Clark said.

These figures alone total \$11,000 in increased expenses that have not been matched in increased revenue.

There have been other increased costs of operation since supplies have all gone up in cost he said.

When asked for possible solutions Clark said that either values could be raised by the school trustees as a majority of the schools are either doing or will be doing or by asking the taxpayers to increase the rate in an election. A third solution would be to reevaluate all property in the district by either a local group or an outside firm.

"Most all superintendent's recommend the employment of an outside firm to come in and reevaluate the property," Clark said. "Most boards want local people to do it, arguing that outsiders do not know the property of land and buildings in the community."

Presently Ranger I.S.D. has a tax rate of \$1.13 for local maintenance of schools and 35 cents for bonds. The rate is based on assessments of 30 percent of value.

In only a few instances is the 30 percent rate adhered to since it is mostly an honor system and most taxpayers are reluctant to assess at 30 percent unless they know their neighbors are up to the scale.

Clark also told the group that contrary to the opinion of some people, the State does not pay all the salary of teachers.

"We figure up what the total salary aid is supposed to be, then subtract what the State expects us to pay," Clark said. "This school year the State deducted \$31,000 in all our aid local taxes had to make up this amount."

The amount varies in all districts. Wealthy districts may receive but a little State aid while an extremely poor district may contribute little locally.

About 20 per cent of the cost of the operation of Ranger School District is paid from local funds.

The tax rate of \$1.50 total for local maintenance and for bonds cannot be raised except on a vote of the people since \$1.50 is the top rate by law unless an increase is approved by taxpayers.

Clark recommended that the taxpayers speak out on how they prefer the money to be obtained since they will be the ones paying the bill.
