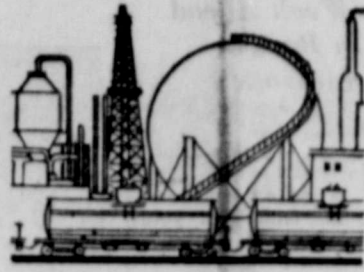

Jimmy Watkins Participates In Science Program

Jimmy Watkins, son of Dr. and Mrs. W. P. Watkins, is one of 100 outstanding high school science students from across the nation and foreign countries participating in the Ninth Annual Honors Science Program at Michigan State University, June 19-July 28.

Selected from 1,000 applicants, this group represents the most able high school science and mathematics students in 18 states.

Watkins, one of 25 students to study chemistry and math, was selected on the basis of scholastic standing, results of nationally standardized tests and recommendations of his teachers.

Co-sponsored by MSU and the National Science Foundation, the intensive program offers an opportunity to "learn for the joy of learning" and, under the guidance of the university's foremost scientists and researchers learn about subjects not usually offered in high school or even the first two years of college.

Watkins, one of six students from Texas attending from Texas, will be a Senior in Ranger High School this fall.

First, there is attire - surely a good chance to get a smart new outfit. Anything from gold lame to buckskin, selections are made with the knowledge that this is worth 20 points.

Second comes personality being and acting the part of royalty and that in Western style, making a good impression on everyone from the judges to the brabams and all the time knowing it's worth exactly 30 points toward the keys to the queen-dom.

The last and most important requirement (worth 50 points) is horsemanship, sort of a "high falutin'" word that means a lot more than knowing which side the saddle belongs on or even the fine art of staying aboard. Contestants must demonstrate their ability to mount and dismount, to put their mounts through the canter, trot, walk and reversing. These demonstrations will be a part of the nightly performances during the grand entry.

1 of 8 People Snore, Including Women Folks

About one out of eight Americans snore. This means something like 25 million snorers, women as often as men. The comic literature about snoring is endless. Plays, movies, vaudeville skits and comics in general have poked fun at snoring down through the years. There's a good chance that there's a snorer in your family. If so, says Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association, you are well aware that it's not very funny. The assorted hisses, gurgles, buzzes, snorts and raspings of the snoring nuisance hold the seeds for the ruination of an ostensibly happy married. Many married couples find it necessary to set up a schedule wherein one spouse tries to precede the other in sleep. Other couples proceed to separate rooms and possibly even the divorce courts. For the most part snoring is generated while breathing either in or out during sleep by several structures in the nose and throat. The sounds are due to vibrations in the soft palate and other soft structures of the throat in response to inflowing and outflowing air. The frequency of the vibrations depends on the size, density and elasticity of the affected tissues and on the force of the air flow. A number of causes of snoring can be helped and even cured. Most cases of snoring in children are cured by removal of enlarged adenoids and tonsils. A blocked nose may lead to mouth breathing and snoring. Sometimes this can be corrected by minor surgery. If snoring is caused by nasal congestion due to the common cold, sinus trouble, hay fever, nose drops, the FBI.

THE FUNCTION AND WORKINGS OF THE 91ST DISTRICT COURT

TEXAS CONSTITUTION Article V — Section VII

"The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law."

There are more than a hundred District Courts in Texas. In some instances, there are a number of counties in one district; sometimes there are several district courts in one county.

The 91st District Court is in Eastland and, at this time, its district is Eastland County. However, the first week of April, new judicial districts for the State were considered in a public hearing before the House Judicial District Committee.

House Bill No. 1043 by Representative Walter Knapp and others directly affects judicial arrangements for the 63rd Legislative District. Under the proposed plan, Eastland County would add Callahan and Comanche Counties to the 91st District.

Representative Furke Musgrove has stated that, if the bill passes, he plans to introduce legislation which would create the position of District Attorney to meet the demand of a three-county district. (At this time, the office of District and County Attorney are combined.)

If the bill passes, Representative Grant Jones of Abilene supposedly intends to run a bill which would essentially shift the 91st District Court criminal jurisdiction to a Taylor County Court.

"For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a General Election, a Judge."

When Judge Turner M. Collier died in Feb. 1965, the Governor appointed Judge Frank Sparks to serve until the next general election, which was in November of 1966. At that time, Judge Sparks was elected by the people to serve the remainder of Judge Collier's term, to wit, December 31, 1968. (This is in accordance with the State Constitution's provision for filling vacancies during an unexpired term. The regular term of election is four years.)

The Constitution also provides that the office of District Judge becomes vacant when the incumbent reaches the age of 75, with certain exceptions.

Judge Sparks said, "My job is to administer the court in accordance with the Constitution."

The Constitution provides the District Court exclusive jurisdiction of such as divorce cases, felony cases, all civil cases where-in the amount involved is over one thousand dollars, contests of elections, and others. It has concurrent jurisdiction with the County Court in civil cases wherein the amount involved is between five hundred and a thousand dollars.

It also gives general jurisdiction over everything not specifically given to another court.

The District Judge has general supervision over all court officials serving in the district court.

Mrs. Susan Hunt of Ranger is secretary to the Judge. She is present at all trials, taking all testimony in shorthand. She records the arguments of lawyers on both sides if they request it.

Her transcript is added to records from the District Clerk's office to form "Statements of Facts" used in appeals courts.

Article V — Section XIX

"There shall be a Clerk for the District Court of each county, who shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State and County."

Roy Lane has served as District Clerk since January 1, 1945. He said, "My responsibilities are to keep all records of the Court and of anything handled by the Court, to collect and disburse all fees in each case, whether civil or criminal; and to handle Trust Fund Monies and Child Support Monies."

"Court costs vary from ten to fifty dollars, usually. This covers filing and issuing of papers connected with the case. Jurors are paid by this office, with checks drawn on the County Treasurer's office, so actually the taxpayers of Eastland County pay the jurors. Those people who hire lawyers pay the lawyers directly and taxpayers pay the jury. The only money we collect is the court costs for filing and issuing."

"Often that court directs a person to pay a given amount to another person, through this court. In this instance,

the person responsible for paying sends money to the Registry of the Court. We then pass the money to the time."

"The Court does not always take the authority of deciding how the money is sent nor does the receiver report back to us how the money was sent. We merely act as a go-between for the two parties."

"We handle between \$13,000 and \$14,000 annually for child support and between ten to forty thousand annually in Trust Funds."

Mrs. Henry (Myrtle) Van Geem is Chief Deputy District Clerk and has authority to handle the duties of the office in the absence of Mr. Lane.

County Oks FM Road North From Eastland

Monday the County Commissioners signed an agreement with the State to provide right of way for a farm-to-market paved road beginning at the intersection of Highway 89 and College in Eastland and running in a north-westerly direction for two miles. (Hollywood-Vassarville is located on College St. in Eastland.)

Plans call for the road to continue to an intersection Highway 123 in the future.

County Judge Scott Bailey announced that the preliminary survey has not yet been completed and that actual construction will begin in the spring of 1968.

Judge Bailey said, "Part of the land involved is within the city limits of Eastland and the city will bear responsibility for obtaining right of way

on that portion of land. The county will provide the other right of way and the state will construct the road."

R. P. (Buddy) Haun, resident engineer and J. A. C. Kirby of Brownwood, superintendent right of way engineer, of the State Highway Department, met with the commissioners court.

Commissioners Buck Collins, Dick Foster, C. B. Dill, and Danny Woods, and Judge Bailey also met Tuesday and Wednesday for the yearly Board of Equalization considerations. About 40 county property owners met to hear their tax valuations discussed. Judge Bailey stated that those who received notice to appear and failed to meet with the commissioners forfeited their right to appeal.

"As It Looks From Here"

WASHINGTON, D. C. —The threatened conflict between the Arab States and Israel should have a sobering effect on our Government's official policy of "building bridges" with the Soviet Union and its Communist satellites in Eastern Europe. It should put a damper on the support by some of the largest American businesses for the Administration's policy of increasing trade with the Russians.

On more than one occasion Ambassador to the United Nations Arthur Goldberg has made it clear that peace in Viet Nam rests with the Soviet Union. According to the statements of Nassar of Egypt, the official line of the Russians is complete support for attacks against the State of Israel.

Not only are the Russians blocking any action in the United Nations, but they are checking any possible moves by the Geneva Conference machinery provided in the 1954 Agreements for settlement of the Viet Nam war.

All the talk about a policy for the United States to make concessions in East-West Trade Agreements has a hollow sound unless the Moscow Government declares its efforts for peace in the Middle East and in Viet Nam.

It is strange indeed that our Government and American businessmen have started a campaign to break a log-jam in trade with the Soviet Union. Washington is supporting the participation of American companies in a Trade Fair in Moscow at this very time. The exhibition, concentrating particularly on food processing and food packaging equipment, opened May 16.

It should be clear to policy makers that we can not satisfactorily end the war in Viet Nam in a reasonable time or bring about a satisfactory peace by making unilateral concessions to Russia or by

blinding ourselves to the realities of world power politics. The world politics in this instance wears the same brand which it has always worn — world Communist domination.

Now, after feeding Hanoi the supplies to kill our men in South Viet Nam, their long-range strategy in the Middle East is showing itself at a frightening speed.

A glance at the map is enough to show that Russian ambitions in that part of the world include the control of the Red Sea and beyond it.

They include the Persian Gulf, source of Western Europe's oil supply, and to control that supply is an invaluable advantage. The complete control would mean a dominant influence on the economic life of Western Europe.

For more than 40 years the secret intent of the Communists has been known. The center of their strategy is to find conditions where strife of any sort of kind can be fomented. It then becomes a vehicle for their use. Although it is presently played down by

our officials, the numerous trouble spots around the world do not appear to be accidents.

Their efforts for crisis in Berlin, in Indonesia, in Hong Kong, were unsuccessful. Earlier, they were unsuccessful in Greece and Turkey, in Iran and in Ghana. At the present time, however, the situation in Greece, Cyprus, the Middle East and, of course, Viet Nam, supported by Soviet intrigue, is a threat to the United States. It is not a matter of our being the pol-

iceman of the world, but a matter of meeting aggression which eventually will threaten our own shores.

Not only should we not contribute to the welfare of the Russians by increased trade, whether it be strategic or otherwise, but we should in strongest terms tell our friends of the free world that they are no longer our friends if they do so. To do otherwise is to help them through trade and aid to achieve their world aims through armed aggression.

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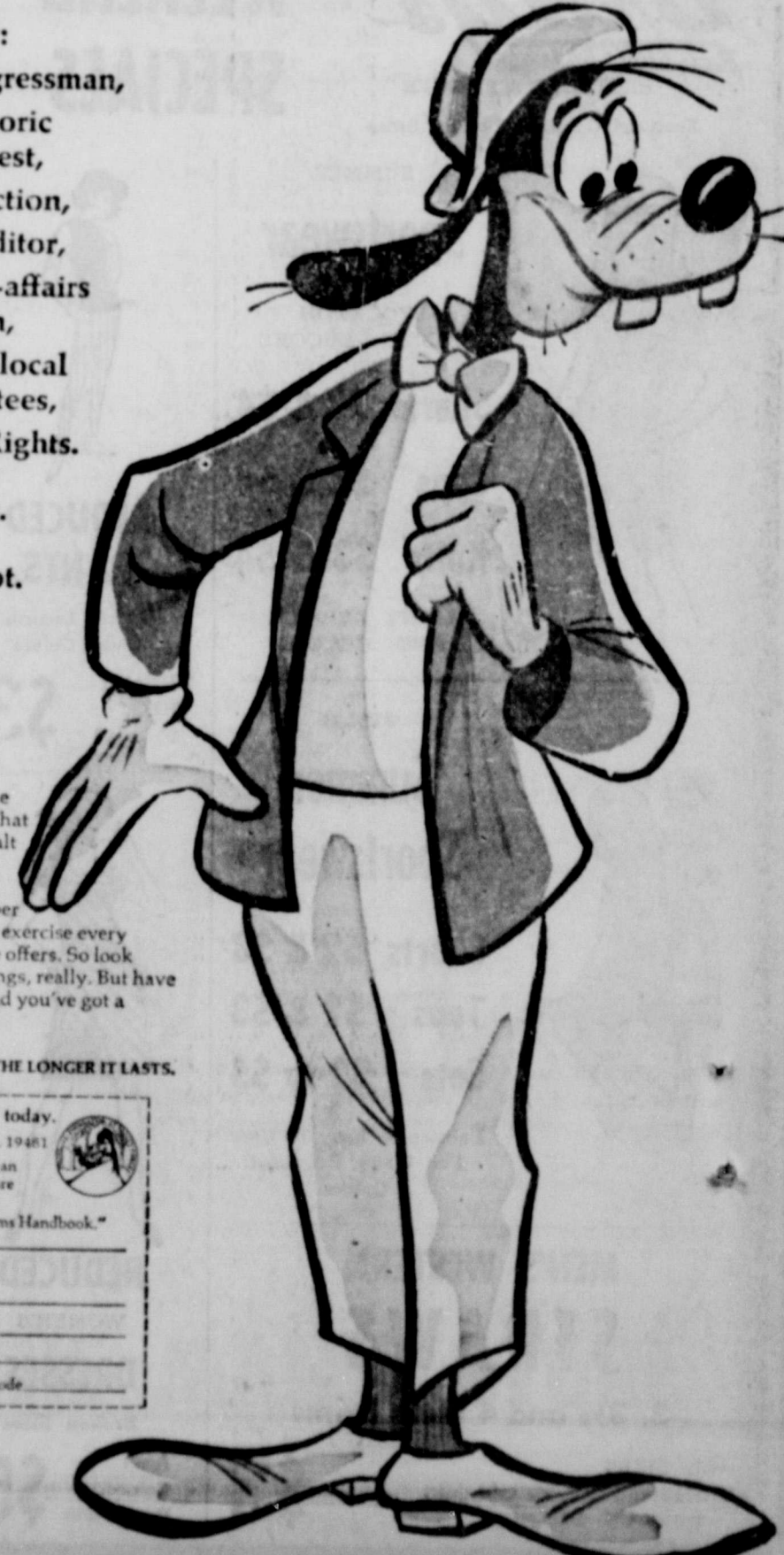

MEMO for MODERNS

by Julia Hunter, Home Economics Director Lone Star Gas Company

Tiny, pinkish new crop or great, dusty-brown Idaho bakers, potatoes are a favorite of all vegetables. They are high in food value in relation to their cost. One medium-sized potato supplies as much as one fifth the vitamin C needed in daily diets plus worthwhile amounts of thiamin, niacin, iron, phosphorus and potassium. That same medium size potato, when boiled or baked contains only about 100 calories — approximately the same as a large apple or orange or half a large grapefruit. The high calorie associated with potatoes come with the addition of fats, sauces and gravies. With a large quantity of both new crop and late crop potatoes on the market, include plenty of potatoes in weekly menus.

Toasted New Potatoes
Toasted New Potatoes add crunchy texture to a meal. Peel 24 new potatoes and cook until tender. Drain. Combine 3 eggs, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Roll cooked potatoes in egg mixture, then in bread crumbs. Arrange in shallow

Irish Flat Cake
Make hot bread and vegetable all in one with Irish Flat Cake. Combine 2 cups mashed potatoes, 1 egg and 2 tablespoons melted butter or margarine and beat until fluffy. Sift together 1 cup flour, 1 teaspoon salt and 1/2 teaspoon baking powder. Add sifted dry ingredients to potato mixture and knead lightly. If too moist, knead in a little more flour. Brush an 8-inch iron skillet with bacon fat. Press and flatten dough to fit bottom of pan. Cut in 8 pie-shaped wedges. Cook over a low flame until golden brown. Turn each wedge separately or turn whole cake into second greased, heated skillet. Cook until done. Serve with pat of butter or margarine on top. Makes 8 servings.

Barbecued Creamed Potatoes
For a zesty flavor treat six Barbecued Creamed Potatoes. Peel 4 large potatoes and slice thinly, directly into a Dutch oven or large, heavy kettle. Add 1 small onion, chopped. Add equal parts of milk and light cream until potatoes are barely covered (approximately 3/4 cup each). Add 1 tablespoon butter or margarine, salt and pepper to taste, 1 tablespoon chopped parsley, 1 tablespoon catsup, 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, dash liquid red pepper seasoning and 1/4 pound finely sliced process American cheese. Mix well. Add 1 bay leaf, leaving it partially submerged. Cover tightly. Cook over very low flame 1 hour or until potatoes are tender. Remove bay leaf before serving. Makes 6 servings.

Potatoes Boulangere
French cousins of popular baked potatoes. Peel 6 or 7 potatoes and slice at least 1/4-inch thick. Peel 2 onions and slice thinly. Mix potatoes and onions. Season with salt and pepper to taste and 1 tablespoon chopped parsley. Spread mixture in a shallow greased baking dish at least 1/2-inch deep. Top with 4 tablespoons butter or margarine. Add 1 cup of boiling, strong bouillon or 1 cup boiling water. Bake in hot oven (400 degrees F.) 30 to 40 minutes or until potatoes are soft and brown and crusty on top. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

Potato Pancakes
Particularly good with German-style food are Potato Pancakes. Combine 2 beaten eggs and 1/4 cup milk in a mixing bowl. Add 2 cups of grated, ground or shredded raw potato to egg-milk mixture. To prevent potatoes from darkening, add to milk mixture as soon as possible. Add 1 tablespoon grated onion, 3 tablespoons flour, 1 teaspoon salt and a dash pepper. Mix well. In a heavy skillet, heat shortening 1/4-inch deep over medium flame. Drop potato mixture from tablespoon into hot shortening, stirring mixture before dropping each pancake. Fry until brown, turn carefully and fry until brown on other side. Drain on absorbent paper. Makes 1 dozen approximately 3-inches in diameter.
