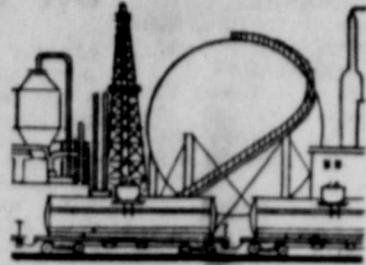

Ranger Jaycees To Appear On TV Program July 4

Ranger Jaycees will appear on the Harry Holt T. V. Show in Abilene at 7 p. m. Tuesday, July 4th.

The second rodeo motorcade will leave Ranger on Saturday morning.

Parcel Post Limit Now 25 Pounds In Most Cases

Mailers will be able to send 25 pound parcels between first class post offices which are 150 miles or more apart starting July 1, the local Postmaster reminded patrons today. The present weight limit is 20 pounds.
This is the first of five increases scheduled to take effect annually until 1971, when

a 40 pound, 84 inch maximum size will be authorized between all first class post offices. Size limitations are now 72 inches in combined girth and length.
The next increase, on July 1, 1968, will raise the weight limit to 30 pounds. On July 1, 1969, the weight limit will be increased from 30 to 40 pounds; on July 1, 1970, the size will be increased to 78 inches; and on July 1, 1971, the size is scheduled to be increased to 84 inches.

The Postmaster also reminded mailers that parcels weighing up to 40 pounds can be mailed between first class post office less than 150 miles apart. Packages addressed to and from 2nd, 3rd, and 4th class post offices, Alaska and Hawaii are not affected by the increase in size and weight provisions of the Public Law 89-573, which became effective Jan. 15, he said. Parcel post mailings to and from these offices remain at 70 pounds and 100 inches.

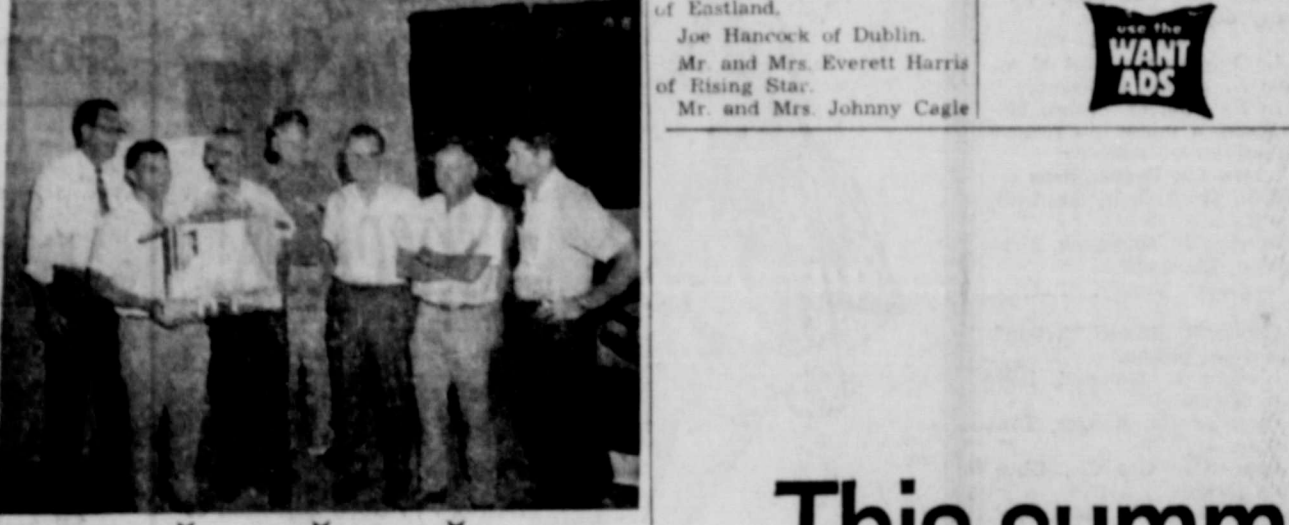

Also as a part of the DP operation additional personnel from other uniformed services will augment the regular Highway Patrol.

"Most traffic accidents are made even more tragic by the fact that with the proper awareness they could have been avoided. Too often even the best driver may let his attention wander and a fatal accident can be the result," Garrison stated.

"If each driver will assume the responsibility for his actions each time he takes the wheel of a car, and if he will observe the traffic laws and rules of common courtesy on the road, the number of accidents could be materially reduced."

Savings Bonds Sales Total Is \$44,578 in May

Bareback Bronc Riding Nightly Feature at Rodeo

A smooth saucy with a hindhoof resembling a suitcase handle is the sole equipment used in bareback bronc riding, a nightly feature of the Jaycee Rodeo.

The rigging is cinched to the horse, atop the animal's flanks and the contestant is allowed to rub the handle with his resin to improve his grip, but when pitted against a ton of sky-leaping horse, this is a very snail-paced race.

Watch that first jump as the bronc leaves the chute. The rider's spurs aren't touching the horse over the point of the shoulders until the animal's front hooves hit the ground, give the rider a nose egg — a score of exactly zero — he's disqualified. Same thing happens if rider touches any part of the bronc with his free hand or bucks off before the whistle sounds.

Close calls come at the sound of the whistle. If the rider is still on the horse, still has a grip on the rigging, has not touched the horse, riding with his free hand, and hasn't touched the ground — he's considered still on the horse. He may be standing on his head or flat on his back, but glory be! The ride is a qualified one.

Bull Riding Most Dangerous Event Of Rodeo

Since 1921, rodeo action has been more dangerous, result of introduction of Brahma Bull Riding, an event which pits the rider against the savage, fast and powerful cross-breed animal that likes nothing better than to add injury to insult by goring or trampling a fallen rider. These 1,500 pound animals are extremely dangerous, both in the chute and in the arena.

A flat braided length of manila rope is used around the bull, just behind the animal's shoulders. A weighted bell attached to the rope falls free when ride is completed. Rider is not required to spur his mount but may receive additional credit for doing so.

Disqualification comes from hitting the ground before the eight-second ride is completed; and, take it from the rider, it can seem like eight hours. He is also disqualified for failing to have bell attached to rope or for touching his mount with the free hand at any time during the ride.

Steer Doggin' To Be Nightly Feature At Rodeo

A Negro cowboy is credited with the origin of steer doggin', a nightly feature of Ranger Jaycee Rodeo.

Never a part of ranch work, this action packed event requires a mounted contestant and a mounted hazer whose duty is to keep the steer running straight as possible. The act is a series of practiced moves as the mounted cowboy leaps from a running horse to the horns of a steer, bringing the animal to the ground. Steer is to be flat on its side, all four legs extended before time is given.

Good Horse Is Very Valuable In Calf Roping

Only tenths of a second divides winners in the calf roping contests, a coordinated effort of horse and rider against time. A true-working horse is valuable property, often commanding a four-figure price tag.

Equipped with lariat rope 25 feet in length, one end tied to the saddle horn, the other forming a catch loop, the rider remains behind a barrier until calf crosses scoreline. Length of heat start depends on size of arena.

Objective is to catch the calf, throw calf by hand, cross any three legs for the tie, then signal for time by raising his hands. Field judge then passes on the tie.

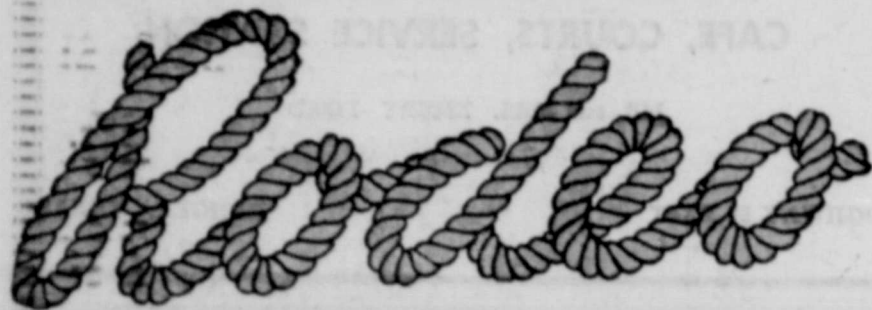

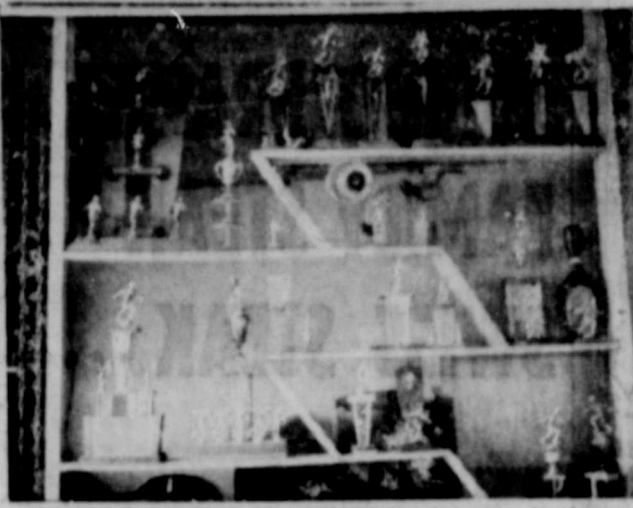

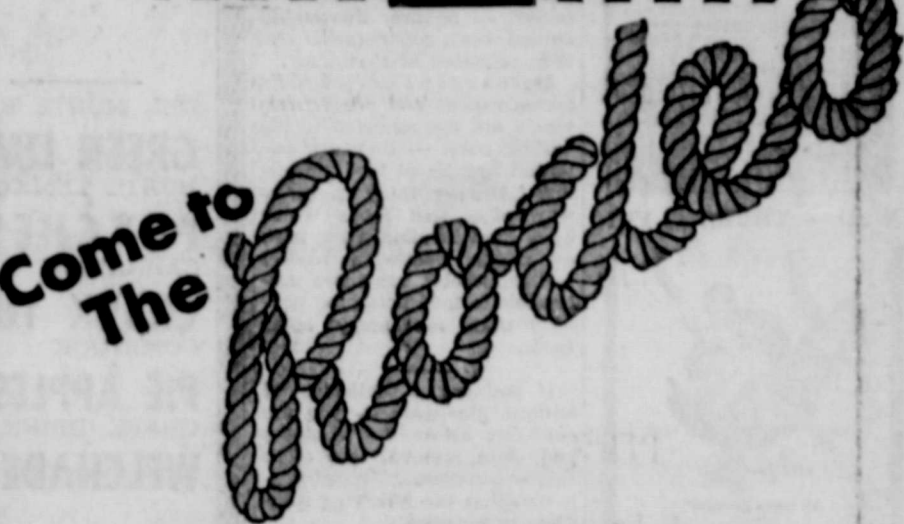

THE GORDON SPOT

Last week the County Agents in District 8 met at the Livestock and Forage Research Center near McGregor. The purpose of the meeting was to help keep county Agents informed on the research being conducted with beef cattle at the station.

Many interesting things were discussed such as cross breeding results, efficiency of small cows compared to large cows and performance testing.

One of the things mentioned was that we have been

hearing a lot about lately is a comparison of bulls and steers as slaughter animals.

During the week of January 2, the station sold twenty animals. Ten of the animals were bulls with an average 12 months weight of 1,015 pounds and sold for \$22.62 per hundred pounds.

The other ten were steers that averaged 934 pounds at 12 months and sold for \$23.22 per hundred pounds. The bulls weighed 81 pounds more, sold for 60 cents less, but brought \$12.12 more per animal.

Tests at Texas A&M indicate that young bull beef is perfectly acceptable as far as tenderness taste and "eat-ability" are concerned.

Iron chlorosis has been showing up in many lawns and ornamental plants in Eastland County. Symptoms are generally a yellowing of the green foliage due to failure of chlorophyll to develop normally.

The chlorosis occurs in susceptible plants where and when iron is not available to them. This lack of iron may be due to a deficiency or to the iron being unavailable because of alkaline conditions. In either case, iron supplied by iron sulfate, commonly known as copperous, or iron chelates will be beneficial.

Iron sulfate can be applied as a foliar spray at the rate of two teaspoons per gallon of water, plus a spreader-sticker. A teaspoon of household detergent can be used as the spreader-sticker. The spray should be applied in the late afternoon to avoid leaf burn and should be repeated in about 10 days if the yellowing persists.

The iron sulfate can also be applied to the soil as a fertilizer. Apply to trees and shrubs in holes made in a circle just inside the spread of the branches. A five-foot tall shrub requires about a fourth of a pound. A tree should

Creighton Is Named 'Return Of Flag of Alamo' Committee by Smith

AUSTIN — Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith has named Senator Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells as vice chairman of the Committee for the Return of the Flag of the Alamo. The committee was authorized by Senate Resolution 141, which was adopted by the recent Regular Session of the 60th Legislature.

The five-member committee is charged with the duty of treating with the Republic of Mexico for the return to Texas of the Alamo's Flag. In announcing Creighton's appointment, Lieutenant Governor Smith commented on the necessity for giving careful

consideration to the Republic of Mexico in this important matter, and said that he felt Creighton possesses the attributes and diplomacy necessary for the committee's task.

Creighton, an attorney, represents the 22nd Senatorial District, which is comprised of 10 counties, including his home county of Palo Pinto. He has been a member of the Senate since 1961, and is currently chairman of the Senate's Committee on Privileges and Elections, vice chairman of State Affairs and Water and Conservation; and a member of committees on Banking, Counties, Cities and Towns, Finance, Game, and Poultry and Oil and Gas.

Others named to the committee by Lieutenant Governor Smith included Senator Charles Herring of Austin, Joe Christie of El Paso, Jim Bates of Minnaburg, and Dursey Hardeman of San Angelo.

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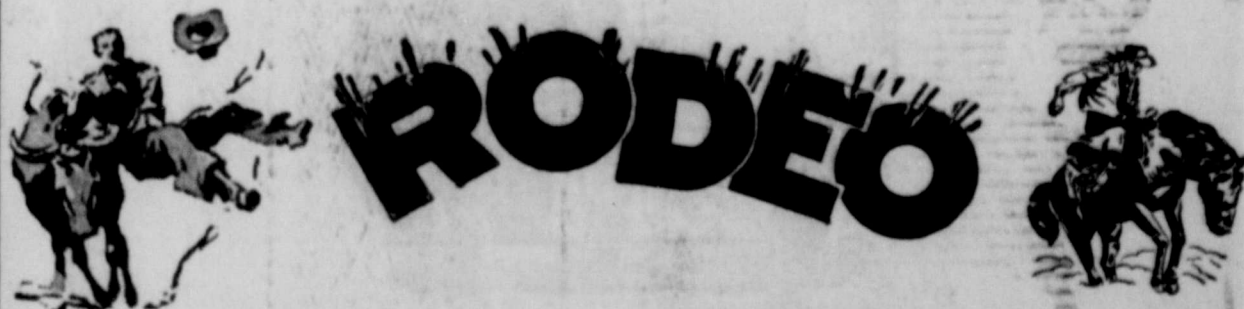

Marketers have statistics on groups of potential customers for everything they make. It is amazing what must be known from the commercial standpoint on what will sell and what will not and how much tariff the market will bear.
