Iron chlorosis has been showing up in many lawns and ornamental plants in Eastland County. Symptom are generally a yellowing of the green foliage due of failure of chlorophyll to develop

The chorosis occurs in sus-ceptable plants where and when iron is not available to This lack of iron may be due to a deficiency or to the iron being unavailable beause of alkaline conditions either case, iron supplied iron sulfate, common l; known as copperous, or iror chelates will be beneficial.

Iron sulfate can be applied as a foliar spray at the rate o I two teaspoons per gallon of water, plus a spreader sticker. A teaspoon of house hold detergent can be used as the spreader-sticker. The spray should be applied in the late afternoon to avoid leaf burn and should be repeated in about 10 days if the yellowing persists.

The iron sulfate can also be applied to the soil as a ferti-lizer. Apply to trees and shrubs in holes made in a cir cle just inside the spread of Hwy 80 E. - 629-1651 the branches. A five-foot tall shrub requires about a fourth of a pound. A tree should


