This unusual but delightful state of affairs was born in the heart of the late D. E. Pulley, prominent Ranger jeweler, than whom there was no greater rodeo supporter.



## THRONING APPLAUDS COUNTY HISTORY AT BIG JULY 4TH PAGEANT

Spectators by the thousands were on hand Tuesday night to see the history of Eastland County come to life on stage at the Kendrick Amphitheater in a Fourth of July Historical Pageant.

The 24-scene pageant began with scenes of the American Indians living in this part of the State. Then a scene with a wagon train which camped for the night, enjoying folk songs, square dancing, and camp activities.

Other scenes depicting the early days were Indian camp, dances, and attack of a wagon train and a rescue by a Cavalry patrol. Members of the Cavalry patrol were members of the Eastland County Sheriff's Posse. It was stated only five persons were killed by Indians in what is now Eastland County.

Other scenes in the pageant were scenes of the early day cattle roundup, early day church services, stagecoach travel, the coming of government and private surveyors,

and scenes of the early day court house, jail, and other buildings.
