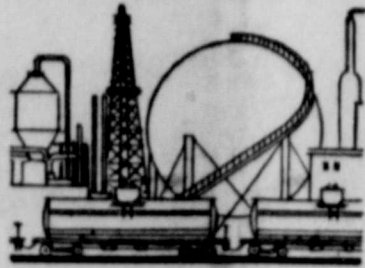

MODEL-T FORD TO APPEAR IN ANNUAL JAYCEE PARADE

"I love a parade" could well be the theme song of the 1923 model T Ford four-door sedan belonging to Gaston Dixon who has given it a final tune-up for the rodeo procession Thursday afternoon.

We'll have to admit that it has not been on the road constantly since Henry rolled it off the assembly line, but it looks as if there is mileage to match the model. For the past five years it has been the prized possession of the Dixon family and can be said to be in its golden, though declining years.

Understood only by those approaching a senior citizenship, description of the car includes such items as 30-3 1/2 tires on demountable rims with high pressure tubes carrying 60 lb. air pressure. It boasts a start but the trusty crank is there just in case the new fangled gadget didn't work (which it frequently did not.) Three pedal controls, low gear, stop and reverse are ably supported by the emergency brake. The gas feed on right side just under the steering wheel made it convenient to "give er the gas" come a slight incline in the road or one of those never-to-be-forgotten sand beds, the bane of motorists. The "spark lever" on the left was good for several things, including a "green stick" broken arm if the lever was too far down when the motorist decided to "crank 'er up."

Quite a romantic vehicle with a hit tune "The Little Ford Rambled Right Along" written in its honor, the girl one carried on a date in this car was one's "sweetie", and if this model could talk, it might speak of stiff shirt collars, crepe de chine dresses and "Wonder What's Become of Sally."

Nothing excelled the prestige of having a kodak picture of oneself standing beside or perched jauntily upon the fender of this marvel of the automotive industry.

Starting the motor was sometimes a problem, especially in winter, but a kettle of boiling water poured over the carburetor and "jacking up" a rear wheel would usually produce the desired result.

There were no drive-in theaters or television shows in those days, but few things were more fun than gently placing the rear wheels of this can in watermelon rinds and hiding to watch the unsuspecting owner attempt to make a departure.

This car served its day and generation well and, at the age of 44 is rarin' to go and promises to do just that — come Thursday.

THE GORDON SPOT

By DeMarquis (Dee) Gordon
Eastland County Extension Agent



For three weeks, June 5, through June 23, I have been attending school at Texas A&M. I took a course in Horticulture, "Factor Influencing Fruit Production." This training will help me in working with pecan and fruit production problems in Eastland County. It was pointed out several times by the instructor that Eastland County has excellent climate and soil for nut and fruit production.

Two of the most common diseases are powdery mildew and rusts. Powdery mildew is a whitish or grayish, mold-like growth over lower and upper leaf, bud or young twig surfaces. Rusts cause orange, brownish-orange, rusty-red or black raised spots mainly on the lower surface of leaves and twigs. The rust rubs off easily and badly rusted leaves shed.

When I returned to the office last Monday, I began getting calls concerning problems of diseases on ornamentals. We are usually glad to get rain during the summer. Unfortunately, this is also ideal conditions for certain viruses, bacteria, and fungi plant diseases.

For control of powdery mildew 25 percent Karathane WD is effective. You can also use 75 percent folpet (Phaltan), Wettable sulfur or Actidione PM. Begin weekly spray applications after the disease becomes evident and continue as needed.

The rusts are difficult to control, but the chemicals that do a good job are Fer-

bam, Zineb, Maneb, or Dichlorone. Begin spray applications 2 or 3 weeks before the disease usually appears and continue at 2 to 4 week intervals as needed.

Plant disease foliage chemicals are most effective when applied as preventive sprays. This means to begin the applications before the disease symptoms appear. But then the questions come up "How do you know when the disease is going to be a problem?" During periods of above-average rainfall or high humidity it would be advisable to start spraying with a general-purpose fungicide which contains several chemicals.

Various types of scale insects are also causing damage to ornamentals. These are very small insects that are stuck to the leaves or stems. Diazinon or Malathion will sometimes control the scale. It usually takes several applications made at 2-week intervals. The only effective way to control scale on fruit trees is to apply a dormant oil spray during the winter.

We have guides for controlling diseases on ornamentals as well as guides for controlling insects. If you would like more information on these problems let me know and I will send you these publications.

I had a good visit with the Nimrod Neighbors Progressive Club last Monday night. About 50 of their members and guests attended the meeting. It is always a pleasure to visit and talk with these people. They make good ice cream, cakes and cookies, too.

Last Monday night the club was awarded a \$25 check which they won in the community improvement contest. The community placed sixth in the district contest.

The annual Lake Cisco Boy's 4-H Camp was held Thursday and Friday. Boys from five counties attended the camp. This is an annual affair which started about 25 years ago.

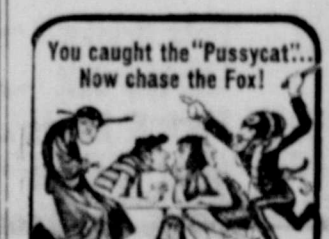
