He served as a Baptist pastor in Plainfield, Wisconsin; Columbus, Michigan; and Ontario, Wisconsin, and taught school in Michigan for twenty-five years. He was a member of First Baptist Church, Eastland. Survivors are two sons Paul Hoskins of Goodells, Michigan; and Otis Hoskins of Port Huron, Michigan; two daughters, Mrs. Ruth Bush of Kathleen, Georgia; and Mrs. Fern Green of Eastland; 14 grandchildren and 15 great-grandchildren; and several nieces and nephews.

Area Recreation Potential Evaluated In New Report

An appraisal of the outdoor recreational development potential for Eastland County has just been completed and released by the Technical Action Panel (TAP), a group made up of representatives from the various Department of Agricultural agencies, according to an announcement Friday. The appraisal, issued in the form of a 29-page booklet, was regarded as well-timed, coming in mid-vacation time. It was being distributed to key people and personnel. Just about every avenue of outdoor recreation is covered and the report evaluates the existing facilities and comments on the potential for development. And the potential is good. With an Interstate Highway now being built through the

county, quite a number of people in all the towns are wondering about the future. Development of the available recreational facilities is a big factor in most thinking. Ten key elements with several subdivisions were used to evaluate potentials for outdoor recreation in the county. Discussed are: climate, scenery and scenic areas, natural areas, historic areas, soils, water, fish and wildlife, populations of people, proximity and access; and rural ownership and land use patterns. Each of these key elements are given valuation in the extensive study and 12 potential recreation development areas are evaluated against these standards. Cabins and Cottages The recreational potential of vacation cabins, cottages and homesites for Eastland County is medium with a score of 93 out of a possible 150. That is, the evaluation of this potential using the key elements shows it to be medium, but worthy of future developments. Camping Grounds The three types of camping grounds (vacation sites, pack trips and transient) each receive a medium score. Vacation site camping received a 70 on the evaluators scale; pack trips, 51, and transient, 43. "Even though camping grounds for Eastland County presently shows medium potential, the completion of I-10 will show an increase in vacation sites camping and will probably move to a high potential for transient camping," the report said. Picnic, Field Sports The potential for game, play and target areas is low with a score of 25. Bicycling low, with a score of 25, and picnicking has the best potential with a medium score of 85 (of 140). Small game hunting centers around the cottontail and jack-rabbit with some limited quail hunting and the important birds are quail and dove. "Big game hunting in the county is limited to white tail deer. The potential is medium with a score of 80 (of 120), based on rather poor habitat in some areas. However, deer hunting is likely to improve as land use changes occur. "Water fowl has the least potential with a medium score of 65 (of 130)." Natural, Scenic and Historical Areas "The existing undevelopment of natural areas of the

THE GORDON SPOT

Seventy six 4-H boys, leaders, fathers and agents from Eastland, Palo Pinto, Callahan and Brown counties assembled at the Lake Cisco Park Thursday at 10 a. m. This is an annual event that has been going on for about twenty-seven years.

Mr. Floyd McBea, one of the camp cooks, said it had not rained during the camp in any of the previous twenty-six years. However this was the year when the boys got wet. Grasshoppers are appearing in abundance in several areas of the county. Grasshoppers are relatively easy to control when they are young and still concentrated near the hatching area. Treatment at this time can be concentrated and is far less expensive than after migration and distribution has begun. Careful checks of fence rows, ditch banks, weedy on grassy areas, pasture and similar areas will generally indicate when and where hatching occurs. Lower dosage rates will generally be adequate for this early season control.

Once grasshopper adults are observed and extend control is desired, apply the higher dosage rates. To stop migrating grasshoppers moving into crop lands from adjacent uncultivated land, treat the margins of the fields and nearby weed patches. Baits may also be effective in this situation. I have the "recipe" for preparing grasshopper baits if you should need it.

Several insecticides give effective control if properly applied. Dieldrin, aldrin, heptachlor, and chlordane are useful in controlling grasshoppers around the home. Weedy areas not grazed, waste lands and any area where a long period of control is desirable. None of these insecticides can be used to treat forage crops or pastures being grazed by livestock. DDT, malathion, and parathion are highly effective, but these are short-residual chemicals. They may be used on forage crops, but there is a waiting period on some of these chemicals before grass can be grazed. Sevin is used effectively to control grasshoppers and may be used on

food crops. As a safety precaution treated areas should not be grazed for two days following the application of sevin. Sevin is a short-residual compound.
 Producers should pay particular attention to the label precautions before applying any insecticide to pastures or crops.

 county has a medium potential with a score of 67 (of 150), due partly to the moderate amount of scenery associated with them. Likewise the scenic areas received a medium potential with a 79 (of 150) score due to some limitations in the natural areas in conjunction with them. Historical places in the county had the lowest score with a 46 (of 100) or a medium potential.

Vacation Farms and Ranches

The potential for vacation farms in the county was medium with a score of 66 (of 140). For ranches the rating was also medium with a score of 74 (of 130). The potential of this enterprise should increase greatly in the near future due to the expanding of our urban areas.

Water Sports Areas
 The long distances to cities and waters limited lakes, streams and related shorelines are responsible for a medium score of 56 (of 130).
