Opinions are mixed. There are some who'll tell you that the 1967 peanut crop prospects are better than they were last year.

Others aren't quite so sure about that.

Either way, it's a guess because the long, and usually dry days of August, are still ahead. And, too, you sometimes have to discount the customarily conservative opinions of farmers. Some are pessimistic by nature.

Last year was "that dreary year" peanut-wise, and naturally everyone would like to see a repeat performance. But is it in the cards? Two in a row would be the exception, all agree.

A quick look and spot check through the heart of the county's peanut land this week gives rise to optimism because there are early fields "looking pretty good."

Peanut Acreage In-County Sale Allotments Seen

Leasing or sale of peanut acreage allotments within a county was approved by the House Agriculture Committee in Congressional action Monday.

This represented a modification of earlier subcommittee action which would have permitted transfers across county lines if approval was given by a two-thirds vote in a referendum.

The committee also decided that the total peanut allotment transferred could not exceed 50 acres. The bill would operate for the 1968 and 1969 crop years.

A downward adjustment would be made in the acreage involved if the normal yield for the farm to which an allotment is shifted exceeds that from which it was transferred by more than 10 percent.

Sale or lease of acreage allotments for cotton now is permitted with certain limitations.

Two farm organizations, the Farmers Union and the Farm Bureau, had expressed opposition to "out-of-county" transfer, but apparently the "within" county measure will be greeted with acceptance with most growers in this county.

acres in peanut allotments, and there will be about 32,000 planted, the ASCS office reported.

You'll see good fields on the Ted Snyder place, at D. B. Warren's, at Otis Rogers', at Lee and W. B. Starr's and others. Claude Fuller is fixing to take his new "walking" system off his early peanuts to put it on his later crop, which is reaching the critical stage. He sees more prospects in the yield from the later crop.

Incidentally, he reports that he's not altogether happy with the motorized system, which is supposed to cut down "moving" time. He can move a manual line in two hours, and it takes him almost an hour to re-locate the walking system — much more time than he had hoped.

Fuller is putting out about 365 gallons of water a minute on his half-mile system which sprinkles 20 rows at a setting, and he moves it about every ten hours. He says that with it as dry as it is, he would like to "get back" over about every seven days, but it's taking more like eleven. Tuesday afternoon, Mrs. Fuller and their 10-year old son, Ricky Don, were helping him move the system.

Fuller has about 100 acres under irrigation and has three wells (with underground wired pumps) dumping the water into a pit from which his 15hp motor collects the water for routing through the 40-foot spaced sprinkler heads.

Blight is another headache that peanut farmers are bearing this year, and this, too, gives rise to that traditional pessimism, perhaps.

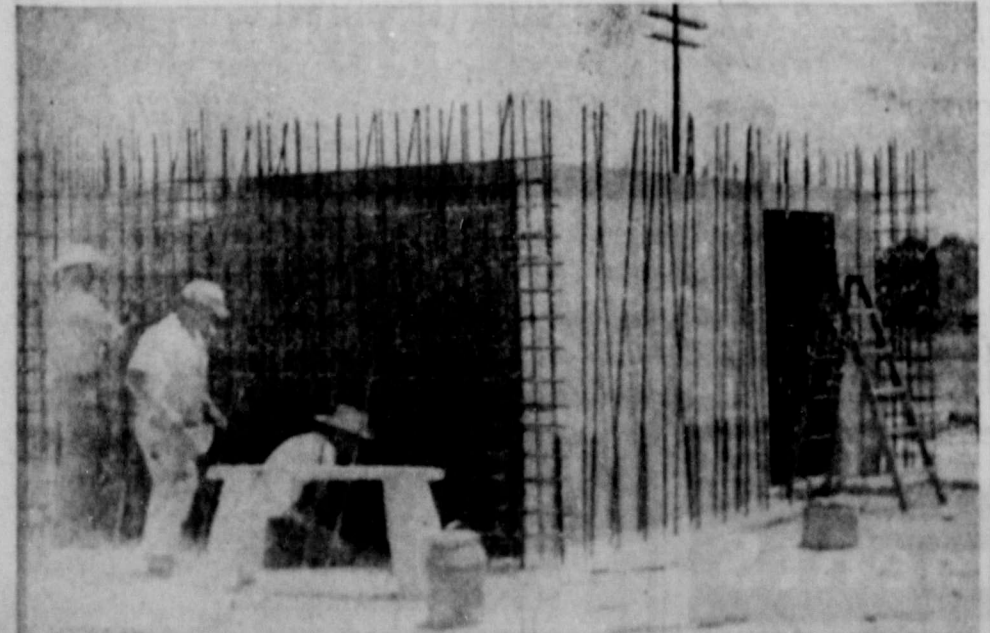
A farmer's lot is made up of many, many variables so, perhaps, they are justified in their conservative view.

Rev. J. Walters New Pastor Merriman Baptist

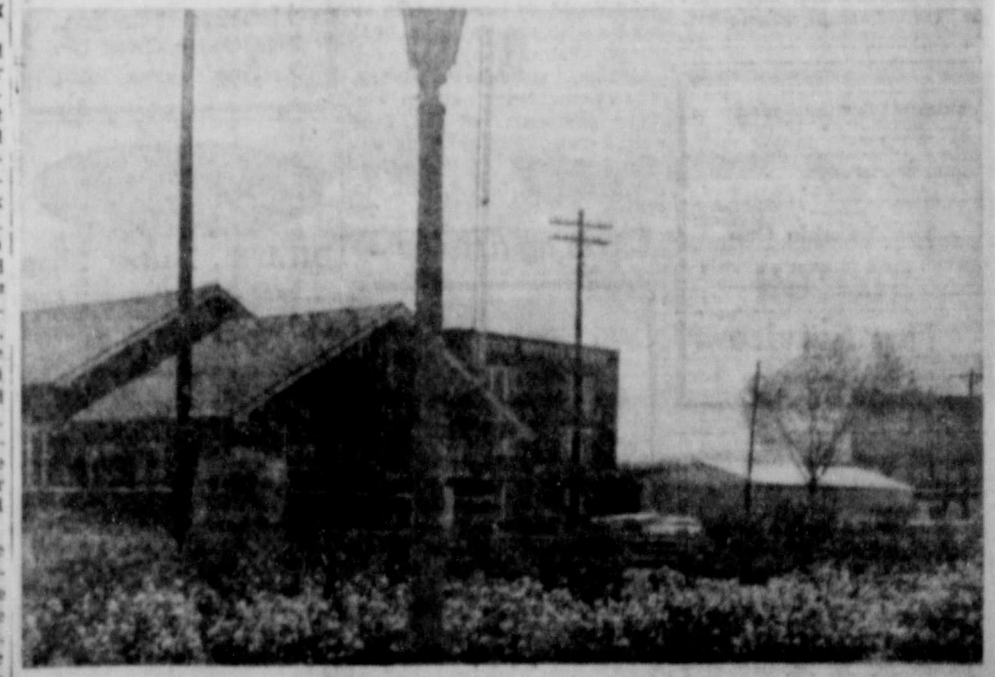

m. to 9 a. m. seemed to be the time when burns were most likely to occur. Almost one half of the people killed by burns were between the ages of 60 and 79.

Falls accounted for 31 farm deaths last year. The hours when most falls occurred was from 3 p. m. to 6 p. m. Again the older citizens were usually the victims. Twenty five of the 31 killed were over 70 years of age.

There were 25 farm people killed in tractor accidents in Texas last year. Most of these occurred when tractors

overturned. During the month of June last year 8 people were killed when their tractors overturned. All but one of the tractor accident victims were men between the ages of 20 and 79. One little girl under the age of 5 was run over by a tractor.

Mechanical suffocation was the largest single killer of children under 5 years of age. Nine children were killed on Texas farms by suffocation in old ice boxes, etc.

Drowning was another major cause of farm accidents. Of the 29 drowning on Texas

farms last year 17 were between the ages of 10 and 19. There were a total of 218 on Texas farms last year. This does not include vehicles accidents. Don't you think it's time we put more effort into reducing accidents on our farms. This is a good week to get started.

The San Jose scale is causing a lot of destruction to fruit trees in Eastland County. The trees first decline in vigor, characterized by sparse, yellow foliage. Reddish spots may be found on

the underside of infested bark around areas where the insects have inserted their mouthparts. The leaves fall from the terminals and limbs, cracking and bleeding of sap occur and the trees die.

Scales are tiny insects beneath light gray, waxy coverings. You will notice a rough waxy surface on limbs and small branches.

The only effective way to control San Jose scale is to spray with a dormant oil spray in December or January. The small insects are protected by the waxy cover-

Plans Ready For Dove Hunting

AUSTIN—The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has released hunting regulations for the mourning and white-winged dove seasons. Digests of these regulations are now available from sporting goods stores, game wardens, and any regional or district office of the Department.

The retention of one fully-feathered wing on field dressed doves is no longer required except in the 21 counties where the mourning dove and white-winged are hunted concurrently.

Mourning dove hunting in the north zone will begin at noon central standard time (1 p.m. daylight saving time) on Friday, Sept. 1 and continue through sunset Monday, Oct. 30 with a bag limit of 12 per day and 24 in possession.

This week July 23-29 has been proclaimed National Farm Safety Week. This is a good time to be safety conscious and correct the hazards which may cause accidents.

I have a list of all deaths due to farm accidents in Texas last year. This list gives a break down of accidents by types of accident, the month they occurred, the time of day they occurred, the sex of the victim, and the age of the victim. Several of these facts were surprising to me.

There were more deaths caused by burns than any other accident on the farms. A total of 46 people died because of burns on Texas farms. The hours from 6 a.

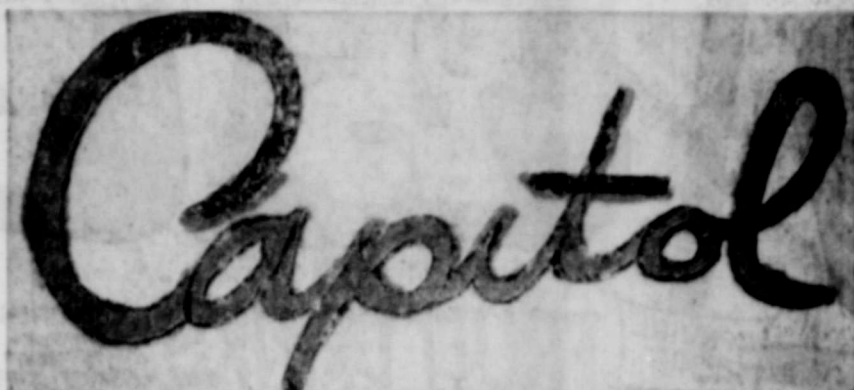
