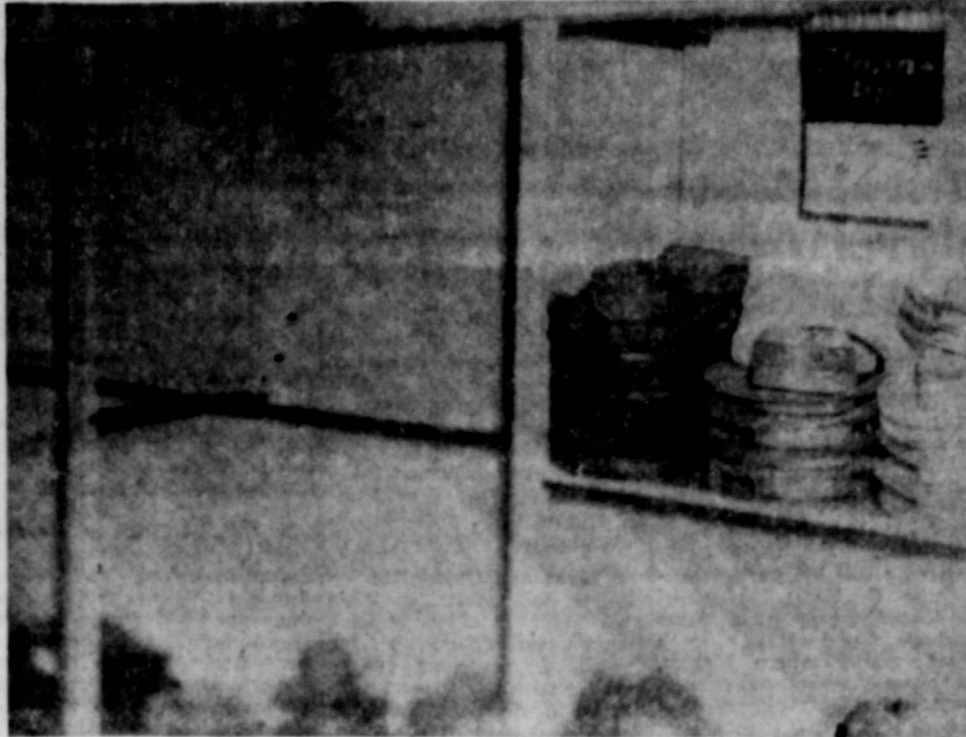

FORMER BARNSTORMER VISITS RANGER TIMES TUESDAY

Mr. and Mrs. H. S. Murray of Midland were visitors at the Times office on Tuesday morning.

For Mr. Murray, it was a part of a "sentimental journey", reliving experiences of other years, the days immediately following World War I.

Early in 1919, Lt. Murray, who was a member of the Signal Corps, and two companions decided to enter the then exciting and highly adventuresome business of operating an airplane for pleasure rides.

The venture began in Cleburne where the trip was hailed as the most daring in the air. For more than 12 months, billboards and newspapers in Texas towns advertised the one-day appearance of the party, offering a three minute ride for a charge of \$10.00.

One such stop was Ranger where, on a Sunday afternoon in autumn of 1919, a record crowd of more than 90 persons saw Ranger from the air, and lived to tell the story. Murray recalls that the Ranger stop was one of the most lucrative of the year.

When the friends dissolved partnership, Murray later became manager of Oakley Aerial Equadrille in Houston.

He was adjutor for an insurance company prior to becoming an auto dealer in Midland, a business he operated for 24 years.

Murray and his wife, now semi-retired, enjoy nothing more than visiting relatives and stopping to seek familiar faces or landmarks. In Ranger he noted "less activity and a great deal less mud."

Ten New Faculty Members Join Junior College Staff

38 Students Complete Driver Training School

Thirty-eight students of the Ranger Junior - Senior High School have completed their summer driving training program successfully and have all been awarded their operator's licenses by the State of Texas.

All the students have passed the 30hour classroom part that took 20 days, according to Principal James Childress.

Following the classroom portion, they had to complete six hours of time in observing from the back seat and six hours actual driving under the wheel. Instructors for the course were Coach Charlie Smith and Coach Dewitt Jones.

Two automobiles were used for the driving part of the program. Actual driving tests were administered by State Police.

A \$25 tuition fee was charged for those enrolling in the course with most of this going for salary of the teachers. Part went to pay for gasoline used and part for dual controls for one car. At this time, the Driver Account has a balance of \$57 in it but this will be paid out for insurance on the car.

This is the last class to finish under the old law which expires August 28. After that only those above 16 years of age can enroll in the course which nearly eliminates the course in Ranger High School for two years.

Candace Anderson of Las Cruces, New Mexico, completed the course as did Steve Dempsey of Breckenridge.

Olden students finishing were Larry Blackwell, Carla Bowstead, David Adams, Elmer Sullivent and Robert Fox. Most of the students above have just graduated from the eighth grade but some were in high school and wanted their drivers' licenses before the new age law caught them.

Ten new faculty members will be on hand at Ranger Junior College this fall to greet what officials predict will be a record enrollment.

According to Larry Hunt, Director of Student Personnel, pre-enrollment is running slightly ahead of predicted figures. Over 100 students have already enrolled at RJC and Hunt says the rate is increasing daily as more and more students take advantage of the chance to beat the confusion and crowds that accompany the regular registration days.

Pre-registration at the college will continue through Sept. 6. Regular registration will be held on Sept. 13 and 14, with classes slated to begin on Sept. 15.

Dean R. B. Golemon, in announcing the hiring of ten new faculty members, said the increased staff will enable the college to better meet the needs of its student body in an ever-increasing range of academic subjects. The new faculty members include: Orsland Aldridge, who holds an MA in mathematics from Auburn University. Aldridge was formerly head coach Comanche High School, and will teach mathematics as well as assist with football at RJC.

Mrs. Ellen Arwood, who holds an MEd degree from Hardin Simmons University and for the past 15 years has been on the faculty of Frat Phillips College at Borge. Mrs. Arwood will teach social and typing in the business department.

Charles Deaton, who holds an MA degree from Stephens F. Austin College at Nacoches and has done doctor work at the University of Nebraska. Deaton will teach government and economics.

Larry Hunt, former principal of Hodges Oak Park Elementary School in Ranger who will be Director of Student Personnel and teach psychology. Hunt holds an MEd degree from Texas Tech. Edmund Lewis, who holds a Master of Music Degree from North Texas State University and has done graduate work at the University of Texas at Paso. Lewis will teach music theory, piano, organ and voice.

John D. McLean, who holds an MS degree from Texas Tech, and who served for years as chairman of the science department at Crat High School. McLean has done graduate work at Texas Tech. (Continued on Page 2)

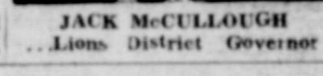
He served as professor of Military Science and Tactics at Tarleton State College and was honored by the students and faculty during that service by having the yearbook dedicated to him.

NEIGHBORHOOD YOUTH CORP. PROGRAM WILL END AUG. 26

The Ranger High School unit of Neighborhood Youth Corp summer program has been notified that students on the program may work the week ending Aug. 26 for a 30 hour week.

The program had been scheduled to end this week but J. B. Arther, Coordinator of the NYC in Eastland, said a week had been added to the program.

Ranger students on the program earn \$1.25 per hour for a 30 hour week. Only students from low income families, based on the income divided by the members in the family, are eligible for the program.

The fall program opening date has not been set yet but it is expected to be either the first or second week of September.

There are 23 Ranger High School students on the program now. They should each earn \$37.50 a week, making the average weekly payroll \$862.50.

**Texas Tortoise,  
 Horned Lizards  
 Now Protected**

AUSTIN—The slow moving Texas tortoise and the bizarre horned frog or toad are now protected from commercial exploitation by laws passed by the 60th Legislature, according to Howard Lee, director of programs for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.  
 Senate Bill 386 protects only the Gopherus berlandieri or Texas tortoise. The Texas tortoise, found only in South Texas and Northern Mexico, is completely harmless and eats fruits from the common cactus and young plants.  
 Lee said commercial exploitation of the land tortoise is rapidly depleting the population from South Texas and Northeastern Mexico. He said the slow reproduction rate of the tortoise could lead to its extinction and could possibly upset the ecological balance of the limited area where it is found.  
 Senate Bill 331 protects all species of the horned toad or frog, which is neither a toad or a frog but a lizard and member of the same family as the Iguana found in Mexico and Central America.  
 A handbook of lizards indicates there are some 13 species in the United States with three found in Texas. The book lists wide variances in the species. Some are egg layers while others are live bearers. Some squirt blood from their eyes which ruin a white shirt or a pair of khaki trousers, Lee said.  
 "Otherwise, they are harmless—except to the ant populations," he said.  
 Violation of the law carries a misdemeanor penalty and a fine from \$10 to \$200. The law protecting the Texas tortoise can also include confinement in the county jail for not less than 10 days and not more than 60 days in addition to the fine.  
 Both laws provide that each tortoise or horned lizard taken, killed, or possessed for commercial exploitation shall constitute a separate offense.

# 80-Year Sentence Due 20 Or 12 Year Review?

If a person is sentenced to the state penitentiary for a certain length of time, how much of that time will he actually serve behind the bars at Huntsville?

This question is frequently asked by local people and in view of recent trials and sentencing in 91st District Court, is asked recently of District Attorney Perry T. Brown.

DA Brown has strong feelings on the subject and replied by offering as indication, a series of correspondences between his office and that of the Board of Pardons and Paroles, Austin.

Early in July, Mr. Brown wrote the board regarding the parole status of a man " . . . recently convicted of the charge of burglary and sentenced to ten years in the penitentiary; and the charge of assault with intent to rape of which he was convicted and sentenced to eighty years. In the last named offense he assaulted a young mother of two school age children, beat her severely with his fists and a baseball bat."

The District Attorney's office here has received the following letter from the Board:

"Your letter dated July 13, 1967 has been received and was presented to the Board. . . . The Board advises that under Senate Bill 145 passed by the 60th Legislature, he must have time credit for twenty (20) years on his eight (80) year sentence before he will be legally eligible for parole consideration."

"His case is on the Board's docket for review during the month of June 1979 at which time he should have accumulated the required time credit to be eligible for parole consideration."

"Your interest and concern is sincerely appreciated and your letter is being made a part of his permanent file for future reference."

Signed Mrs. Gladys Sommers administrative assistant.

It would appear that there might be a typographical error in the second paragraph to wit: "(20) years on his eighty (80)."

The third paragraph is confusing unless it too has an error in it. It would appear that the prisoner in question will come up for parole consideration in 12 years (1979) rather than at 20 as indicated.

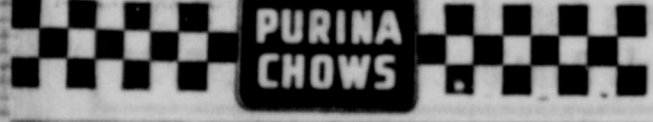

# Local Residents Attend Conclave

Lauretta D. Johnston, Administrator and Mary Frances Cope, Book-keeper of the Western Manor Nursing Home in Ranger, Tex., were among 263 nursing home staff members, welfare case workers, and health department employees who attended a conference in Lubbock, Tex., on Aug. 10, 1967, on the implementation of Title XIX, commonly referred to as Medicaid, of the Social Security Act in Texas.

The one-day meeting, sponsored by the Texas Nursing Home Association, State Department of Public Welfare, and Texas State Department of Health was based on the theme, "Meet The Challenge of Change", and dealt with the responsibilities of the nursing home and state employees under this new program.

Title XIX, being implemented in Texas starting September 1st will replace the current Kerr-Mills welfare program, which have been functioning in Texas since 1962. This new, joint federal-state program, will initially provide the following services to the certain categorical groups of the medically indigent welfare recipients: physician services, in-patient hospital services, outpatient hospital services, skilled nursing home services, and other laboratory and x-ray services. These services will be available to the eligible blind, aged, and totally and permanently disabled and families of dependent children.

Medicaid was the companion legislation to medicare passed by Congress in 1965 as a part of Public Law 89-97. Since medicare is a joint federal-state program, while medicare is strictly a federal program, each state legislature had to pass legislation enabling the state to participate in the program. Senate Bill 2, passed by the Texas Legislature and signed by Governor John Connally on May 11, 1967, was Texas' enabling legislation.

lan," is used by industry to  
make woven and knit wool  
garments that can be machi-  
ne washed without shrinking  
or matting.  
A USDA developed process  
for tanning leather makes it  
possible to launder leather  
garments without affecting

their softness and beauty  
and opens up many new pos-  
sibilities for the use of leath-  
er in wearing apparel.  
Now under development  
are light-weight, wool-cotton  
blends that resist shrinkage  
and wrinkles and hold a  
crease. They are wash-and-  
wear, and in tests, shirts  
laundered and tumbled-dried  
more than a dozen times look-  
ed as smoothly pressed as  
when new.
