The Building Inspec-Group at the First Methodist tor and his assistants are hereby authorized to conduct inspections of buildings suspected of being in violation of this

III. NOTICE TO OWNERS: Whenever a violation of this Chapter has been discovered and reported by an Inspector under Section I, the owner of the premises involved and the occupant, if any, shall be given written notification of the Proop 10, F i r s t Methodist nature of the violation and the date of which a reinspection shall be made to determine if the violation has been eliminated. No reinspection shall be made until the person responsible for a violation under the provisions of this Chapter has been given a reasonable time to eliminate the violation

IV. NOTICE TO DEMOL-ISH: Whenever a violation of Subsections (A), (B), (C), or (D), of Section I of this Chapter is discovered upon re-WANTED: Small two-wheel inspection and the violation trailer. Apply property or persons or to the Ranger Hill Cafe, Highway 80 public, and the cost of alleytf lating the violation is not reasonable related to the value of the building, a notice of intent to order the demolition of the building shall be served on the owner by the Building Inspector, by certified mail, to his post office address as shown on the City tax rolls; or, if his address is unknown and cannot, by the exercise of reasonable diligence be ascertained, by publication for not less than two (2) times within ten (10) consecutive days, in the official newspaper; and, in the event the violation is not eliminated within thirty (30) days from the date of said notice, the City may demolish said building, or cause the same to be done and charge the expenses incurred in doing such work or having the same done, to the owner of said land; and if such work is done at the expense of the City, then said expense shall be assessed on the lot, tract. or parcel of land, or to the premises upon which such ex-

pense was incurred For the purposes of this Section any repair, aiteration, or improvement which is determined by the Building Inspector to cost more than fifty per cent (50%) of the gross assessed valuation of the building, exclusive of land value, shall be deemed not to be reasonable related to the value of the building.

V. 

For the purposes of this Section any repair, alteration, or improvement which is determined by the Building Inspector to cost more than fifty per cent (50%) of the gross assessed valuation of the building, exclusive of land value, shall be deemed not to be reasonable related to the value of the building
