Int. Highway 20 Work Moving Rapidly Here

Most of the interstate highway route across Eastland County has been completed, R. P. (Buddy) Haun, resident engineer for the Texas Highway Department, reported this week.

The route is complete from the Callahan - Eastland County line to a point one mile west of Cisco and from Eastland to the Eastland-Erath line with the exception of freeways around Eastland and Ranger, Mr. Haun said.

Grading and drainage has been completed on the freeway at Cisco while the same is underway between Cisco and Eastland beginning at a point 2.6 miles east of Cisco and extending five miles to a point 6 mile east of State Highway 6 at Eastland. The work is being done by Cecil Ruby, Inc. on a bid of \$1,731,161.03 and is about 50% complete.

Work remaining to be done on IH 20 in Eastland County after the Unit One construction now underway between Cisco and Eastland is finished includes base and surfacing of a highway, on the Cisco freeway and the same kind of work on IH 20 between Cisco and Eastland.

Mr. Haun expected that contracts will be let early next year for the Unit Two work.

Also remaining to be done in the county is the construction of freeways around Eastland and Ranger and it is expected that these will be "turnkey" jobs, probably with contract letting in the latter part of 1968 or early 1969.

The 1970 completion goal is expected to be met, it was reported.

General Rain Assures Good Crop For Eastland County Peanut Farmers

A general rain that measured from one to three inches fell over this region Sunday and Monday nights to assure peanut farmers a good yield and to permit plowing and planting of small grains, and cover crops.

The rain gauges showed 2.1 inches in Cisco, 2.4 inches for Eastland, one inch at Gorman and Carbon, .8 inches for Putnam, two inches at Ranger, 1.5 inches at Moran, and up to three inches in Morton Valley and elsewhere in the county.

Farm leaders said the county's some 35,000 acres of peanuts were assured a good crop as a result of the rain. Near drought conditions had been threatening peanuts not in irrigated areas.

Some peanut harvesting was expected to begin late this month in areas where fields have been watered by irrigation. Dry land peanuts normally are harvested in October.

Many pastures will have time to put out some green growth before frost and stock tanks were mostly in good condition. Plowing was due to start as soon as dry weather permits, and small grain planting will be started.

Peanut men said that it was too early to determine how good the 1967 crop would be. The U. S. Department of Agriculture has posted a support price of \$226 per ton for this year — the same as last year.

No substantial gains were reported for county lakes from the weekend rains.

Ranger Schools Open Tuesday With 624 Students Enrolled

Enrollment in the Ranger Public Schools hit 624 the first day of school which is an increase of 48 over the first day last year when 576 registered. Hodges Primary has 189 this year compared with 164 last year. Young Elementary has 141 compared with 133 a year ago. The Junior-Senior High School has 294 but had 279 last year.

Supt. James R. Clark attributes the increase partly to the local machine shop which has brought several families into Ranger.

It was expected that several more will register by next Monday, Mr. Clark said.

An average daily attendance of 613 this year would enable the school system to put on another teacher next year at state expense or even this year if the school wanted to gamble on the ADA staying above 613, Mr. Clark said.

There was no chance that Ranger High School would go into Class AA football classification in the foreseeable future, although the enrollment is nearly high enough, it was pointed out.

This year Hodges had 70 in the first, 59 in the second, and 60 in the third the first day of school. This totals 189.

At Young the first day there were 45 in the fourth, 50 in the fifth and 46 in the sixth for a total of 141.

In the seventh, there are 53, the eighth has 46, the ninth 56, the tenth 56, the eleventh has 43, and there are 41 seniors.

The 1967 football season will open for Ranger and Cisco High Schools as they tangle at 8 p. m. Friday at Bulldog Stadium in Ranger for a non-conference battle.

As always, the contest promises to be a hard-fought game from beginning to end. The Lobos will be out for revenge as they lost to the Bulldogs by a 31-to-12 score last year in a season's opener played in Cisco. Both teams are expected to be at near full strength for the contest.

Ranger plays in Class 1-A while Cisco is a member of a Class 2-A league. Pre-season dopsters have predicted that the bulldogs will finish near the top, as they did last season, while Cisco has been rated near the bottom of their league. In bulldogs won district and bi-district championship honors in 1966.

Two scrimmage sessions left Bulldog fans convinced that another winning season is in prospect for Ranger. Coaches Charlie Smith and DeWitt Jones have made no secret of the fact that they are impressed with their Bulldogs. Some 34 boys are out for the team and twice-daily workouts were held through last Friday.

The probable starting lineup was listed as follows:

Ends — Rudy Mendoza, 170, and Charlie Orms, 213; tackles — Preston Sunday, 222, and Gene Bilby, 160; guards — Andy Hamilton, 183, and Floyd Parks, 160; center — Terry Brown, 162; quarterback — Tom Golemon, 160; tailback — Ricky Squyres, 177; flanker back, Brad White, 155.

Cisco lost a starting tackle, Lonnie Payne, who suffered a broken leg. The Bulldogs will have two players out with injuries — Bill Watkins and Dwaine Brown. The latter suffered a broken hand in a scrimmage bout with Brownwood and will be out for some time.

Coach Smith said that "I feel that the game will be very close — and I hope we are fortunate enough to be on top when the game is over."

A large delegation of Cisco fans will be out in full force for the game. The bands and cheering sections of both schools will be ready for the new season, and a big half-time show will be staged by the bands.

Henry Brown Dies In New Mexico

Henry H. Brown died Friday, Aug. 25 in a hospital in Truth or Consequences, N.M., following a heart attack.

The son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Porter Brown, Stephens County pioneers who were in that county July 19, 1892. He moved to Truth or Consequences in 1958 where he was former mayor, member of City Commission, Rotary Club, Masonic Lodge and had served on the State Board of Game and Wild Life Commission.

He was a member of the Lutheran Church. Survivors include his wife, Grace, of the home; one son, Dr. Henry H. Brown, Jr. of Carlsbad, N. THE GORDON SPOT

By DeMarquis (Dee) Gordon
Eastland County Extension Agent



Small grain planting time is almost here and next year's harvest of grain or the amount of grazing from the crop may well be determined by the variety planted.

Eastland County farmers should get the best seed available of varieties adapted to this area of the state. The choice of a variety is influenced by whether the crop is seeded on dry land or irrigated, low or high fertility conditions, used for grazing, grain production or a combination of the two. Disease or insect reaction is important since more resistance is being bred into the varieties. Also the shattering and lodging characteristics and finally the quality, especially with wheat.

The hard wheat varieties recommended are sturdy, Cad-do, and Quana and Gage. The Triumph wheats and the new varieties Parker and Guide may be used but are very susceptible to leaf rust. Crockett, Kaw and Comanche are acceptable.

Recommended oat varieties for this area are Ora, Nora, Alamo-X, New Nortex, More-grain, Taggart.

The best rust resistance is found in the varieties Ora, Nora, Suregrain, Florida 500 and Houston. Alamo-X, Taggart, New Nortex and More-grain are susceptible to rust. Suregrain, Houston and Florida 500 are less cold tolerant and may be winter killed in Eastland County.

PROCEDURE IS OUTLINED FOR OBTAINING DRIVER'S LICENSE

AUSTIN—Col. Homer Garrison director of the Department of Public Safety, reminded Texans today that any person, regardless of age, must have a birth certificate or other legal document showing birthdate in possession at the time they first make application for a driver's license. "Apparently many applicants are unfamiliar with this new requirement in the law, Garrison advised, "and large numbers of prospective drivers are being turned away until they return home and get such a document. This part of the law applies only to those drivers who make application for their first Texas driver's license, and not to those wishing to renew a license. Garrison outlined the procedure to be followed to obtain a license in order to clear up any misconceptions brought about by changes in the driver's license law. First, the applicant must be the proper age. A person 16 years old may obtain a license provided he has completed an approved course of driver education or has a certificate showing that such a course is not taught at the school regularly attended by

the applicant. Persons 18 years of age or older may qualify for an Operators License without taking driver education. Persons 15 years of age or older may be licensed to operate a 5-brake horsepower motor scooter. The applicant, with the necessary birth certificate, goes to any examining office of the DPS. If we wish to take the driving portion of the examination, he must provide a vehicle in which to be tested. After Jan. 1, 1968, applicants for the motorcycle license must provide, in addition to the motorcycle, a car and a licensed driver to convey the License Examiner during the road test. Upon arriving at the Examining Office, the applicant will fill in necessary forms and be given a vision test and a written test. If he completes both of these satisfactorily he will be given the road test. If he completes all phases of the examination satisfactorily, he will be issued a temporary permit which will enable him to drive until receiving his license from DPS headquarters in Austin. If the person has not had sufficient experience in operating a vehicle, he may pass the written and vision portions of the examination and be given a temporary learners permit which will enable him to drive as long as a licensed operator over the age of 21 is in the front seat of the vehicle at the same time.

All Automobile Accidents Must Be Reported On

AUSTIN—Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, reminded Texans today of the change in the Motor Vehicle Laws which makes accidents occurring on parking lots reportable to the DPS. Under the new section of the law, which became effective Aug. 23, for immediate investigation and a written report filed with the DPS within 10 days. Forms for reporting are available from any police agency.

Accidents occurring on shopping center parking lots and those in areas where a particular store has provided free parking space are reportable provided that any injury or death has occurred or there is a total of \$50 or more in property damage. The only accidents which are exempted under the new law are those occurring in private residential driveways or on a privately owned parking lot where a fee is charged for parking.

Applications Being Taken For ROTC Scholarships For '68-'69

High school senior boys interested in applying for four-year Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC) scholarships for school year 1968-69 must apply before Jan. 15, 1968, according to spokesmen at Headquarters Fourth U. S. Army, Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, Texas.

It is not necessary for applicants to have participated in the junior (or high school) ROTC program. They may attend any college or university offering the four-year Army ROTC Program if accepted by that college. Nationwide there will be 800

four-year scholarships this year, ranging in value from \$5,000 to \$9,000, depending on the tuition charged at the college selected. Each scholarship includes all tuition and fees, books, military uniforms and a \$50 monthly living allowance, for the period of the scholarship. The pay is higher during summer camps. There were about 100 scholarships awarded in the Fourth Army area of Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, Okla-

homa and New Mexico last year. Selection for the scholarships is based on the results of the College Entrance Examination Board (Scholastic Aptitude Tests), high school academic record, participation in extracurricular activities and personal interview. The first CEEB-SAT testing date throughout the nation is scheduled for Dec. 2, 1967, for which the last registration date without a penal-

ty fee is Oct. 28. Late registration for the tests may be made until Nov. 11. In Texas there will be a special administration of the CEEB-SAT on Nov. 4, for which the without-penalty registration deadline is Oct. 7 and the latest date possible for registration is Oct. 21. Because of the early closing date (Jan. 15, 1968) for Army ROTC scholarship applications, interested young men are urged to schedule the

CEEBSAT for this first date. Counselors at each high school will have information about where these tests will be administered. Application kits and further information on the Army ROTC Scholarship Program are available by writing Commanding General, Fourth U. S. Army, ATTN: AKAAG-RR, Fort Sam Houston, Tex. 78234. The kits will be mailed as soon as they are available.
