Bulldogs-Mavericks to Clash in Eastland Friday Night at 8:00

The Ranger Bulldogs and neighboring Mavericks of Eastland will clash for the second game of the 1967 football season for both teams. The Mavericks won their game last week by defeating Cross Plains 21-12. In last year's encounter with the Mavs the Bulldogs stopped the neighbors with a 14-6 win. Both teams are well balanced and several outstanding players. The Bulldogs have Tom Golemon, Tom Fox, Ricky Squyers, and Rudy Mendoza who showed their fans that the Bulldogs are going to be hard to beat. The Eastland Mavericks journeyed to Cross Plains where they were picked as the underdog, but when the final gun sounded they had won the game by nine point margin. Eastland's Steve Wilson, left halfback and a 155-pound junior, scored 19 points for the Mavs in the Cross Plains game. Other outstanding players in the game for Eastland were Randy Butler, 135, senior; Terry Grimes, 160, pound guard; and Boyd Porter, a 170-pound senior. According to statistics, the Mavs are weak on their passing. They had a total of 48 yards passing with 222 yards rushing in the Cross Plains game. The records show the Bulldogs have defeated the Mavericks 32 times in the last 45 years the teams have met. Game time for the Friday night game will be 8 p. m. in the Maverick Stadium.

Three Local Youths In Custody for Burglary

Ranger police took three youths into custody Tuesday for questioning in connection with the August 20 break-in of the First Christian Church here, in which the church's public address system was reported taken. Ranger police were also seeking a fourth youth for questioning in connection with the burglary. Police Chief J. W. Vinson said one of the youths said he had taken the public address system himself from the church and has "stashed" it in a vacant building north of town. Chief Vinson and Constable Ralph Veale said they went to the site where the youth said he had left the public address system but that it was not there. All three youths are under the age of 18, officers said. The pastor of the church, Rev. Gary Shoemaker, discovered the public address system missing when he went to the church August 20. Entry to the church was made through a back window by the burglars. The address system included an amplifier and other equipment. Ranger police are also continuing to investigate the break in of Busby's Department Store here, which occurred the weekend of Aug. 13, in which some 60 to 70 suits valued at \$8,000 and \$1,000 in belts, shirts, and work shoes were reported taken.

Applications for voter registration certificates will be supplied in the various voting precincts of the county, he said. These applications may be filled out completely and signed then mailed to the tax office and registration certificates will be returned by mail.

Or registration may be done in person at the tax office after Oct. 1, he said.

ON VACATION

(Editor's note: Mr. and Mrs. Gene Boney, Ann, Carla, and Rex of Eastland and Mrs. Annie Harper of Ranger spent August touring 22 states, Ontario, Canada, and Washington, D. C. Here's their report.)
How do you remember almost six thousand miles and

hundreds of towns in bits and pieces. The people. Those things which are different. Moments of rest. Historic sites. Commercial tours. A chicken standing beside the highway, alone, far from anything else. Just standing.

The memories seldom come in chronological order. It is difficult to force order into scrapbook and edited film. Memory is independent and it remembers whatever it chooses.

Always, in the memory of any place, are the people we saw there.

Congressman Omar Burleson, who scheduled our tours of the White House, the FBI, and the Library of Congress and who took time from a busy schedule to welcome us to his office and explain Congress to our teen-agers.

Ed McMahon, Bill Cullen, and James Garner filming TV Shows in the New York City NBC studios. Mimi Benzell interviewing Sally Rand on the NBC Monitor program. And the young NBC guide who said "Sally Rand? Who's Sally Rand?"

The motel managers in Malone, New York: strangers when sudden, and temporary illness struck our family, they were friends in a matter of hours.

The laconic Maine policeman who listened to our request for directions, said "Follow me" and then, in true movie fashion, escorted us through Portland to a lighthouse designed and commissioned by George Washington.

Our tour guide at the United Nations: a young Swedish girl capably blending pride in her own country with the joy of being in the States.

City Music Hall whose precision is legendary.

Bearded, barefoot men shuffling through Greenwich Village. And the Shortline Bus passengers staring at them.

An Amish family riding in a buggy because their faith doesn't hold with motor vehicles. Or water piped from outside one's own property. Or relief, divorce, neglecting one's family and lands, or leaving the faith.

Hoop-skirted hostesses at Mount Vernon.

Tired workers rushing through a Manhattan Automobile.

Talking, laughing people high on the Empire State Building growing silent as darkness falls and lights begin to blink on in New York City, slowly, slowly, and then rapidly turning the island from a collection of buildings to a vast sweep of beauty.

And those people everywhere who were interested in Texas. Repeatedly we heard: "How do Texans really feel about Lyndon Johnson?" "Is it true that 10,000 acres is a small ranch in Texas?" "Is San Antonio as pretty at night as it was back in '43?" "Don't guess you know any mailmen in Fort Worth? Got a friend there, been on the mail route for years."

Not once did we encounter bitterness toward Texas—or sarcastic remarks. Gene's height drew comments: "I've heard of tall Texans and now I've seen one." Our Texas Doodle pads from Eastland National Bank got cries of "That's just like something Texas would do." But both the height and the pads seemed merely to confirm preconceived notions and all remarks carried a tone of friendly indulgence.

The differences were small, but striking. Texas had city limits; some states have corporation limits; some township limits. Motorists in the United States are warned to merge right; in Canada, drivers are told to "squeeze" right. In Texas, diners must ask to have extras (lettuce, onions, tomatoes) taken off

students are back in Texas. An estimated 122,000 pro-

essional people (teachers, principals, and superintendents) are required in the 275 school districts in Texas. Texas State Teachers Association reported a month ago that there were only 50 applications for 1951 vacancies. Texas Education Agency estimates \$1,350,300,000 will be spent on public school education in 1967-68. This is a four per cent, or \$55,700,000 in-
During the coming year, Texas will be spending \$500 for each pupil. Average cost per child for 1966-67 was \$479. With an anticipated continuing teacher shortage, TEA expects an increase in the number of teaching aides employed to do clerical and other non-teaching tasks. Nearly 5,000 of these aides are expected to be employed over the state, compared with 4,317 in

1966-67. While enrollment continues to grow, some observers have noted that the two per cent increase this year is not nearly as dramatic as the increases in prior years. Grades one to six will enroll approximately 1,418,000 pupils and grades seven to 12 about 1,179,000. A dozen Texas cities—including Austin — are rushing into special elections on the new one per cent local option sales tax which became legal on Aug. 28. Here's what the big hurry is all about: local levies approved in elections this month will be collectable Jan. 1. Elections after Oct. 1 would provide money in the till until April 1. Thirty days' notice is necessary to call elections—Election by order of city govern-

ing bodies or in response to petition by citizens. First cities to vote on the sales tax will be Elgin and El Paso. Their elections will be held on Sept. 2. Aransas Pass, Corpus Christi, Electra, Henrietta, Nacogdoches, Orange Grove, Texas, and Wichita Falls will vote Sept. 28. Voters in Austin and Taylor will go to the polls on Sept. 30. Gov. John Connally returned from his African hunting expedition undecided whether he wants to travel Texas campaign trails again. He told reporters that he may take several weeks or even months to make up his mind whether to seek a fourth term. Lieut. Gov. Preston Smith says he will run for governor whether Connally does or not.
