Wilson got through for 14 and another first, then picked up six; Lund plowed for two; and Wilson repeated for two. On a fourth and few needed, Wilson got only one and the ball went back to Ranger with less than two minutes left.

Squyres earned five on a handoff from Golemon. Ranger fumbled on the next entry and Center Terry Grimes got himself a handful of it for new Eastland hope.

On the 41, the aerial display began. It didn't rain during the game but during the closing seconds the sky was showered with passes.

A long one from Kincaid to Simms in the north pocket fell incomplete. Another fell by the wayside. Then Lund connected to End Gary Spradling right at the two-yard line that could have been a life-saver for Eastland—but a 15-yard clipping penalty erased the hope. Ranger fans got a breather.

Another long one fell to the ground, and the seconds ticked away. To stop the clock, a quick-thinking Maverick intentionally fouled, got himself thrown off and gained a few seconds.

Lund had a long pass in the air as the final buzzer sounded—and fans on both sides of the field breathed again. It was over. Ranger victorious again, 14-6.

Precinct No. 2 — Olden.  
Precinct No. 3 — Ranger.  
Precinct No. 4 — Desdemona.  
Precinct No. 5 — Gorman.  
Precinct No. 6 — Carbon.  
Precinct No. 7 — Rising Star.  
Precinct No. 8 — Cisco.

### Who Have School Problems . . . Supt. Clark Asks Parents To Talk To Teachers, Not Trustees

Ranger Public School Superintendent James R. Clark today asked parents of school children who have questions as to school problems to contact the teacher or the principal involved and not to contact school board members.

"It only delays the matter some and causes the trustee to lose time from his business to call the school, Clark said.

"The board of trustees has it in their minutes that they had rather parents take their problems and questions directly to the person involved, then to the Principal, and then to the Superintendent.

"If the parent still is not satisfied or has not had a satisfactory answer, then the next step is to ask the Superintendent when the trustees will meet and either come in person or ask that the problem be discussed.

"We school employees are being paid to handle these problems and the trustees expect us to do so," Clark said.

"It is not fair to burden the trustee with a problem that he can only refer to the school official involved. They have elected us to serve the public and we would like that chance before it goes to a board member Clark stated.

"We know there will be problems come up all year and I want to urge parents to telephone me if they are not sure who to contact or what to do. Let me do what the trustees expect me to do and are paying me to do," Clark said.
