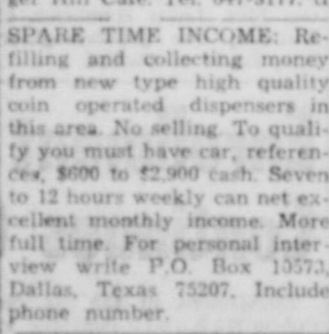

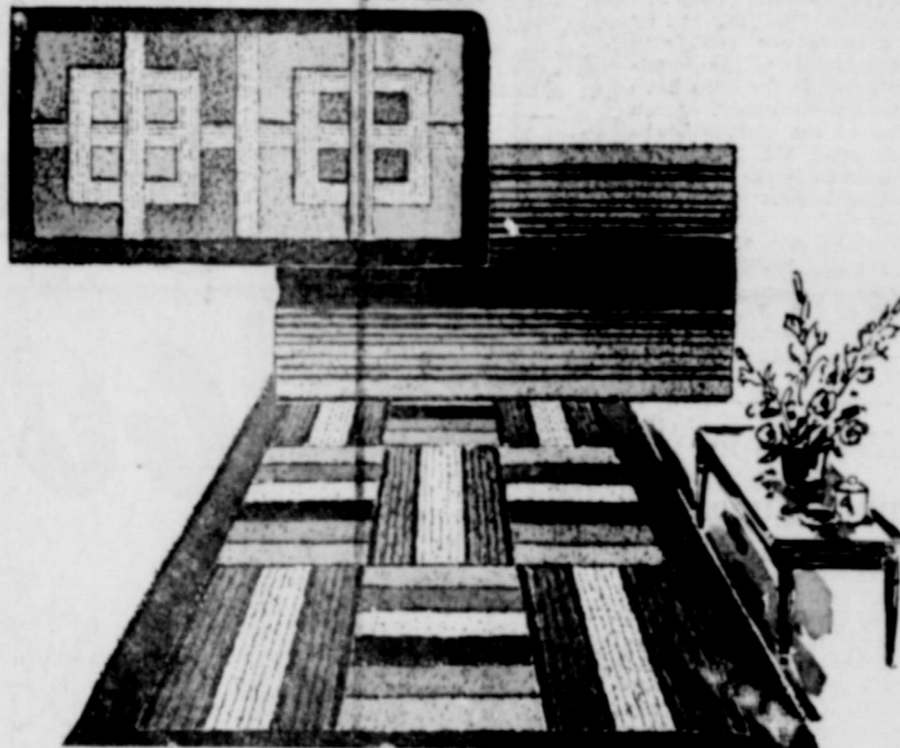

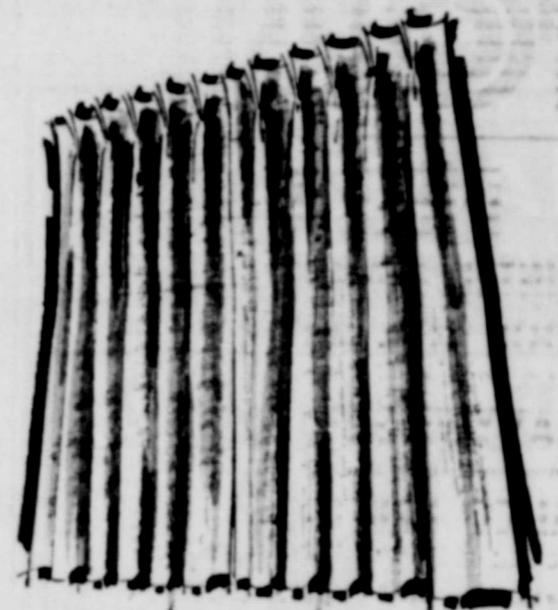

# DAR Hears Noted Speaker In Address On The Constitution

The constitution of the United States is THE great document which contains our legacy of freedom," according to Edward L. Kirk, associate professor of education at Abilene Christian College, in a Constitution Week address last Tuesday noon in Cisco.

Mr. Kirk, speaking on the subject "Our Constitution — Our Strongest Weapon," addressed the September luncheon of the Charles Crawford Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, at the Victor Hotel in Cisco. Guests were present from throughout Eastland County.

Mr. Kirk, who has received six awards from the Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge and numerous other honors for his work in the national interest, described the constitution as "a document that is more than just a collection of words — a document that symbolizes our rights and freedoms... our ideals and ambitions."

Cautioning that the principles which brought America to the greatest heights of freedom yet known on this earth are easily forgotten, Mr. Kirk noted that "the principles which make us great are contained in our great documents and they can endure only as they are learned and retained by an ever-flowing succession of citizens."

These documents, he noted, provide the basis for a deep sense of patriotism and love of country. "They give us a yardstick for determining whether or not the alterations of the original form of our government is good or bad."

Mr. Kirk suggested that "the best way to confront world confusion is to recall what our purposes used to be as recorded in the thoughts of those leaders who made America a beacon of hope for the oppressed of all mankind."

"The constitution is the best plan ever made to assure freedom, the speaker said. 'It guarantees our freedoms, our life, liberty and property. This stimulated more new enterprise and invention and gave us in this country a higher stand of living, better housing, more food and greater freedom in our civil, religious and personal lives than any people in history have enjoyed.'

Mrs. Robert Stewart, vice-regent, introduced the speaker to the 28 members and several guests in attendance. The national colors of red, white and blue were used in decorations on the head table with a centerpiece of carnations.

Roy Hathaway, superintendent of Cisco Public Schools, sang two songs, America the Beautiful and God Bless America. Mrs. M. W. Cotton, choir director at Cisco High School, accompanied him. Mrs. Joe Clements, Regent, made the introduction of Mr. Hathaway and Mrs. Cotton.

## Plentiful Foods List For Coming Month Released

COLLEGE STATION A wide selection of plentiful foods will be available for the homemaker this month.

October plentifuls reported by the Consumer and Marketing Service include apples, orange juice, rice, broiler-fryers, potatoes and shrimp. This wide variety of foods make selection a real treat for the wise shopper, says the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The apple harvest goes into full swing in October. This year's apple production is expected to total 125 million bushels, one percent less than last year, report the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Orange juice continues in especially big supply. Packs of concentrate, single strength, and chilled juice continue to outstrip last year's production figures.

Look for more potato specials in October. A delayed late summer potato harvest coupled with an estimated 229 million hundredweight fall crop is sending large shipments into local markets now, according to market news offices of the Consumer and Marketing Service.

Rice and broiler-fryers should be attractively priced this month. Rice production is expected to top last year's record crop and broiler-fryers are also in good supply.

Shrimp production figures for the first six months of 1967 were expected to be nearly half again as much as last year's catch. Cold storage holdings on Aug. 1 totaled 47.9 million pounds.

## THE GORDON SPOT

Various problems continue to plague peanut farmers in Eastland County. Farmers in the Gorman area said Southern Blight is worse this year than last year. J. O. Jackson, Jr. of Gorman has a demonstration using Terraclor to control Southern Blight.

This is one of the things that will be seen on the peanut tour to be held Tuesday, Oct. 3. The peanut tour is being planned for the morning and the Rising Star area during the afternoon. More information will be given before that date.

Fall army worms are causing considerable damage to young small grain and other crops in some parts of the state. Conditions are now ideal for them to move in Eastland County. Be on the outlook for these destructive worms, especially in early planted oats, wheat, and rye. They may be controlled in small grain with Parathion, Toxaphene, DDT, or Sevin. Be sure to check on the grazing restrictions before using the insecticides.

The objective of brush control is to get the longest period of control for the least

cost, with the largest possible increase in forage and livestock production.

Since brush control is only one important phase of the overall ranch management program, it should be combined with proper stocking and deferred rotation grazing for greatest returns.

Deferred grazing following and brush control program is a necessity. Little improvement in range forage protection may result when pastures on which brush control practices have been carried out are not deferred.

Increased grass production is not the only benefit derived from a properly conducted brush control program. Others listed include the ease of

The Future Farmers went to the Fair also, and to Bryan and San Antonio for 888 miles or \$283.52. Future Teachers traveled 330 miles to San Antonio or \$176.90.

The bands traveled 3,868 miles or \$1,237.76. Athletic trips totaled 3,908 miles or \$1,250.56.

Pep Squad buses totaled 652 miles. The ninth, tenth and eleventh grades each traveled 42 miles on picnics. The sixth grade picnic used two buses for 84 miles. The eighth grade went to Fort Worth on a field trip in two buses and used two on a picnic to total 382 miles. The first grades traveled 84 miles on a field trip. The senior class went to Austin and to Bandera for 906 miles for \$315.52.

Supt. Clark said no official action has been taken on charging 32 cents a mile for extra mileage but that the

State has stated that each school district must arrive at a cost and set a price and put it in their board minutes along with a written policy regarding the use of buses on trips other than transporting pupils to and from school.

Ranger Public Schools spend over \$9,000 each year to operate their buses on all trips and bus routes and every nickel of this comes from the State. The State is trying to see that the local district pays for personal uses of State purchases buses, salaries and operating costs.

A further study will be made before Ranger takes official action Clark said.

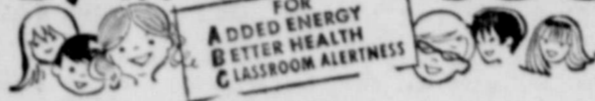
