

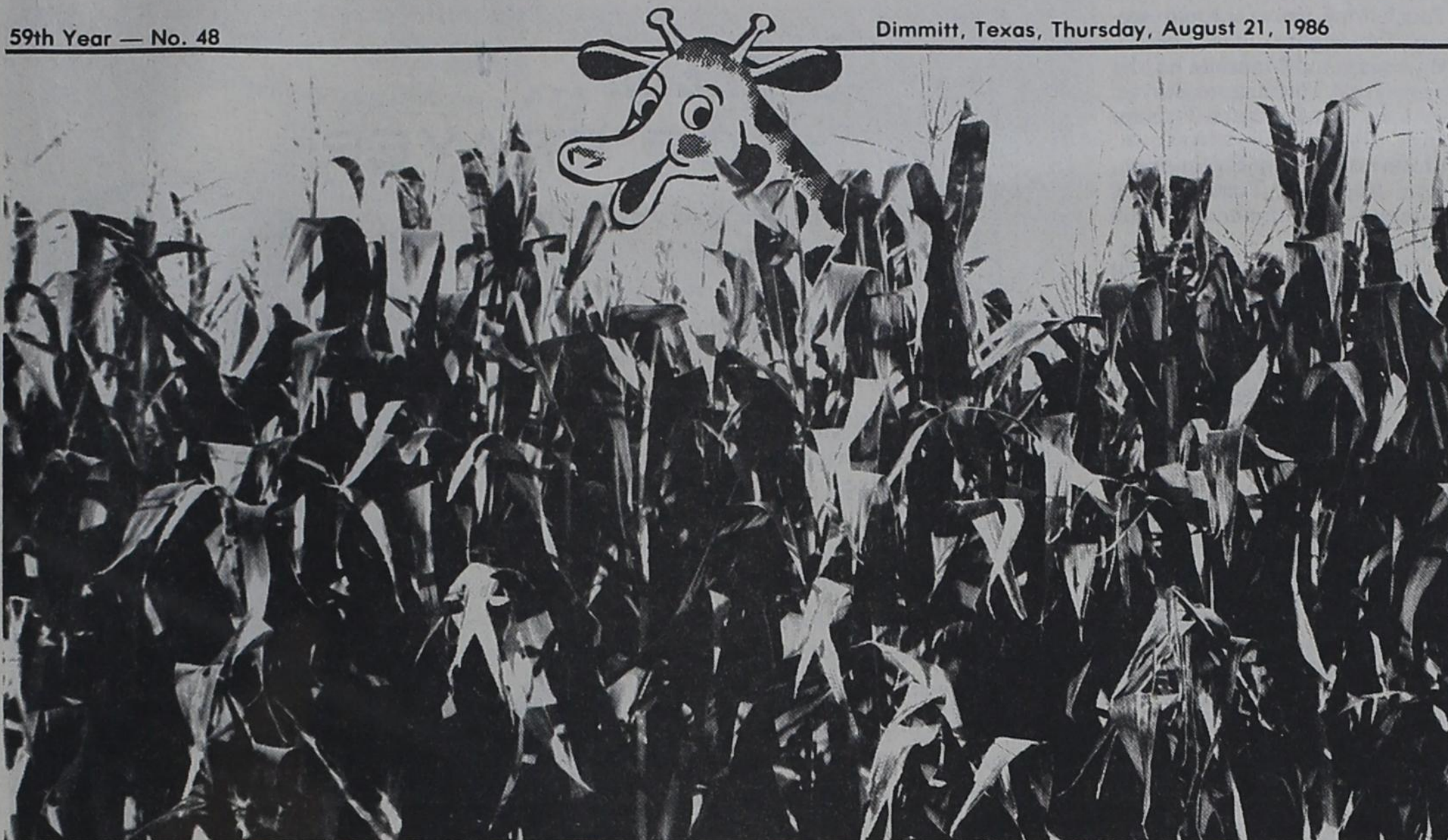

RAIN WILL DO AMAZING THINGS in this country—some folks say almost anything will grow here, if you get enough water to it. Sure enough, farmers in the western part of the county were caught with their wells running last Thursday, when it started

raining. Then came a soaker. That was followed by a drought-buster. Up to six inches of rain fell in one location near Flagg from about 3 p.m. Thursday until 8 a.m. Friday, prompting some pretty amazing growth.

City will consider self-insurance

Plan could put \$70,000 in savings

Dimmitt city aldermen will explore the possibility of self-insurance for most of the city's needs before their current insurance expires Oct. 1.

Currently, the city carries its insurance with the Texas Municipal League. Dimmitt is paying almost \$6,000 per month, over \$70,000 per year, for almost-complete coverage.

After finding out premiums would triple last year, the city opted to raise its deductible amount in some areas and drop comprehensive coverage on vehicles worth less than \$6,000.

Several cities, most notably Amarillo, voted to self-insure last year after learning their insurance rates would skyrocket.

"I think we should think about it (self-insurance)," said Alderman Don Sheffy. "It might be a good idea."

"Our insurance cost us only

about \$12,000 in 1980," pointed out Mayor Wayne Collins. "We've had only minimal losses since I have been on the board (eight years), and we could put this money into savings and cover most of our losses."

"We could save almost \$750,000 in 10 years without interest."

"I think it's worth looking at," said Alderman Harold Hyman, "but I think we should look at someone picking up liability coverage after \$500,000 or something like that. But we should probably self-insure on the comprehensive. One month would pay for most of the damage."

The aldermen have two meetings before they must make a decision on the insurance, which expires Sept. 30.

The aldermen also voted to support Canyon city manager Glen Metcalf for the TML Insurance Trust Fund Board, and interviewed a candidate for the city's vacant fire marshal's position.

Schools set registration dates

Registration for the 1986-87 school year for Dimmitt students will be held Monday in all three schools.

Registration at Richardson Elementary will be held from 1 to 4 p.m. in the school cafeteria for all grades.

Students enrolling in the half-day pre-Kindergarten program must be 4 years of age by Sept. 1, must have a birth certificate, an immunization record, and must be limited in English-speaking ability or from a family whose annual income is at or below the subsistence level.

Students enrolling in the Kindergarten program must be 5 by Sept. 1, must have a birth certificate and an immunization record.

A child must be 6 by Sept. 1 to enter the first grade unless the student has been enrolled in the first grade in the public school of another state prior to transferring to Dimmitt, and must have a birth certificate and immunization record.

Students entering the second

or third grades must have completed the previous grades, or equivalents, successfully in an accredited school.

Dimmitt Middle School registration for students in grades 4, 5, and 6 will be held from 1 to 4 p.m. Monday at DMS in the west section of the building, while students in the seventh grade will register from 1 to 2:30 p.m. and eighth graders will sign up from 2:30 to 4 p.m. in the DMS library.

Meal tickets for breakfast, at 20 cents each, and lunch, for 85 cents each, will be available, as will applications for free and reduced-price meals.

At Dimmitt High School, underclassmen should come to registration meeting DISD grooming codes as school pictures will be taken during registration. Students do not have to purchase pictures, but all will have their pictures taken.

Picture packets will cost from \$6.90 to \$26, and must be paid for at registration.

1985-86 yearbooks will also

be available at registration.

Seniors will register from 1 to 1:45 p.m., juniors from 1:45 to 2:30 p.m., sophomores from 2:30 to 3:15 p.m., and freshmen from 3:15 to 4 p.m. Monday.

New students are urged to enroll before next Monday.

The DHS Student Council will sell parking spots for \$4 each during registration. The parking spots must be paid for at registration, as no spaces may be reserved without money.

Hart students will register next Thursday and Friday.

Students from pre-Kindergarten through the sixth grade will register from 8:30 a.m. until 12 noon and from 1 to 3:30 p.m. at the Elementary gym Aug. 28.

All Kindergarten and 4-year-old students must present a birth certificate and health record at registration, and all new students must also present a birth certificate and health records.

A parent or guardian must accompany students to school on registration day if they qualify for free or reduced-price lunches to sign the lunch forms. The forms must have the Social Security numbers of all adult members of the household, and all Social Security numbers of any working family members must be on the forms before they can be approved.

Parents who have children 4 years of age and have limited English speaking ability that are below the subsistence level must accompany their children to registration.

Farmers reach accord on congress topics

If local farmers and ranchers have their way, a mandatory supply management system will be a way of life in the not-too-distant future in agriculture.

That was the decision reach-

ed Monday night during the Castro-Parmer counties caucus held at the Expo Building in Dimmitt. The caucus was the first step in the United Farmer and Rancher Congress that will meet next month in St. Louis,

Mo. The caucus and the congress are sponsored by Farm Aid. Delegates from 48 states will meet in St. Louis to try to iron out a unified solution to the nation's ailing ag sector.

Delegates from Castro and Parmer counties will include Doug Higgins, Carl King, Lois Wales, Marie Winders and Garvin Thorn. Alternates will include Milton Dixon, Jeanette Thorn, David Smith, Johnna Blackburn and Harold Bob Bennett.

"Supply management is the No. 1 topic from Virginia to California," said V. B. Morris of Gruver, state president for the Texas congressional group. The local group stopped short of demanding a loan rate set at 90% of parity, but did stipulate the price should be set at "the cost of production for domestic use plus a reasonable profit."

Other items designated by the caucus of 50 area farmers and ranchers included:

- Stronger US trade policy;
- Revamping of the monetary policy;
- Controls clamped on futures trading;
- Debt restructuring (a Chrysler-like bail out) for farmers and ranchers.

Nuclear waste foes gain Senate victory

Even while an assistant state attorney general was explaining there was not a whole lot the state could do at this time to halt site characterization work, the rug was partially pulled from under the feet of the Dept. of Energy as the Senate Appropriations Committee voted to cut the DOE's budget by over \$200 million during the next fiscal year, halting much of the present work on a nuclear waste repository.

"I had asked the chairman of

the committee to delete funds for work in Deaf Smith County and the other two sites . . . (because) there are so many questions about the handling of the whole issue by the Dept. of Energy that I believe we need this time for review and study," Bentsen said.

The funding cut would still need to be approved by the full Senate and by a House-Senate conference committee. Earlier, cuts had been denied overwhelmingly by the House and were averted because of a tie

vote in the Senate Energy and Commerce Committee in a party-line split.

Meanwhile, Renea Hicks, at almost the same moment the Appropriation Committee vote was taking place, told a packed news conference at the Nuclear Waste Task Force office in Dimmitt that the AG's office would be plowing "new ground—farmer's ground and legal ground" in trying to avert the placement of the nation's first nuclear waste repository in Deaf Smith County.

Hicks reiterated AG Jim Mattox earlier statements that his office "would not be involved in frivolous law suits—we won't sue for the sake of suing," and said the main purpose for the visit was "to see what we are representing" in the two suits filed by the AG that are pending.

The pending litigation includes an action against the Environmental Protection Agency on site characterization and against DOE on environmental assessment guidelines.

Also holding up any other filings is the fact that DOE has not yet acquired any land, and when it does attempt to buy land or go, it should be a "private matter."

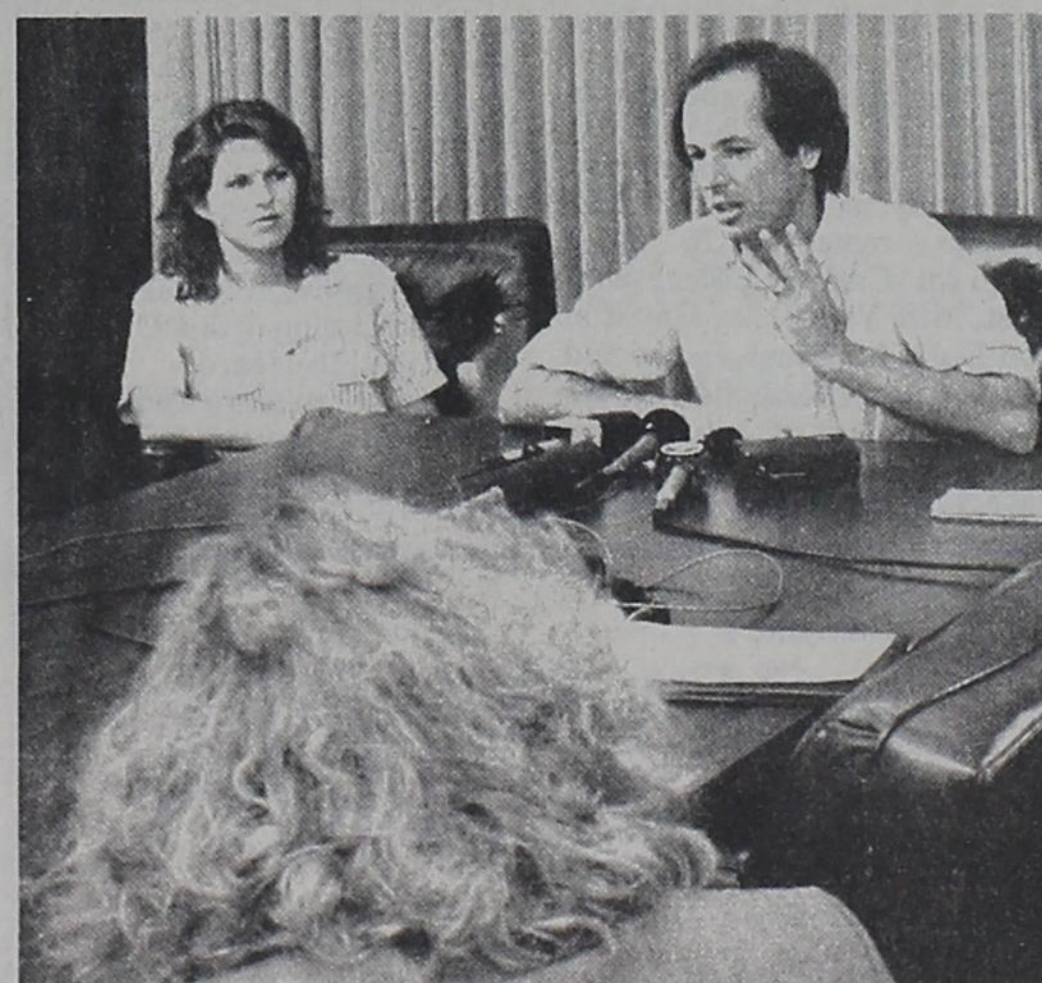
After the press conference, NWTF head Delbert Devin was presented two, \$5,000 checks.

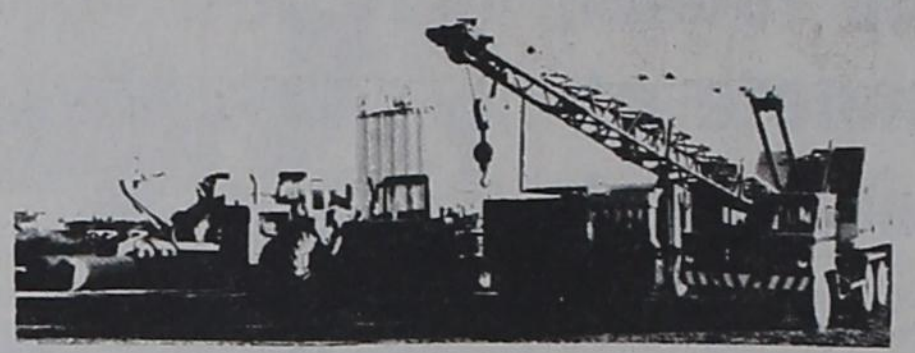
Breakfast and reduced priced lunches will be set later.

Sodbuster rules

USDA could destroy South Plains cotton crop

Definite plans have not been laid out for implementation of the "sodbuster" provisions of the current farm law, says Donald Johnson, executive vice president of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, "but the possibility for disruption of cotton production if the final rules are too stringent are really frightening."

Sodbuster and "swamp-

buster" sections of the law generally deny all farm program benefits (1) to producers who convert highly erodible soils or wetlands to crop production after Dec. 23, 1985 and (2) to all producers after 1990 who continue producing commodities on previously cultivated "fragile" lands without instituting an approved conservation plan.

The effect on production after 1990 is the part that has producers most concerned, Johnson says. Abundant justification for that concern, he notes, is found in a study of the potential impact, done by the Texas A&M Extension Service at the request of the State Agricultural Stabilization and

Conservation Service (ASCS) Committee. Primary authors of the report on the study are A&M's Extension Soil Specialist Billy Harris and Larry Lippke, Extension Economist.

Lacking anything more concrete, Harris and Lippke based projections on "likely" requirements for conservation plans derived from discussions with Soil Conservation Service personnel. The assumed requirements were based on current guidelines and calculations of the erodibility index of Texas soils.

All of Texas is included in the study, but the High Plains, especially counties lying south of US 70 from Matador through Plainview to Muleshoe, is singled out as the area where the impact will be greatest. "Generally," the report concludes, "the coarse sandy soils will not be considered suitable for cotton production at all," and "reasonable estimates suggest that for the average of the southern High Plains, requirements for conservation plans would dictate two-thirds high residue crops."

For any given year, that means two-thirds of the area of necessity would be planted to high residue crops. Put another way, cotton could be produced no more than one out of every three years on the average, could be produced only one out of four years on many individual farms, and could not be produced at all on others.

After studying the five-page report, Dawson County cotton producer, ginner and State ASCS Committee Chairman Jerry Harris told the Western

Cotton Production Conference in Lubbock last week that implementation of the legislation as planned would be "a tornado that will go across the Cotton Belt and eliminate a lot of us."

Complaints from area producers and cotton-related

businessmen already have been lodged with area congressmen and senators, Johnson says, "and there will be many more as producers, ginners and other cotton people become more aware of the potential for economic disaster."

Irrigation loan meet is today in Muleshoe

A special meeting will be held today at 10 a.m. at the Bailey County Coliseum in Muleshoe to discuss the Pilot Agricultural Water Conservation Loan Program.

The program, conducted locally by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1, offers low-interest loans to qualified irrigators who wish to improve

the efficiency of their irrigation application and distribution systems.

"Anyone interested in discussing this low-interest loan program with a Water District representative is encouraged to attend," said Water District Manager Wayne Wyatt. "This is an informal meeting where we will explain to irrigators the types of equipment that loans can be

made for under the program guidelines, as well as explaining what information is needed in order to apply for a loan."

Irrigators from throughout the District's service area have obtained almost \$300,000 worth of loans to purchase drop-line center pivot sprinkler systems, furrow dikers, laser land leveling equipment and surge irrigation equipment.

Insects of interest

Control peach tree borers now

Now is a good time to spray peach trees for peach tree borers, says Allen Knutson, EA-Entomologist. Peach tree borer is the most serious and common pest of peaches. Borer larvae feed beneath the bark near the soil level. Infestations reduce tree vigor and often kill the tree if allowed to continue.

The adult borer is a small rapidly flying black moth. The adult lays eggs on the tree's trunk during August and September. Newly hatched borers tunnel through the bark to feed on the cambium. There is usually one generation per year.

A single application of chlorpyrifos insecticide in mid-August kills hatching larvae before or soon after they tunnel into the tree. Chlorpyrifos is sold as Lorsban® and Green Light Borer Spray. Thoroughly wet the trunk and base of each tree but do not spray fruit. As with all pesticides, read and follow label directions.

WOOL AND LAMB REFERENDUM

Ballots were mailed on Aug. 18, 1986 to all known wool and lamb producers in Castro County. The Referendum is being held to see if producers want to continue deductions for advertising and sales promotion of lambs and wool.

Ballots must be returned to the Castro County ASCS office by Aug. 29, 1986.

If you owned sheep (6 months old or older) for at least 30 consecutive days during 1985 you are eligible to vote. Votes may be cast by an individual, corporations, partnerships, or legal entities, and qualified cooperative associations may vote for all their member-producers, who shall not then otherwise vote in the referendum.

Only one ballot may be cast for two or more producers who are required to apply jointly for a price support payment under the wool program. Each joint producer must sign the ballot.

Don't forget to return the voted ballot to the Castro County ASCS office by Aug. 29, 1986.

Just heard the screeching of tires under the red light, and that screeching serves as a reminder that beet-truck dodging season will soon be here.

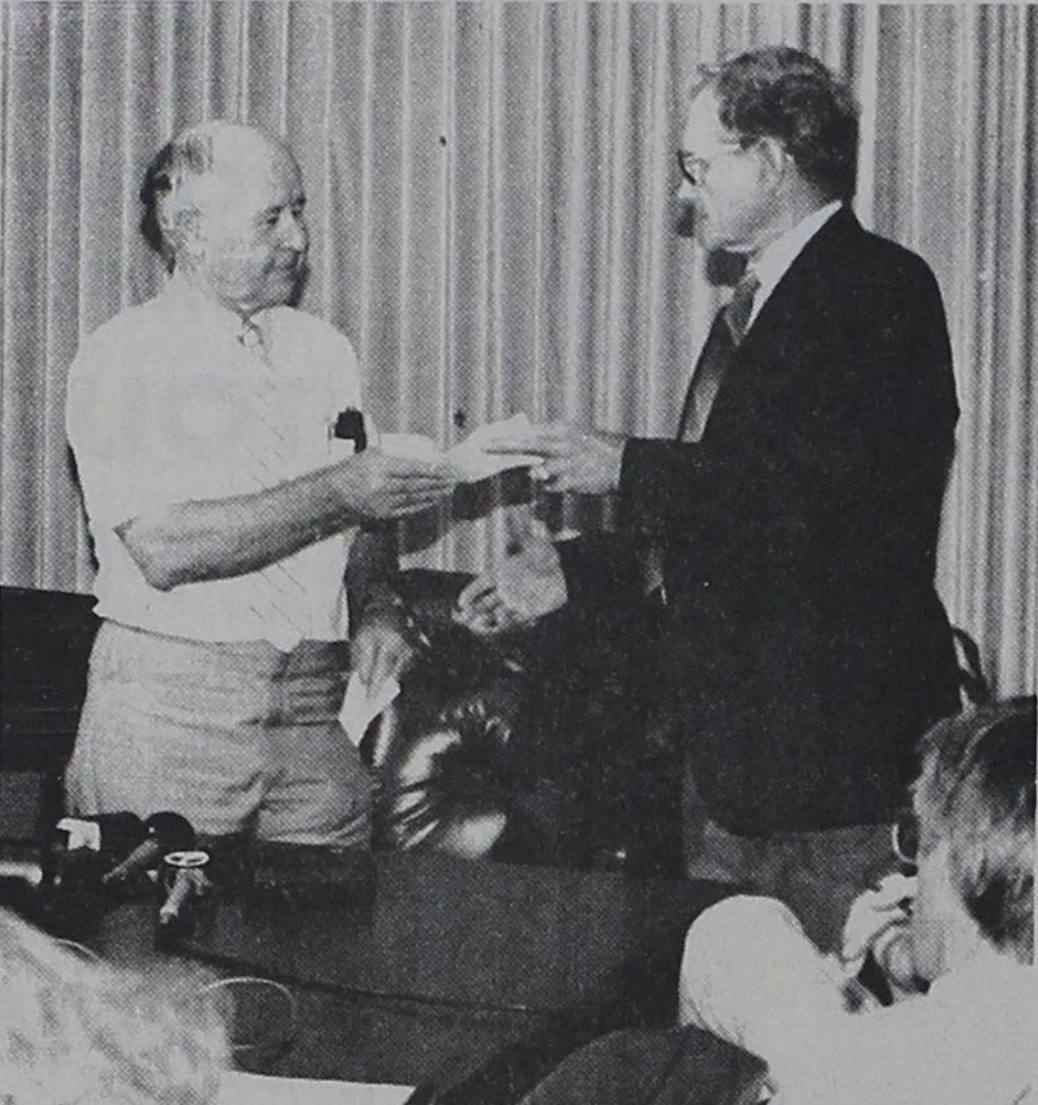
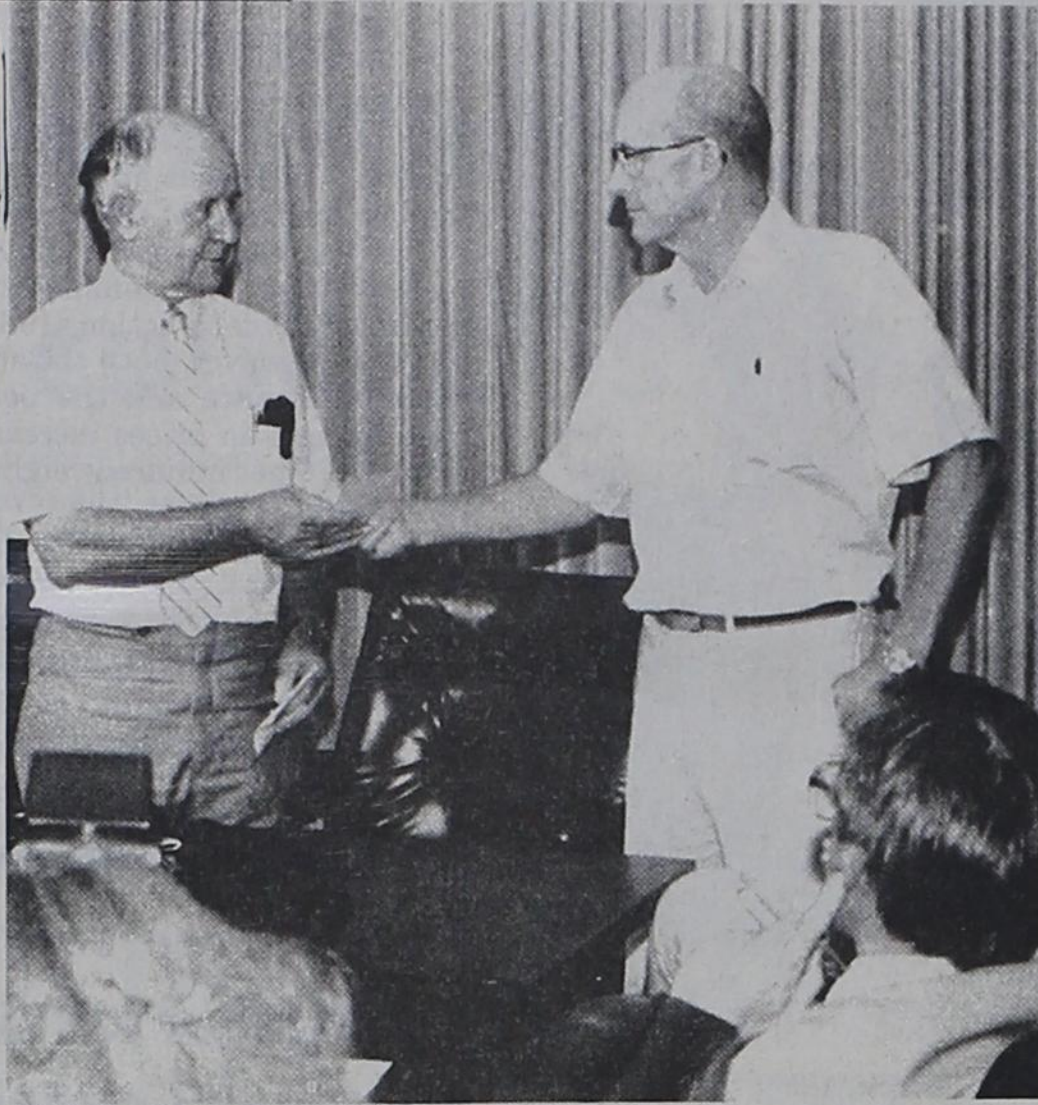
It's bad enough when you're dodging them in your car, but crossing the street at the light is like playing Aggie Roulette.

NISD lists free, reduced schedule

The Nazareth Independent School District is now accepting applications for free and reduced-price lunches.

Applications must be filled out, signed and returned as soon as possible to the school where the student is enrolled.

Applications, which can be picked up at the school, must be accompanied by proof of your last month's income. The application also calls for the listing of total household income listed by the amount received by each household member and the type of income it is (wages, child support, etc.), names of all household members, social security numbers for all household members 21 or over, and the signature of an adult household member.

For a family of three to qualify for the free meals, an-

nual income must not exceed \$11,865. The annual income can be increased by \$2,444 for each additional family member.

For reduced-price meals, annual income for a family of three must not go over \$16,872. \$3,478 may be added to the income limit for each additional family member.

Regular meal prices for the 1986-87 school year will be 70¢ for students in kindergarten through the sixth grade and 90¢ for grades seven through 12. Breakfast prices will be 35¢.

Reduced price lunches will be 40¢ and reduced breakfast will be 30¢.

Resurfacing begins on SH 194 in county

Work resumed August 18 near Plainview on resurfacing a 42.3 mile section of State Highway 194 between Plainview and Dimmitt, according to the State Dept. of Highways and Public Transportation.

Highway officials said work on the Castro County section of the roadway should begin around Aug. 25. The 23.2 mile section of SH 194 to be resurfaced in Castro County is the final portion of a total 45.7 miles of highway to be resurfaced in the county this summer at a cost of \$488,771.

Resurfacing has been completed on sections of FM 1524, FM 145, and FM 168.

The resurfacing, known as a seal coat, helps protect the roads from water and ice damage, and improves skid resistance.

"This type of work is vital if we are going to protect the taxpayer's investment in existing highways," said William M. Pope, highway district engineer in Lubbock.

"It's like the commercial, 'Pay me now, or pay me later.' We want to prevent damage that will be more expensive to

repair later," said Pope.

Motorists are urged to use caution in the construction areas, and observe warning signs.

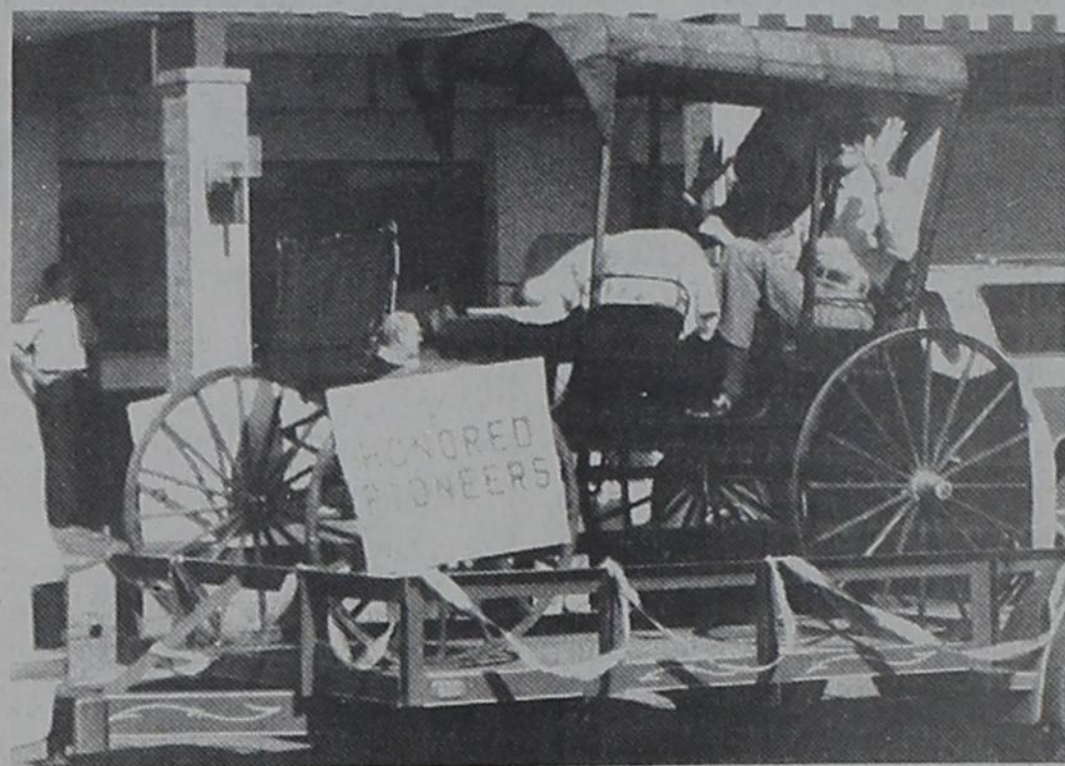

E.E. and Bessie Mae Foster were the 1986 Honored Pioneers, saluted during Saturday's parade.



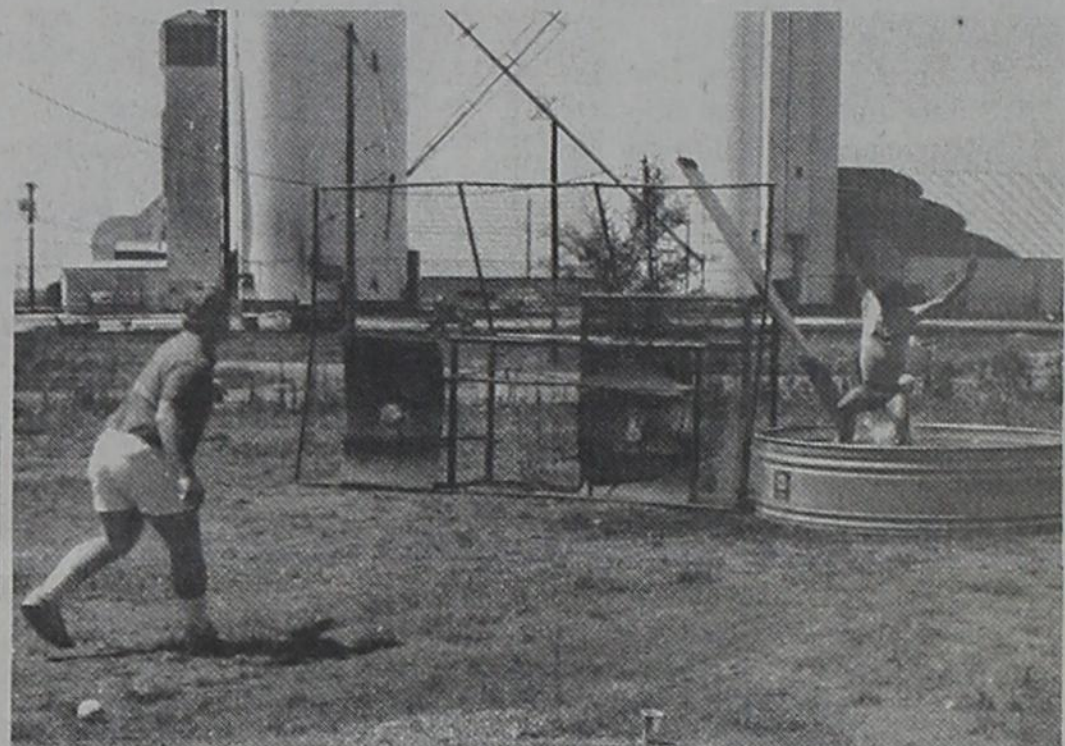

A person who applies for disability under either the Social Security or supplemental security income program may be considered for services offered by the State Vocational Rehabilitation Agency. These services include counseling and guidance, medical and surgical treatment, physical therapy, training in the use of pro-

Applications for disability payments are sent by Social Security to the appropriate agency in the state in which the applicant lives. It is this agency that determines whether the individual is disabled or blind within the meaning of the law.

If it is determined that the available vocational rehabilitation services would assist the applicant in obtaining employment, he or she is interviewed by a counselor. The fact that a person accepts vocational rehabilitation services does not affect his or her eligibility for

disability payments; however, refusing these services will rule out benefit payments unless there is good reason for the refusal.

Although disability checks usually stop shortly after a person's condition improves to the point that he or she can once more work, an exception applies to beneficiaries who were disabled at the time they started an approved vocational rehabilitation plan, but who unexpectedly recover before the program is completed.
