LOOKING At Agriculture

This is the first of a series of articles dealing with agriculture and agricultural programs in Eastland County. The purpose of these articles will be to give local farm and ranch news, which we believe will be of interest to town folks as well as county folks.

The election for 1968 Community Committees has just been completed with the following persons elected: Community A - T. J. Snider, Wayne Eaves, Larry Morrow, J. W. Overstreet, and Durwood Burgess; Community B - N. E. Richardson, Melvin Adams, Morris A. Campbell, J. C. Hathcock, and W. O. Cantwell; Community C - Charles Little, Vern Garrett, Dean Collins, Orval Treadway, and Bobby Tucker; Community D - Lee Starr, N. A. Hagan, Robert Tucker, W. E. Kurklin, and J. H. Reynolds, Sr.; Community E - Clarence Stro-

ebel, Joe Criswell, W. A. Maples, J. W. Gerhardt, and Conrad Schaefer Community F - G. O. Lawson, Kenneth Bostick, VVernon Phillips, Calvin Roady, and G. T. Dawkins. Community committees have an important responsibility to represent their communities on various farm programs. Recommendations for needed changes on programs are listed among their duties, also. A training meeting will be held sometime before Jan. 1 to review current operations.

1968 newly elected community committeemen met at the annual County Convention on Sept. 27. Charles Little was elected to fill the vacancy on the County Committee. He will serve a 3-year term beginning Oct. 1. Charles is actively engaged in agriculture and devotes all of his time toward production of crops and livestock. Other County Committee members are R. G. Lyerla and Paul Norris. Our thanks to Garland Garrett whose term expired and could not serve due to the fact he has accepted full-time employment. Garland

has served on the County Committee since 1962. The County Committee positions as set up at the Convention will be R. G. Lyerla, Chairman; Charles Little, vice Chairman; and Paul Norris, regular member. Committee meetings are held regularly at 9 a. m. each Tuesday. Anyone may attend the meetings. We have been busy the last few days accepting requests for cost-shares on rye, vetch, and winter peas. These practices are widely used in the county due to the tremendous wind control problem in the sandy area. Cost-shares are \$1.40 for rye, vetch, and peas following peanuts, and \$2.75 per acre for vetch and peas on other cropland. The cost-share represents approximately 50 percent of the average cost of carrying out the practice. A total of 6,041 acres had been approved as of Sept. 26. 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Attorney General Asks Support For Police In Riot Prevention

Calling "crime in the streets" the seeds of revolt, State Attorney General Crawford Martin called for support of the police force and good dose of good old fashioned law enforcement to deal firmly with the crimes before the streets run red in revolution. Speaking before a packed audience of Eastland Rotarians, Lions and guests at noon Monday, Gen. Martin added that he believed that "lack of the inner man" is responsible for much of the turmoil which was experienced in riots during the "long, hot summer of 1967."

"The Detroit riot was not a race riot," he said, "it was

a rioting by a race to be sure, but as one Negro man from that town said 'It's just a crazy mess.'"

Explaining his position, he said that law enforcement went to the local level in 1876 in Texas when then-Gov. E. J. Davis delegated civil matters to the attorney general's office, but with the obligation of coordinating the work of the law enforcement agencies including the then-force of 400 Texas Rangers.

Quoting sociologists and others, Gen. Martin sees the riots as the seeds of revolt, but differs with the "blue-ribbon" findings on the elimination of the problems.

The sociologists say that the answer to the problem is the elimination of the scenes of the crime, (clearing of slums, etc., and that it will take some 15 to 20 years to accomplish.)

"The problem is now, not 20 years from now," Gen. Martin said, "and it's now that we must deal with this nightmare — at the scene, on the street, when it happens. I'm all for slum clearance and eradicated poverty. Rioting is not new. If poverty and rioting were synonymous, there sure would have been a lot of rioting in the '30s."

Praising the Texas Ranger force (62 men today), the speaker spoke in their favor of what called one of the most unique organizations in the nation.

"The physical makeup of the mob has not been changed," he said, "and here's what causes a riot: an incident in the middle of an explosive mixture, and prompt, efficient law enforcement will stop it."

Surveys have shown that lack of enforcement, in which policemen and Guardsmen were instructed not to shoot, caused the runaway rioting and looting, he explained.

Rioters were not just the poor, he explained and only about ten per cent of the people in the area actually took part. "Their only similarities were their set of attitudes; they were mad at the world," he said.

The sociologists say that poverty caused the riots. The rioters said themselves in interviews later: "Lack of law enforcement caused the riots."

Gen. Martin was introduced by Program Chairman Jack Arrington and guests included: Charles Clark, Winston Heidenheimer, Jerry Pruitt, J. W. Sitton, Helen and E. P. Crawford, all of Cisco; Judges Ecco Walters and Cecil Collings, Mrs. H. T. Wilson, Ruth Hallmark, Helen Murrell, Judge Frank Sparks, Sgt. Roger Sosebee, Patrolman Bob Rivers, Coach Shirley Frazier, Judge Scott Bailey, Lana Pittman and Kathy Kincaid.

Gen. Martin was accompanied by Dan Turner and Bill Welsh of the attorney general's office. The trio's plane was met at 11 a. m. at Eastland Airport by a delegation including Mayor Frank Deaton, Jack Arrington, Jay Stagg, C. W. Hoffmann Jr., H. V. O'Brien, Dale Bakker, Helen Murrell and Bob Rivers.

The Austin party and the local hosts toured the courthouse offices and the Eastland National Bank before the noon meeting.

Antlerless Deer Permits Will Be Given Out Soon

AUSTIN—Landowners who plan to permit hunting of antlerless deer in regulatory responsibility counties during the 1967 regular hunting season must draw their permits at the time and place publicized in local news media or not hunt antlerless deer this year, according to a statement issued by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission.

This new ruling conforms to Senate Bill 295, passed by the last Legislature. The intent of the act, as written in Section 15, is "to produce a greater degree of uniformity."

Section 6 of the same act prohibits the Department from issuing permits later than ten days prior to the opening of the regular season.

Department authorities said the permits would be issued to landowners sometime during the latter part of October after deer census counts have been completed. The actual date of issuance in counties concerned will be announced later.

Department records for 1966 show that more than 49 per cent of landowners in certain counties, did not draw their permits at the scheduled time and place as announced in local news media.

Since more than 10,000 landowners in regulatory counties drew permits on a state-wide basis in 1966, field personnel of the Department were required to interrupt law enforcement and data gathering activities during the open deer season in order to issue

permits to landowners or their agents who had not drawn permits on the dates selected.

"In many cases, requests by landowners for permits after deadline were difficult to honor as field personnel were away from headquarters and in the field much of the time during this peak period of activity," Department sources said.

The commission suggested absentee landowners designate

a person in the locality to act as agent and draw the permits allocated to properties concerned.

Tidelands Case Is Coming To Forefront Again

Texas Tidelands litigation is coming to the forefront again, State Attorney General Crawford Martin said in impromptu remarks during a speech in Eastland Monday.

Scheduled to argue before the Supreme Court next week, Gen. Martin said the case is one in which the federal government is suing the State of Texas for some \$250 million involving some 46,000 acres of Texas shore-line.

When the tideland bill was passed in the late 1930s it provided that all other states bordering open water would relinquish all off-shore holdings further than three miles out, and Texas, beyond 10.5 miles out.

Now the federal government in its suit, wants that arrangement set up, and based on the coast-line of 1845. This would involve choice Salt Dooil oil areas, Martin said.

Gov. Martin will argue before a seven-man court, he said, with Chief Justice Earl Warren and Thurgood Marshall sitting the hearing out. Warren was attorney general of California at the time of the earlier decision and he has disqualified himself on that ground, and Marshall was U. S. Solicitor General at the time the suit against Texas was filed, so he's not going to sit. (It would have been his first case as a member of the Supreme Court.)

"About half my time is spent with the federal government," Martin said, "half the time they're suing us and the other half, we're suing them."
