This statement shows that total assets made a gain of more than \$250,000 to \$3,678,333 during the past three months. What is more, deposits gained over \$200,000 to \$3,335,728.

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Trustees of Ranger I D S Adopts Budget for 67-68

The Board of Trustees of Ranger Independent School District Tuesday night adopted a budget showing expenditures in 1967-68 of \$283,081 and only \$266,530 in revenue for the year. The deficit will be made up with a balance of \$16,251. The actual planned balance in Operating Funds next Aug. 31 will be \$297 but Supt. James R. Clark told the Board he doubted the revenue would be as high as budgeted and was sure the expense would go over the budget.

Actually, next August a balance of \$10,609 is planned but \$9,709 of it is in the Interest and Sinking Fund and cannot be used for operating the school and \$603 is in the Transportation Fund and cannot be used elsewhere.

Clark said the following revenue is expected: \$99,148 from local taxes based on 91 percent collections which includes \$4,000 in delinquent taxes; \$6,064 from Ranger Junior College and rent on buildings; \$444 from county taxes; \$37,164 from the State based on \$86.35 for each child on the census; \$114,203 in aid from the State for salary and transportation; \$1,300 in supplemental salary aid; \$9,320 in transportation aid; \$681 in reimbursement from the Vocational Education department; and \$1,582 in Title 2 aid or library books for a total income of \$266,530.

Expenses for administration

totals \$22,485 which includes salaries for the superintendent and tax office, printing, postage, travel, diplomas, audit and related expenses of the offices and the board.

Instructional expenses for teachers and principals will total \$185,952.

Library book purchases from Title 2 and local tax money will total \$2,782. Magazines will cost \$370. Audio visual materials will cost \$250 and other library expenses will total \$200. \$1,582 of these expenses will be paid for in Title 2 money from the State.

Teaching supplies will cost \$2,600 with related expenses reaching \$900 and vocational travel and other travel reaching \$1,131.

Total for teaching supplies and library is \$8,183.

No money will be spent for attendance services.

\$100 is budgeted for health services, and \$9,320 is budgeted for transportation. \$6,226 will go for salaries; \$1,054 for payment on two new buses; \$95 for insurance on buses and \$1,951 for gasoline, repairs and parts.

\$20,032 will be spent to operate the plant. \$6,200 will go for salaries of custodians; \$5,510 for heat; \$2,600 for water and sewage; \$1,000 for telephone; \$1,842 for electricity. \$900 will go for supplies such as locks, light bulbs, brooms, soaps, window panes.

\$8,300 will be spent to maintain the plant and equipment.

Bulldogs Sink Vikings 34-12

Two Youths In County Jail After Breaking In Building

Two youths were in the county jail Friday morning after being taken into custody by the Ranger Police Department for Thursday.

The youths, ages 17 and 18 were picked up by the City Patrolman, Benny Mosley after they had taken a speaker and amplifier from the new Commercial State Bank building which is under construction. Also taken was a generator from a pickup which belonged to one of the men working on the building.

The youths were turned over to the County Sheriff Department and confessed to taking the items. They went with the Sheriff about six miles west of Ranger where they had buried the speaker in a suit case, the police reported.

One of the youths was also taken in by the Ranger Police Department for the burglary of the First Christian Church in Ranger a few weeks ago.

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Fixed charges for insurance will total \$2,200.

Total expenses through this item is \$255,692. This average out to about \$419 per pupil per year in average daily attendance.

\$13,000 will be spent for principal on bonds and \$3,780 will be spent on interest or a total of \$16,780. This will leave a balance owed on the bonds for the old building of \$365,000.

The tax rate remains the same for 67-68 at \$1.50 per \$100 valuation based on 30 percent of value. Of this amount, \$1.15 goes to operate the schools and 35 cents goes for the bond payments on the building debt. The assessed valuation of the district is \$5,298,710.

In other action the trustees elected Mrs. Herman Alsop as a remedial teacher in junior high school on the Title I program. Her name had been left off the list of teachers employed earlier by accident.

It was voted to charge 30 cents a mile for miles traveled by school buses on extra trips such as football, band class trips, basketball. The school will not make an actual charge to groups except to those outside the school system. The board also voted to charge the Transportation Fund \$100 a month for rent, utilities and insurance on the bus garage.

Young School boiler had not passed inspection and would require much work if finally passed. The money is not in the budget for the work, he said. A boiler inspector was due in Ranger Wednesday. The inspector said he hopes to get the State to approve the boiler after certain work is done but eventually another boiler will have to be installed at a cost of about \$6,000.

They also were told Olden Schools had bought the old football scoreboard and the money put in the Athletic Fund.

\$600 in taxes were dropped from the rolls after Clark told the board that the persons owing these taxes did not live in the district but had bought their car license in a State law to evade paying taxes on their car in their home district. Their tax notices had all been returned by the Post Office since they had no box or forwarding address.

Other business discussed included sick leave for a teacher, football injuries, a pay

Billy, who is the son of E. E. Young and grandson of Mrs. Tom Young of Ranger, recently appeared on television with two others from his unit in An Khe.

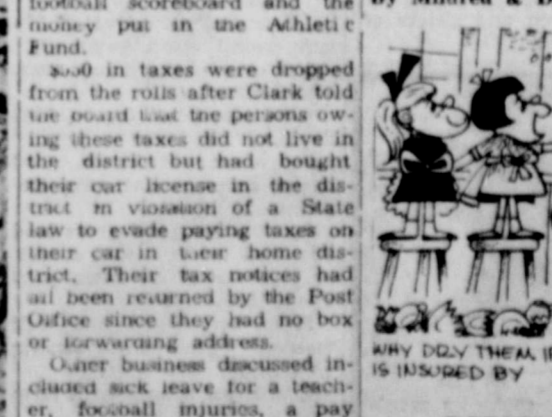
Dr. Reynolds Makes Appointment Changes

The Ranger Bulldogs won their sixth straight victory here Friday night by defeating the Nolan Vikings of Fort Worth, 34-12, in a non-conference game.

Nolan received the kickoff at the opening of the game and gained only 7 yards in three tries before they were forced to punt. Ranger took possession of the ball and with the strong defense of Nolan, could not move the ball after making only three yards in three carries and had to punt.

The Vikings started a drive which netted 13 yards and a first down before they were forced to punt.

The Bulldogs, with Tom Fox, III, and Ricky Squyres, carried the ball and picked up 56 yards on 8 plays before the first quarter ended.

Fox and Squyres carried the ball down to the Nolan three yard line as Tom Golemon, on a keeper play, ran over left guard for the first touchdown of the game for the Bulldogs. Charlie Orms' extra point try was good.

The Vikings took the lead after TD kick-off as Quarterback David Straley passed to End David Evans for 65 yards and a touchdown. The extra point try was blocked and the first half of the game ended with the Bulldogs leading 13-6.

After the half-time activities, the Bulldogs received the kick-off and rushed for 32 yards to set up the third touchdown for Ranger. Golemon took the ball and passed to Rudy Mendoza for 29 yards and a touchdown. The point after by Orms was good.

Nolan received the ball after the kick-off and on the first play, fumbled. Ranger recovered and started another drive but the Nolan defensive team tightened and the Bulldogs were forced to punt.

The Vikings held the ball for three plays with Quarterback Paul Gonzales handing to Vernon Evans as he picked up three yards on the first-down-and-four yards on the second. On third down, Gonzales tried a pass to Arthur Alms which was no good and the Vikings got off a 36 yard punt as the Bulldogs took over.

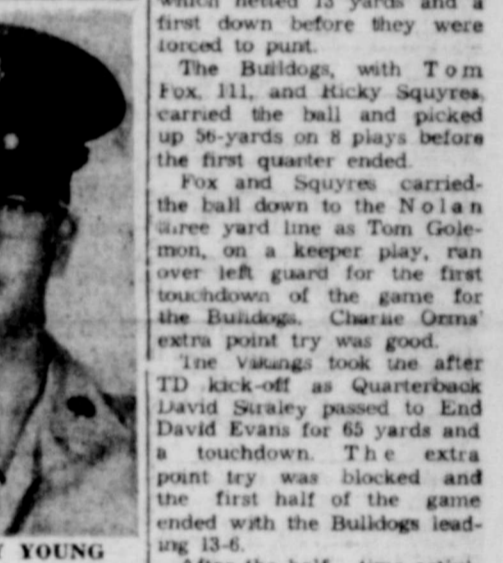
With two plays used up for no gain Bulldog Quarterback Tom Golemon, on an option play to Ricky Squyres, ran to his right and Squyres tried a pass to Golemon for 10 yards and another Bulldog touchdown. Extra point attempt by Orms was good.

The Bulldogs kicked to Nolan after the TD and after the Vikings held the ball for two downs, fumbled and the Bulldogs recovered on the 10-yard line.

On the first down after the Bulldogs took possession of the ball, Golemon passed to Charlie Orms for the final ten yards and another Bulldog touchdown. The extra point kick by Orms was good.

Two minutes deep in the fourth quarter the Vikings fumbled and the Bulldogs recovered. On the first play the Bulldogs fumbled and Nolan again took possession of the ball. Nolan's quarterback attempted a pass which was intercepted by Rudy Mendoza of the Bulldogs.

The Bulldogs started a line drive which overed 23 yards and a first down before QB Raymon Jimenez fumbled and Nolan recovered the ball. On the first play by Nolan the ball was fumbled and Brad



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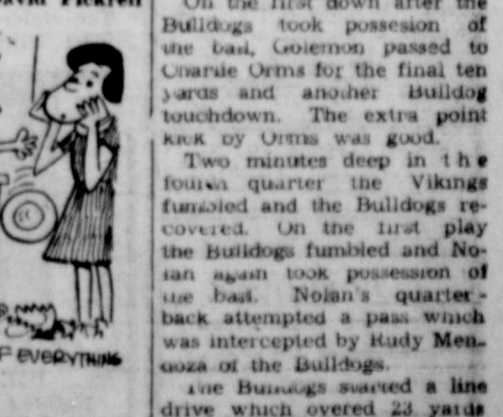
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Cisco Chosen As Site For 1967 Pecan Show

The 1967 Eastland County Pecan Show will be held in Cisco on Dec. 8 and 9. It was announced by A. D. Ellington, president of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association.

The site of the show was determined by a mail-in vote of the membership. Ballots were counted Oct. 11 by C. E. Smith, treasurer, and De Gordon, secretary, and verified by Mr. Ellington.

The show will be sponsored by the pecan growers association and the Cisco Chamber of Commerce.

Eastland and Rising Star also invited the association to have the pecan show in their cities. Mr. Ellington said the association wishes to thank the cities of Eastland and Rising Star for their interest in hosting the pecan show.

A total of 40 nuts of any variety constitutes an entry in the show. They may be mailed or left at the Cisco Chamber of Commerce or the county agent's office in Eastland. If an entry wins first, second or third place in the county show it will be sent to the regional show in Abilene.

A total of 10 nuts are used each time from each entry and judged to determine kernel content, thinness of shell, and weight of the nuts. Native, variety seedlings, and improved varieties are welcome from all surrounding counties and nuts that win from counties that do not have pecan shows will be sent to the regional show.

Other events connected with the pecan show such as a bake sale, center-piece arrangement and pecan queen contest will be published at a later date.

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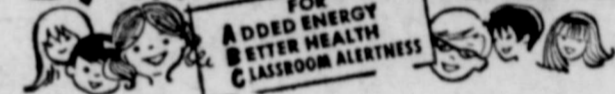
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
