# GI Insurance Dividend Will Be Paid Soon

WACO - Veterans holding Il insurance policies will reeive \$223 million in dividends during 1968, Jack Coker, Man-ager of the Veterans Adminstration Regional Office in

Waco said today. Dividends will be paid on the anniversary dates of the policies with dividend pay-

ments beginning Jan. 1. For approximately four million World War II veterans, their National Service Life Insurance dividends will total \$208 million. The average payment will be \$52. The 1967 dividend totaled \$196 mil Plastic and Insulating lion. Individual payments av-

ereged \$46. The dividend for some 190,-000 World War I veterans with United States Government Life Insurance will total \$15 million, with payments averaging \$79. The 1967 dividend also totaled \$15 million but av-

eraged \$3 less.
While dividends will vary according to play, age and amount of insurance coverage, Coker pointed out that veterans who converted their GI insurance to permanent pans will get higher dividends in 1968 because of increased interest earnings on reserves. Modified life insurance polices will not share ninext year dividend since premium rates for 212,00 veterans holding these policies are so near actual costs that no surplus has

accumulated.
About half of the four million World War II NSLI poli-cies are "Permanent jlan" Coker said. By contrast, all but 2,500 of the USGLI policies held by 190,00 World War veterans are permanent

The 1968 dividend will make the 19th straight year in which an annual dividend has been paid on NSLI policies. It will also bring to approximately \$7.2 billion the amount of dividends paid on NSLI po-licies since 1957.

Dividends were first paid on USGLI policies in 1919. Since that time, and including the 1968 payment, about \$700 million in USGLI dividenids have been paid.


