Trust Fund Set Up for Students

The bulk of the estate of the late Leon Maner, long-time Cisco business and civic leader who died last January 31, was left in a trust fund that will send graduates of Cisco High School and Cisco Junior College to the University of Texas.

This fact was revealed when Mr. Maner's will was filed for probate in the Eastland County Court last week. The will left the First Baptist Church of Cisco securities worth about \$15,000, to be used by the church as it sees fit. This gift will go to the church in the name of Mr. Maner and Mrs. Maner, both deceased.

Securities worth more than \$150,000 were left in trust to the board of trustees and officers of the Ex-Students Association of the University of Texas, Austin. Under terms of the will, the income from the trust will "Provide scholarships to exceptional graduates at Cisco High School and Cisco Junior College as undergraduate students at the University of Texas."

The will provides for Austin officials of the Ex-Students Association to notify Cisco school authorities soon after January 1 of each year as to the amount of money available for use during the coming year. It was expected that some plan would be worked out to select the students and to regulate the amount of the scholarship.

The will requires that ten per cent of the earnings of the trust each year will be added to the principal, leaving 90 per cent for use in providing scholarships. Observers estimated that this should be from \$6,000 to \$8,000 per year.

The First National Bank of Cisco was named trustee of the estate to see that provisions of the will are carried out.

Personal effects, including his home and furnishings were willed to relatives of his late brother and to relative of Mrs. Maner. The Leon Maners had no children.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Maner were long-time members of the First Baptist Church. They had lived in Cisco since 1919. Mrs. Maner died in 1956, and Mr. Maner passed away recently. He was a pharmacist and owned an operated City Drug Company for many years. He was a graduate of the University of Texas and was an ardent supporter of the school.

Last summer, Mr. Maner created a trust fund worth more than \$50,000 with the income to be used in buying books for a special Texas department of the planned Leon Maner Memorial Library on the campus of Cisco Junior College.

James P. McCracken, president of the First National Bank, called the Leon Maner will "a real and lasting gift to the boys and girls of Cisco." "All Cisco should be very proud of this fine legacy left by Mr. Maner, who was a real Texan and an outstanding booster of Cisco all of his useful life. The provisions of his will provides educational opportunities for our young people from now on.

"This educational trust fund plus his gifts in the form of a library trust to Cisco Junior College and to his church can certainly be regarded as evidence that Leon Maner loved Cisco and people, and I feel quite sure that all Cisco sincerely appreciate Leon Maner's gift to us."

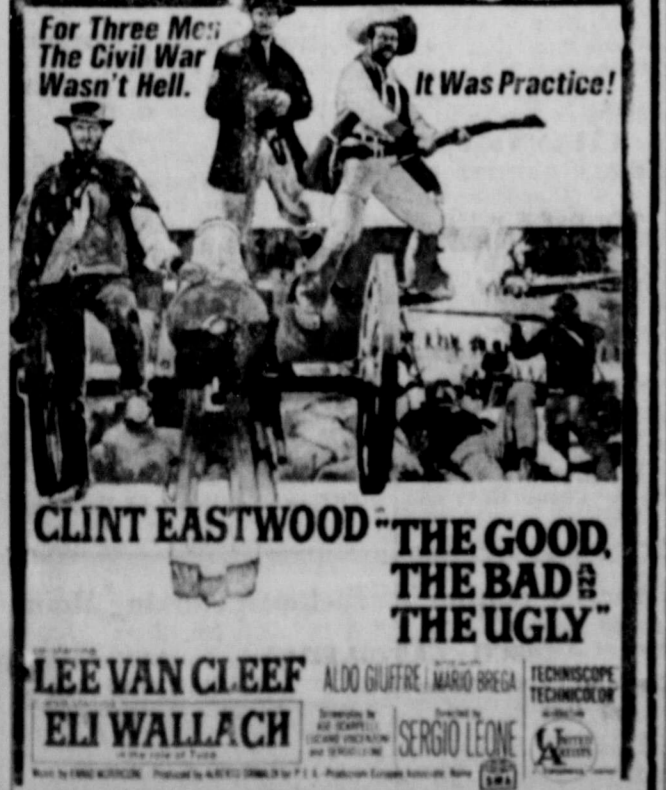

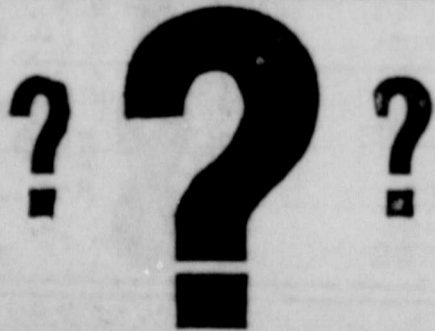

Report On Nutria Study Is Made At Weekly Cisco Lions Club Luncheon

A report on a study of Nutria, a rodent transplanted to this area in the 1950's, was made by Gerald T. DeVinney, Cisco Junior College biology instructor, as the program feature last Wednesday noon at the Victor Hotel dining room. Lion Wesley Valek was the program chairman.

Mr. DeVinney undertook the study some three years by the City of Cisco and ago. Nutria were obtained turned loose in the Lake Bernie area as an effort to rid the lake of cat-tails and water lilies. The rodents thrived for a time and then began disappearing.

The Nutria is a native of South America. Mr. DeVinney reported, and was first introduced to this country in 1890 — in California. In 1937, Nutria were taken to Louisiana to replace the depleted muskrats for their pelts. They are now found in most of the gulf states.

It has been determined that the Nutria soon move from their native foods of cattails and water plants into nearby fields and devour grain crops. Mr. DeVinney reported. Several years ago, the rice farmers of the South Texas area declared war on Nutria, offering bounties on them, he pointed out.

Mr. DeVinney's study here and elsewhere in the state led to an invitation for him

to address a science meeting last August.

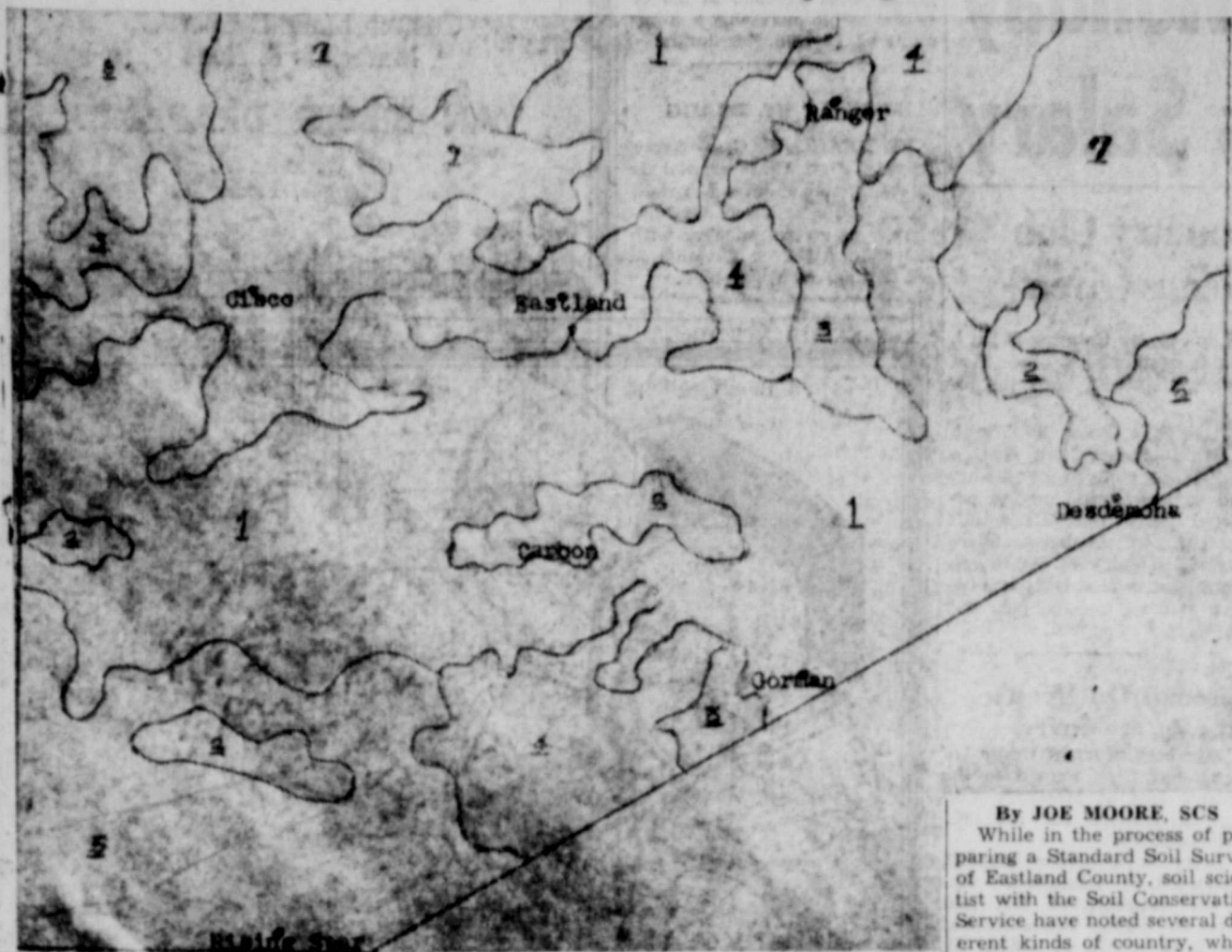

1. CHANEY-MORVAL ASSOCIATION: Deep soils with thin sandy surface layers.
2. PATILO-ARENOSA ASSOCIATION: Nearly level to undulating deep "blow sands."
3. TABOSA-THURBER ASSOCIATION: Deep, fine textured, nearly level to gently sloping upland soils.
4. HENSLEY-LINDY ASSOCIATION: Shallow to deep, loamy soils of the limestone uplands.
5. PEDERNALES-MENARD ASSOCIATION: Moderately deep to deep, gently sloping to sloping upland soils.
6. LEWISVILLE-ALTOGA ASSOCIATION: Gently sloping to steep, clayey limestone upland soils.
7. EXRAY-BONTI ASSOCIATION: Gently sloping to steep, stony soils with clayey subsoils and rapid runoff.
8. KAVETT-VALERA ASSOCIATION: Shallow to deep, stony limestone upland soils.
9. BONTI-TRUCE ASSOCIATION: Medium textured, gently sloping to sloping acid upland soils.

greatly among themselves in some properties; for example, slope, depth and stoniness. Thus, the general map does not show the kind of soil at any particular place, but a pattern that has in it several kinds of soils.

The general map showing patterns of soils is useful to people who want a general idea of the soils, who want to compare different parts of the county, or who want to know the possible location of good-sized areas suitable for a certain kind of farming or other land use.

There are ten soils associations in Eastland County. The small scale of the map pictured above limits the detail and reduced the associations to nine, but gives a general idea of the pattern of occurrence. In future editions of this newspaper, a detailed description of each association will be given, describing the soils occurring in the association and how they are generally used.

When the survey is completed, these different kinds of country will be broken down to individual kinds of soils. Each kind of soil will be defined giving the slope, erosion, depth, permeability and many other characteristics.

While in the process of preparing a Standard Soil Survey of Eastland County, soil scientist with the Soil Conservation Service have noted several different kinds of country, which are called soil associations. The general soils map pictured above shows these associations.

As a rule, each association contains a few major soils and several minor soils in a pattern that is characteristic, although not strictly uniform. Eastland County is noted as a complex assortment of soils occurring in transition areas between major land areas on all sides.

The soils within any one association are likely to differ

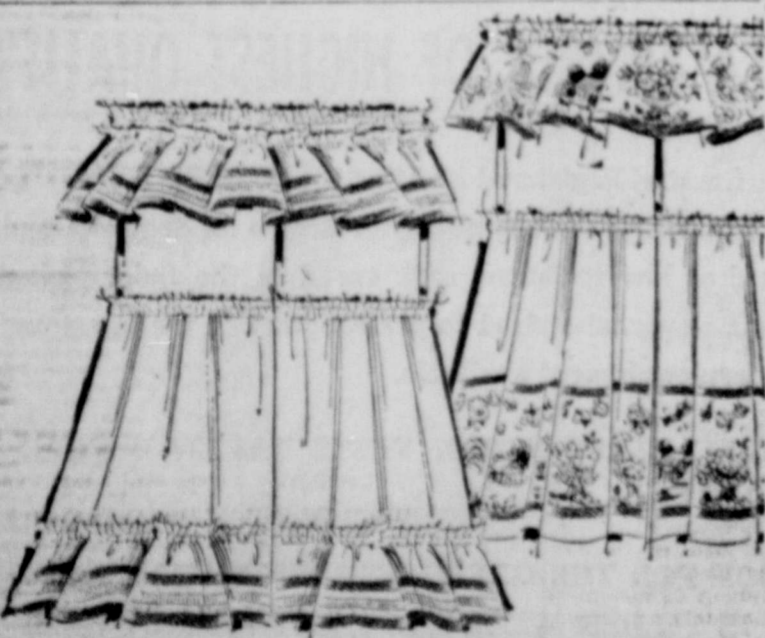
