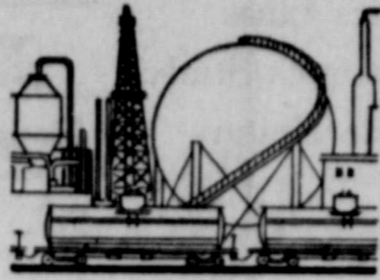

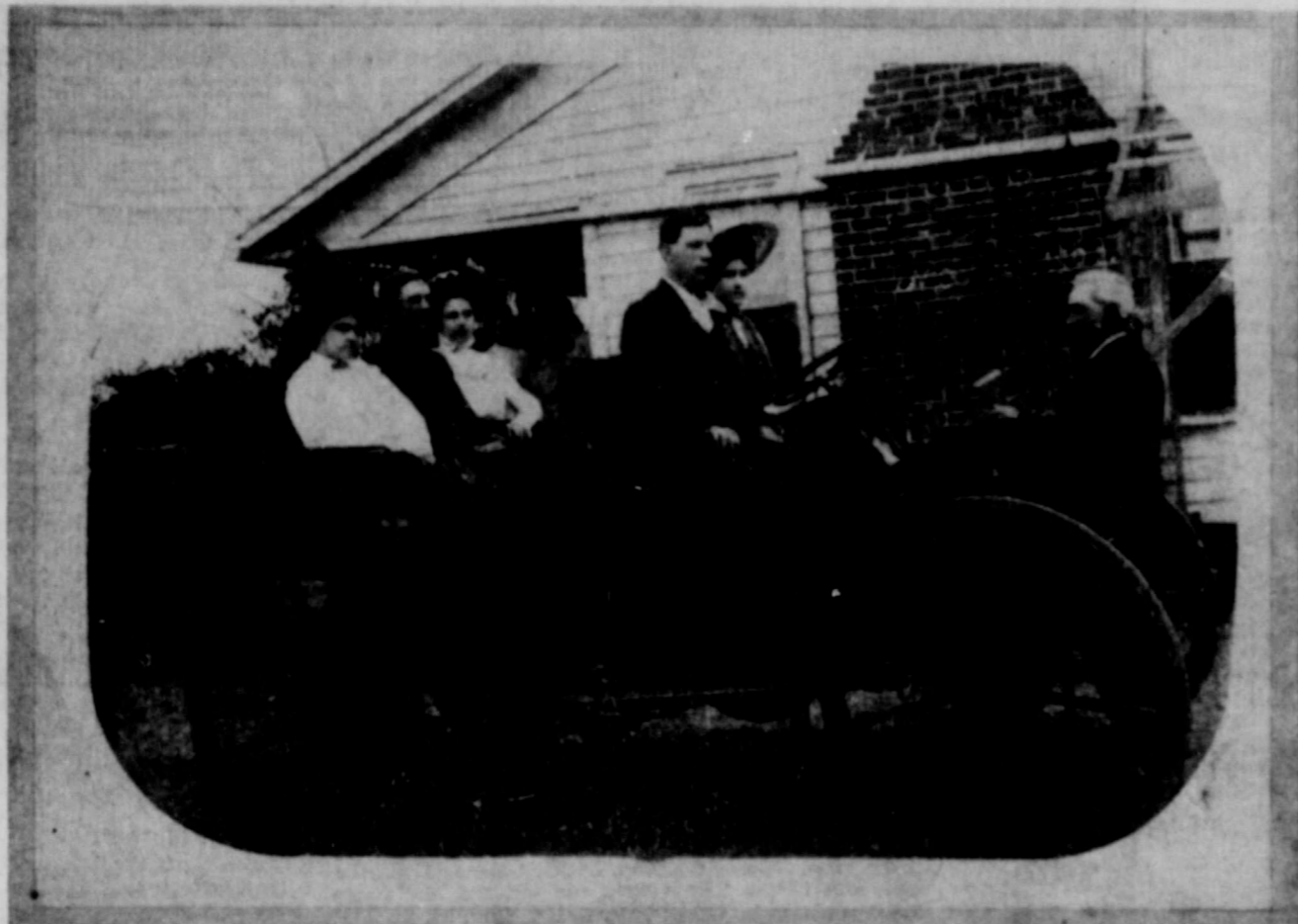
Wonder how long it takes him to read a newspaper?

Don't become confused, all autos of this vintage were driven from the right side. The lady on the left is not the driver, although in seasons to follow she will probably take over. This reminds me of a story: A gentleman suddenly found himself before the Pearly Gate and was cordially greeted by St. Peter. The man was rather confused and asked how it happened that he was there. St. Peter smilingly replied "Don't you remember your wife saying, 'Be an angel and let me drive.'"

However, in this affair I will have to plead guilty as being the aggressor, as on the sunny Sunday afternoon of March 7 1909 I cranked into action this International Har-

vester Co. version of an automobile (horseless carriage) which I had just sold to the gentleman seated in the rear of the picture. I had enticed the lady at my side to go with us for a wild ride of breathtaking speed of 12 to 15 miles per hour, the limit due to condition of the road and for safety of the occupants.

The collection was taken while the Horace Horton family attended a wedding rehearsal dinner for their daughter, Donna, and Jackie Wayne Lyles who were married Saturday night in Denton.

The guns were prominently displayed in the new Horton home. High ladders were necessary for burglars to have removed the guns. Two of the guns were used in the Santa Claus Bank robbery in Cisco in December, 1927. They were at the Cisco Bank, where they have been on loan since last year when the bank celebrated its 50th anniversary.

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Congress Given 15 Proposals Of Interest To Vets

DALLAS—Fifteen specific legislative and administrative proposals are included in President Johnson's recent address to Congress on veterans' issues.

(1) To increase the low cost group life insurance now available to members of the Armed Forces from the present maximum of \$10,000 to \$30,000.

(2) To protect disabled veterans, widows and children against disproportionate pension loss as a result of increases in other income such as Social Security.

(3) To increase the maximum portion of a GI loan that can be guaranteed by the government from \$7,500 to \$10,000.

(4) To permit part-time VA vocational rehabilitation training so service-disabled veterans can improve their skills while working at a regular job.

(5) Enactment of a resolution expressing the sense of Congress that private employers should give job priority to returning servicemen.

(6) To provide incentives to channel the talents of returning Viet Nam servicemen into teaching in deprived areas or serving as policemen, firemen and hospital workers.

The President also recommended expanded VA services in Viet-Nam and in military hospitals and military separation points. Further proposed were 20 new one-stop VA Assistance Centers in larger cities.

Other recommendations were:

(1) Directing the Department of Defense to double participation in its "Project 100,000" which provides military training for young men who would otherwise be rejected on educational or physical grounds.

(2) Directing the Defense Department to extend its "Project Transition" with a goal of training 500,000 disadvantaged men for civilian jobs before they leave service.

The Eastland County Livestock Show will be held Mar. 14, 15 and 16. Many people are at work to make this a very successful show this year. The people of Eastland County can be proud of their county livestock show. I know of no county in the state that has a better county show.

The county show is planned and conducted by the directors of the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association. This group of about 35 men meet each month from September through April making plans for the show. They give many hours of their time to planning and working to improve the show and show barn facilities.

Recently the directors sold ads for the livestock show catalog. Money from these ads are awarded to the boys and girls as premiums for the livestock they exhibit.

would like to thank the businesses and individuals for supporting the county livestock show in this way. About 273 businesses and individuals purchased ads in the catalog.

Individuals may also help support the show by buying one dollar membership cards. During the sale on Saturday night, March 16, there will be a drawing for a free dressed beef. A name will be drawn from the membership list.

The directors and officers of the Livestock Raisers Association are giving a lot of their time and labor to improve the facilities at the show barn. These men were very discouraged last week when they discovered that some of the material which they had worked to install had been torn down and stolen.

Big plans are also being made for the Cisco Livestock Show March 8 and 9. The people of Cisco are justly proud of their livestock show.

Demand for fertilizer is high and because of wet fields have caused delays in getting plant food distributed, a real rush is expected when fields are dry enough for working. The best way to be sure that you have the right type and amount of fertilizer when you need it is to get it on order now or even perhaps better in the barn. And if you need spreader or applicator equipment, better get an order in early for its use. Once fields are dry enough to permit use of the equipment, it may be hard to come by.

If fertilizer is purchased in bags, here are a couple of storage tips. Be sure to give it room by leaving an air space between each stack of bags. Always store fertilizer in a dry place. Don't place bags on a dirt or concrete floor because they'll pick up moisture and get lumpy and caked up. It isn't a good idea to stack fertilizer more than eight bags high. Keep fertilizer away from animals since it is food for plants and not for animals.

MARCH 3 IS BIRTHDAY OF ALEXANDER G. BELL

Alexander Graham Bell was born 121 years ago, March 3. He had no formal education, yet he became one of America's greatest inventors. He perfected the first phonograph records, developed a machine that was the forerunner of the iron lung, designed the first air-conditioning system and invented the first telephone.

Bell never considered himself an inventor, per se. Classing himself as a teacher of the deaf, his life-long effort to help them made him one of America's greatest inventors.

Early in his career, Bell invented a device which could transmit sound over a light beam for short distances. The principles of his "photophone" were later applied to the motion picture sound track and the transistor. His "Vacuum Jacket" predecessor of the iron lung in use today, a metal probing instrument and experiments with kites led him to fame. He foresaw the coming of air power and, as early as 1919 developed a plane-like boat which set a record speed of

70.86 miles per hour. He invented a method for detecting icebergs at sea, as well as a calculating device that was the forerunner of today's dephtometer and sonar devices. Bell defined an inventor as a man who looks upon the world and is not content with things the way they are. He wants to improve whatever he sees, he wants to benefit the world; he is haunted by an idea, the spirit of invention possesses him, seeking materialization.

Thus, without realizing it, Alexander Graham Bell described himself.

County To Send Group To Field Day at McGregor

Several Eastland County farmers and ranchers have indicated they would take part March 7 in the annual Beef Cattle Field Day at the Livestock and Forage Research Center near McGregor.

The Eastland County group will be especially interested in the following progress reports which will be made at the early weaning of calves when depleted grazing forces the cattlemen to feed. County Agricultural Agent De Gordon says scientists at the center explain that when grazing is poor the feed should be put, not into the cow for making milk, but into the calf for making beef.

The use of low-cost proteins for wintering cows with calves on native pasture. Research at McGregor shows that, at the present time, urea feed mix is more economical than feather meal and cottonseed meal. Although the animals relish the feather meal, at \$100 per ton it is too expensive.

The value of hybrid vigor which has been proved in the massive cross-breeding program at the center. Scores of different crossbreeds will be paraded in the show ring for the visitors. Gordon says the cross-breeding research has also proved the rancher's need of purebred sires.

The morning session of the field day will begin at 9:30, with guided tours of the many cattle pens in which research is being conducted. The world's largest herd of mother cows used exclusively for research is at the center.

Master of ceremonies will be Charles E. Ball of Dallas, field editor of Farm Journal magazine. Lunch will be dutch treat, and will be catered by the Walter Jetton Corporation of Fort Worth.

The center, which is a unit in the College of Agriculture at Texas A&M University, is 3 1/2 miles south of McGregor via Highway 317 and 2 miles west via farm to market road 2671.

4. Only qualified voters residing in the "Ranger Precinct" and the "Eastland Precinct" as defined hereinabove who own taxable property therein and who have rendered the same for taxation shall be entitled to vote at said election.

5. Mr. Dewey C. Cox, Jr., from Ranger and Mr. Glyn Gilliam from Ranger and Mr. T. M. Fullen from Eastland and Mr. Charles Freyschlag from Eastland have made application to have their names printed on the ballot and such applications are hereby granted. The ballot, however, shall be large enough to permit the writing of other names.

6. Each voter in the respective precincts shall leave on the ballot the names of the two candidates for whom he wishes to vote. The two candidates in each precinct receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected.

7. No person shall be elected a director unless he resides in and owns taxable property within one of the precincts comprising this District. No member of the governing body of the City of Eastland or the City of Ranger shall be

elected as a director.

8. Notice of said election shall be publishing a copy of this order in the Ranger Times and the Eastland Telegram, newspapers of general circulation published within the District, one time. Such publication to be at least ten days before April 2, 1968, the date set herein for said election.

Museum Institute Is Planned By State History Committee

AUSTIN—"Because of the growing interest across Texas in the establishment and the maintenance of museums, both large and small, the Texas State Historical Survey Committee will hold their second official Texas Small Museum Institute in Fort Worth on Mar. 15 and 16."

The announcement was made by Charles R. Woodburn, of Amarillo, president of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee. The Committee is the state agency that has spearheaded the development of historical museums at the local level.

The Smithsonian Institute of Washington, D. C. will again be participating in the Institute to be held at the Fort Worth Childrens Museum.

In September 1966 (at the time of the first Small Museum Institute), Texas could count 243 museums open

while another 74 were in various stages of planning. Today, this figure has increased to 275 with another 166 museums reported developing. Many of these are small museums seeking to preserve local and regional heritage.

Small museums are hampered in establishment and operation because they have no organized source of professional guidance and few publications to refer to for information.

This is the reason the Survey Committee is sponsoring this second institute which will deal with small museum needs.

All phases of museum operation will be discussed and workshop sessions using the Childrens Museum facilities (nationally recognized for its trend-setting programs and exhibits) will be held. Topics for the workshop sessions include educational programs, exhibits, natural science, astronomy accession, budgeting, financing and gift shops.

An announcement has been sent to county historical survey committees, all museums, chambers of commerce and various state agencies.

The Institute is open to all interested in museums and their workings. The registration fee is \$12.50. Those interested in attending should contact the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, P. O. Box 12276, Austin 78711, for further details.

Large Quota Is Seen For Draft

Texas draft boards next month must furnish the largest monthly quota of young men for military service in nearly two years.

Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said the local boards have been called on to provide 1,948 men — most since the 2,012-man quota of November, 1966. Low point in the interim was 674 men last February.

This year's monthly quotas have been 1,165 men in February and 1,659 in January. National call for March induction is 39,000 men. All are for the Army.
