Huge Crowd Expected For Annual Kendrick Easter Pageant Sunday

Plans are complete for the annual Kendrick Family Easter Pageant at their farm be-

side Interstate 20 (Highway 80) midway between Cisco and Eastland at 3:30 a. m. Sunday, April 14.

Preparations have been made to handle some 10,000 cars and for many thousands of expected visitors to occupy seats in the large boiling green in front of the 360-foot stage complex.

A cast of more than 100 friends and neighbors of the Kendrick family will present the pageant — The Life of Christ, Moses and John the Baptist in 60 scenes that will be shown on 12 stages.

Ranger Bulldog To Appear In "Texas Football" Magazine

Tom Fox, III, Ranger High School sophomore, received a letter from the Southwest Sports Publication, Inc., Waco, stating they were carefully surveying all the high schools in Texas which played to state championship and from the reports of the high school coaches—some 850 this year—and from Southwest Conference sources to compile the massive details of schoolboy section which appears annually in "Texas Football" magazine.

Charlie Smith, coach of the Ranger Bulldogs, stated that Tom was one of the finest fullbacks he had coached and was looking for some fine playing from Tom in the 1968 season.

Tom is the son of Mr. and

Mrs. Tom Fox of this city. The statistics on Tom for the past two football seasons were reported by his coach. Tom is a 6'2, 195 pound sophomore. In the 1966 season he carried the ball 161 times, gaining 580 yards in 1967 he carried the ball for 184 times and 861 yards. He averaged 5.1 yards per carry during the two-year period.

Fox was named All-District on both offense and defense in 1966 and 1967. He caught 33 passes for 365 yards and scored 16 touchdowns and eight extra points for a total of 104 points during the past two football seasons.

Coach Smith also said Tom would be the punter for the 1968 Ranger Bulldogs this season.

Building STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS! In homes: The corner of the basement toward the tornado usually offers greatest safety, particularly in frame houses.

4. If in schools: In city areas: If school building is of strongly reinforced construction, stay inside away from windows, remain near an inside wall on the lower floors when possible. In rural schools that do not have strongly reinforced construction, remove children and teachers to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

5. If in factories and industrial plants: On receiving a

tornado warning, a lookout should be posted to keep safety officials advised of the tornado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for moving workers to sections of the plant offering the greatest protection.

6. Keep calm. It will not help to get excited. People have been killed by running out into the streets and by turning back into the path of the tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. Tornadoes cover such a small zone, that relatively only a few places in a warned area are directly affected. You should know about tornadoes though, "just in case."
