

THE GORDON SPOT

Many people are asking for the name of the insecticide that controls honeydew aphid on pecan trees. The insecticide is Di-Syston.

Di-Syston is a systemic chemical which can be absorbed into a plant's sap system. When the aphid feeds on the plant, it gets a dose of the poison. The Di-Syston has proven very effective against black pecan aphid and the yellow or honeydew aphids.

The chemical is spread on the ground under the pecan trees at the rate of 20 pounds per acre or from 1 to 3 pounds under each tree.

The granular chemical should be applied in six foot bands to the soil on both sides of trees under the main drip areas. Fertilizer applicators or grain drills can be adjusted to spread the granules.

Application should be followed as soon as possible with irrigation where water is available. If irrigation water is not available, it's important to time application so that probability of rain will be excellent. That should be no problem since we have been getting a rain every week.

The usual recommended application period is May 1-15, and only one application is permitted per season, and this must be made at least 80 days before harvest. Season long control is most often the rule when proper application and moisture conditions prevail.

Aphid damage most commonly occurs in mid or late summer, so the systemic needs to be applied to prevent this summer build-up and protect the pecans during the late summer period.

The Di-Syston has been cleared for use only by commercial growers and professional applicators. It is a very poisonous chemical and should not be handled by anyone who is not experienced at handling such chemicals. For this reason we discourage Di-Syston use by homeowners on individual trees around the home. However, if a professional applicator could be obtained to apply the Di-Syston, the chemical would be most valuable to home owners. Honeydew is a real problem on yard trees during the summer months.

There has not been any screwworms reported in Eastland County in several years, but livestock owners should be on the alert. Now is a critical period.

The first case in Texas this year was confirmed on March 26, and more cases are being reported. So far these have been reported in South Texas.

Warm weather, humidity, and a large number of wildflowers, weeds, and grasses are also adding to the possibility of more screwworms moving into Texas. This year the potential for screwworm cases is greater than it has been in a number of years.

Livestock owners should check their animals on a day to day basis. Treat all wounds on your livestock. Worms taken from wounds should be sent to the Mission Screwworm Laboratory for identification. If you need vials for the larval samples or instruction on collecting the samples, contact the County Agent's office.

Scholarships Are Provided By A&M Ex-Students At Annual Gatherings

COLLEGE STATION — Aggie Muster at a Possum Kingdom Lake camp is more than a gathering of Texas A&M exes and students to honor Aggies who died in the last year.

Like many musters on the date of the state's independence, it's the only meeting of the year for Aggie exes in Young, Eastland and Shackelford Counties.

It's an eating meeting that often lasts six or more hours. Barbecue and the trimmings, speakers and discussion covering developments at the alma mater over the past year, command proceedings.

The George D. Dickie Jr. A&M Club performs one other function before the Pitcock Camp muster breaks up. Members and guests, usually numbering 60 to 80, contribute to their scholarship fund. The club named for a 1946 A&M graduate supports four students from the five-county area a year.

"We received a whole fistful of checks from the George D. Dickie Jr. Club this year," commented Dorsey McCrory, A&M development director.

The \$825.50 total for 46 checks and two contributions easily surpasses the club's previous top year.

"It's a remarkable and unique thing," McCrory added. Opportunity Award Scholarships made possible by the club are held by David W. Harrell of Albany, a junior agricultural education major; William D. Fisher of Rising Star, sophomore in industrial distribution, and Matthew W. Oualline Jr. of Oiney, junior architecture major, according to Robert M. Logan, student aid director at A&M who administers the awards along with hundreds of others.

Veterinarian and rancher Dr. Richard Hodges of Ranger, club president, said it's usually difficult for all Aggies in the 4,500 square mile area to make it to Possum Kingdom annually.

"We used to rotate muster through each county, but the Pitcock brothers of Graham donated their camp for the purpose. So rather than have someone unsure of where the meeting will be, we are staying with Pitcock Camp," Hodges said. J. Duff Pitcock, a 1947 A&M graduate, is owner-general manager of Pitcock Brothers Concrete.

The club, the only one of several hundred in the state that is named for an individual, established the scholarship fund in honor of George D. Dickie Jr., bound to a wheel chair by polio. The 1946 Aggie graduate in agricultural economics handles club secretarial chores and owns Woodson Lumber Co.

He's only one of three Dickies' at the annual meeting. His father is a 1920 A&M graduate in agriculture and a cousin, Hugh Dickie Jr., was a pre-veterinary medicine major in the class of 1944.

Former Cincinnati Reds catcher Jim Coker, who married a Throckmorton girl, was speaker for the April 20 muster meeting.

Other musters will be called to order April 21 in years hence, but the George D. Dickie Jr. A&M Club will have a tough time topping the 1968 meeting.

An 18-year-old Abilene and his 16-year-old brother are being held in the Taylor County Jail, charged with the April 30 burglary of a Rising Star grocery store, Sheriff L. E. Sublett reports.

Some 245 cartons of cigarettes were taken in the burglary, and other cigarette thefts are expected to be solved with this and coming arrests, the sheriff said. Some 1,000 cartons have been taken in break-ins in Eastland County during the past few months, he said.

Bonds of \$5,000 each have been set against each of the two, who list Fort Phantom as their home.

Rising Star Nightwatchman John Bishop discovered the break-in at 4:45 a. m. and notified then Rising Star Police Chief Charles Thomas who sent out a state-wide alert. Similar burglaries had been staged in Tuscola and Moran. Arrests were made in Breckenridge and the younger of the two is out on probation from Gatesville, the sheriff said.

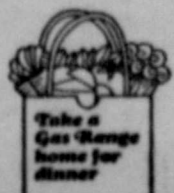
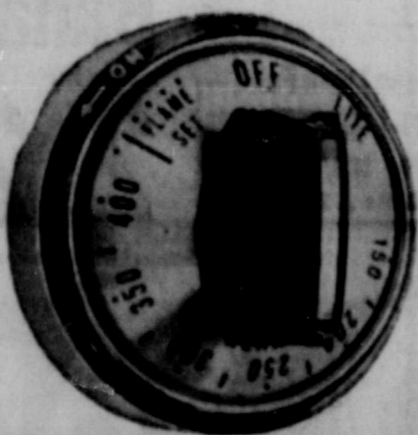
