Due To ADA Additional Teachers To Be Employed In Local School

An increase in average daily attendance in the Ranger Public Schools will permit an additional teacher to be employed with the State paying most of the cost.

The average daily attendance for white students was 595 this past term and for negro students it was 14.

This will qualify the Ranger Schools for 25 classroom teachers instead of 24 last year. Supt. James R. Clark said that a teacher in the high school formerly paid from Title I funds would now be paid from State funds so the change is purely a financial change.

The average daily attendance as of Monday, June 10, in the first three grades was 63-97, 54.70 and 54.10 for a total white ADA of 172.77. Negro ADA was 4.70, 98 and 144 for a total of 7.12 students in average daily attendance.

At Young in grades 4, 5 and 6 the white ADA was 53.10, 4.76 and 45.71 for a total of 146.57. Negro ADA was 1.56, .91 and none in the sixth

In the junior-senior high school the white ADA for the grades 7-12 was 50.79, 45.22, 54.28, 50.65, 37.36 and 37.14 for a total of 275.44. Negro ADA was 1.96 in the seventh, 1.72 in the tenth, .94 in the eleventh for a total of 14.21 for the entire junior-senior high.

The combined ADA for white and negro for this year was 609 students present each day. Last year it was 582, the year before it was 579. Earlier than that it was 599, 668 and 709 in 1961-62.

Ranger lost several teachers since 1961-62 due to decrease in average daily attendance.

Young Workers Need SS Cards

Every year at this time thousands of young men and women get a job during their summer vacation and then return to school in the fall.

Those students getting a job for the first time will need a Social Security Number to give to their employer so he can withhold their income tax and their social security tax. Most of them will get back the income tax come next January, but Social Security checks and Medicare are quite a few years away.

If you work on a summer job, talk to your employer about your W-2 form. Make sure that he knows where to mail it to you so you can file a tax return and claim a refund if you have one coming. Ordinarily you will receive a refund of all income taxes withheld, unless you make more than \$900 during the year.


