Musgrove Is Honored At Barbecue Meeting

Some 300 people from throughout the 53rd State Legislative District honored Burke Musgrove, who recently won re-election to a second term over two opponents at a barbecue at American Legion Hall in Breckenridge Monday night.

Rep. G. S. (Gus) Mutscher of Brenham, who will be the speaker of the House of Representatives next long session, headed a list of prominent state officials from Austin and elsewhere who joined residents of the five-county district for the affair.

Mr. Mutscher was the principal speaker, and he told the audience that Musgrove has won the respect of his fellow legislators and that "he is growing in experience and prestige every day."

Musgrove, in response, pledged that he would re-double his efforts "to serve you well in Austin." He expressed appreciation to Mutscher and others who attended. He paid tribute to three men, Harris Beale, Jack Eden and Norman Brewer of Breckenridge, for their efforts in his behalf during two campaigns. Dave Masner of Breckenridge was master of ceremonies.

Case Settled, Jury Released

The \$10,000 law suit which began in 91st District Court Monday morning was settled between the parties and the jury dismissed after they had heard testimony.

Dr. M. F. Wallach of Cisco was suing All-State Insurance Co. for \$10,000 as the result of an auto collision in Fort Worth on June 4, 1967.

The jury (11 men, one woman) was picked shortly before noon Monday and Judge E.H. Griffin, presiding, recessed until 1 p. m. when testimony was to begin. Attorneys for both sides were still negotiating, and testimony was delayed but finally was given.

Settlement reportedly was in the neighborhood of \$6,000 in favor of Dr. Wallach and the jury was notified not to return at 1 p. m. Tuesday as they had previously been instructed to do.

Rising Star Woman Is Killed In Auto Mishap

Funeral services for Mrs. Tom (Waldene) Lewis of Rising Star, who lost her life in an auto accident near Romo on Highway 183 midway between Cisco and Rising Star Monday morning, were conducted at 3 p. m. Tuesday at the First Methodist Church there.

Services were directed by the Rev. Strator Taylor of Lake Worth Methodist Church, assisted by the Rev. Jay Beavers, Rising Star pastor, with burial in the Rising Star Cemetery.

Mrs. Lewis, 53, cashier for West Texas Utilities Co. in Rising Star, was en route to Eastland to report for jury duty when she met a truck, put on her brakes and skidded into a concrete bridge abutment on the rain-slick pavement.

Justices of the Peace W. L. Lewis of Cisco went to the scene and conducted an inquest. He ruled that death was due to a head injury sustained in the accident. The mishap occurred about 8:15 a. m.

Martin Weiser of Cisco, driver for Gardenhire Oil Co., witnessed the accident but the truck was not involved. He stopped to give emergency first aid, but Mrs. Lewis apparently died instantly.

Born Aug. 17, 1915, in Miss County, Mrs. Lewis was a veteran employee of WTUC. She was married June 28, 1936, to Tom Lewis. She was organist of the Rising Star Methodist Church and had lived there 32 years.

Besides her husband, Mrs. Lewis is survived by her mother, Mrs. Florence Lasly of Goldthwaite; one son, James Walter Lewis, Houston; one daughter, Judith Ann Lewis, Rising Star; two brothers and one sister.

Survivors include her husband; two sons, two daughters, three sisters five brothers, 16 grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Ralph Reid, 66, a widow of L. J. Burnett of Ranger, died Monday, June 17 in a hospital in Prescott, Ariz.





THE GORDON SPOT

We would like to congratulate Patsy Moseley for winning the first in the state 4-H Natural Resource demonstration. She completed 4th district winners from all parts of Texas at the state 4-Roundup June 5. The theme of her demonstration was the value of water conservation. Patsy lives at Olden. Lynne Phippen of Cisco is also due congratulations for representing the county well in the food preparation contest. She won a red ribbon at 4-H Roundup. Both girls have

livestock projects as well as their home economic projects. I will be out of the county for a period of three weeks, June 15 through July 7, attending National Extension School in Colorado. I am one of ten Texas Extension Service employees who will be attending the school at Colorado State University at Fort Collins, Colorado. The assistant county agent, Bob Cohen, will be in the county during this time and will be available if you need to call on him.

There have been a few calls this week concerning chinch bugs in lawns. Chinch bug infestations are usually more severe in periods of high rain fall.

These small insects are usually difficult to see and may cause damage before they are noticed. The adult bug is one-sixth to one-fifth inch long, has a black body, reddish yellow legs and fully developed wings. Each front wing is mostly white, but is marked with an irregular black patch at the middle of the outer margin. The newly hatched nymph (young) is bright red and has a whitish band across the back.

Chinch bugs suck the plant juices which results in yellowish or brown patches occurring in the lawn. Injured areas frequently are first noted along the edges of the lawn. As the insects continue to infest, the brown patches enlarge as the bugs begin to work outward.

In most cases, when chinch bugs are present in sufficient numbers to cause yellow or brown patches to appear in the lawn, they may be found by parting the grass in the damaged area and making close observations. If chinch bugs are present they will appear as small black or red bugs with white markings on their backs moving rather quickly when they are disturbed. When the insects appear in large numbers, they may be seen crawling over grass blades or along the sidewalk and other areas around the home.

If chinch bugs cannot be found by this method, their presence may be detected by using a metal can such as a coffee can with both ends cut out. Force one end of the metal can about 2 or 3 inches into the ground in the yellow portion of the grass or at the margin of the damaged area. After the can has been inserted in the grass, fill with water, and if chinch bugs are present, they will float to the surface within about five minutes waiting period.

Four insecticides are effective in controlling chinch bugs. They are Dazitron, Aspon, Ethion, and Trithion. The insecticides come in emulsifiable concentrate liquids and in granular formulations. Granular applications provide equal or superior control and are much easier to apply. The convenience of application strongly supports our recommending granular formulations. It can be applied with a fertilizer applicator. Other trade names for Dazitron are Spectracide, Dipofene, and Diazol.

38 Texans Are Expected To Die In July 4th Accidents

AUSTIN—The acting director of the Texas Department of Public Safety has called for "heads up" driving on the part of Texas motorists over the upcoming four-day Fourth of July weekend to help bring about a reduction in the estimated toll of 38 lives in traffic during the holiday period.

Wilson E. (Pat) Speir announced that "Operation Motorcade," a "special" emphasis program designed to focus attention on the added dangers of holiday travel, will be in effect from 6 p. m. Wednesday, July 3, through 11:59 p. m. Sunday, July 7.

Traffic fatalities will be tabulated by the DPS throughout the period, and the totals will be announced officially three times daily as a means of keeping safety uppermost in the minds of the motoring public, he said.

"It is a known fact that the unusually crowded conditions of the highways on Independence Day holidays makes

driving more hazardous than usual," Speir said. "Past experience and the present trend of traffic deaths indicate that 38 persons will lose their lives in traffic accidents during the 102-hour period of the holiday this year, according to DPS Statistical Services. This means that on the average one person will be killed in traffic every two and-a-half hours.

"Of course, we hope this proves to be too high an estimate, and will do everything we can to keep down the expected toll of lives and suffering from accidents. As part of this effort, we will be utilizing additional personnel from our other uniformed services to augment the regular Highway Patrol force during the holiday period.

"However, the most important effort needs to come from the drivers themselves who, of course, have the most at stake. We can talk all we please about inadequate highways, we can talk about mechanical defects, but in the end, the vast majority of all accidents and fatalities can be traced directly to misbehavior, misjudgment, recklessness, negligence, and mixing drinking and driving.

Disability Work Credits Are Reduced

Persons becoming disabled before age 31 will now need fewer work credits to get disability benefits than they did prior to the 1967 amendments, according to a report from the Social Security office in Abilene.

The report stated that if a person is disabled between the ages of 24 and 31, he needs credits for one half the time between age 21 and the time he becomes unable to work. If one is disabled before he reaches age 24, he needs only one and a half years of work credits out of the three-year period ending when the disability began.

Persons who become disabled before age 31, should contact the Social Security office in Abilene.


