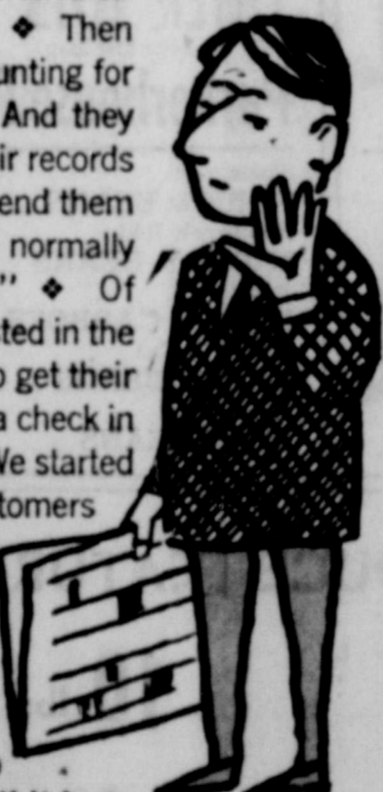

The OES Looks At County, Reports Us Half Prosperious

Is Eastland County a poverty area? Oh, about half way the federal government says. A community profile report just issued by the Federal government's Office of Economic Opportunity indicates that this county measures up to about normal when compared to the yardsticks set up by OEO in its comparison of the 3,135 counties in the nation.

OEO sets up a table with "normal" down the middle and "unfavorable" on one side and "favorable" on the other. Magnitudes of favorability and unfavorability are further divided into "extreme, significant, moderate."

In the 12 categories on which the county is measured, we fell below "normal" in exactly one half. And we were only "moderately" below normal on each of these points while on the other hand, in the six areas in which we are adjudged above "normal", we fall into the "significantly" favorable section in at least two areas.

By way of further explanation, the report states: "Poverty indicators show social and economic characteristics which vary with the nature and level of poverty."

"Definition of terms is as follows: "Extremely unfavorable — worse than 90 to 99 per cent of the counties. Significantly unfavorable — worse than 76 to 89 per cent of the counties. Moderately unfavorable — 60 to 75 per cent of the counties.

"Normal — no better or worse than 41 to 59 per cent of the counties.

"Moderately favorable — better than 60 to 75 per cent of the counties. Significantly favorable — better than 76 to 89 per cent of the counties. Extremely favorable — better than 90 to 99 per cent of the other counties.

Using these guide-lines here's how the county stacks up with OEO:

Magnitude of poverty — moderately unfavorable.

Severity of poverty — moderately unfavorable.

Economic compensation — unfavorable.

Economic activity — moderately favorable.

Family resources — significantly unfavorable.

Employment conditions — significantly favorable.

Educational achievement — moderately favorable.

Functional illiteracy — moderately unfavorable.

Adequacy of health care — significantly favorable.

Health Status — Moderately favorable.

Sufficiency of housing — moderately favorable.

Agriculture prosperity — moderately unfavorable.

The OEO report further explains the categories like this: Magnitude of poverty — 1,681 families in Eastland County received incomes below the social security administration poverty cutoff in 1966, as opposed to a national county norm of 1,221 families.

Severity of poverty — 29.6 per cent of the families in Eastland County received incomes below the social security cutoff in 1966, compared to 22.6 per cent of the families in the typical county.

Economic compensation — \$818 average first quarter gross earnings for employees in all industries were reported in Eastland County in 1964, where \$906 were earned in the county at the norm.

Economic activity — \$1,441 of retail sales were transacted for each person living in Eastland County in 1966, contrasted to \$1,204 at the national level.

Family resources — a median family income of \$3,825 was observed in Eastland County in 1966, as opposed to the United States county standard of \$4,630.

Employment conditions — 3.4 per cent of the labor force in Eastland County was unemployed in 1960, compared to 4.8 per cent in the typical county.

Educational achievement — A median of 9.7 school years were completed by persons age 25 and over in Eastland County in 1960, whereas the typical county showed 9.5 years.

Functional illiteracy — 8.5 per cent of the population of Eastland County had failed to complete over four years of school in 1960, contrasted to the national norm of 7.8 per cent.

Adequacy of health care — 101.6 physicians per 100,000 population were practicing in Eastland County in 1962 as opposed to 61.1 doctors in the typical county.

Health status — 1,327 infant deaths per 100,000 live births occurred in Eastland County in 1964, compared to a national norm of 1,700.

Sufficiency of housing — 9.1 per cent of the dwelling units in Eastland County housed more than the national average of 1.01 persons per room in 1960.

Rabies Not Thing of Past, Is Report Of Health Department

Is rabies a thing of the past? Don't bet your life on it, says the Texas State Department of Health. Statistics and activities of the Health Department indicate otherwise.

"Rabies in man is always fatal," said Dr. James E. Peavy, state commissioner of health, "and for that reason prevention is the only cure."

A big step in prevention is vaccination of pets.

Vaccination of pets takes on a more vital role when you come to realize that most rabies treatments received by humans have come from exposure or possible exposure to pets," said Dr. Peavy. He noted also that rabid pets normally expose the people closest to them—their masters or neighbors.

Among the animal heads examined for rabies last year, 385 were found to be positive for rabies upon laboratory examination by the State Health Department. Another 16 cases were affirmed on military bases following examination at the Fort Sam Houston laboratory in San Antonio.

Of the 385 cases, 86 were dogs; 32, cats; 27, foxes; 152, skunks; 44, bats; 24, bovine; and 20, other species. Six horses and seven raccoons were found to be positive among the "other" species in 1967.

Communities and individuals have their greatest opportunity to prevent the spread of rabies among pets and on to humans by means of vigilant anti-rabies vaccination programs and stray dog control.

Health authorities feel that a community is adequately protected from an outbreak of rabies when 70 per cent of the pet population is vaccinated. But most urban areas in Texas have attained only a 10 to 16 per cent vaccination record.

Q — I have received a widow's pension providing benefits for myself and two minor children for several years. This VA award is based upon my husband's military service. I have just remarried. Will my children still be eligible to receive benefits from the Veterans Administration?

A — Yes. Your children will continue to receive pension benefits from the VA as long as their unearned income is less than \$1,800 a year for each child. You should report promptly to the Veterans Administration your remarriage to prevent an overpayment of pension benefits.

Are your peaches turning white because of powdery mildew? Due to the cool humid weather that has prevailed in the Eastland County area this year, powdery mildew is a problem on peaches. There are two chemicals, Du-Ter and Cy-prex, that will help control powdery mildew on peaches. Neither chemical will completely control the disease, but will partially reduce the number of infected nuts and the size of the powdery mildew spots.


There is a short supply of peaches in this area this summer. Several things happened to the peach crop. Late freezes and hail ruined peach crops in many sections of the county. Excess rainfall during blooming caused an increase in the blossom blight stage of Brown Rot. Continued high humidity throughout the spring has increased the disease problem.

Many producers were unable to spray their trees at the right time because of the rains in the spring. Since they were not sprayed to prevent insects, many of the peaches were lost.

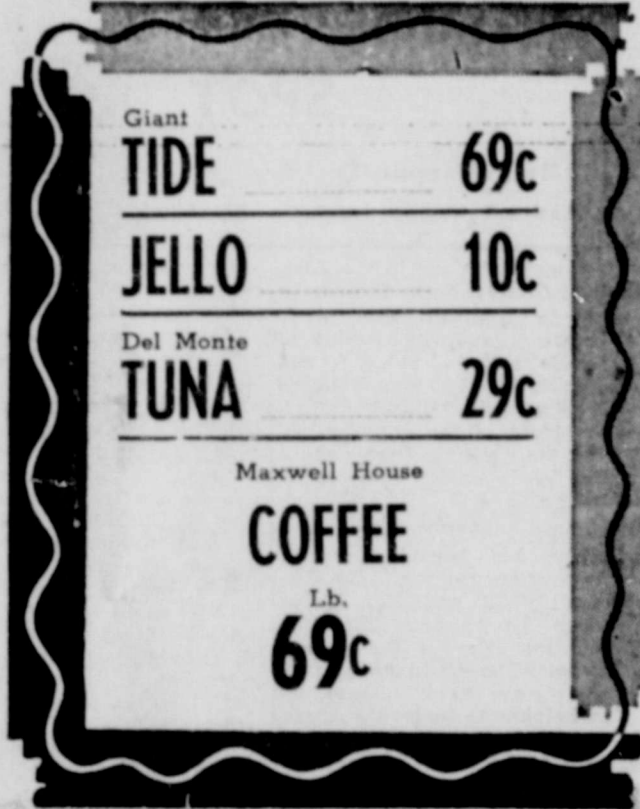

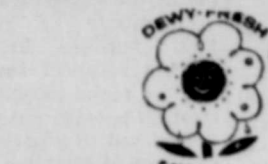

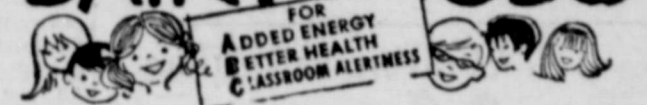
