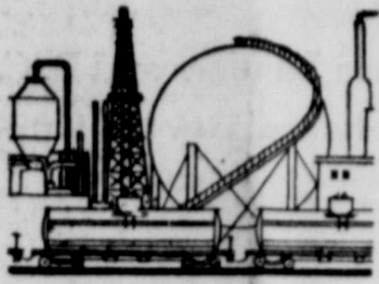

## Morton Valley Water Plan Funds Okayed

The Farmer's Home Administration has awarded a loan of \$98,500 plus a grant of \$81,000 to the Morton Valley Water Supply Corp. it was announced this week. Word came Monday from Sen. Ralph Yarborough's Austin office reporting the approval for the development work.

Retired Col. Roy R. Plumley is president of the non-profit corporation and the funds will go for development of a water system covering the rural section of the county serving 83 farms and other homes, it was announced. Application was made through the local FHA office, with Mr. O. M. Boyle, Eastland County FHA supervisor. Construction is expected to begin soon.

M. Sgt. E8 Charles D. Shamburger, son of Mr. and Mrs. V. L. Shamburger of Rt. 2, Eastland, was among those honored at a retirement ceremony at Fort Carson, Colo., on July 27.

Sgt. Shamburger was graduated from Morton Valley High School in 1946 and entered the Army in June of 1947. A veteran of the Korean conflict and the Viet Nam war, having served with the First Infantry Division in some of its major campaigns in and around the Iron Triangle.

He also served three tours of duty in Germany and two peacetime tours in Korea. His decorations include: Bronze Star Medal with one Oak Leaf Cluster (two awards); The Army Commendation Medal with five Oak Leaf Clusters (6 awards); The Good Conduct Medal (6 awards); the Occupation Medal (Germany); the National Defense Service Medal with One Oak Leaf Cluster (two awards); The Korean Service medal with two battle stars; the United Nations Service medal; the Republic of Viet Nam Service medal with three battle stars; the Vietnamese Campaign Medal with aperture; the Republic of Korea presidential Unit Citation; the Navy Unit Commendation Medal and the U. S. Presidential Unit Citation.

M. Sgt. Shamburger and his wife, Alice make their home at 1940 Kodiak Dr., Colorado Springs, Colo. His wife is the former Alice M. Fowler of Weatherford. ## 3.5 Inch Rain Over County Called Peanut Crop-Maker

A cool front, which arrived shortly after midnight Saturday, lowered temperatures and brought welcome rain by Monday throughout the county. Official county weather observer James Dabney said that Saturday's 104 degrees, high for the year, fell to 86 for Sunday's high. Low during the night was 67.

Rainfall in Eastland was 1.38 inches Monday and 2.12 Tuesday, bringing the two-day total to 3.50 by 7 a. m. Wednesday. Cisco measured 2.60 Monday and .80 Tuesday for a total of 3.40. Nimrod reported a high 4.10 for their two-day total and Mitchell and Dan Horn communities each reported over an inch Monday followed by more Tuesday.

Lightning and high winds which accompanied the rain did little reported damage in Eastland although at least one sign was blown over. The only reported damage in Cisco was by J. D. Yardley, owner of the Spot Restaurant, who said lightning apparently struck some part of the air conditioning system at the restaurant, causing a failure in its operation.

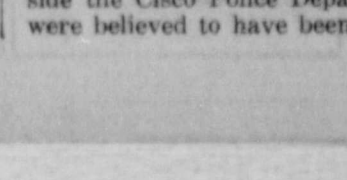
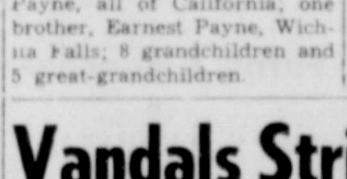

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR24)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article 8, Constitution of the State of Texas, is amended by adding a Section 2a to read as follows:

"Section 2a. (a) The Legislature may, by General Law, exempt from ad valorem taxation by the state and its political subdivisions all or a portion of any equipment, device or improvement installed or constructed on real property, which is designed to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions or water effluents on the air and water quality in this state, to the extent that the capital investment in such property is made to comply with or to exceed air or water quality standards established by law.

"(b) Legislation which may be enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Section is not void because of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."

### PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR22)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas, Article III, be and the same is hereby amended by deleting therefrom Section 18, and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 18. No Senator or Representative shall, during the term for which he was elected, be eligible to (1) any civil office of profit under this State which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which may have been increased, during such term, or (2) any office or place, the appointment to which may be made, in whole or in part, by either branch of the Legislature; provided, however, the fact that the term of office of Senators and Representatives does not end precisely on the last day of December but extends a few days into January of the succeeding year shall be considered as de minimis, and the ineligibility herein created shall terminate on the last day of December of the last full calendar year of the term for which he was elected. No member of either House shall vote for any other member for any office whatever, which may be filled by a vote of the Legislature, except in such cases as are in this Constitution provided, nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he was elected."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state, at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

### PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (SJR4)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a of Article III thereof, so as to provide for contributions on the basis of the full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System; providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to a vote of the people at an election and for proclamation and publication thereof.

Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the state; provided that the amount contributed by the state to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the state and/or school districts; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten (10) years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service; but shall be entitled to refund of moneys paid into the fund."

"Moneys coming into such fund shall be managed and invested as provided in Section 48b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as

may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other state pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such other state pension or retirement fund, contributed by the state, is repealed to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid; providing, however, that this Section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

"AGAINST the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the state constitution and be effective from the date of determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and shall have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

**Eastland Historical Plaque  
Wording Is Up-Dated Here**

**EASTLAND**  
County Seat, Eastland County, named for William M. Eastland—Texas war for Independence hero who was in Mier Expedition against Mexico, and was executed in the "Black Bean" lottery at Rancho Salado in 1842.

Most noted early local people were Comanches, who resisted occupation of area by white settlers. The last recorded Indian Raid in County was in 1874.

Eastland was named county seat in an election on Aug. 2, 1875. With 250 people it was incorporated on June 6, 1891, and elected W. Q. Conneliee as mayor.

After a discovery in 1917, one of the fabled oil booms of Texas occurred nearby, with Eastland center for legal matters. With oil priced \$2.60 a barrel, many wells flowed at 10,000 barrels a day. The city quickly grew to 25,000 people; five banks prospered.

Continuing oil production, agricultural processing, and clay products bolster the present economy.

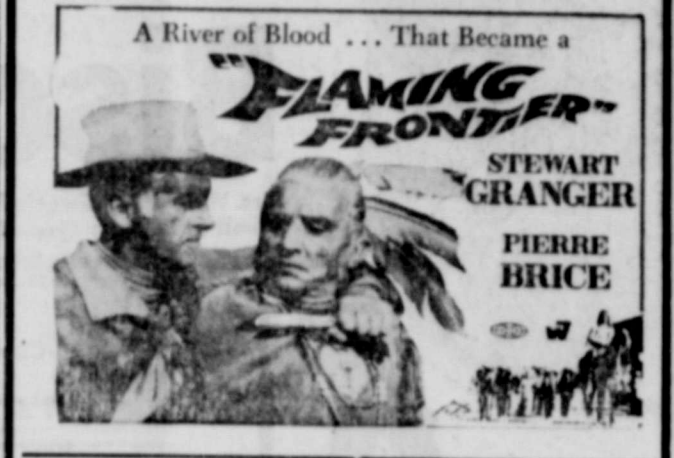

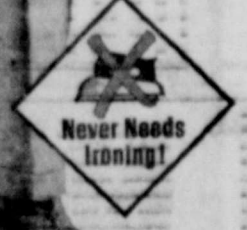

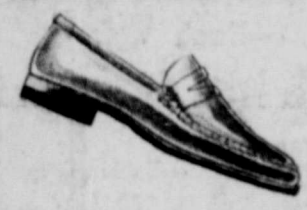

# The Gordon Spot

By DeMarquis (Dee) Gordon  
Eastland County Extension Agent

Leaf spot, a disease of peanuts, is causing a lot of damage this year. The lower leaves of peanuts were showing leaf spot infection early in the season. This causes leaves to fall and a reduction of yields. It has been proven that the control of this disease is economical. The leaf spot is worse

in irrigated peanuts and is worse in dry land peanuts in wet years.

We had a leaf spot demonstration on Edwin Schaefer's place near Pioneer last year. Peanuts that were treated made from 12 to 28 dollars more per acre above cost of treatment than the non-treated peanuts.

This year we have another leaf spot demonstration on Claude Fuller's farm near Gor-

man. We are using three different fungicides — Cal-Cop 10 Kocide, and Poly-ram. Different rates of water are also being used. Each chemical is being applied with three different rates of water. Some plots are sprayed with 15 gallons more per acre, some with 25 and some with 35 gallons per acre. Other fungicides that are being recommended for leaf spot control are sulfur, Sperlox, Dithane and Maneb.

The fungicides should be applied to the peanuts every 10 to 14 days.

I attended the Texas County Agents Association convention in Abilene August 5 and 6. Our speakers included John McKee of the Ford Motor Company, John Hutchinson, Director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Dr. H. O. Kunkel, Dean of Agriculture, Texas A&M.

The Southwestern Peanut Growers Association furnished roasted peanuts for the convention again this year.

Grass burs and weeds usually cause a problem in coastal bermudagrass. John Love of the Chaney Community can tell you how to solve this problem. We sprayed two swaths 20 feet wide through his coastal bermudagrass. Simazine 80W was the herbicide used

and was applied on March 6. One swath was sprayed with one pound of Simazine per acre and the other was sprayed with 1 1/2 pound per acre. John said the Simazine worked better than he expected it to. All summer you could easily see the difference in the sprayed area and the unsprayed area. There are very few weeds in the treated area.

Simazine was cleared this year for use on established bermudagrass. The chemical kills weeds by entering through the root system of newly germinating weeds and grasses. As weeds emerge they may appear normal, but in a few days the leaves turn yellow and the weeds die. Simazine will not hurt bermudagrass. Simazine costs about \$2.90 per pound. One pound per acre is enough on fine sandy soil, but 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 pounds are needed on sandy loam soils.

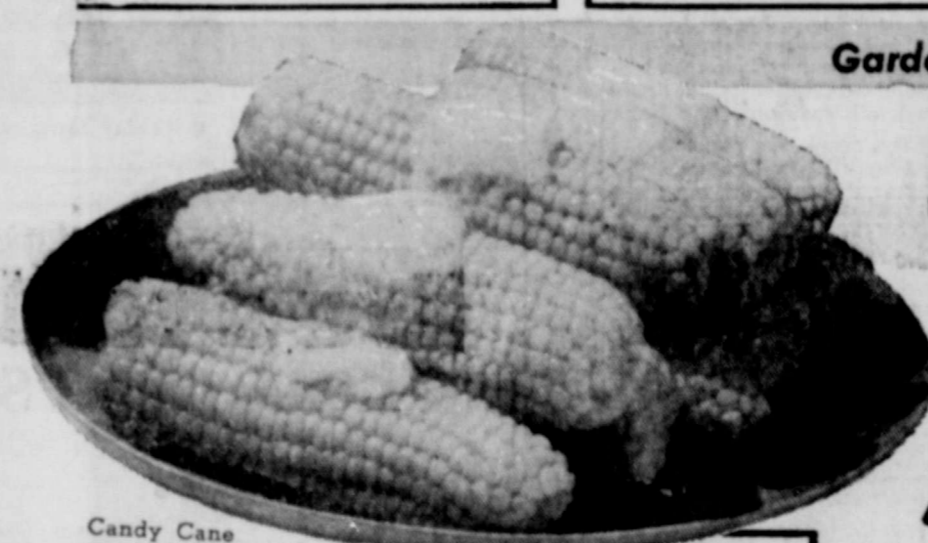
