Eight New Faculty Members Join Staff at Ranger Junior College

Eight new faculty members have joined the staff of Ranger Junior College for the 1968-69 school year.

The faculty reported for its first meeting of the year on Thursday, Sept. 5, at the RJC Library.

The new faculty members include two additions each to the Humanities, Natural Sciences, and Practical Arts divisions, and one each to the Fine Arts and Social Sciences divisions.

Joel M. Lamkin will be the new band director at the college. Lamkin is a graduate of Baylor University and is presently engaged in additional graduate work at Baylor. He formerly taught at Gatesville.

Roger O'Connor will be an

instructor in English. O'Connor holds a bachelor's degree from Baker University at Baldwin, Kan., and a master's degree from Kansas State. He has done additional graduate work at TCU and taught last year at TCU.

Miss Maria de Rocha will be an instructor in Spanish and American History. Miss de Rocha is a native of Brazil and holds a bachelor's degree from Texas Wesleyan College. She also holds three master's degrees—in Spanish from Texas Tech, in theology from Southwestern Theological Seminary, and in history from Texas Tech.

Brodie Campbell will serve as assistant football coach and instructor in physical education. Campbell holds both his bachelor's and master's degrees from East Texas State University.

Mrs. Yvonne Martin will teach business administration and secretarial science. Mrs. Martin formerly taught at Galveston Community College

and holds both her bachelor's and master's degrees from Hardin-Simmons University.

Robert Wilson will be a part-time instructor in psychology. Wilson, the pastor of St. Rita's Catholic Church of Ranger, holds a master's degree from St. John's University in New York, and has done additional graduate work at New York University.

Van Rigby will teach agriculture and biology. Rigby holds both his bachelor's and master's degrees from Sam Houston State College at Huntsville.

Robert C. McReynolds, who is returning to RJC after a year's absence, will be an instructor in biology. He holds a bachelor's degree from Lamar Tech and a master's degree from Texas Tech.

With the addition of the eight new faculty members, a total of 29 instructors will be on hand this fall when RJC students begin classes on Sept. 12.

GOVERNOR'S COMMITTEE REPORTS: Structure of Public School Seen In for Drastic Change

The long-awaited Governor's Committee on Public School Education report was made public Sunday and as predicted it calls for sweeping changes in education in this state. Much of the report, which was published in a complicated 76 page booklet, is of interest to taxpayers of this county.

The report calls for a master plan for school district reorganization and asks that such a plan be adopted by the Texas Legislature in 1969 for full implementation in the 1971-72 school year.

Rep. Burke Musgrove of Breckenridge, after reviewing the report, said he would not be surprised if Gov. John Connally called a special session to deal with the report.

Of main concern here are proposed minimum standards

for competent districts. The report states: "Every operating district should contain a minimum of 2,600 children in average daily attendance in a 12 grade system, with three exceptions:

"1. Countywide (or larger) districts may be allowed to continue operation as independent systems with a minimum of 1,600 ADA;

"2. Countywide (or larger) districts may be allowed to operate as 'Sparse Area Districts' with less than 1,600 ADA on a program approved by the State Board of Education; and

"3. 'Special Purpose Districts' (such as those operated on military bases, at State institutions and by private corporations such as 'Boys Ranch') may be allowed to con-

tinue operation with less than 1,600 ADA on a program approved by the State Board of Education.

The definition of a dormant district should be expanded to include any system which has not provided full 12 grade program for all students during the previous two-year period. Districts offering less than 12 grades under their own management should be annexed to adjacent districts."

The report went on to give this explanation of the recommendation: "A school district must have at least 2,600 ADA to qualify for all personal classifications under the present Minimum Foundation Program. An expanded Basic Foundation Program would provide enough professional and paraprofessional staff

members to insure a full range of courses and supplemental services. Such districts would also be large enough to manage an innovative program with new patterns of staffing, class scheduling and individualized learning supported by the new technological tools.

"The proposed exceptions for countywide districts recognize the geographical problems in some areas of the state. With only slight liberalization of the basic formulas, an independent school system of 1,600 to 2,600 ADA could offer a reasonable comprehensive program."

Under a heading of "A Definite Plan For Reorganization" the report states:

"A specific plan for proposed district reorganizations should be tentatively adopted, with statutory authority for modification by the State Board of Education before 1971-72, according to the following procedure:

"1. A state map realigning school districts according to the proposed standards will be issued by the Governor's committee as an addendum to this report;

"2. The State Board of Education should appoint a School District Reorganization Study Committee in each county of the state, charged with the responsibility of approving the proposed district alignment or proposing an alternative pattern meeting the recommended standards no later than Jan. 1, 1971;

"3. The State Board of Education should provide staff help to the Reorganization Study Committees;

"4. The State Board of Education should promulgate the final statewide school district reorganization plan no later than June 1, 1971; and

"5. Further school district reorganization should be suspended until the state plan is put into effect, unless proposed combinations are in accord with the state plan."

The report states at one point that, "In some cases, it may be more practical to divide an existing district and attach it to two or more other units or to ignore county boundaries."

The report also calls for statewide guides to set property and personal valuations. It recommends a proposed Market Value Index to report full value in every district along with a Uniform State Equalization Rate. The report flatly states that valuations of school districts are not equal. It reports studies show that city real estate is appraised at 59 percent, farm and ranches at 13 percent, utilities at 61 percent, banks at 34 percent, commercial and industrial property at 58 percent, business personal property at 52 percent and oil and gas property at 64 percent.

"A large number of assessors add new construction to their rolls at a fairly high percent of actual cost, but never reappraise older buildings," the report stated. "The new property owners may be paying on 75 percent of value, while the older property is assessed at 50 percent."

Registration For Fall Semester Scheduled Wednesday at RJC

Registration for the fall term at Ranger Junior College will be conducted on Wednesday, Sept. 11, at the college administration building.

Students should report to the registrar between 8:30 and 4:30 to sign up for classes. A full schedule of classes will be offered this fall—

including, for the first time, a full slate of evening classes. Students at RJC may work toward an Associate in Arts degree or they may acquire certification in business skills and practices through the RJC business program. RJC is also an accredited college and courses taken there are

fully transferable to other colleges throughout the nation.

The RJC evening program will offer classes in English, government, history, speech, Spanish, art, office machines, biology, typing, algebra, French, and physical education.

Veterans are urged to investigate the RJC evening program. All RJC courses are approved by the Veterans Administration and veterans may receive up to \$215 monthly in benefits if they are enrolled for the required number of hours at RJC.

Veterans May Receive GI Benefits While Taking College Courses at RJC

Veterans may receive up to \$215 monthly in benefits from the peacetime GI bill while taking college courses at Ranger Junior College.

The recently increased veteran's benefits provide veterans with an additional incentive to return to college and work toward a higher education.

Under the terms of the GI bill veterans with 36 months or more active duty since Feb. 1, 1955, may qualify for up to 36 months of benefits as a result of their service.

Veterans desiring further information about their eligibility for benefits are urged to contact their VA office or the registrar at Ranger Junior College.

The nine-month program offers the Master's Degree in Teaching Standard English to Speakers of Other Languages and Dialects. This new field of teaching is especially important to metropolitan school systems.

Herrington is a graduate of Ranger High School and Baylor University. After spending two years with the Peace Corps in Ecuador, S. A., he accepted a position as instructor of language arts in a junior high school in Albuquerque, N. M. He has done graduate study in Spanish in University of New Mexico and in Guadalajara, Mexico.

Ranger Mayor Receives Intensive Sales Training

Something new has originated in Texas and the Big Country is to be a part of it. What certainly must be the most ambitious and intensive sales program in mutual funds history has been undertaken by a Dallas securities brokerage firm, Ling and Company, and Morris Newnam of Ranger will bring it to the Big Country. He will have offices in Ranger and in Dallas, with his territory ranging over the Big Country, as far west as Midland. He and his family will continue to live in Ranger.

Newnam is one of 39 graduates, hand-picked by Ling and Company who six months ago undertook one of the most intensive training programs ever offered by an investment business. In January 1968 Ling and Company advertised in the Wall Street Journal and other newspapers for sales trainees, offering \$10,000 a year and expenses during a six-month course. Required of candidates were that he be successful in his present business, that after graduation he go into his own home area and work in his new profession.

The ad drew 2,400 replies from which 42 were selected. Of these, 39 graduated after the six months of intensive study, which required that they be in Dallas five days of each week.

The 39 left Dallas last week driving new cars, all distinguishable by their "Ling blue" color and their "Ling" license plates. Among the group, made up mostly of young men, but not restricted to any age group, was one millionaire, pushing 80, with an income from dividends of \$40,000 a year, a lawyer, a landscape architect, several baseball players and several Air Force pilots.

The unusual part of the training program for the sale of mutual funds is that Ling and Company spent one-half million dollars to train this sophisticated sales force. Until now, trainees paid for their own period of training, and most went to New York for that training. Michael Ling, brother of Dallas financier

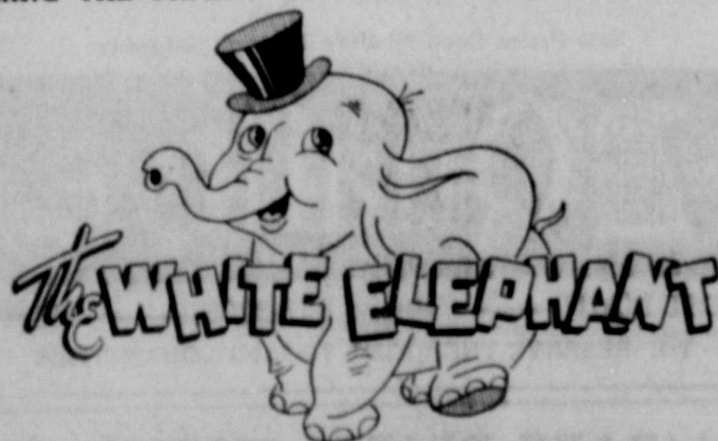

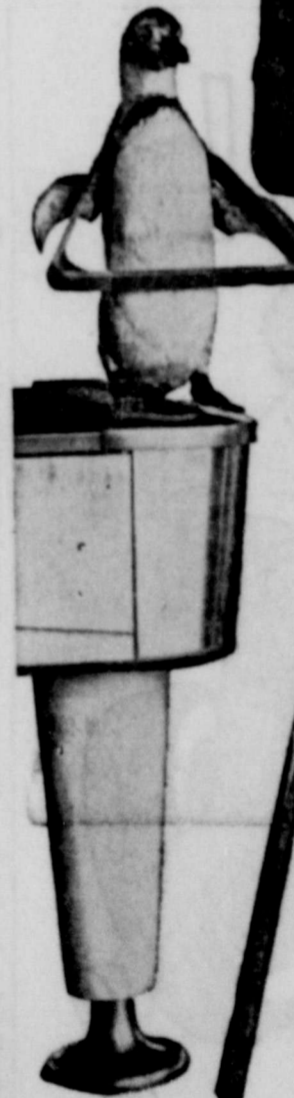
