Plant a pecan orchard and give it proper care to insure its growth to full potential in a minimum of time. That is the advice of C. E. Smith of Rising Star, veteran orchard owner, to young men interested in a vocation with potential.

Smith enjoys an annual income of \$10,000 to \$15,000 per year from his 65-acre orchard of improved varieties of pecans.

The success of an orchard depends to a great extent on how much effort goes into its management and care, Smith said. "But I don't know of any kind of business that will earn you a living unless you work," he added.

Arrest of Three People Solve 3 Burglaries

The arrest of two Abilene men and an Abilene girl has apparently solved two burglaries and an attempted robbery which occurred here about Aug. 1, it was reported by Eastland County Sheriff, Lef Y. Sublett.

The burglaries were reported by two Abilene men, Troy Bagley and Sam Honeycutt, who discovered their Lake Cisco cabins had been burglarized. Property loss and damage to the Bagley cabin was estimated to be \$300 and Honeycutt suffered a \$350 loss.

An attempt was also made to break into the safe at the office of the Cisco Housing Authority, the report said.

The Abilene girl, a juvenile, is in Eastland County Jail and the two men are in Abilene jail awaiting transfer to Eastland County Jail in lieu of \$5,000 bond each, Sheriff Sublett said.

The arrest came as the result of combined investigation by the Eastland County Sheriff's Dept., Taylor County Sheriff's Dept. and Abilene City Police Dept. The men were charged with burglary and car theft in Abilene, the report said, and the arrest also solved burglaries reported in Callahan County.

The Bulldogs took possession of the ball on the 30 yard line, but could not get a drive started and were forced to punt. Eleven plays and four first downs later the powerful Mavericks hit pay dirt again as Kincaid raced around the left side of the line for eight yards and the touchdown. The extra point attempt by Baker failed and the score remained 13-0 in favor of the Mavs as the first half ended.

Despite being outplayed in the first half, the Bulldogs came back in the third quarter and seemed to turn the tide.

The defense of the Bulldogs began to hold the Maverick attack, but, facing a third down and eight yards to go for a first on their 45, the Mavericks broke it open when George Simms darted 51 yards to the Bulldog four yard line.

A penalty and tough defense of the Bulldogs pushed the Mavericks back to the 11, then Kincaid hit wingback Bobby Williams over the middle of the touchdown.

The Bulldogs got on the scoreboard in the fourth quarter on a two-yard drive by Tom Fox, III. The TD was set up on a pass interference call against the Mavericks at the ten yard line. A pass from quarterback Bill Watkins to Armando Renteria moved to ball to the two yard line, then Fox plowed his way in for the touchdown.

He went over left tackle for the extra points against a penalty against Eastland.

The score stood 19-8 with 11:39 left in the game, and it looked as though the Bulldogs might climb back into the game. The Bulldogs were able to control the Maverick attack.

George Simms put Eastland back into business as he returned a punt 21 yards to the Bulldog 35-yard line. He sacked over right tackle for the final 35 yards for another Maverick touchdown. Kincaid passed to Simms for the extra points to wrap up the scoring.

Playing heads-up ball for the Bulldogs were Fox, Jimmy Dumith, Bill Watkins, Brad White, Armando Renteria and Floyd Parks.

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Dyess Planes Begin Low Level Training Flights Over Region

The Headquarters 516th Tactical Airlift Wing stationed at Dyess Air Force Base has commenced low level flight operations over this region in a new training program, according to an announcement here. The flights began during the past week and will continue for sometime.

(Continued from page 1) half to an inch in diameter. Planting seed gives you a better root system, he believes, and your production will begin sooner by two or more years. Nursery trees lack all of the important tap root, he added. Water planted trees the first year or two, he said.

Smith's orchard includes peach and apple trees that are being replaced with pecans as the fruit trees die out.

This country produces good peaches and apples, he said, adding "you have about three days to market a peach crop when it ripens as compared with several months for pecans, and your fruit yields is not nearly as dependable."

Smith believes that the Comanche pecan, which was developed by Louis Romberg at the U. S. Pecan Experiment Station at Brownwood, is the best for this region. It is a large, round papershell pecan with a delicious meat and it does well in dry years.

Most of Smith's trees are of the Burkett variety, although he has 13 or 20 different varieties for experimentation. All budding has been to Comanches lately and he will continue to emphasize this variety, he said.

The Texas Pecan Growers Association recently ran an evaluation check in the Smith orchard. Using their formula for placing values on pecans, they concluded that Smith's orchard is worth around \$1,500 per acre. Improved orchards with good management practices grow in value with the years, Smith said.

Smith's son, Carl, assists his father with the orchard work. "I'm getting a little old for all the hard work that goes into producing pecans," the elder Smith said, Carl is a plumber by trade and works in that profession in the Rising Star area as well as helping in the orchard.

Smith has long been active in the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association and the state organization. He cooperates in experiments with A&M Extension Service station and with County Agent De Gordon. A spraying program using four different kinds of chemicals has been carried out in his orchard this year.





Telephone Checkup Time

A PAGE FOR AGED: Elderly men and women who live alone are now able to combine their wish for independence with the security that they will not be forgotten.

Local Committees on Aging in many areas of the state are serving as coordinators for a telephone checking service. Older people may request to be called at a specific time each day as a safeguard against neglect in sickness or accidents. If the subscriber does not answer his phone, a designated neighbor (or the police) is notified to make an immediate investigation to see if the subscriber is safe and well. If the subscriber knows that he will not be able to receive a call, he should notify the caller that he plans to be away from home.

Many older people have no regular contact with relatives or friends and the call from the TELEPHONE RE-ASSURANCE SERVICE may be the only means of discovering accidents, sickness, or other emergencies that would necessitate immediate help for the subscriber.

The service may be initiated with a minimum of effort by distributing application forms for callers and subscribers to golden age clubs and other senior groups. Churches and civic organizations may be contacted for assistance both in locating individuals who may want to be called and in supplying a ready list of volunteers to make the calls.

In several cases of potential subscribers who could not afford a telephone, a church, relatives or other organization has underwritten the cost of the telephone.

Such a service requires practically no budget and yet it can mean the added support so badly needed by many of our aging citizens who want to continue living in their own homes.


