Marine Private Jimmy F. Williamson, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. M. F. Williamson of Route 2, Ranger, Tex., was graduated from eight weeks of recruit training at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot here.

He will now undergo from two to four weeks of individual combat training and then after leave at home, will report to his first Marine Corps assignment.

The intensified Marine recruit training emphasizes rigid physical conditioning and survival techniques, both at sea and shore, to develop self-confidence and endurance. Marksmanship with the M-14 rifle and 45-caliber pistol are equally stressed, and close order drill instills the traditions of Marine Corps teamwork.

A thorough study of basic military subjects, hygiene, first aid and sanitation, and the customs, courtesies, history and mission of the Marine Corps serve to polish the new Marine's recruit education and prepare him to join the Marine combat forces.

## Highway Patrol Seeks Applicants

Patrolman Bob Rivers announced today that the Texas Department of Public Safety is making a special effort to obtain qualified young men for the position of Patrolman with the Department.

Patrolman Rivers said, "All men between the ages of 20 and 35 who are of sound physical condition, have at least a high school education or equivalent, have vision of not less than 20-40 and have high moral standards should contact him or any member of the Texas Department of Public Safety immediately.

There are four branches of service for which men are directly recruited—Driver License, License and Weight, Highway Patrol and Motor Vehicle Inspection. Trainees are assigned to the service for which they are best suited.

Upon graduation from the 18 week training program at the modern DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin, the trainee is commissioned into one of these services. At the Academy, he will receive a salary of \$500 a month while in training. He will be taught such subjects as Texas Highway Law, accident investigation, first aid, professional driving, care and use of firearms, and many other subjects. The next class begins Dec. 10.

Benefits afforded patrolmen include: two weeks annual vacation; 12 or more holidays each year; 12 days sick leave each year; modern retirement privileges and travel expense. DPS patrolmen are furnished all uniforms and equipment necessary for performance of their duties.

## Over \$450,000 Is Allocated By FHA For Area Programs

Loan and grant funds totaling more than \$450,000 were approved last week for three rural community water and sewer systems in this area, according to announcement by the U. S. Farmers Home Administration through Congressman Omar Burleson.

Area projects were:

City of Moran — \$150,740 for water improvements.

Morton Valley Community of Eastland County — \$98,500 loan and \$81,000 grant for water system construction.

City of Carbon — \$130,000 for a water system building program.

The Congressman said the rural water facilities program "deserves the highest priority, even in these times of severe pressure on the national budget. Modernizing water and sewer services is an indispensable first step toward reviving rural communities and making them more attractive places to live, to work and locate new industry. Benefits of this program are measured not only in terms of rural progress, but in easing the flow of distressed people to the cities."

The rural community facilities programs are carried on through the Farmers Home Administration, a Department of Agriculture agency, for rural towns of up to 5,500 and areas of the rural countryside. Projects are developed through Farmers Home Administration county offices.

## Oil Industry Employs 223 In This County

Eastland County during 1967 had 223 petroleum employees with a payroll of \$1,158,824.

Helping boost the payroll in the county are the five gasoline plants. They have a combined capacity of 76,300,000 cubic feet of gas daily.

Value of the gas produced in 1966 was \$832,832. A total of 487,154 barrels of crude oil was produced, having a market value of \$1,446.87.

Royalty payments for the mineral owners amounted to \$28,960.

Crude oil taxes amounted to \$66,555. State production taxes \$58,298.

An estimated \$396,016 was spent on drilling in Eastland County in 1967. Six dry holes were drilled, costing \$96,564.

Eleven oil wells and two gas wells were completed during the year.

# THE GORDON SPOT

A total of 35 men attended at least one session of the Beef Cattle Short Course held in Eastland Oct. 15, 16, and 17. Fourteen attended all three sessions while about a dozen attended two sessions.

Three Eastland Merchants contributed to the short course by providing coffee and donuts. We would like to thank Hanna Hardware and Lumber Co., Eastland Grain Implement Co. for the refreshments.

The short course was held in the Eastland County Farm Bureau meeting room. This was an ideal place for the three night meetings. We are grateful to the Farm Bureau Directors for letting us use the building.

All three speakers covered timely subjects and did a good job of presenting their material.

L. A. Maddox discussed cow efficiency. He said three things are considered when talking about efficiency—cow size, weaning weight of calf

and caving percentage. Therefore, the most efficient cow would be a small cow that weaned a heavy calf every year.

Maddox discussed crossbreeding is not always the best practice. It has some disadvantages.

Dr. C. M. Patterson said on Wednesday night that all cattle in Eastland County should be sprayed very soon.

Spraying cattle now will have three advantages. It will help prevent a screwworm outbreak that is threatening the entire state; it will kill insects lice that usually attack cattle that are spreading anaplasmosis; and it will kill cattle lice that usually attack cattle in the fall and winter.

There were 1,431 cases of screwworms reported in Texas during the last two-week period. This compares to only 835 cases during all of 1967. The first case of screwworms in several years was found in Eastland County last week. Screwworms have also been reported in Brown, Calahan, Taylor, Comanche and Coleman counties. Producers are advised to hold off on all animal surgery until cold weather arrives, to search for and treat all animal wounds and spray all cattle.

U. Thompson discussed beef cattle feeding on the final night of the short course. He suggested a feed ration of 90 percent ground grain sorghum, 10 percent cotton seed meal and 10 percent salt for stocker calves that are also grazing small grains or spring pastures. With this ration gain can be put on calves at the cost of about 16 cents per pound. This mixture is fed free choice.

Thompson also discussed feeding urea as a protein supplement. He said cattlemen could cut feed cost by feeding urea.

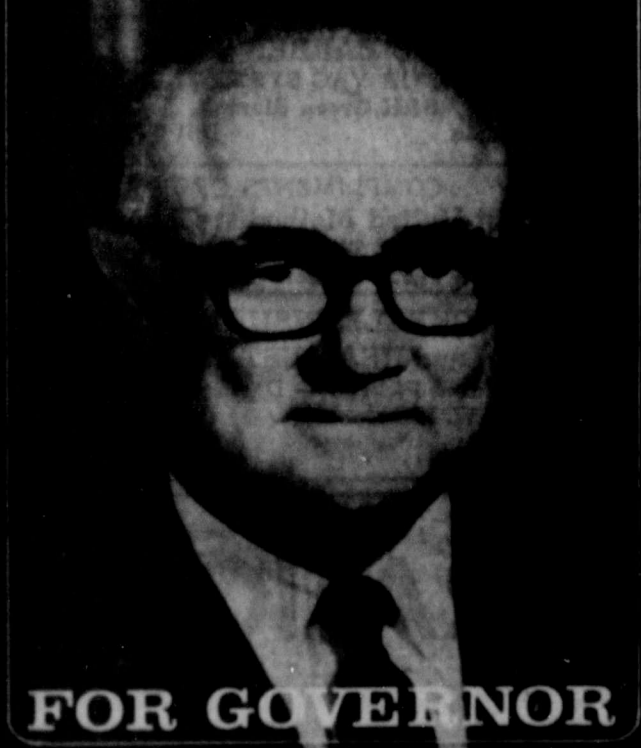

The Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 52, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investment of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System.

The Constitutional Amendment raising the limit on the amount that may be expended in any one year out of state funds for Public Assistance payments only to Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000).

The Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas.

The Constitutional Amendment continuously reducing State ad valorem property taxes and abolishing all State ad valorem property taxes after December 31, 1978, except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning.

## Explaining Amendment

**AMENDMENT NO. 2**  
Increasing the amount which may be expended in one year from state funds for public assistance payments to needy aged, needy disabled, needy blind, and needy children to \$75,000,000.

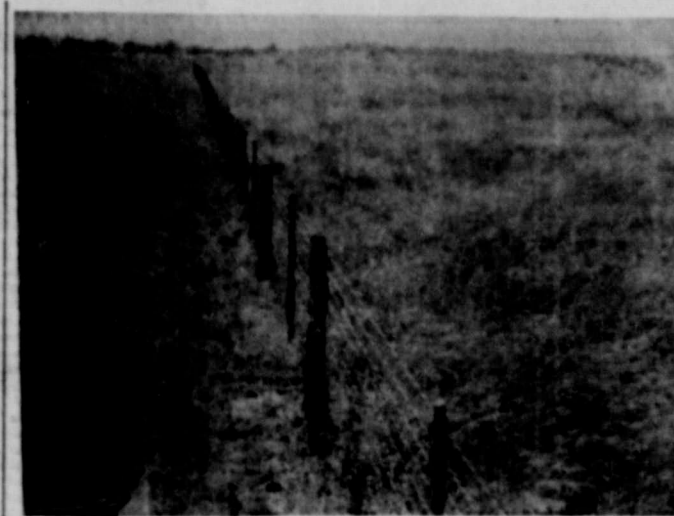
This proposed amendment to Section 51-a of Article III raises the ceiling on state funds used for financial assistance to the needy aged, needy disabled, needy blind, and needy children from \$60,000,000 to \$75,000,000 to assure

Texas recipients that they will not be disqualified from receiving the maximum amount permitted under the federal program simply through a deficiency of state funds to meet federal standards.

The proposed Amendment No. 2 does not make an appropriation but rather allows the legislature greater discretion in meeting the needs of all four classes of welfare recipients in the state by raising the ceiling on the use of state funds for this purpose from

\$6,000,000 to \$75,000,000. Texas consistently has been in the lowest percentiles of the nation with respect to welfare, ranking 50th in administrative cost per recipient for old age assistance, 44th in percent receiving old age assistance, 49th in assistance in aid to dependent children, and 45th in assistance in aid to permanently and totally disabled. Because aid for dependent children allotments are based on a family of four, the higher ceiling provided for the proposed amendment would make it possible for the legislature to have greater discretion in giving budgetary consideration to larger families. Further the proposed amendment would permit consideration to be given to last year's 4 per cent rise in the cost of living in budgeting for all four classes of recipients.

Against:  
The large overall expenditure of state funds which this amendment would authorize would increase each recipient's income only a few dollars a month but would require \$15,000,000 in new funds at a time when the state is already hard pressed to meet existing financial obligations. Instead of encouraging dependency on public welfare, the state should begin to draw a line in combating growing socialism and the welfare state.



## The Value of Scientific Grazing Demonstrated In County Project

Farmers and ranchers of today have long since realized that grazing management of their rangeland has become a technical science. A plan of operations is needed for forage and livestock production. This grazing management plan should have short term and long term objectives. Ways or methods to accomplish these objectives, methods for distribution of grazing, a forage and livestock inventory and deferred grazing.

Some of the short term objectives might be to improve the present cover to control erosion. To obtain the greatest amount of use from lesser desirable species and improve the vigor of the more desirable species. Also to learn to judge the degree of grazing based on the key areas and key species.

Long term objectives should include plans to increase the amount of desirable forbs. To obtain a better balance be-

tween summer and winter forage. To change the overall vegetative composition from less palatable plants to ones higher on the ladder of plant succession. Also to improve all pastures to as near the original climax composition as possible.

Ways to accomplish these objectives might be to concentrate goats at a rate of 3-6 per acre on oak in early spring, mid-summer and early fall to defoliate brush, and do not graze at any other time. By heavy use of spring annuals, and graze approximately 50 percent of the current seasons growth by weight.

Distribution of grazing can be accomplished by fencing watering facilities, salting and

supplemental feeding areas. These factors facilitate management and aid in better distribution of grazing by protecting from poisonous plants, permitting selective grazing of specific sites or species, better use of all species, and protecting heavily used or more accessible areas.

A forage and livestock inventory on the farm or ranch is basically the same principle as an "end-of-the-year" stock inventory made in a drug store, grocery store or any other business of this type. The inventory simply reflects the acres in each pasture or site, the condition of each site, the amount of forage available whether on the ground or in the barn, acres per animal unit, total animal units, important key species by which to judge degree of use and the best season of use by pastures.

Enough cannot be said about the value of "Deferred

Grazing. Deferred grazing is simply resting a pasture during the growing season. Utilization of Coastal bermudagrass pastures works beautifully in conjunction with rangeland in that the Coastal is being utilized from about May through October, the period that most native grasses need a rest to grow and make a seed crop. Some of the benefits of deferred grazing are to get the maximum benefits from brush control. Protect livestock from poisonous

plants, protect seeded areas, maintain feed reserves for dry years, and most important to increase vigor, establish a seed crop, and extend ground cover.

In order to adhere to the principles of range management all grazing management plans must reflect: the best season of use, kind of livestock best suited, distribution of grazing use, proper degree of grazing use and should be realistic, flexible and feasible.
