Bulldogs Blank Baird; To Host Glen Rose Fri.

Ranger's Bulldogs maintained their lead in District 10-A here Saturday night by rolling past the Baird Bears, 28-0, with tailback Tom Fox having another big night. Fox scored three of Ranger's four touchdowns and gained 113 yards rushing in 10 carries as the Bulldogs posted their third district victory without a loss. Ranger marched for a touch down immediately after taking the opening kickoff, going 56 yards in 11 plays. Fox scored on a 12-yard pass from quarterback Bill Watkins, but was stopped on run for extra points. Fox went nine yards for the second score late in the opening quarter, then smashed through the left side of the line for the extra points. That was all until the third quarter when the Bulldog scored the rest of their points. Fox ran 14 yards for the touchdown and was again stopped on the extra point. Reserve quarterback Johnny Graham directed the Bulldogs final scoring drive and Baird White carried it in from the two. White also scored the extra points. Ranger's defensive play which blanked Baird was led by Richard Williams, White, and linebacker Floyd Parks. Chris West, James and Bill Collins led Baird's efforts and Franklyn Alexander was the Bear's top gainer with 39 yards.

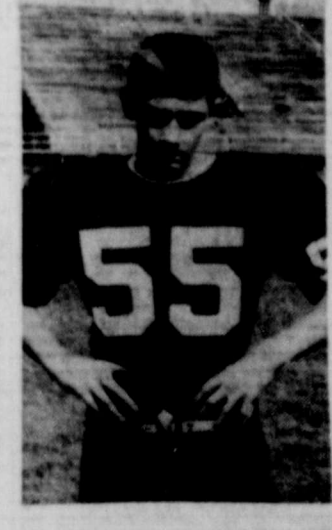
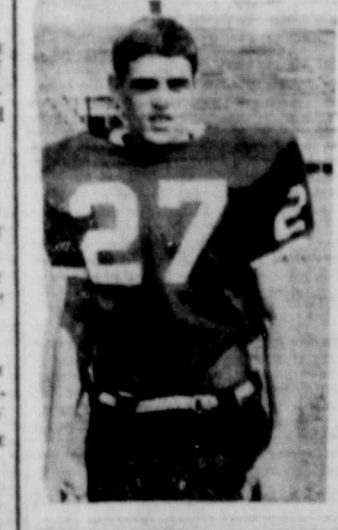

6 Amendments Are Favored

Democratic Presidential Candidate Hubert H. Humphrey carried Eastland County by about 500 votes — with all eight boxes complete. The unofficial but complete returns show the Democrat polling 3,231, Richard Nixon, 2,699, and George Wallace, 1,124 in this county. Eight of the county's boxes were complete, including absentee. Ranger's returns were reported just before noon Wednesday. Richard Nixon was declared the apparent winner at mid-morning Wednesday, with a majority of the electoral vote. VP Humphrey carried every box except absentee and Eastland. Eastland voted 597 for Humphrey, 681 for Nixon, and 231 for Wallace. Cisco voted 737 HHH, 664 Nixon and 254 Wallace. Ranger voted 516, 344 and 152. One of two write-in candidates in the county was successful. Assistant County Attorney Emory Walton, who staged a write-in for the county attorney's office for which no candidate was nominated, tallied 1,422, and Eastland from Ranger), and Eastland Attorney Saul Pullman, an unannounced write-in, got 145. District Judge Earl Conner easily defeated write-in candidate Truman Kirk. Cisco attorney for the district judge's office, Conner polled

4,081 and Kirk 1,071. The 3 big boxes went like this: Cisco — Conner 836, Kirk 528; Eastland — Conner 1138, and Kirk 138; and Ranger — Conner 731 and Kirk 86. A total of 6,293 voters went to the polls Tuesday and voted for Democratic candidates, 2-to-1, except in the presidential race. This was believed to have been the heaviest turn-out in recent history. The long, difficult ballot gave counters fits and most were late coming in. The Eastland box reported in about 1:15, and Rising Star came in complete at 12:45. In other races, the county voted as follows: Governor — Smith, 4,182; Eggers, 1,893. Congress — Burleson, 4,662. Lt. Governor — Barnes, 4,704 and DeCluitt, 1,324. Atty. General — Martin, 4,672 and Wynn, 1,244. Comptroller — Calvert, 4,597 and Bennet, 1,284. Treasurer — James, 4,770, Sanchez, 1,148. Land Commissioner — Sadler, 4,700, Neptune, 1,204. Agriculture Commissioner — White, 4,675, Schnart, 1,215. Railroad Commissioner — Langdon, 4,593, S-grist, 1,250. Countians voted FOR only six of the 14 proposed Constitutional Amendments. Favored in Eastland County were Nos. 1, 3, 7, 9, 12, and 14. All others were rejected. State Rep. Burke Musgrove polled 4,786 to his GOP Opponent Pat McGough's 1,090 in this county and easily carried the five-county district.

Letters TO THE EDITOR

A long time ago, God must have reached around the universe and gathered unto himself over 3,000 of His best children.

Then he found a beautiful piece of land - here He deposited His chosen few - these chosen ones are the PEOPLE OF RANGER.

On Oct. 18, 1968, a red 1959 Chevrolet pulled away from Vaughn's Garage, crossing Hwy. 80. The driver didn't wait for the traffic to clear and a car from Abilene hit him broadside resulting in the total destruction of both cars. The driver of the red car had his wife and four-week old son in the front seat with him. My wife, our six-week old son and myself were in the back seat.

When it was over, I had a shattered hip and pelvis and a woman in the other car had cuts and bruises on her face. Thank God, there were no other injuries, especially to the babies.

I had already fought a five-year battle with bone disease in my right hip and leg which left me handicapped; now my other hip is injured.

I had been working at Houston Peanut Co. since we settled here a short time before. The day before the accident I went to work for Southwest Tool & Engineering where I could earn more money and learn the trade but I worked only one night.

I will be bedfast for three months or longer and it may be a year before I am able to walk. After I entered Ranger Hospital and the pain was eased, I started to worry about what my family would do; with no income and no body back home who could help. During the past five years, I had lost faith in God and man.

My faith has been restored by the PEOPLE OF RANGER. They came with food, rent money and paid the milkman so the baby could have milk. Different churches and many individuals helped. These people, most of whom I had never seen for we had not attended church in Ranger, has helped to restore my faith in God and my fellow man. I have had a hospital bed donated so that I may be able to be with my family sooner.

I cannot begin to name all who have helped and offered help for the future.

All I can do now is say "Thank You, People of Ranger, and may God bless each and every one of you. You have helped me to find my God and to put my trust in Him."

Ranger will continue to be our home and perhaps when I am able to walk again, in some small way I can repay all of you by helping others in their time of need. God be with you, PEOPLE OF RANGER.

'100-Bushel-Acres' Seen In Present County Harvesting

Quite a few instances of "100-bushel-acres" are being reported in the present Eastland County peanut harvest which is about half finished, according to Gilbert Meredith, County ASCS office manager.

A report will be issued soon on the exceptional yields which are the results of increased fertilization of crops in this county, he said.

Some 32,000-plus acres are in peanut production in the county with grades running in the 70s. This is up some 1,000 acres from 1966-67 and the usual grades running in the 60s.

1966 was the record crop for Eastland County with \$4.20 million for county farmers. Meredith said this year's crop will yield form \$4.50 to \$5 million. Government support has been increased by \$13.25 per ton. Acre yield in 1966 was 1,266 pounds; in 1967, 937 pounds; and this year the yield is expected to be from 1,200 to 1,250 pounds per acre.

Meredith said the dry, clear weather of the past weeks has been a boon to the peanut farmer and they need a few weeks more of the same to get the entire crop harvested. He predicts, weather permitting, that harvest will be completed by Nov. 20th.

Dry-land and irrigated peanuts are grading out about equal. The very dry weather has presented some difficulty in harvesting. Some with irrigation equipment have watered to loosen the soil. The too-dry ground tends to pull off the nuts in the harvest process.

Melvin Shell, manager for Gorman Peanut Company in Gorman, said his company was further behind this week than at the peak of the bumper 1966 season, though drying facilities have been greatly expanded since 1966.

Grover Hallmark, vice president of Eastland National Bank, who handles farm loans expressed optimism that 1968 would be a bumper year for peanuts in the county. He stated that from 80 to 125 trucks of peanuts were lined up at the Gorman Peanut Company's drying plant early this week, and that the same situation existed at the Carbon drying plant.

"The need right now is for more dry weather and more harvesting and drying machinery to take care of the big peanut crop Eastland County has ever produced," Meredith said.

Eastland and Eastland County has experienced one of the driest Octobers in recent history. Unofficial rainfall records show only 30 inch of rain, plus three days when a "trace" was recorded.

This amount compares with 8.65 inches for October, 1967. In 1964 October received only .95 inches of rain, however, looking back over ten years of unofficial records, the average has been approximately 2.86 inches as compared with the official average of 2.78 inches.

Another Marker Due Erection on Courthouse Lawn

The Official Texas Historical Marker for City of Eastland will be erected soon, today announced Charles Woodburn of Amarillo, president of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee. This is a "State Matching Fund marker."

Mr. Mike Collins of Eastland, chairman of the Eastland County Historical Survey Committee said the marker will be placed at southeast corner of courthouse lawn in Eastland.

The inscription on this 27 by 42-inch marker reads:

County Seat, Eastland County named for William M. Eastland—Texas War for Independence hero who was in mine expedition against Mexico and was executed in "Black Bean" Lottery at Rancho Sa'ado in 1842.

Most noted early local people were Comanches, who resisted occupation of area by white settlers. The last recorded Indian raid in County was in 1874.

Eastland was named county seat in an election on Aug. 2, 1875. With 250 people it was incorporated on June 6, 1891, and was elected W. Q. Connelley as Mayor.

After a discovery in 1917, one of the famed oil booms of Texas occurred nearby, with Eastland center for local matters. With oil priced \$2.60 a barrel many wells flowed at 10,000 barrels a day. This city quickly grew to 25,000 people; 5 banks prospered.

Coming here to seek "Black Gold" were celebrities, including Evangelist Billy Sunday, Circus Owner John Ringling, movie figures Jess Willard, Tex Rickard.

An international wonder story happened here: The old courthouse cornerstone was opened on this site in 1923 to reveal survival of "Old Rip". A horned toad placed there with other mementoes on July 19, 1897.

Continuing oil production, agricultural processing, and clay products bolster the present economy.

This is the 8th Official Texas Historical Marker to be erected in Eastland County. Dedication plans will be announced by Collins.

The marking of local historic sites and landmarks is part of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee's 5-year RAMPS Program to Record, Appreciate, Mark, Preserve, and Survey Texas history.

More than 3,300 Official Texas Historical Markers have been awarded throughout Texas since the RAMPS Program was begun in 1964. The markers of cast aluminum with Swedish style effect.

This marker and its location will appear in the next edition of the "Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers," in tourist guides and on maps to stimulate tourist interest in this area, to provide interest on historical tours, and to acquaint the people of Eastland County with their own unique historical past.

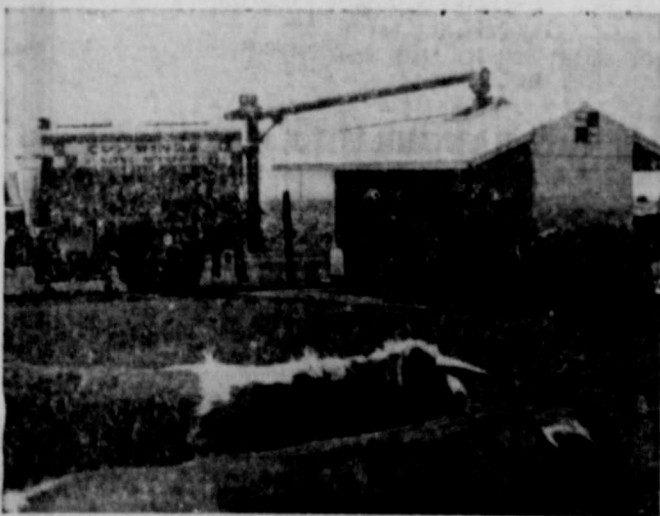
Lupe Hernandez Crowned '68 RJC Band Sweetheart

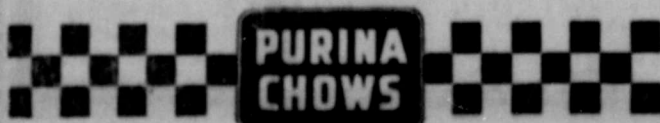

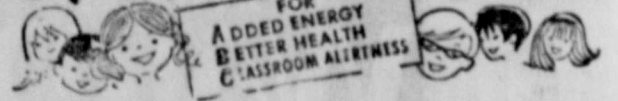

Movie Rating Is Due on Pictures At The Majestic

The Majestic Theater in Eastland will join theaters throughout the country in adopting a new movie rating system in the near future, according to Manager Dick Dixon.
"Virtually all Texas theaters have agreed to apply the new voluntary movie rating system devised by the Motion Picture Association of America to provide a system of guidance as to the suitability of films for young audiences."
This is the first all-out effort nationally to restrict attendance by persons under 16 years of age to see certain films, he added.
Under the new system, a competent staff of film appraisers will rate movies in four symbol categories: "G" for general audiences, "M" for mature audiences, "R" for restricted to 16 years old unless accompanied by parents; and, "X" for films where young people under 16 will not be admitted under any circumstances.
Advertising material concerning films will carry the letter rating as fast as same can be applied, Dixon said.

Highway Patrol Seeks Applicants

Patrolmen Paul Dixon announced today that the Texas Department of Public Safety is making a special effort to obtain qualified young men for the position of Patrolman with the Department.
Patrolman Rivers said, "All men between the ages of 20 and 35 who are of sound physical condition, have at least a high school education or equivalent, have vision of not less than 20/40 and have high moral standards should contact him or any member of the Texas Department of Public Safety immediately.
There are four branches of service for which men are directly recruited—Driver License, License and Weight, Highway Patrol and Motor Vehicle Inspection. Trainees are assigned to the service for which they are best suited.

He will be taught such subjects as Texas Highway Law, accident investigation, first aid, professional driving, care and use of firearms, and many other subjects. The next class begins Dec. 10.
Benefits afforded patrolmen include: two weeks annual vacation; 12 or more holidays each year; 12 days sick leave each year; modern retirement privileges and travel expense. DPS patrolmen are furnished all uniforms and equipment necessary for performance of their duties.

COUNTY TAX OFFICE IS BUSY YEAR-AROUND

Eastland County Tax Collector Edgar Altom was elected to the office in 1964 and re-elected in the primary held in May of this year.

His office assesses and collects taxes: ad valorem and school taxes for two districts on the eastern edge of the county and one on the western edge of the county. (Put-

nam has a half mile strip of its eastern edge in this county, although the town itself is in another county.)

License plates are sold in the office, and all title changes are handled there. Altom said this year the office will sell 9,300 passenger car licenses, 2,700 truck trailer and commercial, 1,450 farm vehicle, more than a thousand for special trailers, (house trailers, etc.) 150 for motor buses and truck tractors, and some 200 for motorcycles.

Tax collections, averaged for the years 1963 through 1967, were 92.61 percent of the amount assessed. Altom says "We collect delinquent taxes regularly, along with current taxes, which would raise the average slightly."

The office also handles voter registration, which is required for every voter. To be eligible to vote, anyone must register between Oct. 1, 1968 and Jan. 31, 1969.

The office occupies two large offices in the main floor space in a courthouse basement vault. A check of the older records shows that in 1881-82, the county issued 130 "special Occupation Tax Receipts to Commercial traveller drummers, salesmen or solicitors trade." Each sold \$50.00. A five-page "inventory of goods," written for a tax-payer in 1879 included, these items: "one tin cup, value 10 cents; one china box, value 10 cents; and two ounces of soap, value 20 cents."

Chief office deputy is H.M. Gilbetr. Office deputies are Paul McFarland, Mrs. Nancy Trout, Mrs. Dorothy Walton, and Mrs. Ion Bownds, all of Eastland; Miss Glenda Fox of Olden; and Mrs. Bonnie Petty of Cisco.

Altom said, "Each of us is here to serve the public. We are willing to help anyone who needs help in completing his records and to discuss any questions anyone has."

Applications To Fill Gov't. Jobs Are Announced

Congressman Omar Burleson, (D-Tex) said today that the Civil Service Commission is now receiving applications for the 1969 competitive examination for summer employment with the United States Government. The examination leads to eligibility for appointment to most temporary summer jobs, at Grade GS-1 through 4, also Post Office Clerk-Carrier PFS-5.

Those who are interested in the summer jobs covered may apply to take the written test on or before filing dates—Nov. 6, Dec. 6, 1968 and Jan. 3, Jan. 30, 1969. Representative Burleson stressed that no application postmarked after Jan. 30, 1969 will be accepted. If you miss the last test, you can not be considered jobs if filled by this application and for maximum consideration, you should apply early.

The Congressman noted that last year's eligibles, including those who were selected for a summer job, must take this new examination. The examination provides an opportunity to compete on a merit basis for a summer job merit bit or a summer job. It will last one one-half hour and will measure vocabulary, reading comprehension, abstract reasoning and table and chart interpretation.

Any application forms needed to apply for jobs described in Civil Service Announcement No. 414 may be obtained from high school counseling office, college placement offices, most post offices, and Civil Service Interagency Boards.

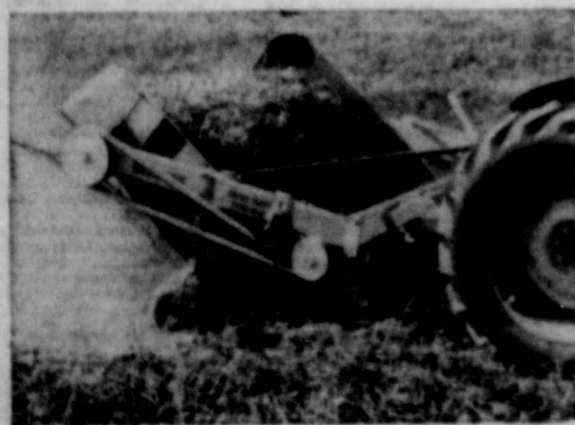

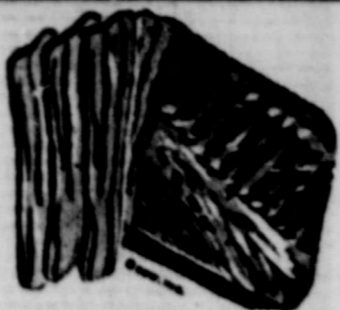
