AS THE FIRST FALL of snow for this wintery season fell Friday morning, we remembered the date back in 1957, the date was Nov. 24. I suppose the reason I could remember the date so well was because of the death of a very close friend and former editor of the Times, Norman Wright. Mr. Wright and I would go to the high school and college football games together. He would try to teach me how to write football stories, Boy Scout activity stories and just about every other small news items that might be of interest to his readers.

All of this reminiscing brings us back to that press day when, at about 9:30 a. m. we had just gotten the first proof off the press and was waiting for the editor to give the go-ahead sign to print the week-end paper. We heard a sound in the editor's office and, of course, all of the men in the composing room ran to see what had happened.

Mr. Wright was lying on the floor, grasping for breath. Duane Dennis, former shop foreman of the Times and I began to give Mr. Wright artificial respiration. A doctor was called, but it was too late. Ranger had lost a fine man and one of the best editors the Ranger Times has ever had.

The Times editor was a "Ranger first" man. He boomed Ranger every chance that he had. His final page one, "What's Cooking" column appeared in the left side column and his obituary appeared in the right side column of the front page of the issue of the Times on that Nov. 24, 1957, the first snowfall of the year.

RIGHT SPIRIT was displayed by Vice-president Hubert Humphrey in pledging his support of the winning presidential candidate; also by one Ranger man who remarked that for all he lost his vote, he would have as good a president as anyone else.

Silver Star Award Is Presented Friday Night

Friday night, before the football game between the Ranger Bulldogs and the Glen Rose Tigers, Mrs. Jack Burrows was presented the Silver Star, posthumous award of her son, Marine Pfc. Larry Joe Rogers, in ceremonies by the U. S. Marine Headquarters of Abilene.

COMMANDER IN CHIEF UNITED STATES PACIFIC FLEET
The President of the United States takes pride in presenting the Silver Star Medal posthumously to **Private First Class Larry J. RODGERS United States Marine Corps** for service as set forth in the following:

CITATION
"For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action while serving as a Rifleman with Company D, First Battalion, Seventh Marines, First Marine Division in connection with operations against the enemy in the Republic of Vietnam. On the afternoon of 17 March 1968, during Operation WORTH, Private First Class RODGERS' company was assaulting a large, well entrenched North Vietnamese Army force. As the Marines maneuvered forward, they began receiving intense automatic weapons, mortar and anti-tank rocket fire. In the initial burst of fire, all members of the lead squad's machine gun team were wounded. Regarding his own safety, Private First Class RODGERS seized the weapon and immediately began delivering a heavy volume of machine gun fire against the enemy positions, which enabled his unit to maneuver to covered positions. Ignoring the hostile fire impacting around him, he resolutely remained in his dangerously exposed position and continued firing the weapon for ten minutes until he was morally wounded by enemy automatic weapons fire. By his courage, aggressive fighting spirit and steadfast devotion to duty, Private First Class RODGERS upheld the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."

Surprise Snow Storm Swoops In Suddenly

"Most unusual" was the way the official weather observer and other Eastland Countians described the snow they found early Friday.

Apparently Eastland, Cisco and Ranger were in a band that stretched from the New Mexico border into East Texas where snow fell early Friday. Points north (Breckenridge) and south of here had rain, but no snow, it was reported.

Measurements ran from an official three (3) inches at Eastland, through 10 a. m., to unofficial four (4) inches at Cisco.

Weather Observer James Dabney reported that rain began at 4:30 a. m. and measured .52 of an inch by 7 a. m. when the snow began to fall. The predicted temperatures of from 42 to 44 degrees, dropped on down and stood at 35 degrees in Eastland at 7. It came on down a degree or two before rising, and melting the extra-wet snow. First Steps Are Taken Toward New Library

First steps have been taken toward a new library for RJC according to an announcement this week by RJC president Dr. E. W. Mince.

Dr. Mince said that the college has received state approval for a \$50000 grant this year. This grant makes the college eligible for two more grants of equal size over the next two years.

Anticipated cost of the new library is \$350000 which means that the college itself will have to supplement the government grant with \$200,000 in local funds. These local funds will have to come from the sale of revenue bonds which in turn will be liquidated by a library fee.

The entire proposal has been taken under advisement by the college board of regents.

After installation, Wayne worked in the plant until the transmission headquarters were established. At that time, he became a system operator in the transmission department. When he retired he was working as the data analyst for the department.

Caton worked in Eastland except for 1932 and 1933 when he was in Big Spring. While visiting back in Eastland Wayne met Miss Flarra Malone of Handley who was visiting her parents in Eastland, where her father was employed at the Leon Plant.

Ranger Bulldogs Head for Playoff By Defeating Glen Rose, 19-6

The Ranger Bulldogs clinched their third straight district playoff spot here Friday night as they defeated the Glen Rose Tigers, 19-6.

The Bulldogs began their scoring in the first quarter as they moved 75 yards in nine plays on their first possession. Quarterback Bill Watkins tossed a 22-yarder to end Armando Renteria for the first touchdown of the night, with 8:20 left in the first quarter. Tom Fox III kicked the extra point.

Eight minutes later with only 11 seconds left in the first quarter, Ranger scored on a 65-yard run by Fox as he went over right tackle, climaxing a 76-yard drive in only three

plays. The extra point attempt failed.

The Bulldogs finished their scoring in the second quarter as Renteria grabbed a 21-yard

pass from Watkins for the touchdown. This score finished a 52-yard drive, which took only three plays, all passes. Renteria set up the score with

a pass interception and ran back to the Ranger 48. A run by Fox was unsuccessful for two points.

The Tigers of Glen Rose managed to score in the third quarter on a four-yard drive up the middle of the Bulldog line by Tailback Danny Thompson. A run for two points failed.

Outstanding defensive players for the Bulldogs were Roger Rutledge, Bill Watkins, Renteria, Fox, and Richard Williams.

Next Friday night the Bulldogs will travel to Dublin for their final game of district play.

This year's Christmas Seal originates from an old English folksong. The Seal is "a partridge in a pear tree." a plump partridge and a ripe golden pear on a field of blue and yellow.

Twelve Days of Christmas" is the rollicking old English folksong in which "a partridge in a pear tree" is one of the lines. The origin of the song is unknown. But it was probably a song of the countryside, of wandering minstrels and Christmas fairs. The song honors the 12 days from Christmas, Dec. 25, to Epiphany, Jan. 6, the day the Three Wise Kings arrived from the East to visit the child.

Much of the fun of the song has always been trying to remember its long list of "gifts" that "my true love sent to me," ranging all the way from two turtle doves to 12 drummers drumming. In the old days "The Twelve Days of Christmas" not only was a test of memory but often times of sobriety.

"The tradition of this marvelous old song and that of the Christmas Seal are well matched this year," said Mrs. Jeannette Arther, Nurse Region 6, State Health Department, TB Control Division. "The Seals decorate thousands of cards, letters and packages in Eastland County each holiday season."

180,000 Christmas Seal letters are being mailed to area residents this week. Proceeds will be used to support programs in research, health education, tuberculin skin testing in the schools and the mass screening activities of the Christmas Seal Mobile X-ray Unit.

THE GORDON SPOT

It now looks as if our county peanut crop will be one of the best ever. We do not yet know if the peanut crop in the county will be as large as the 1966 crop, but several farmers have told me their individual crop is better than it was in 1966. The average yield in 1966 was 41.9 bushels per acre in Eastland county—the best yield on record.

Many believe that this year's crop will be valued higher than the 1966 crop because the price of peanuts are \$13.25 per ton over the '66 crop.

The County ASGS records show that the average yields in the county were from 17 to 20 bushels per acre, between 60 and 1964. In 1965 the yield was 23.2 bushels and in '67 it was 31.2.

Increased use of irrigation and better production practices are largely responsible for the increase in yields the last few years. However, the weather was very favorable in 1966 as well as this year. While the yields and the price are up this year, we would also mention that costs of production is up. Many



Has 15,000 Birds . . .

New Quail Hunting Resort Opens For Business Southeast Of Cisco

The old R. Q. Lee Ranch, which was a Cisco-area show place a few decades ago, promises to become well known again, but for another reason — as a game bird hunting paradise.

The 966-acre place, located three miles southeast of Cisco and owned for a good many years by late R. C. (Bob) Presley, now belongs to Paul E. Jones, formerly of Breckenridge, and Jimmy D. Weir, a rancher at Jal, New Mexico.

The name of the place now is the Red Barn Hunting Resort, and it has been stocked with bobwhite quail, pheasant and chukkers for a six months hunting season that began last Oct. 1. The Resort has been licensed by the Texas Game Commission as a commercial hunting preserve. The license covers raising,

shooting and selling game birds.

The Red Barn resort accepts quail hunters at \$10 per day. This entitles the hunter to five quails. He pays extra for any he shoots over five and there is no limit. Chukkers and pheasants come a little higher than bobwhites.

The public can stop in and buy frozen quails packed two to a package (\$1.15).


Mr. Jones is the operating partner. He moved his family to the resort's main residence last June 1. He and Mrs. Jones have three children in the Cisco Public Schools and two married sons. He operated an auto upholstery firm in Breckenridge for 12 years.

Mr. Weir, the rancher, is a retired cowboy and rodeo performer. He won many trophies in a rodeo career that included riding in big shows throughout the country. He plans to move his wife and three children here later.

Jones spent the past three years studying game bird raising in preparation for his present business. When they bought their property, Jones moved his equipment and birds to Cisco. This included an electric incubator capable of turning out thousands of quail chicks.

A total of 185 laying hen quails and the incubator have turned out some 15,000 quails that now live at Red Barn Resort. The laying hens and their male mates are placed in pairs in a cage barn — similar to a cage hen laying house. Each quail hen lays some 150 eggs per year. Jones and his two helpers gather the eggs every other day and fill sections of the incubator at regular intervals.

Jones said that quails mate and remain together. In the wild, a covey of quails always includes an adult male, his hen and their chicks. They often produce two coveys per year, depending on the weather and food situation.

Since June, 10 of the laying hens have died and they were replaced. The 185 layers will be increased next year.

It takes 24 days to incubate quail eggs. As a setting of several hundred come off, they go to the brooder house where special equipment keeps them warm. When the birds are old enough, they go out to growing pens. When they are grown, the birds are ready to be released as hunters come in.

Many of the birds are killed and frozen to be sold to restaurants or the public.

Special pens are being built for the birds that will be released soon. These are 12 feet wide, six feet high and 90 feet long — big enough to give the bird flying room so they will be wilder when they are freed.

Plans call for the resort range to be stocked with 20 or 25 cows next year. All stock was kept off this year so the grass would go to seed. For the most part, the land is covered with good grass and post and live oak trees — ideal game bird country.

Jones is constantly on guard against disease and animals that might be attracted to the birds. He has trapped eight owls in the past month as they came in search of quails.

Red Barn Resort's plans for the future include bird dog kennels, a trailer park for the public and hunters, a restaurant, duck hunting next year, and catfish farming.

The Joneses, who are natives of Dokaib in East Texas, like Cisco. Needless to say, they are working hard to make their resort attractive to hunters.
