

Ranger Is On The Move and Looking to The Future

"We are not booming", Glyn Gilliam, president of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce said, "but somewhere in the past 3 or 4 years we have managed to stop the downward trend and feel now that Ranger is on the path of steady growth. There is a new feeling of confidence and expectation among business men and other Ranger residents. We need more new homes and we are getting some — but not enough."

Ranger Chamber of Commerce is justifiably proud of the "100%" improvement on Main Street, brought about by business men who have rebuilt, renovated, expanded and painted property. Businesses and stocks have increased.

Not just Main Street, on its one railroad spur, sits one of the biggest new assets this town has acquired in many years. Hou-Tex Peanut Company's shelling and storage plant, which has been improved and expanded each year since 1966 when the Houston firm, owned by Allan Gugenheim and David Askane, bought the small peanut company from T. C. Wylie, who had operated it since 1944. Wylie is now general manager of the Ranger plant and the company's peanut drying plant in Carbon.

The 1968 expansion, in anticipation of what turned out to be the county's record peanut crop worth more than \$5,000,000 to farmers, included a new warehouse, equipment programmed to shell 10,000 tons annually and enlargement of the drying facilities at Carbon.

Glyn Gilliam, president of both Ranger Chamber of Commerce and Ranger's Industrial Foundation said his organizations are willing and ready to assist in any way possible to "beat the climate" for industrial growth in Ranger. Though the C of C had no actual part in the sale by Wylie to Hou-Tex, they are eager to assist Hou-Tex or any other companies desiring to come to Ranger.

The First State Bank assisted with the original purchase and expansion program carried out by Hou-Tex. The company owners, though Houston citizens, have added much to Ranger in the form of taxes, support of civic organizations and projects and memberships in business organizations. They have spent over \$200,000 for expansion here and Carbon in the last two years, Gilliam said.

Wylie said his annual payroll for 35 to 40 men is approximately \$150,000 for year-round work instead of heretofore seasonal work. The gross annual volume is approximately \$2,350,000. The plant shells and ships some 1,000 to 1,025 tons per month to points all over the U. S. and exports to Canada and England. Transportation is shared about 50-50 between trucks and railroad.

As Wylie related facts and figures in his office, a driver came in for clearance on a truckload of peanuts — gross weight 72,340 — bound for Anaheim, California peanut butter factory.

Besides actual cash released in Ranger in salaries, the large and growing Hou-Tex plant generates business for maintenance and repairs, utilities, building trades, and etc. in the amount of \$1500 per month, which is paid farmers.

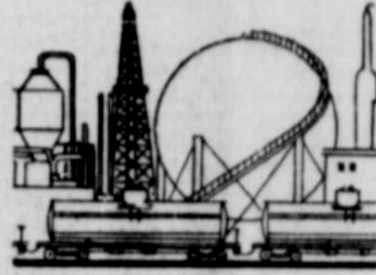
And Main Street is aware and ready: Building a business which has expanded, renovated, painted, put up new buildings, etc. include: First State Bank, Ranger Junior College downtown housing for men students, Ben Franklin variety store, Pickrell Insurance Agency, Young Age Shop, First Federal Savings and Loan, Montgomery Ward, Pulley Jewelry, Don Ervin Jewelry, Bray's Department Store, Corner Drug J. R. B. Grocery, Adams Grocery, Quality Food Mart, Bomar Building, Ranger Floral and many others. One of the biggest improvements has been the painting of walls, several stories high left raw when a building was torn down. This new neat space is a parking lot for Quality Food Mart.

Southwest Machine and Tool, along with four or five other smaller machine shops filled many of the vacant buildings; employ over 100 men; are working on contracts for airplane parts for such major companies as General Dynamics, Bell Helicopter, North American Aviation, and Ling-Temco Vaught.

Ranger Junior College has completed a long-range building program and recently converted the old Texas National Guard Armory into an attractive Student Center. Featherlite Corp. employing up to 75 men has expanded in the past three years. One new restaurant has opened in a new building and several more have enlarged and renovated. Several of the churches have either rebuilt, added on or renovated existing buildings.

In the past three years Westman Manor Convalescent Home added a new wing to the home. It now has fifty patients. Walnut Street Clinic also has been renovated in the last few months. City Floral has also done extensive remodeling.

Bulldogs End Grid Season With 14-12 Defeat Friday

For the second straight season the Ranger Bulldogs have met the Clifton Cubs, and the second straight season the Bulldogs have been beaten by the Cubs in the Quarterfinal Playoffs. Friday night the Bulldogs were defeated 14-12 to finish their 1968 football season.

Clifton got on the score board in the first quarter of play to take a half-time lead of 7-0.

The Bulldogs started off the second half with an 80-yard kick-off return by Armando Renteria. The Bulldogs were stopped short of the goal line by the strong Clifton defense.

Later in the second quarter Richard Williams, of the Bulldogs, came up with a Clifton fumble recovery at the 40 yard line as the Bulldog offense, with Tom Fox III, powered through the Cubs to score the first Bulldog TD. A try for two points by Fox fell short of the goal.

Clifton then started a 72 yard drive to take the winning touchdown. A 15-yard penalty against the Bulldogs put the Cubs in scoring position as Wayne Prescher moved in to score the touchdown and kicked the extra point.

Ranger's quarter back, Bill Watkins, started connecting passes to Renteria and Brad White on the sideline as the Bulldogs tried the ensuing kickoff and drove to the 18 yard line before being held by the Cub defense.

Clifton's offense could not move the ball and were forced to punt as Ranger took the punt returned it to the 46 yard line. A pass from Watkins to Renteria carried the ball to the 26 and two plays later Watkins fired a long pass to Brad White who grabbed the ball in the end zone for another Bulldog touchdown.

Fox tried an end sweep to the right side of the line but was stopped. The Cubs held on to their 14-12 lead.

The Bulldogs tried to get a drive going again with 4:55 left in the game but a 15-yard penalty on a play killed their last effort to score.

Outstanding players for the Bulldogs were Tom Fox, Watkins, Renteria, White, Bobby Sipes, Mike Lobrado, DeLazaros, and Richard Williams.

The Bulldogs will trade in their grid uniforms Monday morning to start their basketball season, after ending a very impressive football season. The entire team and coaching staff are to be congratulated on a fine season they have ended.

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Ranger Junior College Is Accepted in Association

Ranger Junior College is now a member of the Southern Association of Colleges.

This announcement was made following an official business meeting held in Atlanta, Ga. on Wednesday, Dec. 4. This is the highest accredited goal a college can obtain.

Work toward this coveted title began in 1966 when the original contact was made with the Southern Association, followed by application in the fall of 1967.

A committee from the association visited Ranger last spring and gave a favorable report. Dr. E. W. Mince, RJC President, was in Atlanta, Ga. in October to answer questions of the Screening Committee concerning the report.

Ranger Junior College was admitted along with four junior colleges and one senior college.

The attitude of both the community and the campus did much to influence the favorable report of the committee, a spokesman said.

RJC To Sponsor Area High School Cage Tourney

Ranger Junior College will sponsor its fifth high school invitational basketball tournament December 12, 13, and 14. Eight teams will compete, with Graford returning to defend the championship it won last year. Other teams will include Ranger, Eastland, Strawn, Gordon, Eula, Dublin, and the Wetzerford Junior varsity.

Girls' teams will also compete in a separate division. Voting for the title will be high school teams representing Ranger, Albany, Eastland, Eula, Strawn, Gordon, Dublin and Graford.

The RJC Rangers will meet Navarro Junior College in a conference tilt to open the tournament Thursday night.

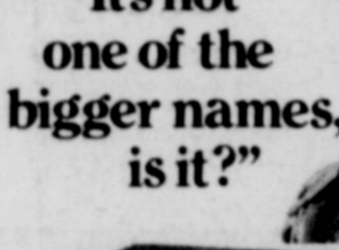

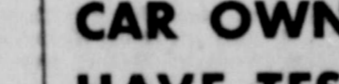

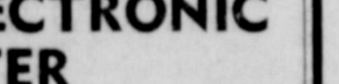

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AUSTIN. — Lt. Gov. Preston Smith is making arrangements to take office as governor on January 21.

He already has selected some of his official family. Jim Oliver of the Legislative Budget Board, which Smith now heads, will become director of the executive budget office. Oliver is working on the budget that the new governor will recommend to the legislature.

Jerry Hall, chief of the Capitol Bureau for Newspapers, Inc. — The Austin, Waco, Port Arthur and Lufkin dailies — will become Smith's press secretary.

Certain to have a top job, either as secretary of state or as chief administrative assistant, will be Harold Dudley, who managed Smith's campaigns.

New members of the legislature came to Austin for two days to learn the ropes about the legislative process.

Speaker-to-be Gus Mutscher of Brenham, with the help of the Legislative Council, arranged the orientation sessions. Freshman legislature will thus have an insight into how the legislative process works when they start the 104-day session on January 14.

Turn-over in the legislature this year was low. Only 30 new members were named

to the 150-member House, and only three new senators among the 31-member Senate. Two of the senators have been in the Legislature before, so there are only 31 in all who have not had legislative service.

For the 4th straight month the Railroad Commission left the allowable unchanged at 41.3 per cent of potential, permitting a December maximum production of 3,027,299 barrels daily.

December pattern will average out the year at 44.9 per cent of potential which (by the old standard) means 164.3 million flowing days — highest since the 171-day days of production during the 1956-57 Suez crisis.

Five of 14 major Texas crude oil buyers asked bigger allowable, three less and six the same.

Buyers aplenty showed up at the Veterans Land Board's sealed-bid sale at which 233 repossessed tracts were offered to high bidders.

Total number of bids was 898, and the Board accepted the high bids on all the tracts except four. One 74-acre farm in Guadalupe County drew 90 bidders. High man was Marion A. Coulter, who bid \$22,502.

Board even managed to sell a 350-acre tract in Maverick County on which no bids were received the first time it was offered. It was one of the "block deals" from the veterans land grants of the 1950's, and this time it drew 10 bidders.

Short Snorts

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has asked the U. S. Corps of Engineers for a permit to build an artificial reef seven and a half miles southeast of the Port Aransas jetty.

State Health Department purchased six porta-mobile radios to provide communications in disaster areas, such as it faced in the Hurricane Carla situation.

Nine hundred men at the state prison farm units at Angleton and Trinity who volunteered to be inoculated with the new Hong Kong influenza vaccine to test the effectiveness of the new vaccine will be watched by Baylor Medical School doctors.

Big-city ambulance operators told a House committee headed by Dr. Don Hand of San Antonio that private operations of ambulance service with subsidies from cities and counties is the best way to provide this service in urban areas.

Two state agencies are wondering which one should regulate the sale of cooperative or "condominium" apartments: Texas Real Estate Commission which has jurisdiction if the agents sell the apartments as real estate or State Securities Board which has jurisdiction if the sale is of stock in the apartment house corporation.

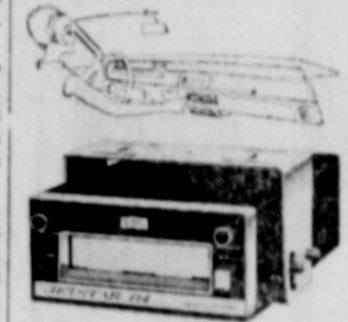
Last, a teen-age girl. The

Civil Defense Is Subject for USDA Officials, Families

Do you think people will usually panic and "go to pieces" when disaster strikes? According to research conducted by the U. S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the Department of Defense, panic is a rare response to an emergency of major proportions.

This and other important facts about disaster brought about by radioactive fallout, floods, hurricanes, earthquakes, and tornadoes, were discussed by the members of the County National Defense Board at a program presented in the Reddy Room of Texas Electric on Monday evening, Dec. 2.

The chairman of the Defense Board, J. G. Meredith, Office Manager of the A. S. C. S., explained that the purpose of the meeting was to help adults know the best ways to prepare themselves and their families for unseen emergencies.

D. Gordon, County Extension Agent, presented a series of slides to show the safety measures to take before disaster strikes. E. E. McAlister,

Work Unit Conservationist for S. C. S., discussed how people act in disasters. His remarks were based upon the fact sheet from the U. S. D. A.

"Building your own strength to handle emergencies" was primarily a lesson in Mental Health. Much to the audience's surprise, they learned that according to research, play should come before a job is finished. Upon being questioned by Meredith, the group had supposed it was best to work done first, then play.

The last section to be discussed was "How parents can help children handle emergency." This part of the program was led by O. M. Boyle, County Supervisor for the Farmers Home Administration.

The fact that pre-school children are not too young to be trained how to face danger was pointed out. The attitude and philosophy of life of the parents determines how children will handle an emergency, such as fire, flood, or radioactive fallout.
