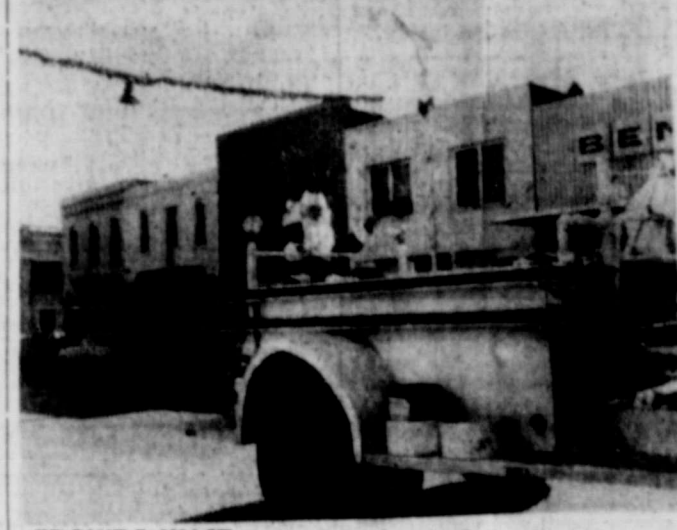
Richard Helmcamp was master of ceremonies for the 90-minute variety program of fifteen numbers.

LIGHTING TECHNIQUES - up to 30 points. The use of regular Christmas lights, spot and flood lights and other lights such as fluorescent, reflector color lights, etc. will be determining factors.

ORIGINALITY - up to 20 points. Prime consideration will be new lighting ideas or effects, new ways of using standard devices such as candles, wreaths, luminous plaques, etc.

INGENUITY - up to 20 points. Advantageous use of the structure of the house and its surroundings will determine points earned.

Using above guide, a maximum number of points attainable for one display is 100.

The show will be officially dedicated to the late J. M. Cooper in a special program to be held at 10:00 a.m. Saturday morning. B. G. Hancock, Horticulturist from Texas A&M; John Burleson, Extension District Agent from Stephenville and Cox will take part in the program. County Agent DeMarquis Gordon said Cooper originated the first county pecan show in Texas in 1952. Other counties followed his example and this year there will be twenty-four county pecan shows, three regional shows and one state pecan show. Gordon said Cooper probably did more than anyone else to promote the culture of high quality pecans in Texas while he was County Agent of Eastland County.

The pecans will be processed for judging Friday morning. Friday noon is the deadline for entering pecans in the show. Entries will be judged Friday evening and Saturday morning. The winners in all divisions will be made known sometime Saturday morning. The displays will be taken down after noon Saturday.

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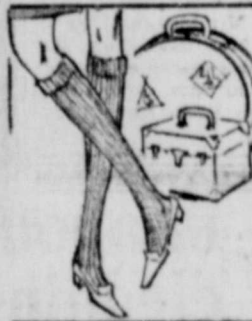
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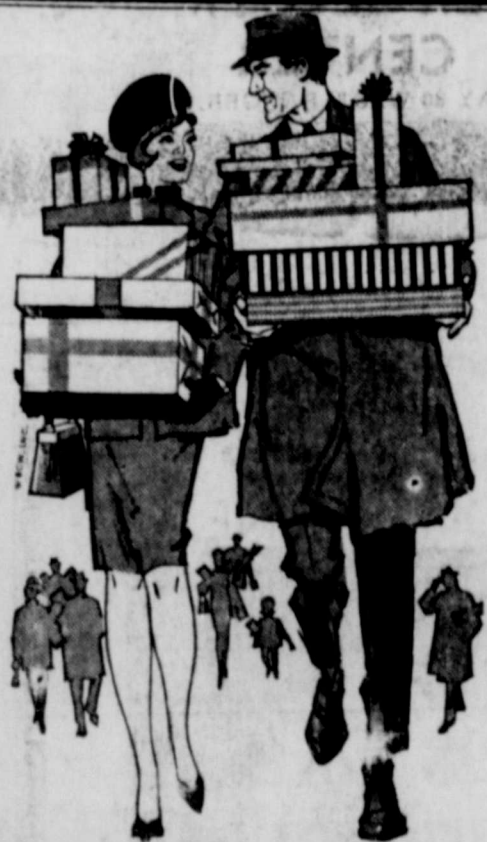

Navy Medic Tells Of Mr. 'Typical'

"Whenever you hear someone saying that the kids of today are going to the dogs . . . H.M.2 David Gary Watson, a Navy medic in the thick of things in Vietnam, has a ready answer for that. And he puts it into words in an article, entitled "A Typical Man in Vietnam," which appeared this month in a Lutheran Church publication distributed to men and women of the Armed Forces.

The piece tells about the American youngsters . . . now 19, a veteran, and fighting to make 20 . . . At 23, young Watson has seen enough for several lifetimes.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Wenzel, Star Route, Box One, Cisco, David is a Cisco High School and Cisco Junior College graduate, and was a senior pharmacy student at the University of Texas when he enlisted in the Navy in

November of 1962. Stationed at Da Nang, he must be somewhat above "typical" himself. Being a Corpsman, he finds himself constantly in the midst of drama in its rawest. Where things are so bad that the chaplains can't go out, the Corpsmen perform the duties that are needed; giving last rites to dying servicemen and a million and one other things that comfortable civilians can hardly imagine back at home. He's been in Vietnam since May, and with luck he'll be home next May. He was recently wounded but reports himself "okay" now.

Due to a communications break down when he was out on a rescue mission not so long ago, his parents were mistakenly notified of his death. Later they received word that he wasn't dead, but missing. Word finally came that he was alright, but when he got back to Da Nang, he learned that one of his best friends, another medic, Navyman Bubba Everett, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Everett of Olden, had been killed in a terrific siege at Da Nang.

Corpsman Watson could have left Vietnam once, but elected to stay . . . because the younger men needed his experience. And a wiser head would agree; that he most nearly speaks their language and understands. "There are times, I'd like a shoulder to cry on, but the younger ones need one more often. Mine's usually available."

If he's above typical, what's typical?

Here's the way Corpsman Watson tells it:

A TYPICAL MAN IN VIETNAM

Most of the guys over here are 18 and fighting to make it 19. The average age of the combat soldier in many units here is 18½. And what a man he is—a pink-cheeked, tousel-haired, tight muscles fellow who under normal circumstances would be considered by society as half-man, half-boy, not yet dry behind the ears and a pain in the unemployment chart.

But here and now he is the beardless hope of free men. He is, for the most part, unmarried and without material possessions except possibly for an old car at home and a transistor radio here. He listens to rock 'n roll and 105 millimeter howitzers.

He just got out of high school, received so-so grades, played a little football, and had a girl who promised to be true.

He has learned to drink beer because it is cold and "is the thing to do." He is a private first class, a one-year military veteran with one or possibly three years to go.

He never cared for work, preferred waxing his own car to washing his dad's, but he is now working or fighting from dawn to dark; often longer.

He still has trouble spelling, and writing letters home is a painful process. But he can break down his rifle in 30 seconds and put it back together

in 29. He can describe the nomenclature of a fragmentation grenade, explain how a machine gun operates, and use either if the need arises.

He can dig a fox hole, apply first aid to a wounded companion, march until he is told to stop, or stop until he is told to march. He has seen more suffering than he should have in his short life. He has stood among hills of bodies, and he has helped to build those hills. He has wept in private and in public and has not been ashamed at doing either because his pals have fallen in battle, and he has come close to joining them.

He has become self-sufficient. He has two pair of fatigues, washes one and wears the other. He sometimes forgets to brush his teeth, but

not his rifle. He keeps his hocks dry and his canteen full. He can cook his own meals, fix his own hurts and men his own rips—material or mental. He will share his water with you if you thirst, break his rations in half if you hunger, and split his ammunition if

you are fighting for your life. He can do the work of two civilians, draw half the pay of one and find ironic humor in it all. He has learned to use his hands as a weapon and his weapon as his hands. He is now 19, a veteran, and fighting to make 20 . . .

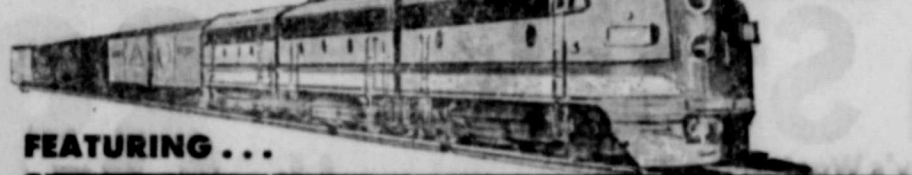

Convicted Man Admits 28 Burglaries in Eastland County

At least 28 Eastland County burglaries, dating back to 1965 and 1966, have been cleared up with the conviction and sentencing of a Lubbock man, according to County Sheriff L. E. Sublett.

A Texas Ranger brought the man to Eastland County recently en route to Huntsville, where the man is sentenced to serve a 30-year term from Lubbock.

Cecil Ray Rhinehart told

Sheriff Sublett he had burglarized a number of Eastland County firms including the safe at Sandler Manufacturing Co. in Cisco, Anderson Jewelry in Cisco, the O. K. Grocery in Ranger and the Man's Store in Eastland. Over 100 suits were taken in the Man's Store burglary, but Rhinehart remembered to Sublett "only taking about 40 suits."

The man operated with a brightly-painted rented trailer.

Two Cisco Junior College students were in Taylor County Jail and another one out on \$1,500 bond as the result of charges stemming from a series of burglaries in Eastland County, according to Sheriff L. E. Sublett this week.

Charges with theft over \$50, a felony, are Danny Ray Tidwell of Wink and John Paul Guinn of White Deer. Another White Deer student, Jerry Dan Grange is charged with receiving and concealing stolen

goods. Guinn had made bond Monday, Sheriff Sublett said.

Reported taken during the past few weeks were two deer rifles, a 30-30 and a 264 Magnum, in Cisco, two sets of hubcaps (four spinners and four "masks"), taken at the football field in Eastland the night of the Eastland - Granbury game. Persons losing such items may inquire at the sheriff's office in Eastland.

Two of the youths were first arrested in Abilene. Sher-

iff Sublett and Assistant County Attorney Emery Walton went to Abilene and took statements from two of the youths.

In other sheriff's department action, five registered Angus cows and two calves, belonging to Glen Hubbard of Eastland, and stolen recently at Rising Star, have been recovered in Mills County. Charges are expected to be filed immediately, Sheriff Sublett reported.
