




FIRST PLACE winner in the Residential Lighting Contest is the home of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Dennis, 807 Blundell.



Teresa Dudley Wins Trip To Jan. 1 Orange Bowl Football Game

Miss Teresa Dudley has been awarded a three day all-expense trip for two to Miami, Florida and the Orange

Bowl Game on Jan. 1, 1969. The award was announced during a called assembly meeting in the High School Auditorium at 1:45 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 17.

Floyd Parks, Student Council President, called the meeting to order and introduced Jim Johnson, Readers Digest representative who discussed the Quality School Plan of Readers Digest in cooperation with Sports Illustrated. He explained its sponsorship of magazine sales by Junior classes of high schools in which Ranger is an annual participant. He praised the Ranger school for its academic musical and athletic accomplishments.

Jack Clark, district manager for the Quality Plan, held his audience in suspense as he told of the Oklahoma student who was winner in 1967 and the Arkansas student who won in 1966. He then declared Miss Dudley to be winner for 1968.

Miss Dudley was called to the platform where she was presented two round trip airline tickets from Abilene to Miami, reservations for two at a Miami hotel, tickets for the Orange Bowl Game, an official football, an attractive carrying case and \$120.00 spending money.

In accepting the award, Teresa referred to an article she submitted to Sports Illustrated in which she explained why she would like to attend such a game; to see the reaction of people in the stands and the spirit of unity of fans of one team.

Miss Dudley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Beverly Dudley, Jr., was team captain in the recent magazine sales campaign. She is a member of RHS "Spirit of Ranger" band, Future Homemakers, Future Teachers and Beta Club and is photographer for the Annual Staff.

Newly Formed Teachers Organization Meets With of Ranger Independent School Trustees

Regular Business

Is Conducted At

Tuesday Meeting

The trustees of Ranger Independent School District held their December meeting Tuesday night and conducted only routine business which included going over the various monthly reports.

Meeting in the office of Supt. James R. Clark, the board received three representatives of the newly organized Classroom Teachers Association. They were Mrs. Frances Worden, president, Mrs. Marilyn Henderson and Mrs. Doris Childress.

The organization was originally formed many years ago but had ceased to function in the early sixties.

The teachers appeared before the board to ask that their organization be recognized and that they be given permission to have representatives appear before the board at various times.

The board asked them to draw up their plans and pre-

sent to the board at their next meeting.

The organization seeks what the legislature recently made legal and that is Professional Consultation agreements between boards and teachers.

It is not a means of going around principals or adminis-

trators or trying to take power from the board.

It is an acknowledgement of teaching as a profession, a process for the identification of problems, it is identification and clarification of responsibilities, it establishes lines of communication, it is a method

of reducing conflicts and is an orderly means of exchanging views.

Many schools in Texas already have such agreements and more are considering the agreements Clark said.

Clark told the board that the roofs of the Recreation Building and Hodges Primary School had hail damage sometime ago and needed repairing. Approval was given to the repair if the insurance company approves the damage done.

Clark told the board that the boilers at both the High School and Young School had had extensive repair bills on them and more trouble was expected. He said there was no danger of explosions and that both boilers had passed State inspections recently but that water leaks had occurred and many boiler tubes had to be replaced at a great cost.

The trustees agreed to ask the Board of Regents of Ranger Junior College to meet with them January 14 at Hodges Primary School at 7 p.m. in a joint fellowship meeting with nothing special on the agenda.

Reports were given on tax collections, luncheon and athletic financial reports, game reports on all the football play off games and attendance reports.

Clark told the board it was almost a certain fact that Ranger will lose one teaching unit next year due to drop in enrollment and attendance. He also reported extensive trouble this year with transmissions going out on the school buses due to dirt getting in them.

Seven Bulldogs Make All-Area Football Team

The big problem in selecting this year's Reporter-News Class A all-area team wasn't deciding who to put on it—but who had to be left off.

An abundance of talent from a number of fine Class A teams in the Big Country "spooned" the task of trying to decide who was best.

But when the selections were over, Ranger and Coahoma, the teams which were farthest in the state playoffs, had the greatest numbers assembled.

Selecting a coach of the year proved to be just as difficult—and in the end two shared the honor. Bernie Hagnes of Coahoma and last year's pick, Chaelin Smith of Ranger.

Both won their district championships when they weren't generally expected to Ranger advanced farther in the state playoffs, but Coahoma wound up with the highest-ranked team and just narrowly lost to state finalist Sonora.

Biggest problems in the selections were the running backs. There were no less than eight players given strong consideration for the three positions and all were probably good enough to have made the team during most years.

The selections were bruising Bobby Hickey of Dublin, Tom Fox of Ranger and speedy Danny Frazier of Aspermont. Together, they gained well over 4,000 yards.

For Hickey, this year's selection represented a triumph over adversity. He was named to the all-area team after a brilliant sophomore season, but missed out when hampered by injuries throughout his senior year.

He gained 1,520 yards this year and averaged 6.3 per carry despite everybody stacking.

Mr. Parker was from 1933 to 1950, Eastland County auditor, and from 1950 to 1956, assistant county auditor. In 1956, he joined Southwestern at Gorman as accountants, and retired from that organization on Aug. 1, 1968.

Boone reminded me that the most important thing to remember is that the anticoagulants must be fed in dry bait or water for several consecutive days. He said one should start with at least twenty pounds of dry bait when treating a barn infested with rats. Water baits are often more satisfactory than dry baits. 

Morris Ray Newnham of Ranger is serving as treasurer of Kappa Sigma, national social fraternity, at North Texas State University.





Veteran Questions And Answers

EDITOR'S NOTE: Veterans and their families are asking thousands of questions concerning the benefits their Government provides for them through the Veterans Administration. Below are some representative queries. Additional information may be obtained at any VA office.

Q—I am interested in buying a farm with a G.I. loan. I am told I can do this even though the selling price is more than the VA appraisal.

A—I was drafted and have served two years. Now I am about to be released from active duty but must serve in the Reserve. May I keep my servicemen's Group Life Insurance while in the Reserve or must I convert to a private plan?

A—You must convert your SGLI policy to a private plan within 120 days after release from active duty if you want to keep this insurance protection. For further information, contact your nearest Veterans Administration office when you get back home or write to the Office of Servicemen's Group Life Insurance, 212 Washington Street, Newark, N.J. 07102.

Q—I lost my father in Korea, and the Veterans Administration has been paying an allowance to my mother for me. When I enter college this fall, will the War Orphan Educational allowance also be sent to my mother, or to me?

A—The VA usually pays the benefit directly to the college student, unless the mother or other fiduciary has been for-

mally appointed as "guardian" by court action.

Q—I am interested in buying a farm with a G.I. loan. I am told I can do this even though the selling price is more than the VA appraisal.

A—Unfortunately, you have been informed incorrectly. Farm real estate (nonresidence) cannot exceed VA's appraised value. PL 90-301, signed by President Johnson last May 7, permits veterans to pay more than the VA appraised price for homes—not farms.

A—You must convert your SGLI policy to a private plan within 120 days after release from active duty if you want to keep this insurance protection. For further information, contact your nearest Veterans Administration office when you get back home or write to the Office of Servicemen's Group Life Insurance, 212 Washington Street, Newark, N.J. 07102.

Teaching Aides Offered Local Schools In Telephone Project

She's not a teacher, she's not a student but she's back in the classroom.

With her will go a couple of thousand dollars worth of equipment, several films, booklets, posters and charts and a wide assortment of teaching materials.

She's Mrs. Anna Long, school consultant for Southwest Bell. Although Mrs. Long headquarters in Fort Worth, she makes frequent trips to this area to visit with local teachers. Her job is to provide teaching aids for the local elementary and secondary schools and to show teachers how to use them.

"The telephone has a real place in the classroom — even for some of the older students," Mrs. Long explained. "And we have programs for all ages."

For the younger students, telephone company programs deal with the basic use of the telephone. "Telezonia," for example, teaches students how to dial calls, how to practice courtesy and how to use the telephone to get help in an emergency.

Still another program, "Tel-trainer," is aimed at junior and senior high school classes. The program is designed

to help students learn to communicate better and show them practical applications of the telephone in the job.

In junior high school, the program is used primarily to help students improve diet, speech and use of the English language. In high school, it is used in business classes such as distributive education. Here, students get experience in using the telephone in realistic job situations — situations like handling irate or unpleasant customers.

"There are other practical applications for the telephone in the classroom," Mrs. Long explained. "For example, students can learn to make more efficient use of the telephone in their social and school life."

In addition to the pamphlets, charts and films available to local teachers, Mrs. Long also offers the use of a Tel-trainer, an electrically-powered device containing two working telephones and a control set which produces all the sounds — dial tone, busy signal and calling ring — of the real telephone.

"With the Tel-trainer, teachers have all the practical applications of daily telephone use at their disposal — yet under their complete control," Mrs. Long noted.

Still another program under Mrs. Long's supervision, is the Aids to High School Science Program which is directed to secondary physics, chemistry and biology classes. Science teachers are offered practical teaching aids developed by Bell Telephone Laboratories, research and development unit of the Bell System. "Understanding Computers" is the subject of the current program.

"One reason I enjoy my work is because I'm always learning something new," said Mrs. Long. "That's why I'm glad when school starts again — I get a chance to pass on all new information."




