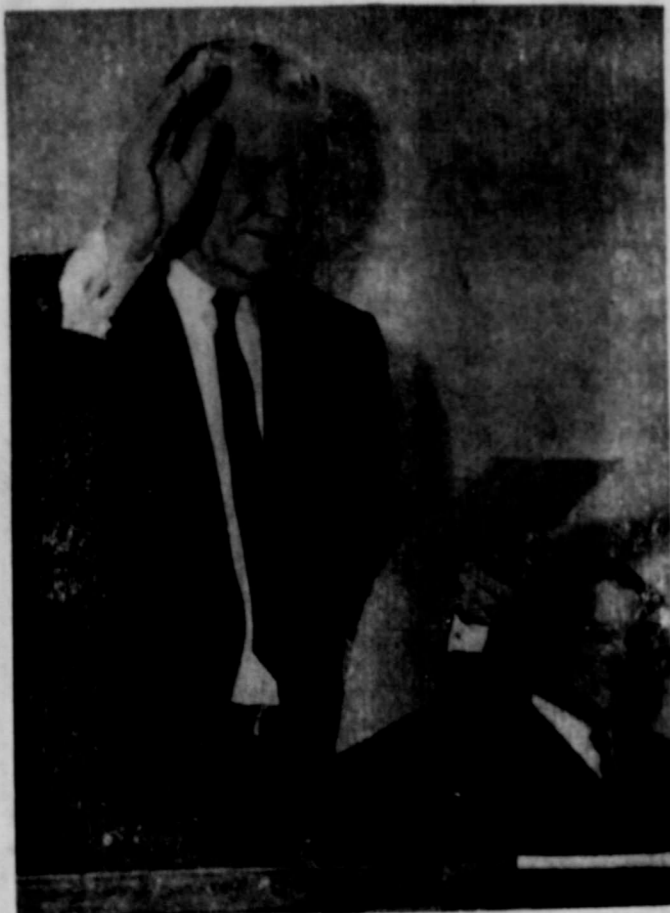

Government Brought to People In Musgrove Swearing-In Event

Bringing government to the people was vividly demonstrated in Eastland County Tuesday morning when State Rep. Burke Musgrove elected to be given his oath of office among constituents rather than with the 149 other law makers in Austin on the same day.

And symbolically, the event was held in the 11th Court of Civil Appeals, a court which the young Musgrove has helped keep here, and the oath was given by Chief Justice Clyde Grissom. A large group of county and district residents were present for the event on the fifth floor of the county courthouse. A reception was held in the 91st District Court, where County Home Demonstration Club members and 4-H Club members served cookies and coffee.

In brief remarks prior to the actual swearing in, Judge Grissom spoke of the importance of the people's interest in our form of government and pointed out that those country's which had our

form of government and tried to replace a system of law and order with other forms have failed.

"Some people believe we have too much government," he said. "Others believe we have too little. But regardless of the amounts, the system works only when people have respect for law and order," Judge Grissom said.

Introducing members of the staff of the 11th Court of Civil Appeals, including Justices Cecil Collings and Esco Walters, Clerk Homer Smith, Mrs. E. N. Varner, Mrs. Pat Mosley and Joe Jones, Judge Grissom stated that everyone, including himself, was here because they preferred to live in a small town.

During remarks prior to the reception in the 91st Court Room, Rep. Musgrove rounded the same thought when he talked briefly on the governor's proposed educational re-vamping plan when he suggested that rather than consolidating all the rural schools that emphasis should be placed on strengthening them to help maintain and improve the quality of education in the rural area so that urban problems aren't compounded by the evacuation of people to the larger areas.

Special guests and assisting with arrangements were members of the government classes at Ranger Junior College and their instructor, Charles Deaton.

County Political Leader Mike Collins presided and the Rev. Len Layne, pastor of the First Methodist Church, Eastland, gave the invocation. Mr. Musgrove introduced people from this county and from the other counties in the five-county 53rd District. RJC Student Government President Ronnie Smith lead the assembled audience of several hundred in the Pledge of Allegiance.

"We wanted to be sworn in for our second term by the people who helped elect me," Musgrove said. This was the second time that he has done this, having been sworn in at

Fox was the leading rusher, with 1417 yards, leading scorer with 157 points, most to all offense 2653 yards and tied for the most fumbles recovered, for a total of six fumble recoveries.

Three Ranger Bulldogs were named to the Bulldog Hall of Fame. They were Floyd Parks, senior center and linebacker who was named to the Allstate team, All-Area Team and the All-District Team; Armando Renteria, Honorable mention on the All-State Team, All-Area end and offensive end and defensive back on the All-District Team. Also to the Bulldog Hall of Fame was Quarterback Bill Watkins. Watkins was the leading passer for the Bulldogs, with 1160 yards. He was also named to the All-Area and All-District teams.

Voted as the most valuable back by members of the Bulldog team was Tom Fox III, most valuable lineman was Floyd Parks and the most dedicated player, voted by team, was Bill Watkins.

Texas Farm Bureau Organized in 1920

The combined assets of Farm Bureau Insurance Companies in the United States now amount to more than \$1,450,000,000, according to Eastland County Agent Buddy Aaron.

The first Texas Farm Bureau was organized in the summer of 1920. The organization grew rapidly at first but by 1932, the first Farm Bureau in Texas had ceased operation.

With the increasing interest in agricultural legislation during the first years of the New Deal came renewed efforts to organize Texas farmers and ranchers.

The Texas Agricultural Association was chartered in 1934. Two years later it became affiliated with the American Farm Bureau Federation, and still later changed its name to Texas Farm Bureau.

The fledgling organization never had more than a few thousand members during the 1930's although dues were only \$2 a year during that period.

By 1945, there were some 7,000 members in the Farm Bureau in Texas. During the next five years, it grew to more than 50,000 members as

scores of new counties were organized. The organization has grown each year since 1952.

The Texas Farm Bureau initiated its first service-to-member program in 1944 when it entered into an agreement with Blue Cross-Blue Shield of Texas for a hospital and surgical program. In 1946, the TFB joined with other states to found the Southern Farm Bureau Life Insurance Co. The Southern Farm Bureau Life Insurance Co. was established in 1947 in association with other southern state Farm Bureaus. In 1950, the TFB set up its own TFB Insurance Co., offering fire and extended coverage. The Company, which was converted into a mutual company in 1958, later began writing crop-hail insurance for members.

In the early 1960's, the TFB expanded its services to include promotion and development of export markets in Europe for Texas commodities. In 1966, the TFB inaugurated a domestic cattle marketing program limited to pilot counties. A used-hen marketing program was begun in 1967.

The latest economic service program, instituted in 1965, involves sale of Farm Bureau's own Safemark tires and batteries to members through independent dealers. More than 175 Texas counties are now participating in this program. Texas is one of 33 states in the program.

The Texas Farm Bureau today has 110,669 members in 203 organized counties. About 165 counties have their own offices.

The Texas Farm Bureau board of directors is composed of 13 directors, one from each of the 13 districts in the state. Officers of the organization are elected by board members from among their own number.

During the month of November sales of United States Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares in Eastland county totaled \$25,283, according to J. V. McWhorter, area Chairman.

Total January-November sales were \$177,873, and this is 49 per cent of the 1968 goal of \$360,000.

During the eleven-month period sales in Texas totaled \$164,300,917—89 per cent of the 1968 sales goal and a 6.8 per cent increase over sales during the same period of last year.

Nationally, sales of Series E and H Bonds and Freedom Shares for November totaled \$377 million. Series E sales totaled \$334 million and November sales of Freedom Shares were \$28 million—61 per cent above last November.

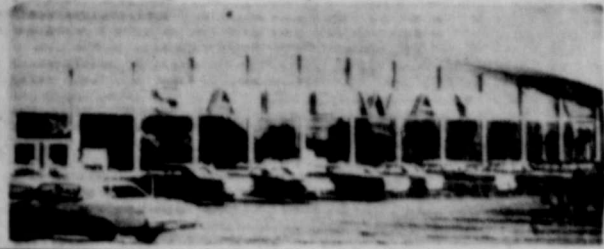

Safeway Announces 1969 Extension Plans



A 1969 building and expansion program of approximately \$30,000,000, encompassing an area within a 300-mile radius of Dallas was announced by the Dallas Division manager.

Safeway's continuing policy of modernization and development is being greatly accelerated to meet the challenges brought on by the phenomenal growth in our market area, the official said. Many of the new locations will have in-store bakeries & delicatessen operations. To accommodate more products, all of the new stores will be larger

in size, averaging 20,000 to 23,000 square feet of space.

Another step in the modernization program is individual designing of the stores to adapt to the neighborhoods in which they are being built, a distinct change from the universal style or "trademark" store exterior which has been used in the past.

In addition to the stores under construction, 12 major remodeling projects, totaling in excess of \$3,500,000 dollars

are being started. Other plans include: expansion of Dallas Division Headquarters, \$500,000; expansion of warehouse facilities, \$2,785,000; and ultra-modern new Milk and Ice Cream Plant, \$4,500,000; a n d expansion of plant operations in Denison, \$384,000.

The \$30,000,000 dollar expenditure is the first phase of a major growth program scheduled by Safeway over a 3-year period. "The store customer of today," the official said, "is better informed, more quality-conscious and more sophisticated in her tastes than ever before, and wants full value in both product and in service. Safeway, as always, will do everything possible to anticipate these requirements and meet them fully."

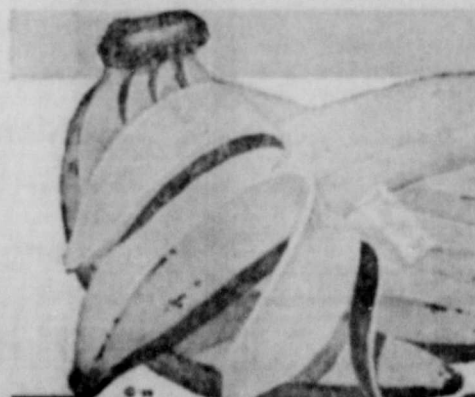
