Nurse Administrators Get Data on New Law

Mrs. Laurette D. Lawler, administrator, and Mrs. Mary F. Cope, bookkeeper, of the Western Manor, in Ranger were two of 296 nursing home staff members and public welfare workers who attended a conference in Lubbock, Texas, on January 21, 1969, on the implementation of the new multiple levels of service program for public welfare recipients residing in nursing homes.

The one-day meet, sponsored by the Texas Nursing Home Assoc. and the State Dept. of Public Welfare, dealt with the responsibilities of the nursing home and state welfare workers under this new program which became effective on Jan. 1, 1969.

"The new program is designed to place the patient in the nursing home that offers the level of specific care program that the individual need stated Mr. Frost and Carey.

Nursing homes and those welfare recipients requiring nursing home care are now classified into three types: Skilled care, intermediate care III and intermediate care II. Skilled nursing homes serve patients requiring maximum nursing care. Intermediate III homes serve patients needing nursing care, but of a lesser

degree. Intermediate II homes serve residents who do not require professional nurse care, but are incapable of independent living.

A welfare recipient classified as Skilled, Intermediate III or Intermediate II will be provided care in a nursing home of like classification, where possible. However, when not possible, special personnel waivers have been developed to insure that all eligible recipients receive necessary nursing care. Waivers may be granted for various reasons, some of which include: physician orders that a move would be detrimental to the patient, where beds of like classification of the recipient are not available in the area, and to avoid the separation of family members who may not have the same classification.

James Baker, President of the Texas Nursing Home Assoc., stated, "In order to better serve the needs of the community, many of our member nursing homes will establish distinct part classifications. This means that a nursing home might care for two or three type patients within three."

Ranger General Hospital HAS NOT been re-approved since it last's Medicare on Nov. 4, 1968.

Much time, labor and money has been spent in order to meet requirements for service under the Health Insurance for the Aged program. Several Medicare patients have been admitted to the local hospital, but to date, no Medicare payments on these patients have been received by the hospital.

Ranger citizens should write or call their congressman, senator and/or representative and ask WHY the hospital has not been re-approved.

Our local hospital is equipped to give excellent medical care and treatment to the Medicare patients, as well as to those who are under 65 years of age. The hospital now has facilities for some thirty patients with two very fine doctors.

Sure, Ranger wants and needs a NEW HOSPITAL, and it will take the work and support of every citizen of the hospital district to see that we have a hospital, one that will be beneficial to the Ranger area, now and certainly to citizens of Ranger in the future.

A Citizens Advisory Committee, approved by the City Commission, has been working hard to find ways and means whereby Ranger can have a new hospital. The committee has made many trips to Austin to talk with officials of the Texas State Hospital Board and have been able to make favorable reports to the hospital meetings concerning their findings.

LOCAL PETITION ASKING H.E.W. FOR PROVIDER HOSPITAL AID

(Editor's Note: This is a copy of the Petition that is being circulated for holders of Medicare Cards. If you have not been contacted, go by the hospital and sign the petition).

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

We, the undersigned, beseech the Department of Health, Education and Welfare to grant to Ranger General Hospital provider funds under the Medicare Program. We feel that the Hospital Board, the Administrative Staff, and the local Doctors are endeavoring to comply with all of the Medicare requirements. We are fully aware of the age of the building. We feel that so long as an honest effort is being made to correct this deficiency we should be allowed to continue to receive Medicare funds.

We are over the age 65 and most of us have used Ranger General Hospital all of our lives. We feel that the decision of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare to refuse Medicare funds for Ranger General Hospital is a very serious threat to our health, as well as, a mental strain which we as Medicare recipients should not have to endure.

Furthermore, we feel that we should be allowed to be treated by the Physician of our choice. We realize fully that this can not be done if we are forced to be admitted to an out of town hospital. We know the world acknowledges the shortage of physicians and no one can expect physician to travel miles in order to care for a patient who should be hospitalized in his home town.

Ranger is endeavoring to build a new hospital. Again, we beseech the Department of Health, Education and Welfare to grant at least temporary or special certification to Ranger General Hospital.

Report From Thailand

Thailand-Land Of The Free

NAKON RATCHASIMA, THAILAND — Thailand is indeed the land of the free, as well as the land of smiles, the land of beauty, the land of tranquility. The Thai people are the friendliest in Asia, almost never losing their temper. The year round sunshine and tropical climate make Thailand a green-hued paradise to any weary traveler.

The true gem of Bangkok, and the pride of the country, is the breathtaking Wat Arun, the Temple of Dawn. Ancient and noble families of Siam worshiped Goharana Buddha, the Lord Buddha to the Thais here. The main structure, the Royal Chapel, extends hundreds of feet into the air. The tower is embedded with small pieces of enameled pottery, which glint in the sun like diamonds. The smaller buildings in the Wat are roofed with sheets of solid gold leaf, placed there by the devout in hopes that their offerings will help them return to earth in the form of a beautiful animal or insect. Reincarnation is more fact than fiction to the pious Thai. To sit at a fly or step on a cricket is a mortifying mistake. One may have just destroyed his honored grandfather.

The Thai are a handsome race, and do not possess the usual squat, extremely slanted characteristics of most Asians. A Thai feels deeply honored to have an American as a houseguest. He is soft spoken, courteous, gentle, and, as one soon comes to believe, possesses no temper whatsoever.

The countryside is equally friendly and pleasing to view. Although Bangkok, the country's capitol, is filled with unbelievable sights such as

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the Pasteur Reptile Institute. The Institute is the leading snakebite control research center in the world, using such advanced methods as radioactive analysis of the venom-producing glands of deadly snakes. Large quantities of antivenin, or snakebite serum, used in the treatment of the bite of the King Cobra, the Krait, and Bamboo Pit Viper are produced here.

Bangkok University, the most up-to-date center of higher learning in Southeast Asia, is housed on a sprawling campus just down Rama V Avenue from the Institute. The University produces the majority of the doctors, lawyers, dentists, engineers, and other professionals so vital to this booming country.

The geographical lifeline of Thailand is the Chao Phraya river, which empties into the Gulf of Siam at Bangkok.

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
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



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2 Countians Sought To Assist With Aged

Two Eastland County residents are sought for positions working with the elderly in this county, it has been announced here.

Applications will be taken at the Home Demonstration Office in the Basement of the Courthouse in Eastland on Monday, Feb. 3, from 9 a.m. to 12 noon. Mrs. Dorothy Griffin, area coordinator has announced.

An aide and a VISTA volunteer or two VISTA volunteers are sought Mrs. Griffin said. The VISTA Volunteers will work locally and in be-

nounced here.

half of the elderly poor through the Senior Opportunities Services (SOS) program. The SOS program replaces the FiND program, which has been authorized and funded by the State of Texas to assist the elderly in this 16-county area where the highest percentage of over-65 persons live, it is reported.

The proposed program is sponsored by the Hill Country Community Action Association, Inc. in San Saba in cooperation with Central Texas Opportunities, Inc., Coleman, and Community Council of Comal and Blanco Counties, New Braunfels.

Persons should be willing to work with the elderly and the VISTA volunteers will receive six weeks training in Colorado Springs, Colo., and be reimbursed for food, lodging and personal expenses according to costs in the area. (About \$175 per month, less taxes) and six cents/mile when they use their own auto on the job. The volunteers will be eligible for a \$50 per month bonus at the end of the first year of work. The volunteers will be covered under Blue Cross-Blue Shield through VISTA. VISTA pay does not affect Social Security benefits, Mrs. Griffin said.

Sign-Up Dates Set For Crops By County ASC

Farmers will sign-up for '69 wheat, feed grain and cotton crops beginning Feb. 3 and ending March 21, according to an announcement by the Eastland County ASCS office. Producers were due to receive notice of payment rates and participation provisions before Feb. 3.

April 1 is the final date to transfer peanut acreage by sale or lease, the announcement said. Yields must be established before transfer details can begin. The total transfer for a farm may not exceed 50 acres for the combined 1968 and 1969, the announcement added.

Meetings on peanut production have been announced for February 19 in De Leon and February 20 in Rising Star. Specialists from the extension service will hold all-day meetings on these dates. Time and meeting sites will be given later.

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



Completions Reports Filed For Two Caddo Oil Wells Near Cisco

Completion reports have been filed for two new oil wells in the Joe Kiel Field, a Caddo lime pool five miles southwest of Cisco in Eastland County. The field had been regarded as depleted.

General Minerals Co. of Wichita Falls completed both of the new wells as their No. 1 W. T. Donham and No. 2 W. T. Donham. Both are in Section 91, Block 3, H&TC Survey.

The No. 1 Donham gauged a daily potential of 21 barrels

of 42 gravity oil. Flow was through a 1-2 inch choke with 200 pounds casing pressure. Production was from perforations at 2,810-50 feet after treatment with 500 gallons of 28 per cent acid. The hole was bottomed at 3,326 feet.

The No. 2 Donham had a daily potential of 31 barrels. It was on pump from an open hole after similar treatment. Perforations were at 2,860 feet with the bottom at 2,900 feet.

Safety rules for boys and girls who fly kites were outlined today by Frank Sayre, Manager of Texas Electric Service Company.

As explained by Sayre, the safety rules are: fly your kite out in the open where it won't get caught in wires, trees or TV aerials; use only string made of cotton, silk, linen, or rayon; use only wood in your kite frames, and fly kites only in good weather. You don't want to get them rain soaked, and any kind of string can be dangerous when wet. If your kite should get caught in electric wires, call Texas Electric Service Company. They will send someone to get it down for you.
